## Seeks Review in U. S. High Court

### Ft. Dodge Jury Returns Verdict of \$24,000

City Manager, Council Member to Attend NAACP Meeting Tues.

The regular meeting of the Des Moines branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People will be held at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Mar. 24 at Wilkie House, 900 W. 17th street.

Frank McGowan, city councilman will discuss city government. Elder Gunter, city manager, will also attend and participate in the discussions which will follow.

Herbert Cox, Waterloo Disc Jockey, Cited

Waterloo, Ia.—Herbert Cox, 48, of radio station KKEL, was presented the 1958 Negro History Week Pioneer award by local groups. A native of Fort Dodge, Ia., he is believed to hold honor as the first Negro disc jockey in Iowa and the first in Waterloo.

He has received trophies for outstanding community service, citizenship and outstanding achievement.

among them a citation by the mayor "for outstanding work with the station" in the fall of 1957.

Cox has been with the station since 1954 and emcees a Sunday evening program called "Ebony Hour." He has been employed 20 years with the Rath Packing company here and holds a complimentary as deputy sheriff. During World War II he became one of the first Negroes to drive a cab here.

His wife is the former Martha Lovenia DeVan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Homer DeVan of 1336 E. 19th street in Des Moines. (Cox was the second candidate in the Bystander's weekly feature, "Who's Who in Iowa").

Regional Conference of Settlements Convened

The midwest regional conference of the National Federation of Settlements and Neighborhood Houses convened in Des Moines today for a three day session at the Hotel Fort Des Moines.

Progress of the Des Moines committee on Integrated Housing will be the topic of discussion at a luncheon tomorrow (Friday) with Atty. J. B. (Brad) Morris, jr., President of the Wilkie House board, as chairman.

Other discussions on social trends, including mobility, leisure and segregation will be held Friday morning and afternoon.

National guest speakers include Bernard M. Shiffman, executive secretary, division on recreation and informal education of the Chicago, Ill., welfare council, and Dr. David B. Carpenter, associate professor at Washington university, St. Louis, Mo.

For 8 Negro Plaintiffs In Case Involving 3 Car Accident in 1957

Fort Dodge, Ia.—A Webster county district court jury Thursday night, Mar. 12 awarded plaintiffs in seven lawsuits a total of \$24,400 for injuries and other damages received in a three-vehicle accident in 1957 which took the life of an 11-year-old Fort Dodge girl.

The verdict, reached at 7:45 p.m., was divided into seven separate divisions, with each of the plaintiffs awarded an amount. Four of the eight plaintiffs in the seven suits are members of one family.

All Are Negroes

The verdict was returned against Roger Charles Doster, Rockwell City, defendant in the case. The plaintiffs had sought to recover a total of \$54,700.

Judgments

Plaintiffs and the amounts they are to receive (with the amount they had asked in parentheses) are: Welch Lauferweiler, Fort Dodge, administrator for the estate of Sharon Kay Washington, Fort Dodge, the girl killed in the Aug. 25, 1957 accident, \$10,000 (\$10,000).

Sharon's mother, Mrs. Justine Washington, Fort Dodge, \$2,000 (\$7,500); Lonnie Dean Washington, 11, brother of Sharon, \$10,000 (\$25,000); Ronnie Gene Washington, twin brother of Lonnie, \$25; and Jinx Ann, 13, another of the children, \$25 (\$1,500 was sought for the two in a joint suit).

Arthur Blodgett, Fort Dodge, driver of the car in which the Washington family were riding, \$1,000 (\$5,000); Kass Horn, Fort Dodge, cousin of the Washington children and also a passenger in the car \$1,000 (\$5,000); and Dean Horn, Fort Dodge, owner of the car, \$350 (\$700).

Stalled Car

According to testimony brought out at the trial, the car in which the plaintiffs were riding was stalled and was being towed by a Fort Dodge Top and Body wrecker when the Doster car struck it. The Doster vehicle then bounced into the wrecker. The accident occurred west of Moorland on Highway 20.

Maurice Breen and D. M. Kelleher represented the plaintiffs and Ralph W. Bastian was attorney for Doster. The jury began deliberations at 2 o'clock in the afternoon following instructions by Judge Harvey Uhlenhopp.—Fort Dodge Messenger.

David Campanella, Ruled Delinquent, to Be Sentenced Apr. 10

New York, N. Y.—David Campanella, 15-year-old son of former baseball star Roy Campanella, was paroled to his mother, Ruth Campanella, and a Catholic priest Wednesday, Mar. 11 after he was formally adjudged a juvenile delinquent for breaking into a drugstore.

Children's Court Justice Sylvia Liese order the youth to stay off the streets at night unless accompanied by an adult. She said she will decide what punishment to give young Campanella on Apr. 10 after receiving reports from social agency experts and psychiatrists.

## Urges Positive Role by U. S. In Desegregation Struggle

Washington.—The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People Thursday called upon Congress to enact legislation authorizing "the federal government on its own initiative to bring suits in cases involving denial of civil rights."

In a statement scheduled for submission to a subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee here today, NAACP Executive Secretary Roy Wilkins noted that such a provision, stricken from the Civil Rights Act of 1957 under threat of a Senate filibuster, is included in the bill introduced in the 86th Congress by Representative Emanuel Celler (D., N. Y.) "which has been endorsed by our Association, along with the companion bi-partisan Douglas bill, S. 810, in the Senate, as well as a similar bill in the Senate, S. 456, introduced by Senator Javits and co-sponsored by Senators Keating, Case (N. J.), Cooper, Scott and Allott."

Celler Bill

The Celler bill, the NAACP leader told the committee members, "recognizes the necessity of supporting affirmatively the 1954 ruling of the Supreme Court and, in its Title VI, it authorizes the Department of Justice, on its own initiative, to seek preventive relief to protect the constitutional rights of citizens in all civil rights situations, not merely in voting cases."

Cincinnati, Ohio.—John Kasper, racist, is now facing his second "stretch" in a federal penitentiary after his convictions on charges of interfering with the integration of Clinton High school (Tenn.) was upheld by the U. S. Sixth District Court of Appeals.

New York, N. Y.—Lester B. Granger, was given the "city's scroll for distinguished and exceptional service" by Mayor Robert F. Wagner Mar. 5 at a luncheon held in his honor. Granger, for nearly 20 years has been executive director of the National Urban League.

Sacramento, Calif.—Democratic Governor Edmund G. "Pat" Brown honored publishers of California's Negro newspapers with a luncheon Mar. 6 at Hotel El Mirador. It marked the first time a California governor had ever met with the Negro press.

Memphis, Tenn.—Purdue university has granted an assistantship in bio-chemistry to Sidney A. McNairy, Jr., a 21-year-old senior who will be graduated from LeMoyné college in June.

New York, N. Y.—Henry Wheatley, 27, a native of the Virgin Islands, educated on the mainland, has been appointed assistant to the secretary of Governor Rockefeller at a salary of \$11,000 a year.

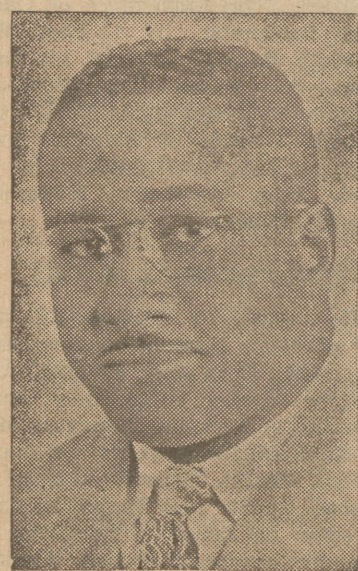

## Ask Federal Justices to Reverse Decision of Ark. Court Denying Rehearing

Washington—Contending that municipal ordinances of Little Rock and North Little Rock, Ark., requiring the disclosure of the names of NAACP members are in conflict with rulings of the United States Supreme Court, the Association this week filed a petition with the high court seeking an order to the Arkansas State Supreme Court to review its judgment in a case involving two NAACP leaders in that state.

Violated Ordinance

Mrs. L. C. Bates, of Little Rock, state president of the NAACP, and Mrs. Birdie Williams, president of the North Little Rock branch, were found guilty by a lower court of violating the local ordinances when they refused to disclose Association records. They were fined \$25.00 each. On Dec. 22 last, the Arkansas State Supreme Court affirmed the fines. Later, on Jan. 19, the court

Washington—The United States Supreme Court has been asked to review the ruling of a three-judge federal district court staying jurisdiction and refusing to act on an NAACP complaint challenging recently enacted Arkansas statutes. The appeal was filed by NAACP attorneys in the Supreme Court on March 9.

The challenged laws would require the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to disclose its membership lists, empower the Arkansas State Attorney General to seize Association records, and define as barratry NAACP activities in aiding litigation in the state.

The NAACP petition to the Supreme Court maintains that the lower court was in error in refusing to take jurisdiction in the action brought by the Association.

## Frank Franklin, Commercial Artist at KRNT-TV, Has Won Awards in His Field

This is the 56th in a series of articles featuring Negro firsts, leaders and outstanding personalities in Iowa who are excelling in civic, professional, business, religious, educational, fraternal and entertainment fields.)

Charles Frank Franklin, commercial artist at KRNT-TV in Des Moines is a man who loves his work and has a contingent of awards and years of experience to attest to his ability.

At KRNT-TV he does art work and background scenery on every show originating in Des Moines. In addition his job covers promotion work for network shows. As extra he works for KRNT radio station painting courtesy cards for store displays.

Transferred from Mo.

Before coming to Des Moines three years ago Mr. Franklin had worked at KYTV-TV in Springfield, Mo. (He had transferred by request to Des Moines through the Columbia Broadcasting network. For three years at the Springfield station he held the position of commercial artist and art director. He also worked on the background scenery for two network shows originating there, Eddie Arnold show and "Ozark Jubilee."

Walgreen Drug Co.

Mr. Franklin first became interested in the commercial art field during his boyhood. A native of Houston, Tex., he was educated in the elementary and high schools in Birmingham, Ala. Following graduation he entered Xavier university in New Orleans, La. After he received his degree in the field, he landed his first job as a commercial artist with the Walgreen Drug company as a display man and card writer. For five years he traveled, serving the midwest branch, working out of the St. Louis, Mo. From there he went to Springfield.

Contest Awards

Among Mr. Franklin's awards and special recognition are first prize in the Betty Rose (women apparel) display contest in Kansas City, Mo., and second prize in the national Van Huesen contest annually sponsored by True magazine. For three consecutive years (1954-56) he was listed among the honorable men-

tions for the 10 best display men in the United States.

Back in his senior year in high school he entered a painting of a Biblical scene in a national contest which was adjudged a masterpiece. It was then put on display in the Birmingham public library and appraised as worth \$1,000 with an automatic \$500 yearly increase.

Portrait Painting

Mr. Franklin has also won recognition in his hobby, portrait painting which is closely allied with his profession. His seven entries in a contest in Springfield, won him five first and two second place entries.

the massed powers of the states, including the treasuries composed in part of their own tax money.

Government Should Act

"In such a situation, it is absurd to maintain that the government of all the people of the United States should remain an inactive observer while courts are defied, human rights trampled, and the protagonists of simple justice under law are mangled in a grossly one-sided struggle."

Of the Administration's civil rights proposals, Mr. Wilkins said "many... are helpful," but pointed out that "the chief disappointment of the Administration program is the failure to endorse the principles of Part III of the 1956 and 1957 civil rights bills, which it then sponsored."

Johnson Bill

The NAACP spokesman cited with approval bills introduced by Representatives William Dawson (D., Ill.) and A. Clayton Powell D., N.Y.). Because of its failure "to recognize that there has been a Supreme Court decision in favor of desegregation," the bill introduced by Senator Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson (D. Tex.) is "unrealistic," he asserted, and added: "It would be better to have no bill at all than to have the Johnson bill."

PIMIENTOS-POTATOES A TASTY DISH

Let's face it. Potatoes can be delightful or they can be something to be left on the plate. But with pimientos to pretty them up and add a special delicate flavor, jaded appetites perk up and second helpings are called for. This dish smells good, looks good and tastes good—and can be done with the greatest of ease. What's more, it's gentle on the budget.

Pimiento Potatoes

- 2 lbs. small potatoes
1 to 2 cloves garlic
1 medium onion
1 bunch parsley, small
2 Tbs. oil or shortening
2 Tbs. margarine or butter
1 4-oz. can or jar pimientos

Wash and peel potatoes. Boil in salted water until almost tender. Drain. Chop garlic, onion and parsley and add to potatoes. Sauté all together in the hot oil and margarine until potatoes are lightly browned. Cut pimiento into large pieces or strips. Add to the potatoes and heat thoroughly. 4 to 6 servings.

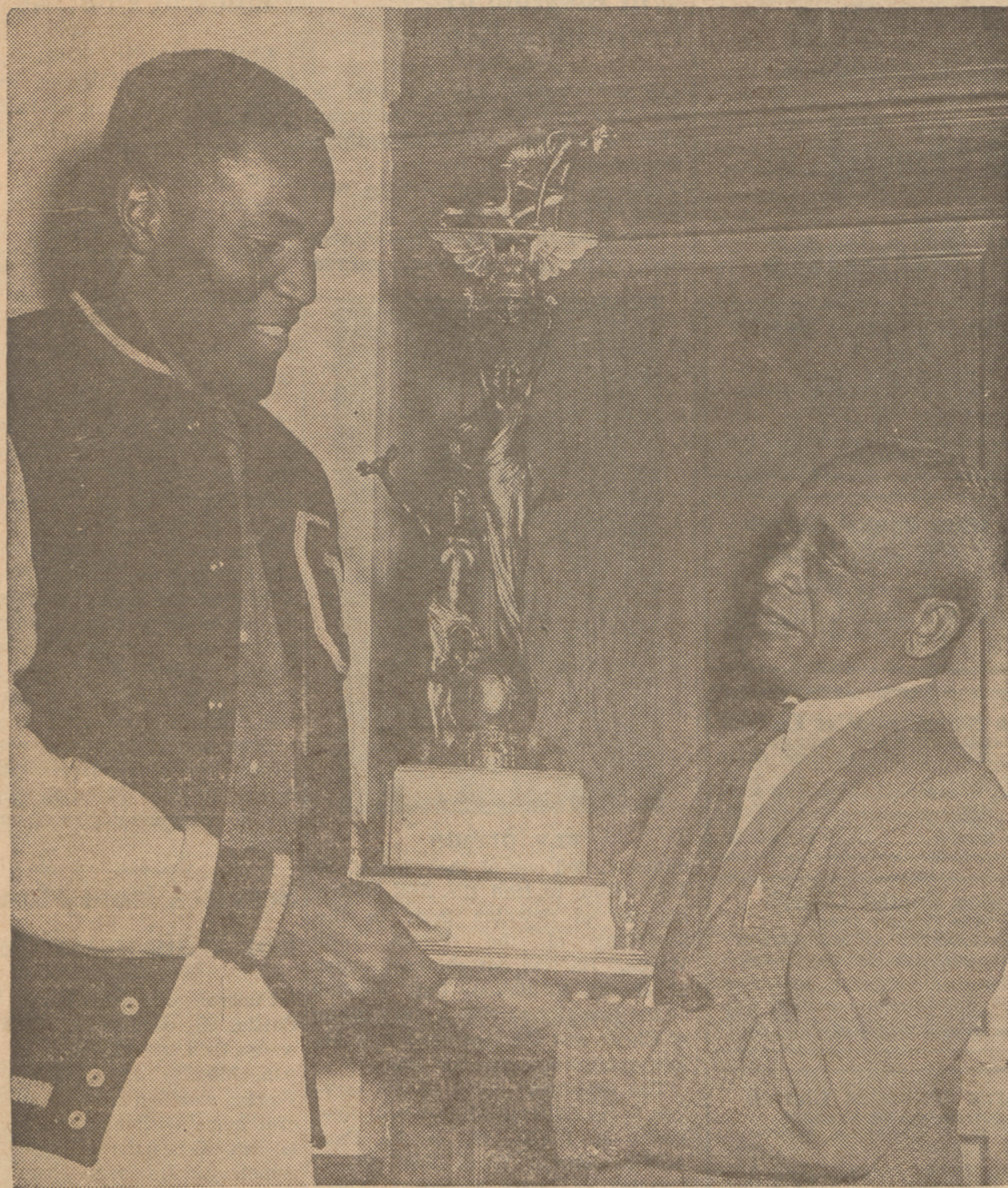

## UNCF Reveals Goal For 1959 Campaign

New York—Goal for the 1959 nation-wide United Negro College Fund campaign is \$2,250,000, Bruce Barton, national campaign chairman, announced here today. Mr. Barton is chairman of the board of Batten, Barton, Durstine & Osborn.

"When divided among 33 member colleges, \$2,250,000 is a small sum," Mr. Barton said. "But it will provide 10 percent of their yearly operating costs. Since the Fund's first campaign in 1944, these colleges have depended on the annual appeal for this important percentage of their budgets."

The colleges use the money to provide scholarships, improve faculty salaries, buy library and laboratory equipment or wherever it is most needed.

### Opens April 1

The 16th annual College Fund appeal will open April 1. Organized campaigns are conducted in more than 125 communities throughout the country. Where there are no formal campaigns, appeals are made by letter, TV, radio, newspapers and magazines. UNCF has raised more than \$37,500,000, both for capital and current-fund purposes, over the past 15 years.

The colleges and universities—all but one located in the South—have a combined student enrollment of more than 24,000.

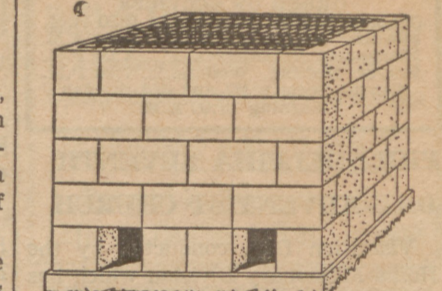

### Handy Incinerator

FOR burning household rubbish, an incinerator built of concrete blocks on a concrete foundation is excellent. The base is 4 by 5 feet, and the concrete should be reinforced with chicken wire, according to Family Handyman.



Use standard size building blocks, setting the first course on a thin layer of mortar and leaving two 8"x8" spaces at the front to provide ample draft for complete incineration.

The cover is turkey wire, 1"x2" mesh, with welded joints so the wires won't separate due to the heat. Eye-bolts may be inserted in the joints between two of the top building blocks, if you want to hinge the mesh cover by looping down two pieces of the wire into the metal eyes.

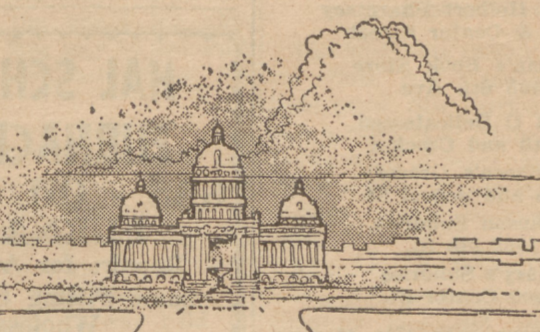

## LEGISLATORS UNREALISTIC ABOUT LIQUOR

Several measures are pending in the Iowa legislature which would permit the sale of liquor by the drink. During several sessions, attempts have been made to enact such a law but without success. Small town and rural legislators have, and still, pretty well control the legislature. Most of them, at least, vote dry and thus those proposals have met defeat.

The State of Iowa operates the liquor stores. And while the system is an improvement over the prohibition area, and considerable revenue is derived from the operation, many people, particularly in the cities, oppose it: some because of the cumbersome method of handling liquor in packages only; some because it does not produce the revenue which liquor by the drink would.

Undoubtedly, the measure, providing for local option by counties, has the best chance of passage for it offers those areas in which there is substantial opposition an opportunity to reject liquor by the drink. Unfortunately, too many legislators have not been practical in their opposition to a change. They fail to realize that people will get liquor under any system they devise. Yet the present system produces bootleggers who operate without licenses and thus pay no tax on what they sell. And with the heavy burden of taxation, every business should pay its fair share of taxes.

Just what chance liquor by the drink has to hurdle the legislature is difficult to predict. However, the legislators should quit beating around the bush and come up with a liquor by the drink law.

## BLOCKS THROWN AGAINST SCHOOL INTEGRATION

Roy Wilkins says that pupil assignment laws place a great burden upon Negroes in that students rejected illegally must prosecute individual lawsuit to protect their rights. This, of necessity, slows up integration and makes the enforcement of the Supreme Court school desegregation decision extremely difficult.

It has always seemed ridiculous that Negroes have been forced to finance lawsuits to protect and/or enjoy their rights. And not only this, but out of their tax dollar, they must help pay the bill of those fighting to deny them their rights. Under the pupil placement law, some integration will come in most communities, but painfully slow. It is just another chapter in the program some continue to pursue aimed to block the path of Negroes to complete equality.

## PRESIDENT EISENHOWER STANDS FIRM

President Eisenhower made a masterful appeal to the American people Monday night with respect to the ticklish Berlin situation. He reviewed just how the division of the occupied German area was brought about following victory over Hitler's forces after World War II to which our allies, including Russia, agreed but which Russia now makes every effort to disavow.

The situation he described sets forth America's obligation to the West German people and our allies and reiterated that America would not shirk its responsibility.

It is difficult to comprehend that Russia would so brazenly disavow its solemn pledge to maintain peace, or its continued effort to keep peace in a state of uncertainty. Surely, no sane person should so disregard the rights of others that war might be started when almost utter destruction awaits any nation which engages in it, in the light of potential total destruction. And yet this is exactly what faces the East and West today.

Evansville, Ind.—The A&T College Aggies took third place honors in the National Collegiate Athletic Association college division tournament by soundly thrashing Los Angeles State, 101-84 in the consolation game here last Friday night (March 13).

The Aggies scored a tournament record of 479 points in the five games including the regional play-offs. The old mark of 448 points was set by St. Mary's of Maryland in 1957.

Curry, a Bahamian, batted close to .300 mark during the 1958 season.

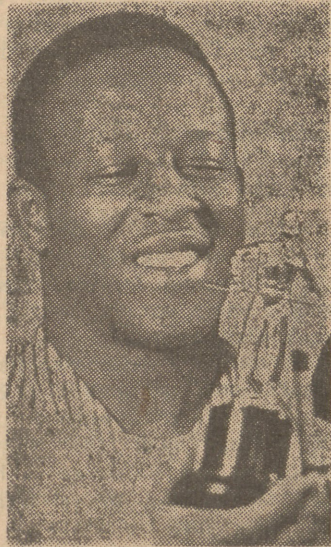

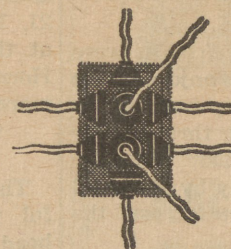

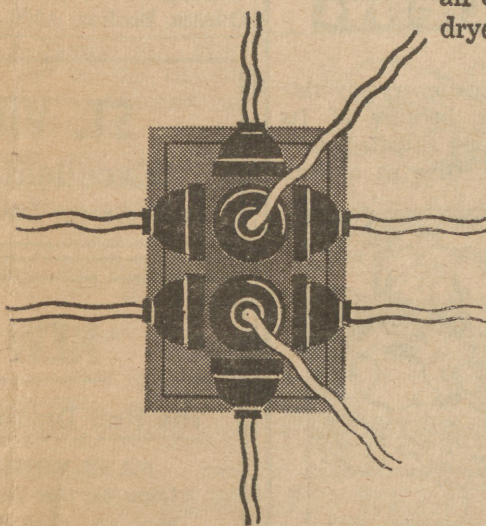
