The person with insomnia who delays visiting his doctor harms himself in two ways. He puts off finding the real source of his trouble, perhaps letting a serious illness get the upper hand. Meanwhile, he suffers needlessly from the frustration of trying to make himself sleep, and then drags himself around miserably during the day without the energy to perform his normal tasks.

Sleep, and enough of it, is necessary to health, efficiency, and full enjoyment of living. Sleep does certain necessary things for the body which nothing else can do. It restores muscles and tissues which are fatigued or broken down. It also builds up reserve energy, which gives that fresh and energetic feeling after a restful sleep. Sleep is directly responsible for reducing poisons and wastes accumulated in the body, and sleep must supplement good food in replacing and building red corpuscles in the blood.

HEALTH FOR ALL

Insomnia, the inability to sleep when sleep is ordinarily to be expected, is a symptom rather than a disease itself. Most people who find it impossible to sleep at night are actually suffering from some mental or physical disorder, or a combination of the two.

It is not uncommon for people to have difficulty in getting to sleep once in a while, usually for easily explainable reasons. The majority of us are wakeful at night during oppressively hot weather, or if we are excited just before bedtime, or if we eat a heavy meal late at night. But these conditions are temporary and are seldom a serious threat to health.

But of real concern is "true insomnia," the condition whereby a person goes right after night without sleep. This situation is one of nature's warnings that there is something mentally or physically wrong with the sufferer which calls for medical diagnosis and treatment. The person who, for unexplained reasons, cannot get the sleep which his body needs should see his doctor without delay.

If they are prescribed for a particular reason and used under medical direction, these "sleep producers" should be kept out of the family medicine cabinets, labeled carefully, and any left over should be destroyed when the condition for which they were prescribed has been corrected.

**Resistant Plants**  
Plant diseases are no respecters of experimental plots. As a result scientists have sometimes acquired valuable information in the nick of time. So it was in the case of Victoria—blight of oats, which invaded breeding plots and demonstrated to plant breeders of the U. S. department of agriculture and some of the middle west state experiment stations a type of disease resistance soon to be needed on a large scale. Clinton—and some of the other new varieties of oats derived from the Bond variety—in that way became known as resistant to a disease soon to be rampant in the Mississippi valley. This disease attacked the widely grown oat varieties derived from the Victoria oat brought in from South America.



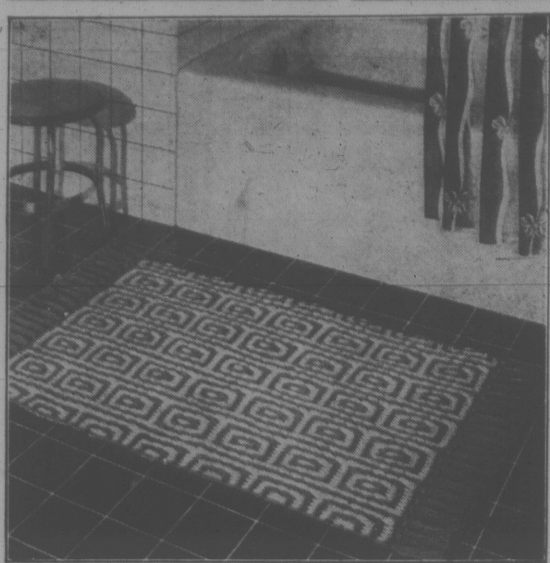

MISERABLE LACK OF LAW ENFORCEMENT HERE

One day there is a hopeful sign that America is beating down the rough spots in its quest for democracy for all of its citizens; another day something comes along that makes it appear that we are competing with Russia in the perpetration of some of the very things we yell at them about from the house-tops.

When the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that Negroes could not be barred from voting in the Democratic primaries in the south, it became necessary for additional lawsuits to be brought to secure the enforcement of the law. This very thing happened in South Carolina and it became necessary for a district judge to threaten to jail election officials if the law was not enforced. Of course, they obeyed.

Some South Carolina people don't like this decision. They don't want to abide by it and have gone so far as to threaten and stone the home of Judge Waring. To date, nobody has been punished for the offense and officers, sworn to uphold the law, seem unwilling to do anything about it.

Such an offense strikes at the very foundation of our judicial system. If a court cannot be secure in its rendition of opinions according to the law of land, then anarchy steps in and nobody can know whether he will get justice when he goes to court seeking redress for a wrong or an impartial interpretation of the law.

A COURSE OTHERS MAY WELL FOLLOW

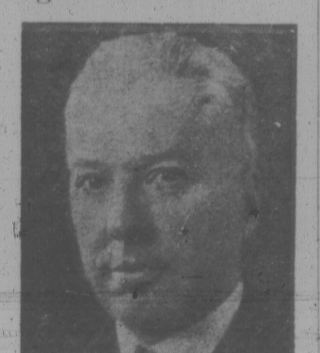
At a recent meeting of the National Negro Nursing Association voted to disband in January, 1951. The organization took this action because the objects for which it was formed had just about been completed and to carry on further would simply be a duplication of effort.

The association cited the fact that hospitals were letting down the bars on Negro applicants, that Negroes were being accepted in many associations without discrimination and positions were opening freely. The organization took a wise step. Certainly there is no justification for maintaining separate associations of any kind when people are being accepted on their merit, rather than on their race. In addition to the expense of maintaining separate groups, they tend to put Negroes in one world and whites in another.

The action taken by the nursing association is in step with the times. And Negroes cannot criticize others for segregation, separation and discrimination if they, themselves, do the same thing.

It is hoped that other separate organizations will see the light and follow suit. As a matter of fact, liquidation of some of our national professional organizations is long overdue. Many state organizations of Negro lawyers and doctors have done this or have become inactive because they find it more advantageous to belong to the general associations.
