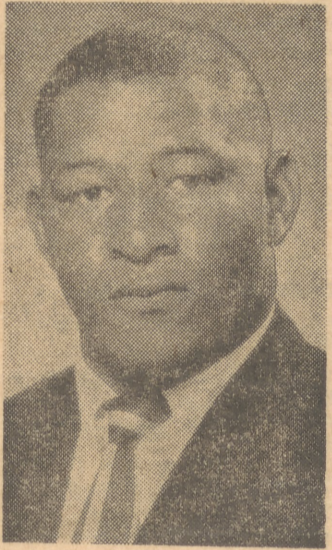

Probe Shooting of Mississippian

Cal Jones, Iowa's First Two-Time All American Member

On Look Magazine's all-star team for the second straight year is Calvin Jones, guard and captain of the State University of Iowa football team, who last Saturday became the first two-time All-American player in Hawkeye history.

The team was chosen for Look by the Football Writers Association of America.

A second major honor came to Jones when he was announced as winner of the Outland Award, presented annually by the Football Writers Association to the guard or tackle adjudged best in the nation.

Jones is one of nine middle western standouts chosen on the 22-man all-America. All 22 are "first-teamers," no distinction being made as to first or second teams.

The tradition of choosing a 22-man all-America originated with the late Grantland Rice and has been continued by Look and the writers.

Effective this year, it is reported, the Look-Football Writers team will become the nucleus of the 1956 All-Star football squad which will meet the professional league champions next August in the Chicago Tribune's annual charity game.

Jones is one of six Big Ten Conference players on the team. The others are Norman Masters, tackle of Michigan State; Jim Parker, Ohio State's great guard; Ron Kramer, Michigan end; Earl Morrall, Michigan State quarterback, and the famed Howard (Hopalong) Cassidy, Ohio State halfback.

Rev. Delaine Who Fled S.C. Gives Up in New York

New York (CNS)—Rev. J. A. Delaine who fled for his life from Lake City, S. C. after leading a fight for desegregated schools, appeared at the District Attorney's office this week with 25 friends to answer a fugitive charge.

Delaine told how he had worked with the NAACP in its anti-segregation fight then lost his church which was burned so that even the insurance company was investigating for arson. On the night of October 10th, Delaine retold how caravans of hooded men drove by his house with the sheriff even suggesting that Delaine ought to try to hit one of the cars with a bullet to mark it.

When they fired first, he fired two shots. One, it is charged hit one of the men and this is South Carolina's charge against him.

Official extradition hearing was set for December 28. Meanwhile, Delaine and his attorney plan to appeal to Governor Harriman of New York to prevent his return to South Carolina.

ICC Orders End to Racial Segregation by Jan. 10; Calls It 'Unreasonable'

Washington, D. C. — The interstate commerce commission (ICC) Friday, Nov. 25, ordered an end to racial segregation on interstate trains and passenger buses.

It ruled too that segregation of interstate travelers in public waiting rooms is unlawful.

(At Atlanta, Ga., Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook pledged to continue to seek enforcement of racial segregation on trains and buses operating within the state (intrastate) despite the interstate ban.)

The commission, in years past, has gone along with the theory that separate but equal accommodations for the races met the requirements of the interstate commerce act.

"Unreasonable"

But it said in Friday's rulings: "The disadvantage to a traveler who is assigned accommodations or facilities so designated as to imply his inherent inferiority solely because of his race must be regarded under present conditions as unreasonable.

"Also, he is entitled to be free of annoyances . . . which almost inevitably accompany segregation even though the rail carriers . . . sincerely try to provide both races with equally convenient and comfortable cars and waiting rooms."

The supreme court in 1950, upsetting an ICC ruling, banned segregation in railroad dining cars.

The ICC returned its findings Fri-

day in two separate cases. One was initiated by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People against 13 railroads, operating principally in the south.

Bus Incident

The other case was brought before the commission by Sarah Keys, New York City beautician, who charged that while serving as a WAC in 1952, she was refused further transportation by the Carolina Coach Co. of Raleigh, N. C., when she refused a driver's demand that she move to the back of the bus.

The orders drew one dissent, by Commissioner J. Monroe Johnson of South Carolina, one of the 11 members, who asserted:

"It is my opinion that the commission should not undertake to anticipate the (supreme) court and it—

Tuskegee, Institute, Ala.—Ways of aiding nearly 400,000 Negro farm families in the South who earn under \$1,000 a year was the problem which challenged over 100 agricultural experts representing 16 states, here this week at a rural development conference sponsored by the school of agriculture.

Proposals for solving the problems of these low-income farm families ranged from increasing the personnel of federal and state agricultural agencies to encouraging the establishment of more industries in the South to provide additional off-farm employment.

Former NAACP Leader Tells Economic 'Squeeze' By White Citizen's Council

Belzoni, Miss.—It's the same setting as it was last May 7 when the Rev. George Wesley Lee—a man who dared speak out and fight for desegregation was mysteriously killed after his automobile crashed into a home. This time it is the former president of the Belzoni chapter of the NAACP who was shot last Friday night by gunmen who fired through his store window.

At Mound Bayou Hospital, Gus Courts told how a car containing three or four men drove up to his store as he stood near the cash register and opened fire through a window. Courts was struck three times. Just last Spring Courts was forced to move his store for getting Negroes to register and vote.

Courts was shot in the stomach and right arm. He was listed in critical condition after surgery early Sunday, but improved rapidly and by night was conscious and "resting well."

Gov. Heogh Urges Issuance of B. T. Washington Stamp

and answers, the wounded grocer gave his story of the shooting.

Courts said his troubles started when he tried to get more Negroes to register as voters in Humphreys county.

Last spring, he said, the Citizens Council—an organization formed to fight segregation foes with economic pressure—began putting on the squeeze.

Told to Leave

Courts said members of the council told him several times to get out of business and leave Belzoni—a delta town of some 4,000 residents, the majority Negroes.

Mrs. Courts told a newsman she recalled that a white man, whom she identified only as a member of the Citizens Council, warned her husband about two months ago against paying his poll tax so he could vote.

She said the man came to the store and threatened Courts "by mouth." Belzoni Police Chief M. L. Nichols said no Negroes voted in Humphreys

Says S.C. Politicians Are 'Ready to Destroy Country Rather Than Obey Law'

Columbia, S. C.—South Carolina politicians "are willing to destroy and even the country rather than obey the law," Clarence Mitchell, director of the Washington bureau of the National Association of Colored People, charged in an address prepared for delivery here Nov. 25 at the 15th annual convention of the South Carolina State Conference of NAACP branches.

The NAACP, he told the delegates, is "determined that they shall not succeed. We are doing everything possible to arouse the country and to guarantee that neither economic pressure nor physical violence will halt the fight for civil rights . . . We have a program of fighting for civil rights on all fronts and with all the weapons that the United States Constitution provides. We fight in the courts. We fight with the ballot. And we fight with our buying power as well as our money.

Counter Measures

The NAACP spokesman proposed programs of counter measures to meet economic pressures against civil rights advocates and of political action to pave the way for enactment of civil rights measures.

There are thousands of Americans, he said, "who will be happy to stop

eating whatever you say you have stopped eating. They will stop drinking whatever you say you have stopped drinking and they will stop wearing or using whatever you say that you cannot buy because of your views on civil rights."

To Organize Teams

Next year, during the presidential campaign, Mr. Mitchell asserted, "it may be necessary to organize teams of speakers from South Carolina and Mississippi who will go into congressional districts and key states for the purpose of letting the people know that certain candidates must be defeated in order to make sure that the right party controls the Congress. It is too early to say

Failure of Agencies
Dr. Dowdy pointed out that within the last 50 years the number of Negro farmers in the South has declined by 183,000 and their acreage has dropped correspondingly. On the other hand he said, the number of white farmers in the region has increased by 162,000 and their land in farms by close to 70 million acres.
He attributes the Negro farmer's

Crunchy Pineapple Cranberry Mold A Festive Buffet Supper Salad



This colorful salad will fit into almost any menu.

Molded fruit salads look so refreshing and will look pretty as a picture on your table. Golden pineapple, cranberries, oranges and nuts are the ingredients encased in this lemon-flavored mold. It is a perfect combination for a buffet supper featuring turkey, chicken or baked ham.

CRUNCHY PINEAPPLE CRANBERRY MOLD

- 1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple
- Water
- 2 packages lemon-flavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 3 tablespoons shredded or chopped orange peel
- 3 cups whole cranberry sauce (canned or fresh)
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Drain syrup from pineapple and add enough water to make 1 1/2 cups liquid. Heat to boiling and pour over gelatin. Stir until completely dissolved. Stir in pineapple and remaining ingredients in order given. Turn into rinsed 8-inch ring mold. Chill until firm. Dip mold in hot water for 15 seconds. Invert over serving plate to unmold. Garnish as shown with pineapple slices, salad greens and holly leaves. Serve with a fluffy dressing. Serves 8 to 10.

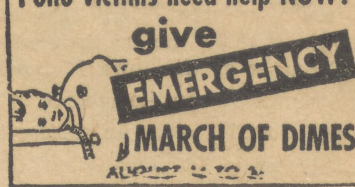

To Lubricate a Lock

IF A LOCK becomes stiff and hard to operate, a temporary cure is available in any home in the form of a soft lead pencil. Simply rub the key until it is heavily coated with the graphite, and then turn it in the lock a few times. This treatment should make the lock work like new. Of course, you can use powdered graphite, which is available in most hardware stores. This lubricant is blown into the lock through the keyhole by squeezing the tube. 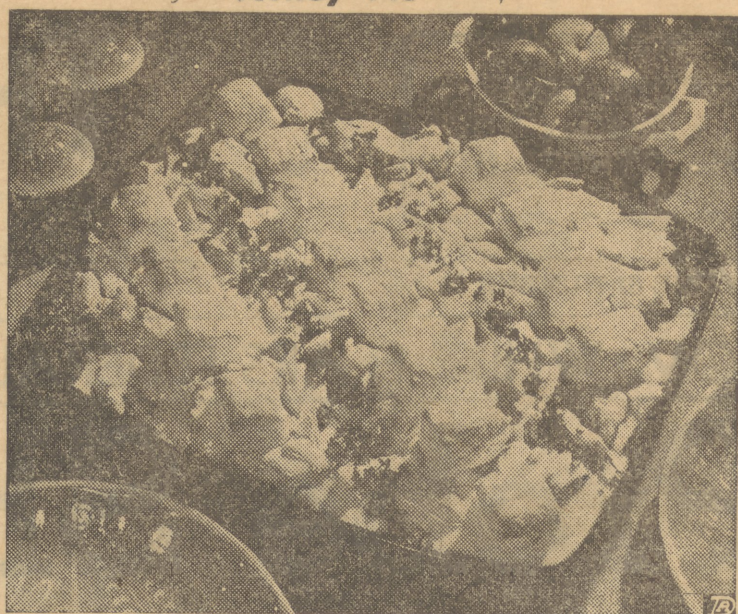

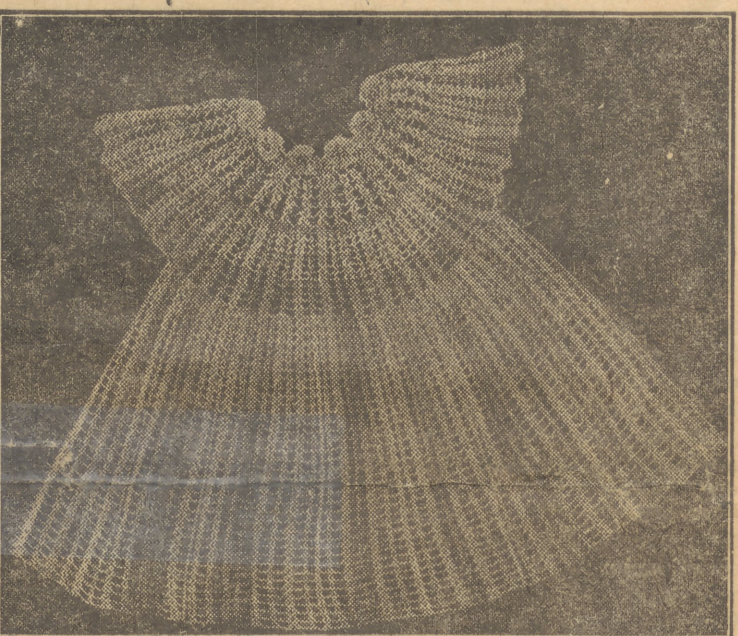

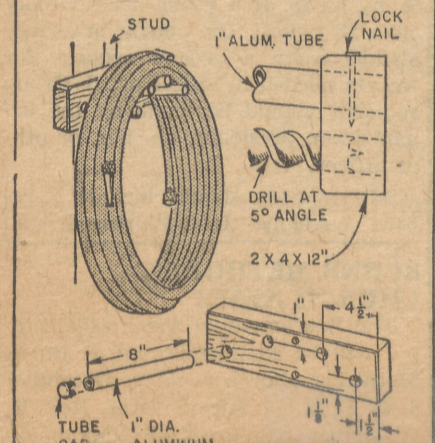

Tube Rack Keeps Gardening Hoses Safe This Winter

Caring for your gardening equipment during the winter will keep it in tip-top shape, ready for use next spring. To store garden hoses, try this simple



rack that keeps them neatly coiled, off the floor and out of the way.

Cut a 12" length of 2x4 to make the main support. Lay out the holes for the 1" Do-It-Yourself tubing and bore the holes at a slight (about 5°) angle to keep hose from sliding off. Drill 3/16" holes for the two screws that hold the 2x4 to the wall.

Cut four 8" lengths of the 1" tubing and force tubes into the bored holes. Drill holes from top edge of 2x4 into each tube end and drive in lock nail.

Screw the rack to the wall with two #10x2 1/4" screws. To keep dirt from getting into the tubes, snap 1" aluminum tubing end plugs into the outer ends of tubing hangers.

Reynolds Do-It-Yourself aluminum is available in local hardware and building supply stores.

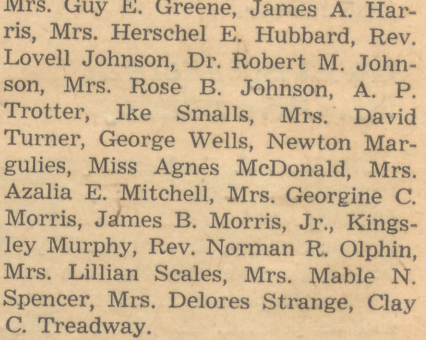
