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## Des Moines Chosen For Regional CORE Headquarters

Roy Innis, National Director of the Congress of Racial Equality has chosen Des Moines, Iowa as the site of the Regional Headquarters that comprise eighteen states of the Central States Region. Clarence Jackson is the Central States Regional Director, with Sam Miller as his assistant.

Jackson recently moved to Des Moines from Davenport, Iowa, where he and the local chapter were instrumental in affecting some of the changes that were needed in that part of the state. Jackson was tapped by Innis to move up to the national level to implement and

generate local chapters in his 18 state jurisdiction.

Sam Miller moved to Des Moines, Iowa, in 1972 from New Haven, Conn. where he has been active in C.O.R.E. since 1962. Miller formerly acted as Editor of the New Haven, "Corelator" the newsletter that keeps abreast of the news that is of interest to Black people. Miller was chosen by Jackson to be his assistant in his endeavor to promote a Des Moines chapter and to also establish Regional Headquarters here.

There is much work to be done in Des Moines and we must get on with

our job.

This is a statement by our national Director to make those who are not acquainted with our beliefs and our goals:

Statement: "Since 1968, CORE has consistently labored to sensitize the American government to the idea of community control as a solution to the major economic and political disorder in Black Communities.

In 1977, we intensified this effort with unique and workable approaches to: 1) the lack of quality and equitable education for Black children; 2) new channels of direct funding of community

services in the area of public health, education, housing, and employment projects; 3) the dependent economic status of Black Communities due to the lack of a self-sustaining business sector. By presenting a comprehensive program for Community Self-determination, CORE challenges President Carter to discard the old, rancid, and erroneous blueprint used by other presidents in their planning for urban inner cities. We do not seek the deferred dreams of Kennedy's New Frontier or Johnson's Great Society. Under both of these administrations,

## Tribute To Black American Soldiers

Two weeks ago in a story featuring Memorial Day and the remembrance of people now departed who once enriched Des Moines' black community, there was an important group I left out. These are the men who risked and gave their lives for a country they loved.

Whether charging across an open field into entrenched German machine gun fire in World War I, driving Army trucks through fiery hell rushing gas to the front lines with the Redball Express in World War II, having a leg amputated from frostbite in Korea, or fighting hand-to-hand combat against your colored brother in Vietnam, black soldiers

have given their blood hoping deep inside that in exchange they could have equality with their white brothers.

Television and movies have failed to show the important contributions made by black soldiers. Not only have they failed to show them, but they have robbed black America of our non-published glory. The first and only movie made about the famed Redball Express (a black supply truck unit that was known for their efficiency and bravery under fire in WW II) was made with a completely white cast.

While white kids ran to Canada, or their daddies paid their way out of Vietnam, poor blacks held the front lines against their colored

brothers who never threatened black America. Why have we fought and died for a country that degrades our blackness? The answer to this is that these men believed that the only way to advance the position of black America was to show their white brothers that they loved America and would die for it. Was this rationale effective or was it useless?

To anyone informed in history it is obvious that the two World Wars advanced blacks more than any other events in history. Not only did black Americans advance economically, but also socially and educationally. Attending the University of Iowa, I know that integration in living accommodations at

this University was not achieved until 1946, and was a direct result of World War II.

In a dramatic speech in the cafeteria of the largest dormitory a returning white veteran who was also student president stood on a table and yelled to the student body, "we fought with these guys so we can live with them too, anyone who doesn't like it can come up here and tell me, right now!!!" The room was completely quiet and since then black American students have lived in the dorms. 1946 was also the bloodiest year on paper that has ever been recorded. Returning black soldiers demanded justice and racial violence peaked.

In 1946 there were 41

reported lynchings in this country, and the figure doesn't show what was not reported. Many people think of the 1960's as the most significant civil rights years, but if we look closer it is obvious that the 50's, 60's and early 70's were all on a new level that began with the returning soldiers in 1946.

To the black American

war veterans, no matter which war, I salute you. And in no finer way can it be said than the poem that follows, by Roscoe C. Jamison, a black American poet born in Winchester, Tennessee 1888 - 1918, who wrote of the black soldiers in World War I, but it can be applied to all black soldiers. This poem —

### "The Negro Soldiers"

These truly are the Brave  
These men who cast aside  
Old memories, to walk the blood-stained pave  
Of Sacrifice, joining the solemn tide  
That moves away, to suffer and to die  
For Freedom— when their own is yet denied!  
O Pride! O Prejudice! When they pass by,  
Hail them, the Brave, for you now crucified!

These truly are the Free,  
These souls that grandly rise  
Above base dreams of vengeance for their wrongs.  
Who march to war with visions in their eyes  
Of Peace through Brotherhood, lifting glad songs.  
Aforetime, while they front the firing line.  
Stand and behold! They take the field to-day  
Shedding their blood like Him now held divine  
That those who mock might find a better way!

Once again our favorite what shall we call him, Pat Buchanan, has taken a swipe at all of the blacks who happen to be outstanding people. He almost gleefully comes up with the argument that most of the black people don't want special treatment on jobs, don't want intergration in schools, and that by a margin of three to one think that most of the people on welfare are there because they don't want to work.

You have to wonder where the man gets his figures. I guess that if one were to choose the people he talked to, he could come up with a survey that would contain the things Buchanan says. I know that if you listen to people, black or white who have never been on welfare, never had it very rough, most of them will yell that welfare people don't want to work.

I have heard longtime postal employees say that

women on ADC deliberately have more children so they can get more money. I asked some of them if they really believed that very many women would go through the trouble of carrying a child for nine months, endure the pain of childbirth and the hassle to get not enough money to take care of it just to get a few more dollars in their checks. You'd be surprised how many of them said yes.

That is the lever the masses of lower income people in America are controlled with. Conservatives can play the working people against the non-workers, those on welfare, the rich against the poor and keep them from uniting to gain their goals.

So the man has a point that I am sure he can back up with figures from working people of both races. But let those people get caught in the web of welfare, and see how their eyes come open.

And we always knew that there are people in our group who don't want the status quo changed. During the days when there was strict segregation some blacks got rich because the rest of them had no other place to trade but with them.

Here in Des Moines, the classic example was the pool hall run by a Mr. G. W. Scott. This was the only place in town where blacks could play pool or billiards, and "Buck", as he was called ran it with an iron hand. He had strict rules about excess profanity, clean hands while playing, and fair play.

Failure to abide by these standards was to be barred from the place. And Buck got rich because there was nowhere to play pool but in his place.

So it isn't hard to come up with some black people

who would agree with Mr. Buchanan, because we all have different ideas and view points. But the man gets off on the kick that blacks who speak out on issues that concern blacks are speaking for all of us. He says with a shrill note of joy that Andy Young and Julian Bond don't speak for all of the blacks.

Well, whoinell said they did? Those people are expressing their views just as anybody would do. I can't think when any one black speaker spoke for us all.

Even Martin Luther King didn't speak for all of us. He gave his ideas as they concerned us, but he knew he was not speaking for us all, no matter how much he wanted.

Does any Italian or Irish speaker speak for all of the members of his group? Well, then, why suppose that we have to have a spokesman?

Bond discusses things as he sees them, and so does Andy Young. And events have certainly proved the man to be right when he said that England and the European countries are full of racism. Witness the recent election in Britain, and the Nazi propaganda that reaches Germany from the United States. And they want more.

Ms. Thatcher got her start by embracing the theory that there were too many blacks in England. What would you call that? So Mr. Young wasn't as far off base as the media tried to make him.

So I wish Mr. Buchanan would come face to face with the facts of life in these United States and see things as they are instead of as he wants to see them.



## Thoughts and Comments

Rhodesia and South Africa are again in the news. In South Africa last week, following the release of the latest report on the widening "Muldergate" scandal, former Prime Minister and current President Balthazar Johannes (John) Vorster resigned his office in disgrace. In Rhodesia (Zimbabwe-Rhodesia), the new Prime Minister, Bishop Abel Muzorewa, called President Carter's decision not to lift economic sanctions against his "new" nation "an inhuman decision by a committed Christian". And in the United States, the real and imagined shortages of gasoline, diesel fuel and other petroleum-based products and the accompanying public protests make this nations policy toward these two African neighbors a key point in our energy future.

In South Africa, the Erasmus Commission issued its third and final report about the corruption and irregularities during the twelve year period during which Vorster served as Prime Minister. Vorster's last official act as President (a post he had held for the previous nine months) was to officially receive the report that described his involvement in the scandal and which directly led to his resignation from office.

The most important finding of the Commission, headed by Supreme Court Justice Rudolph Erasmus, was that Vorster was fully aware of the secret plan of his former Minister of Information, Cornelius Mulder, to funnel millions of dollars from a secret government fund into efforts to improve South Africa's world image through political interference and the news media.

The Commission thus retracted its preliminary findings which had completely exonerated Vorster, concluding that he had lied in sworn testimony he gave about his role in the affair.

The Erasmus Commission also provided a rough summary of what happened to the more than seventy-three million dollars in public funds which were diverted to this covert attempt to influence world attitudes toward South Africa and its racial policies. Of this sum, approximately one-half million dollars was directed to Eschel Rhodie, one of Mulder's key aides who, it was said, was blackmailing the government and its ministers over the release of information to the public and press about these irregularities.

Some nineteen million dollars also was directed to L. Van Zyl Alberts, the publisher of a newspaper and magazine that were, the report concluded, secretly funded government publications. It was further charged that ten million dollars in government funds were given or loaned to Michigan publisher John McGoff in an unsuccessful attempt to acquire the "Washington Star" newspaper in 1974, although he insisted that he had no South African support in any of his business dealings. As to that ten million dollars, the government was unable to account for the use of more than one-third of that sum.

The ramifications of that report were felt in this country very quickly. Acting at the request of the

Department of Justice, the F.B.I. is investigating a number of allegations published in South African newspapers in conjunction with the issuance of the Erasmus Commission Report about the roughly 3.7 of the ten million dollars to Mr. McGoff which the South African government was unable to account for. These allegations are:

1. that approximately twenty thousand dollars of South African money went to the primary campaign of now President Jimmy Carter in New York state at a time when he and other Democratic candidates were short of funds;

2. that approximately two-hundred fifty thousand dollars from that fund were used to defeat former Senator Dick Clark (Dem., Iowa) in the 1978 elections. Clark, a frequent critic of the South African government, was chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee on African affairs prior to his defeat and now is an ambassador at large and coordinator of the government's refugee policies;

3. that approximately one hundred twenty thousand dollars from the fund was used to defeat former Senator John V. Tunney (Dem., Calif.), also a frequent critic of the South African regime; and,

4. that McGoff used some of the funds allocated to him to establish a pro-South African newspaper outlet in this country. After failing in his attempts to buy the "Washington Star", McGoff allegedly used a portion of the money to acquire the "Sacramento Union" (California) for that purpose.

Under the Ethics in Government Act of 1978, the Attorney General is required to conduct a "preliminary investigation" of up to ninety days upon any allegations concerning the President. If, upon the basis of these investigations, he or she determines that there is some substance to the

Well now, how ya'll doin? Forgive me for not writing these last three weeks. As usual I been goin through some heavy dramas. The main heavy drama is the one that's all about survival. This Niggah is so broke super-glue can't fix me up.

Me and my partner, Calvin Clark bought us a truck to try and make some money ya dig? So we finally have a good day (this was last Thursday). We hauled two loads of trash to the dump and hauled a ton of sand for ol' Al Veasley on the east side and threw it up on his roof. We were beat, dead tired, muscles sore but exuberant because after paying the truck note, costs to get into the dump, and filling the tank up we had \$15.01 net profit.

So we said let's cruise through the park (Goode), then go home, get this grime off and step out. We do our normal thing which is to speak to all the folks and make the pretty girls smile. We stop to dap (the "soul" handshake) with a brother and procede on because we don't want to block traffic.

As we are traveling down University Ave. Calvin says: Man, the police is after you. I says ungh ungh

cause I ain't did nothing. To my surprise I am stopped. I jump out upset as hell and demand to know why I was stopped. I refuse to show my license until they give me some reason for stopping me. I am charged with disorderly conduct, and stopping where prohibited (there are no signs indicating such).

I am then put in chains (handcuffs). He calls for the paddy wagon and someone tells him I ain't nobody to be messed with so he apologizes drops the disorderly conduct charge. I am hauled off to jail. I cry tears of rage every foot of the way. Of course I don't let them see the tears flow. I cry out Oh God,

why? I try my best to be good God and look what happens.

Right then I decide to title this week's article "Pickin up the Gun . . . Again". I am only in jail about 20 min. before Calvin bails me out, and this is the clincher. Remember I said we had a net profit of \$15.01. It cost 15.00 to get me out of jail. Our net profit is \$.01. One single solitaire penny.

I'm really upset now. First they had the nerve to take me to jail on a new traffic ticket (I had no warrants) then they take my last dollar and leave me with one penny. I flashed back to when they were chaining me and the words I uttered to the punk

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## A Black Look At Politics

In my last column, I gave a brief summary of a variety of political changes and shifts affecting Black America by the late 1970's. On of the foremost was widespread political (and social) conservatism on the part of whites. While I had originally planned to discuss Black unemployment this week, I feel compelled to examine a new organization on the National scene; one that could potentially represent the biggest threat to Black Civil Rights accomplishments since the old "American Party" of the 1960's.

I refer to the so-called "Christian Voice", a coalition composed of conservative politicians (including Iowa Senator Roger Jepsen) and ministers, who self-righteously label themselves "chosen shepherds of the flock in these times." The group will supposedly lobby Congress on several issues, including Rhodesia, Taiwan, government aid for abortions, balanced budget, broadcasting laws, Internal Revenue Service rules, and "Satan" (whoever he is).

The "Voice" also opposes a proposed IRS rule denying tax-exempt status to private schools that practice racial discrimination. It therefore logically follows that they must tacitly endorse racial discrimination, along with "white flight" from public schools. I hope my accusations prove false, but the "storm clouds" are clearly "on the horizon."

This so-called "Christian Voice" purports to mix politics and religion, and dares to defy the Constitutional prohibition separating "church and state". Similarly, one group member, Utah Republican Senator Orrin Hatch, has issued

charges and that further investigations may be needed, he or she must apply to the "special court" for the appointment of a special prosecutor to investigate and prosecute for any wrongdoing discovered. If, upon the basis of that preliminary investigation, the Attorney General finds that no further investigation is warranted, he or she must notify the "special court of that fact in a secret memorandum.

Further, a few days prior to the issuance of the Erasmus Commission report, Assistant Attorney General Philip B. Hayman asked the F.B.I. to begin investigation of the other allegations arising from the South African scandal. Although the Erasmus Report did not refer to the alleged attempts to influence American political campaign specifically, it did support them indirectly.

What does all this mean to the American Black community? Several things came to mind immediately. In the first place, it means that Congressional liberals who have been supporters of the civil rights movement and critical of the white minority regimes which still exist in southern Africa could be defeated in their bids for re-election, not so

officer that stopped me. "From Kunta Kinte to Kalonji Saadiq still in chains".

The punk kept calling me by my slave name Clive. The same name other officers call me when they want to harass me. I flashed back to roots, as Kunta Kinte "Why you chain Kunta, Kunta free, my name Kunta not Toby".

I am currently circulating a petition to remove the police from the park not just because philosophically speaking "the parks belongs to the people" but because concretely speaking 1,500 to 2,000 Blacks (the average daily crowd) and a bunch of all white police don't mix.

I am to present these petitions to the city council at their July 2nd meeting. I wanted to present them at their next meeting 9:00 a.m. June 25th but was told they do not allow controversial items or persons in their morning meetings. So since I can't appear before the city council on Monday morning I'll appear before the people on the steps of city hall as I announce my candidacy for Mayor of Des Moines at 9:00.

Yep. Ya'll heard right. This poor, lowly trash hauler (if ya got anything ya want hauled call me at 244-7296) is runnin for Mayor of Des Moines, Iowa "The hub of the midwest". If ya'll think that's somethin wait till next week.

statements indirectly comparing the "Voice" to Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini and the New Revolutionary regime, which seems to be leaning ever-further towards fascism and censorship of dissent.

Groups which have desired to return America to the "good old days" of "Christian morality" have historically been fascist, or at least reactionary. Organizations such as the American Nazi Party, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, American White People's Party, and Knights of the White Camelia, all sought a return to the days when whites didn't have to "worry" about "Jews and niggers," for they were "in their places." While I would not go so far as to lump the "Christian Voice" in with the Klan and the Nazis, there are clear similarities in some of their goals.

The Rev. Robert Gordon Grant, a founding director of Christian Voice, said, "We will no longer look the other way as opportunistic, shortsighted politicians cater to small radical interests, and in the process destroy both our economic well being and our political freedom."

Such disturbing statements echo the old settlements of "white is right", and "majority rule". The leaders of this group sound like demagogues, who seek to manipulate their ignorant followers, or, as my father used to say, "the blind leading the blind." The "Voice" allegedly opposes the slaughter of the unborn," but has taken no firm stand on the controversial abortion issue. Most Blacks recognize that access to government aid for abortions for poor women is often necessary, in order for many black families to get a step ahead of poverty, and hopefully break the powerful chains of ghetto life.

Rev. Grant also said that if Christians can unite, "We can do anything. We can pass any law, or any amendment. And that's exactly what we intend to do." The sticky problem remains, who is a "Christian"? I was always taught that religion is an intensely personal relationship between an individual and his God (Jesus Christ, Buddah, Allah, or Whomever). Similarly, how does one know whether he or she is one of the "chosen few"? These are

much because their political beliefs necessarily offended their constituents, but because money from foreign sources could provide financial and other support (in essence "buy" the victory) which their opponents could not acquire by their own efforts.

Second, we could see the unification of international racism, which could be the most profound threat to Black civil rights gains of the 1950's and 60's since George Wallace's American Party of the 1960's.

Third, Congress will have to be much more thorough in its investigation of the backgrounds of its membership to try to prevent a recurrence of events like those alleged here. In so doing, the weight of Congressional prosecution and censure for such violations will likely, as in the past, fall most heavily on Black or other minority members of that body who have to struggle so much harder for campaign support than their white counterparts.

And lastly, and perhaps most importantly, the

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questions which human beings are ill-equipped to answer, I fear.

Yet, if the Christian Voice secures enough support, they may indeed become able to "pass any law" — including just who is "chosen", or, they may go as far as trying to wipe out Black Civil Rights gains of the 1950's and 60's. The Rev. Grant spoke of a "Christian Truth" — but no one has a monopoly on the Truth, myself included.

I caution Black Americans from getting involved with these right-wing evangelists, until more can be uncovered about them. Their membership includes Congressmen and Senators whose Civil Rights voting records are far from acceptable, including men such as Floyd Spence of South Carolina, and Trent Lott of Mississippi.

Any why is Iowa's Roger Jepsen involved with these people? Perhaps the answer is rather obvious, especially on issues such as abortion and lifting trade sanctions on Zimbabwe-Rhodesia. Jepsen is one of those conservatives in the Senate who favors lifting U.S. trade sanctions on Zimbabwe-Rhodesia, despite recent elections where most of the eligible black voters were not given sufficient time to register, and the Muzorewa-Smith regime operates a country where economic power and property ownership are still largely in the hands of the white minority.

This factor directly relates to allegations in the last few months, of Jepsen campaign being partially funded by secret contributions from white South African officials, channeled through anti-abortion groups in Iowa. And Dick Clark was the African specialist in the U.S. Senate, where he opposed white rule in South Africa and Rhodesia. Relatedly, the "Christian Voice's" anti-abortion leanings fit right in here, conjuring up images of international racist cooperation.

Is this all mere speculation, and hearsay? I think not. There are too many parts seem to fit together. I feel that Blacks should be on the look out for more of these disclosures, in order that we may be in a better position to determine our political allies — and our enemies.

implications of foreign influence in American political campaigns will force Blacks and other minorities to be extremely suspicious and careful in screening candidates for office in an attempt to ascertain their allegiance to their cause.

What effect these allegations, whether proved or not, will have upon Black attitudes toward politics as a means to attain equality is uncertain, but I must conclude that it could not be other than negative. At a time when Black political awareness and activism is reaching a new low point, this is the last thing that we need.

Song and the Rythm Machine, under the direction of Ms. Ramona Hall.

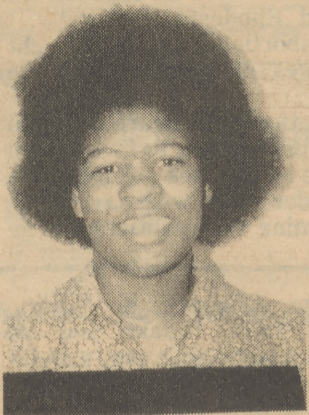

The drive home allowed time for a report of the help of friends to be sure she was on time for the early flight after being up most of the night. Phyllis went to bed for a few hours sleep after greeting her father.

Father's Day celebration began with dinner at Imperial House. From there we went to Indianola to attend the Sunday performance of Inherit the Wind staged in the local courtroom. For those who may have forgotten and those too young to remember, Inherit the Wind is the dramatization of the prosecution of a biology teacher in Hillsboro, Tenn. for violation of a law against teaching the theory of evolution in the public schools.

The trial, itself, attracted nationwide attention because of the two nationally famous lawyers taking the case. William Jennings Bryant for the prosecution. 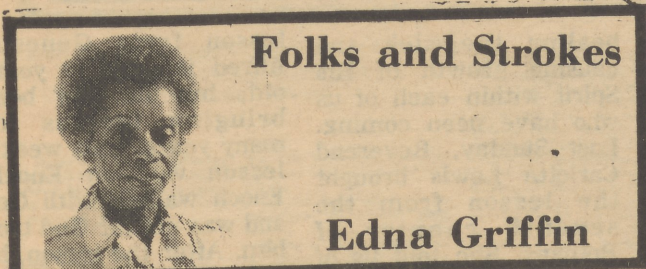

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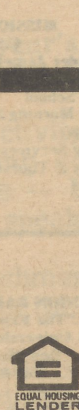

## Remake the World

Shahid A. Muhammad

With the Name Allah (in the Name of God), the Gracious, the Compassionate.  
As-Salaam-Alaikum

(Editor's Note: The following article is from excerpts of a Jum'ah Prayer lecture that was delivered by Emam Wallace D. Muhammad on July 22, 1977.)

Dear Readers,  
The Holy Quran teaches that Allah is Self-Sufficient, Independent of all the Creation—not just us here (the Earth) but all the total Creation. Allah has created it. He did not create it so He would feed from it; He created it so that we would feed from it. How can the Creator be one who has to create for Himself some food to eat. The Quran teaches

that Allah is the One who feeds but is not fed; He lives and does not die.

The idea about human beings, messengers, or prophets being God is due to the people forgetting or losing sight on the main object in religion and taking up the habit of trying to enrich themselves in knowledge so they can claim to be an unquestionable authority. Once knowledge becomes the attracting thing for us and we come to God to seek knowledge—not to obey God—then the next step is going to be the worshipping or setting up of ourselves or some other to worship.

Only Allah can save us from corrupting our worship. As long as we worship for the sake of Allah, seeking His pleasure, seeking to please Him and not for any personal motive or gain except honest gain, then we are going to be safe. But, the moment we begin to seek Allah for any selfish kind of thing, we are going to lose the proper worship. To please Allah, we must live the true Muslim life as exemplified in Prophet Muhammad about 1,400 years ago.

The Quran teaches us over and over again that Prophet Muhammad is not a God, Prophet Muhammad is not an angel, Prophet Muhammad is not a supernatural being. Prophet Muhammad is the Messenger of God to all the world—a human being, a mortal messenger. That is what the Quran teaches us to protect us. Nothing can serve us as

a god but God. The Quran teaches that anything else except God is going to ruin life and degrade the human being.

What is there for the human being to worship except the Creator, who created everything—the One to whom he owes his existence and all of the growth or progress that he has made? Allah is the only One he can worship.

You may say, "Oh, worship such and such a person," such and such son of God." What son? Prophet Muhammad was given the revelation (the Quran) which teaches, if God desires sons, He only has to create them. He does not have to find a wife or girl friend to "birth" some men on earth. Whenever He wants an obedient man on Earth, He just creates him. He created Adam. He did not get a wife or look for a girl friend and say, "Well, let us make man, where are our wives?"

The Quran teaches us that the likeness of Jesus is the similitude or the parable of Adam, and Adam was made from the dust of the Earth. Allah is telling us this so that we will know there is only One Creator. Everything else is Creation and has no equal status with Him.

If Allah makes a human being from the dust of the earth, and if people in religion accept this idea that God made human beings from the Earth, then can't that same God who had the power to make a human being from nothing but earth make an obedient

person? He doesn't have to look for a flesh and blood virgin. No—Allah doesn't need any virgin women to form or bring about righteous men. He can bring about righteous men from filthy, unclean women. And, life tells us that everyday. We see children who are products of filthy, ignorant homes. They are the products of parents who are unclean, immoral and ignorant but we see often a good, upright, highly moral conscious son or daughter born to those unfit parents.

Dear beloved Muslims—Islam is salvation. It is called in the Quran, Al-Islam. Islam means submission, yielding, surrendering ourselves to the Will of Allah in peace (peaceful yielding or peaceful surrender). Al-Islam means that religion or that discipline or yielding of the spirit and will to God that is given to us by God. It is not just any yielding. It is not the Hindu way. They have religious disciplines and they practice too, the yielding of the will. The Buddhists and many others practice the yielding of the will, but in the Quran we are told that this one, Al-Islam, God has ordered this particular yielding of

the will and it is the correct and perfect one.

We have this religion (Al-Islam) which is the salvation of all human beings and we have as our example, a human being—not an angel and not a supernatural person. How far can I follow an angel? When the angel goes out of my territory, I can't follow. And, when he comes in my territory, I doubt if he can follow. Similarly, it goes for a human being trying to follow a supernatural being.

But, God gives us a human being and God says in the Quran: Had the Earth been populated with angels, I would have sent you an angel as a messenger. But, since the earth was populated with human beings, I sent you a human being as a messenger. This is the teachings of the Quran.

If the human being comes and says: "I am only a human being; I have to sleep, I have to eat, I have to die, I get sick, I want a wife, I have to marry, I have to obey laws—then that human being sets an example for us. We have no excuse with God for not following that example.

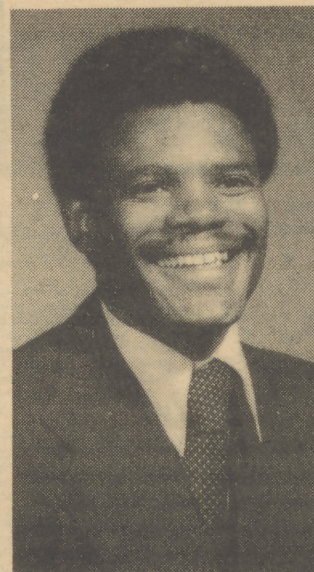

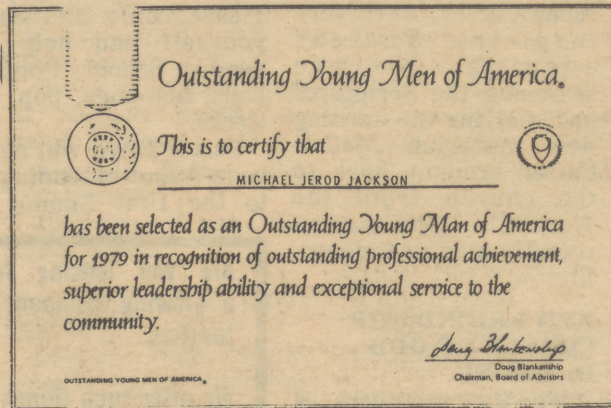

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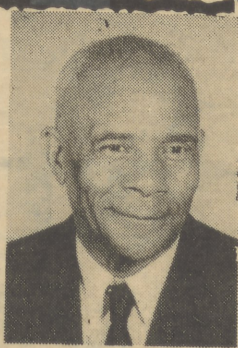

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# LOOK ON SPORTS



The story about Homer Lewis in the Tribune last week made me think back a few years. Homer was a rather small fellow, but there was nothing he wouldn't tackle. He had been a track athlete at East High way back when, and I am told that he played some football there. He became best known for his golf team that he called the Lewis Brothers team. He was the only black member of the team, and he shot a pretty good game, so he wasn't a handicap to the team. The team played team matches all over Iowa.

Homer had a barber shop in the Valley Bank building and from that address sent out requests for team matches. Then, in the thirties, just about every town that had a golf course had a golf team, so Homer got all the matches he wanted.

I often wondered what the people of those fine country clubs thought when the Lewis Brothers golf team showed up and out-stepped Homer in some towns where black folks weren't allowed to spend the

night. But I never heard that they had any problems, I suppose because Homer, who catered to white trade only in his barber shop, knew how to handle himself, and he wasn't afraid of the devil.

The guy also had a Lewis Brothers basketball team back in those days. I had our Crocker Y Big Five, and we made an enviable record around the city and state.

Well, the Lewis Brothers team kept challenging us. This went on for the whole season, until finally we decided to give them a game and teach them not to mess with us. I never did know how the fellow pulled it off, but we had a packed house at East High that night to see the game. Homer showed up with the Drake Varsity cage team intact, subs and all. He even brought along his own referee. It created a mild shock.

But, if we had been swamped, there would not have been any trouble. The game was one of those cliff hangers that wasn't decided until almost the last shot. Then there were several close calls that went against the Crocker Y team. When the last shot was fired, and the game was out of reach by a couple of points, the crowd rioted.

It took all of the Crocker Y team to help the Drake team and the referee to reach the safety of the locker rooms downstairs. The official got a pretty good going over before we could pry him loose from the crowd. We had to lock the Drake fellows in until the police showed up to escort them out of the place.

It was perhaps one of the wildest nights in Crocker Y history. There were several stories about Homer that are worth telling, but this one stands out to me because I remember it as if it were yesterday.

This is a bit late, but I received a letter from a friend of mine telling about the Chester Brewer baseball field in Los Angeles. We all know that Chet

has been a talent scout for the Pittsburg Pirates, and has been a voice in developing young baseball players as well as guys who get into trouble. There are more stories about how he spent his own money to help youngsters make it than I could tell.

If you have never read this column before, you wouldn't know that Chet is the only black from Des Moines to make it big in the old Negro National league, and was considered on a par with Satchel Paige. They sent along a picture of Brewer and his baseball field.

any future, except one where more and more of us will be forced to depend on a welfare state for survival.

We must begin to recognize the many advantages for Blacks in being a majority in their own communities. For too long, we have defined ourselves in relation to other groups as a powerless minority. With a new perspective of our unrealized potential, a proper kind of analysis can be made of our situation, and the disparity between Black and white America can be corrected. The establishment of parity between Black and white earnings, education and vocational achievements, and the communities in which we live, is an important precondition for any attempt at integration. This kind of logic, however, has escaped our state and municipal legislators.

CORE's diverse social, economic, and political programs are mini-models of the kinds of innovative programs that can be effective on a national scale. The success of these programs as they are expanded to reach larger segments of our population will be used to counter the resistance and skepticism of myopic Black and white elected officials.

In response to the depression-level unemployment riddling our community, CORE's national headquarters is becoming a clearinghouse for jobs throughout the country. Our Equal Opportunity Affairs Department is conducting a drive to exact commitments from the corporate sector to open up positions to qualified

Blacks. We believe that jobs already exist in big business, but are being diverted away from those of us most in need of employment.

We will expose and bring pressure to bear on those firms and companies that have consistently held policies opposed to the ideals of equal employment opportunities.

We are surveying our own communities to discover what resources can be tapped to generate both business and employment. While we are opposed to a policy of make-work, a restructuring of existing business and investment policies can make us the beneficiaries of the goods and services on which our communities depend. The Black Communities' disposable income can be directed to an investment bank to stop the flow of our cash out of the community as soon as it leaves our pockets, and foster industrial and commercial growth with unlimited possibilities for economic development. This becomes even more important in the light of the problems underlined by this year's looting in New York, and by the decline of city neighborhoods in many areas of the country.

Each CORE chapter must function as a training center for the skills and professionalism that will ensure our ability to secure the kind of employment bringing financial stability to our communities. In the area of computer sciences, in the last year, we have trained young men and women for careers in data processing.

Many of our trainees have been hired outside the organization and are receiving salaries

commensurate with the experience and proficiency gained from on-the-job training.

Other CORE programs train individuals in publishing, finance, sales and business administration. Our programs have a reciprocal relationship with the Black

Community: we offer employment and training, while the community gives us the support we need to sustain the organization's political functions.

This type of economic resourcefulness is only the beginning of alternatives available to Jimmy Carter in the

years ahead. It is also Black America's hope for survival."
