## Pulliam Explains Social Services Post Appointment

Dolph Pulliam, recently shed some light on comments made over the news media regarding Catherine Williams and the appointment of the new Commissioner for the Iowa State Department of Social Services.

Pulliam, an employee of KCCI-TV, also serves as a member of the Iowa Council of Social Services and is Vice Chairman of the 5 member body, chosen by the Governor, to set policy for the state department, approve budgets and make policies. Two members from the Council were chosen by the Governor to serve on the search committee in an attempt to find a new Commissioner.

The following are some of the questions contained in the interview.

What was meant by your comment "...a budget that is not only

acceptable, but understandable"? Pulliam explained that traditionally the Department of Social Services is the largest department, with a budget of about \$600 million per year, there are approximately 9,000 employees and numerous programs are administered. Much of the criticism against the department is that it is too large, unmanageable; the legislators have criticized the department for the presentation of a budget. There is a need to have an understanding of what is going on in the department. The governor has to give final approval to the budget prior to going to the legislature.

Mr. Pulliam said he was sad he could not vote to place Williams. He said Williams has contributed outstanding service to the department and is a

tremendous role model for young and old blacks in the state. Williams has shown what can be done because of work and education.

He said people should still look at the success this tremendous person has had and not say we have fallen short. We as a people should be as anxious to congratulate Catherine and tell her how proud we are of her for her accomplishments as we are to tell the governor that he made poor judgment.

Under the direction of the governor, the committee was asked to send out notices that they would be accepting resumes. As the resumes came in the individuals were interviewed. The American Public Welfare Association was also included in the search process. Six people on the search committee, four of them had done this type of job before and two, including Mr. Pulliam,

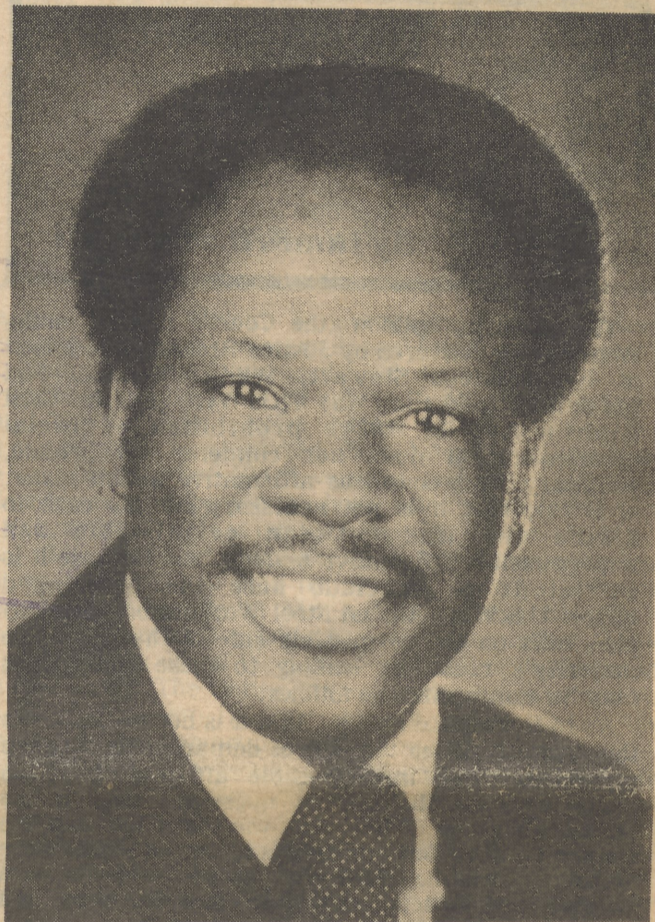
had not. Everyone looked for something different and this made the committee unique. The candidate was chosen on the basis of qualifications and job experience.

What was Catherine appointed to and what will she be doing? Pulliam said Williams will remain as Deputy Commissioner of the State Department of Social Services and, unlike before, she will have much greater input in programs, staff and in planning for the department. Her role will not just be that of a deputy, Catherine and the new Commissioner will work closely together. Catherine's role will be a vital role, stronger than the Deputy Commissioner has ever been.

Do you feel the Black Coalition hurt Mrs. Williams' chances?

than the Republican party. But also through the years the black vote has been taken for granted by political candidates, who in turn forget the needs of their black constituents. Today it has become essential for black people to voice their own needs and concerns and through the channels provided by a group such as the Democratic party.

Paula Baker, chairperson for precinct 44, says the black vote is very powerful and does make a difference in American politics on all levels. She says the

black vote is a powerful interest group that can determine whether an incumbent will make it to office again or a new candidate will be placed in a position.

"I think the most recent show of power of the black vote was the election of President Carter. I think more could even be done on a local level if blacks could recognize the strength they do have in voting numbers."

"The problem with blacks voting is that even if they vote on election day they tend to lose contact with the Democratic party in off

election years. Those off-year elections have and do make the difference. Those persons elected to those positions make powerful decisions that will effect black people's lives. Blacks are still not in positions of power within the Democratic party in their day to day operations and unless they participate, work and voice their opinions they can receive no benefits from their system of patronage that exists within the Democratic party.

In addition, even though the black vote turns out, the vote has

been taken for granted by some leaders in the Democratic party. Those leaders will not be responsive to needs in the black community after they have been elected. Some of the policies displayed by President Carter is a good example."

Particularly in a Republican state such as Iowa it is very important that blacks vote and be a part of the Democratic party.

"For years Governor Ray, a Republican, has received a substantial share of black votes each time he has been elected because he

comes off as a nice guy. During most of his election years there was a predominately democratic state legislature and to some degree legislation passed was sensitive to the needs of blacks and poor people. Ultimately whenever Ray signed one of those pieces of legislation he took credit for the work of the Democratic legislators. His conservatism was balanced out by the majority of a democratic legislature. He has come out smelling like a rose.

"But in 1978. for the

## Iowa City suspends liquor license due to racism

Tuesday night July 31, the Iowa City Council suspended the liquor license of Woodfields Disco for 4 months. Woodfields, owned by Harry Ambrose and Daniel Lovetinsky, was accused of racial discrimination by denying entrance on the night of June 23 to blacks.

The suspension came after the Iowa City

Human Rights Commission found that racial discrimination did take place on June 23 and recommended to the Council that action be taken against Woodfields.

The Commission heard testimony that lasted more than 13½ hours on July 23 and 24. There were seven complaints filed with the city by Joseph Penney, Robert

Morris, Sharon Nelson, Robert Martin and three others. The discrimination was done by requiring that blacks show 3 picture ID's with birthdate on each one while whites were let in showing one or no ID's at all.

The Council voted for the suspension of Woodfields liquor license after they were informed by the City Attorney that

they didn't have the power to revoke the license. Over the weeks of investigation and hearings black student groups pressured the City Council and the Human Rights Commission to make a quick ruling, even though they were not legally involved at all.

The feelings of the complainants, who were legally involved, were

best summed up by Robert Martin; "I don't care how long it takes, I just want it done right because Harry Ambrose should pay for the great wrong he did."

Ambrose and his attorney, J. Patrick White, sat quietly as the suspension ruling was given. Complainant Robert Morris reflecting on the entire incident stated; "I must say in

all truth that I feel sorry for Harry Ambrose. He is paying the price for doing, somewhat blatantly, a practice of social segregation that has been an accepted and effective means of discriminating against blacks in Iowa City for years. In this respect he is not alone. He is Iowa City's very own 'fall guy'."

## Thoughts and Comments

The majority opinion (the Court's ruling) in the Weber case, delivered by Justice Brennan and joined in by Justices Stewart, White, Marshall and Blackmun, held that: (a) Title VII's (of the Civil Rights Act of 1964) prohibition of racial discrimination does not condemn all private, voluntary, race-conscious affirmative action plans; and, (2), that it is not necessary in this case to define the line between permissible and impermissible affirmative action plans because it is sufficient to conclude here the challenged Kaiser-U.S.W.A. (United Steel Workers of America) plan falls on the permissible side of that line. The majority's reasoning leading to these conclusions may be summarized as follows:

As to the second holding, that it is not necessary in this case to define the line of demarcation between permissible and impermissible affirmative action plans because the one in question falls on the permissible side of that line, the Court felt that the Kaiser-USWA effort's purposes mirrored those of the statute. It was designed, they noted, to break down old patterns of racial segregation and hierarchy, and

was structured to open employment opportunities for Blacks in occupations traditionally closed to them.

At the same time, the plan does not necessarily impede the interests of white employees, neither requiring the discharge of white employees and their replacement with new Black ones, nor creating an absolute bar to the advancement of white employees since half of those trained in the program will be white. Additionally, the plan is a temporary one not intended to maintain a racial imbalance but only to eliminate a manifest racial imbalance.

Therefore, the Court concluded that "... the adoption of the Kaiser-USWA plan for the Gramerny plant falls within the area of discretion left by Title VII to the private sector voluntarily to adopt affirmative action plans designed to eliminate conspicuous racial imbalance in traditionally segregated job categories."

A concurring opinion (in agreement with that of the majority of the Court) was filed by Justice Blackmun. He cited the dissenting opinion of Judge Wisdom from the earlier decision by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals (whose majority had favored Weber's arguments) which held that, in his understanding of the facts, employers and unions who had committed "arguable violations" of Title VII should be free to engage in remedial efforts without fear of liability to whites.

The majority here, however, adopted a broader theory which would permit affirmative action by an employer whenever the job category in question is "traditionally segregated". A job category is "traditionally segregated" when "... there has been a societal history of purposeful exclusion of Blacks from the job category, resulting in a persistent

disparity between the proportion of Blacks in the labor force and the proportion of Blacks among those who hold jobs within the category". The Court's theory here is a significant departure from the narrower "arguable violations" approach adopted in the lower court dissent in two significant ways.

First, the "traditionally segregated" theory measures an individual employer's capacity for affirmative action solely in terms of a statistical disparity — thus an individual employer need not have engaged in discriminatory practices in the past to make voluntary affirmative action efforts. Secondly, it permits an employer to redress discrimination that lies wholly outside of the bounds of Title VII. For example, Title II provides no remedy for pre-1964 discrimination, yet the purposeful discrimination that creates a "traditionally segregated job category" may have entirely predated the adoption of the Civil Rights Act.

Further, strong considerations of equity also support an interpretation of Title VII which would support the Court's theory permitting affirmative action to reach where Title VII does not. Absent compelling evidence of legislative intent, Justice Blackmun argued, he "... would not interpret Title VII itself as a means of 'locking in' the effects of segregation for which Title VII provides no remedy."

He criticizes the reasoning adopted by the dissenting Justices (a summary of whose opinions will appear in this column next week) by saying that the passages from the legislative history which they cited are "... not so compelling as to merit the whip

jail." I said "yo honor let me have one last day to  
live it up and commit all forms of folly." He agreed  
to this and that's just what I did. Committed all sorts

## A Black Look At Politics

Last week I examined a few of the political options open to blacks in Iowa. Potential political allies were presented, and reasons for or against their acceptability were outlined. For this week, I should like to offer several ideas for strengthening the political position of blacks, particularly here in Des Moines.

All across America, the black community is increasingly fractured in a variety of ways: we no longer live near each other in segregated neighborhoods; our incomes fall across a wide range, from extreme poverty to extreme wealth; our employment opportunities have broadened, making for more contact with white workers. There are more interracial marriages and living arrangements than ten or fifteen years ago.

All these things, and many more, split the black community socially, as well as politically. The white collar black who lives in the suburbs is in more frequent contact with whites, and is more likely to agree on most issues with his white neighbor than with an inner-city dweller. Indeed, income usually dictates the political views of most people.

Almost always, more wealth one gets, the more conservative ones social and political views become.

Thus, suburban residents, regardless of color, would be shocked at what sometimes goes on in urban, inner-city areas.

What's the old saying? "Out of sight, out of mind." Many people choose to ignore a problem, hoping it will go away. Eventually, they'll swear it doesn't exist. With more and more blacks moving out of "ghettoes", and into more predominantly white neighborhoods, a real "crisis of identity" can result. This can be seen everywhere, from Oakland to St. Louis, or from Des Moines to Boston.

The breakdown and fragmentation of the Des Moines black community is a good example of this. While many blacks enjoy lifestyles unheard of in the 1950's and 60's, they have been bought at a very high cost, notably political fragmentation. We see issues in terms of self-interest — not what is usually best for the black community.

Similarly, Des Moines suffers from a serious shortage of black political leaders. Various groups have sprung up around the state, claiming they speak for black Iowans, or Des Moines blacks. In reality however, these groups speak for no one, by and large.

What seems to escape these, and many other people, is that numbers count in politics, whether it be the number of votes one can control, or the number of dollars in one's bank account. Politics is a game of exchange and compromise, and with so few blacks living in Iowa, concentration and unity are clearly necessary.

The upcoming Des Moines School Board and Mayoral elections provide good "proving grounds" for any candidate who is shrewd enough to try and

attract the black vote by waging an all-out voter registration drive in the black community, divided though it is.

The white vote would be decisively split amongst the various School Board or Mayoral candidates, especially since there are so many of them this year. A concentrated voter registration campaign aimed at black high school seniors, senior citizens (with free transportation to the polls), the "street" brothers and sisters who frequent "The Block," black office workers, black workers at various plants in Des Moines, and finally those brothers who virtually "live" at local basketball courts.

This is not an easy thing to do, but it is possible, and perhaps the only way blacks can assert themselves positively in the political process in Des Moines. For next week, I will look at issues most important to black Iowans, notably, jobs and housing.

Incidentally, how many readers were surprised at Governor Robert Ray's appointment of Michael Reagan to the Directorship of the Iowa Department of Social Services? Reagan, a former Human Services Administrator in New York, was selected over Des Moines resident Catharine Williams, the Assistant Director of the Department. As most of you know, I had predicted this occurrence in last week's column.

I have a personal, and very reliable source, who explained the Governor's choice was entirely necessitated by the naive and bumbling actions of the so-called "Black Coalition." Were it not for their ill-considered efforts, Catharine Williams would now be the Director of the Iowa Department of Social Services.

hand over the obvious equity of permitting employers to ameliorate the effects of past discrimination for which Title VII provides no direct relief."

He further notes the significance of the fact that while the Court's opinion does not foreclose other forms of affirmative action, the program in question here is moderate. It is little more than a temporary tool for remedying past discrimination without trying to "maintain" a previously achieved racial balance. If the Court, he concluded, has misperceived the political will of the makers (as the question here is purely statutory), Congress may, by subsequent amendment of the language, set a different course if it so chooses.

is the personal debt. I'm probably the ultimate communist. had taken a vacation he might have realized the need to consult his Black peers at home, and, especially, in Africa.

Answers to our problems are not to be found either in Camp David or South Africa! The ego trip is a dangerous journey for those lured by flattering phrases of how important or how influential they are - all expenses paid. Time to think, to consult, would have saved Jesse Jackson.

Is he not a man of integrity? While the New York Times tends to view the world, especially Africa from the viewpoint of the business world, the quotes from Jesse Jackson's remarks in South Africa are less than reassuring.

"Mr. Jackson has been careful not to annoy the whites on two issues that are the heart of the racial strife in that country — the withdrawal of foreign investments and the use of violence by Blacks to weaken the white monopoly in power" ... This is the price of admission into South Africa, it appears.

It is to be noted that no less than the approval of Secretary Cyrus Vance was shrewdly required for the admission of Jackson. According to the N.Y. Times, "In private sessions the Black leader has been more direct. A major purpose of his visit is to meet with executives of some of the 350 U.S. corporations operating here to test their assertions that their \$1.7 billion investment and their employment practices are beneficial to Blacks."

The question remains unanswered why Jesse Jackson is in South Africa and why at this particular time.

It is certainly clear that Jackson has not found it important to consult UN representatives of countries belonging to the Organization of African Unity who are unanimous in their condemnation of apartheid,

Please forgive me once again for crying the blues. I know this is only temporary and Kalonji "the eternal optimist" with spring back to life with a renewed vigor. But for right now, "what am I gonna do? Now that its all over." I feel like Willie Hutch when he ended the song "I'm so all alone".

and South Africa; in particular. Black African workers in the mines, mills and factories understand that they who have spent a life time are just barely able to exist and barely able to feed their children.

The workers realize cutting off of trade is the alternative to bloodshed. Would Jesse Jackson dare to stand before Black workers and say, "I have a concern for people on both sides of the partition (apartheid)? He is quoted as saying this privately.

The question remains as to why Jackson was 'invited' at just this moment in history. There is evidence that South Africa is caught in a bind by a shortage of skilled labor because of apartheid. South Africa has one of the finest coal burning processes in the world. The United States has need of the process. The problem is the growing strength of the movement against apartheid around the world.

There is a possibility of dock workers refusing to unload in the USA. Another reason for the Jackson visit is wishful thinking that the visit will turn attention from the rising guerilla warfare in and surrounding South Africa. This does not mean, however, that South Africa is not mobilizing her army - even impressing Blacks into service in separate ranks, of course.

As a follow-up from last week's article, we viewed part two of the CBS Reports examining today's quality of life for blacks — in the North, in education, housing, jobs and politics, continuing the examination in the city in which he grew up, CBS News Correspondent Ed Bradley looked at Philadelphia. Having joined the program in progress, Mr. Bradley was at Mann Elementary School discussing reading skills. Many blacks graduate from high school and yet, they cannot read.

In his interview, he found that black children seem to fall behind in 4th grade. Teacher responsibility says to do something for this child rather than pushing them on ahead. Teachers and the principal discussed ways of reaching the student, for we cannot expect one teacher to do a fantastic job with a child and the next teacher not continue to make progress.

Rev. Sullivan in 1964 began OIC (Opportunity Industrialization Center) stressing the importance in getting unemployed into jobs because by helping a man get a job, you help the economy.

In looking at housing, blacks in 1954 did not own their own homes, but that has changed. More than 100,000 black families, over 1/2 in the city own their own homes. They are in a segregated area that creates segregated schools. There are some exceptions. One couple interviewed, the Pounds,

earn \$600 per week. They came out of the ghetto, rose above it and are interested in maintaining their area so that the ghetto does not come to them.

There is a definite public housing controversy in Philadelphia, 75,000 poor blacks live in public housing. None are being built at this time because the federal government says the public housing must be built in pairs...one in white community and one in black community. The white community has thus far prevented such housing in their community.

Four out of ten blacks live below the poverty line. Public Housing was best described as "an indefinite detour on the road to nowhere".

There are efforts to rehabilitate some of the 20,000 homes in the city. Some families have moved into vacant homes, fixed them up and then received permission from the government to live in the home. Black activists have made allegations that the moneys allocated to Philadelphia have not been distributed properly.

Mr. Bradley spoke regarding the process called "recycling" and the fact that housing stimulates discontent and formulates blacks into organizing. One of the problems was you cannot draw from HUD moneys until all work has been completed and inspected. This causes problems in getting contractors who will do the job. At the request of

the "Streeter" brothers, unusual methods were used to get the attention of city council as regards the housing problem.

For the last seven years, Frank Rizzo has been Mayor. Last August, an event took place that aroused the black community to unite and show the power of the vote. Fifteen people, belonging to the group MOVE were injured and 1 policeman

killed in a confrontation when police tried to move the members from a vacant house they were living in. Newsfilm showed the brutal beating police officers inflicted upon the group's leader. 150,000 blacks registered to vote and Rizzo was defeated in his attempt to run for Mayor another term.

The CBS report clearly showed that many Americans do not know what is going on in our

inner cities. Rev. Sullivan spoke to the issue when he stated "...our cities are bombed out with unemployment, welfare, bombed out with neglected schools, bombed out with police who don't care."

The Supreme Court Decision in 1956 was a historic event that triggered changes and

paved the way for all civil rights that followed.

Via the CBS Report we have seen how life has improved for many blacks; we have seen that blacks and whites can still be separate but not equal. The Brown decision was an important step in the long struggle for equality, and if lost, will cause us all to suffer.

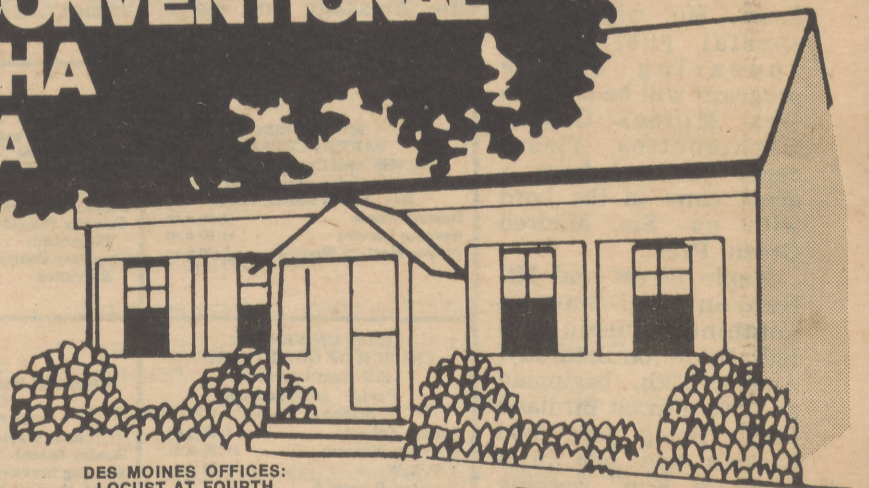

more than one. In every area of human life we find it plagued with duplicity. There is a double standard prevalent in our society that absolutely undermines our sense of morals and literally destroys our sense of justice.

Today we find double standards between the sexes (in respect to the way males generally view females as inferior sex objects), double standards exist in housing, employment, education and justice.

The quality of housing we live in is largely determined by our employment, which is largely determined by our degree of education and when we examine the educational system — we find it designed to speak to the needs of caucasian students — which incites a subconscious rebellion or a submission that merges non caucasian students into the mainstream of another peoples culture while shelving their own.

The IQ testing system for example is designed to test the level of intelligence of a student. This test is used in evaluating and classifying students academically. However, this is a testing system

based on the culture of caucasian people. What is implied is that the determination of a child's level of intelligence is based upon the ability to remember caucasian culture.

If caucasian children were to be given an IQ test based on Bilalion (Black) culture or better yet if the general public would be given an IQ test on the Religion of Al-Islam — we would have a lot more unintelligent people on our hands to deal with. We have to learn to do justice by one another.

Coalition did do some harm to Catherine's chances. I think the governor in no way would make a decision just on pressures alone. The press killed the coalition and probably the best thing to have done would have been to go to the governor directly before going to the press," he said.

Some blacks in the community were offended because of the comments you made over the news media and/or why you, as a representative of the black community because of your color, had to comment at all?

Mr. Pulliam stated he felt KCCI news chose him to speak because (1) he was an employee of TV station, (2) on the search committee and (3) because he was black. Mr. Pulliam had received calls and pressures also to choose Catherine as the Commissioner or to use his influence. He felt his one vote was important but it was one of five.

In his additional comments, Mr. Pulliam shared with me how he felt about Catherine and how he felt black people should view what has happened to her. "I have known Catherine for more than 7 years and worked with her for 7 years in the State Department of Social Services and I have found that not only is Catherine a very capable lady and hard working, but she has been my own model, she exemplifies the kind of work that gets to positions she has attained." Mr. Pulliam further stated, he thinks very highly of Catherine, admires her and because of the love he feels for her, felt very torn in having to make the decision, having to vote for someone and against someone he really had great respect for; torn because he had to make a decision not based on race alone.

Mr. Pulliam further stated, "I hope that blacks will look at it as such and that they will take Catherine for their own personal model and emulate some of the things she has done. Young people need these types of images and many of our young people cannot see that high and look at what Catherine has done.

Some can only see that the next step would have been Commissioner and forget about what she has done and what she is continuing to do, the vital role she is playing. Because she did not get the job, does not have to be another strike against blacks. There will be other appointments and things happening for blacks in the state."

On September 10, Michael Regan, a former Co. Social Services Administrator, from Syracuse N.Y., will assume the duties as Commissioner.

# ALLEN ASHBY with a LOOK ON SPORTS



When you read this our Hilltop tennis meet will be in full swing. I don't think we will have as many entrants as we usually do, but there will be tough competition in just about every division, and that hasn't always happened. There could be some surprises in the adult divisions, as well as one or two in the juniors.

The people who talk about this meet now don't realize how the thing got started, and that we have probably the oldest tennis meet in Iowa. Of course, if you count the integrated portion of it, it is only thirty one years this year for the thing, but actually the meet goes back to 1929, and has continued without a break since then, being all black for the first twenty

years.

The story of our present setup has been told too often to be repeated here, but I have to wonder how many meets like this one there are in the country.

What people don't know is that during our first twenty years we worked hard at promoting tennis at Good Park. Nobody worked harder than the late Bill Ashby. He always said he wanted to make the park the center of tennis in the city for everybody, and there is at least one day when that seems to be true.

I can recall one year when the finals of the prestigious Hawkeye were held at Good because we happened to have the best courts and the best setup for watching tennis in town. We still have the best setup for watching the game in spite of the bleachers at Birdland. You can sit there and watch three or maybe four matches at once and know what is going on on all of them, something you can't do if the seats are on the side of the courts.

We tried to promote exhibition matches between the best white players available and our bunch, even though we knew we would get clobbered, but we stepped up and did our best so people could see how well the game could be played. It wasn't always fun taking our lumps, but we thought we were doing good for the game, and maybe we did, because in the fifties and sixties we had a pretty good group of young players who, had they gotten the chance to

play in as many meets as the other fellows might have done pretty well.

I can still see Eddie Holt who was about five feet four or less, playing the number two junior in the state at Cedar Rapids. Bill Stoy was about six feet four, and the match looked funny to everyone but Stoy who had to bust his gut to get out over Eddie.

Then we had tennis parties, chose up sides and had team matches among ourselves with the losing side buying a feed for the winners. Our club promoted just about every sort of activity that could include tennis.

In fact, one year at the state tennis association meeting, they had a person from the USTA to tell us how to promote tennis in the clubs. Everything the guy suggested, I could tell the bunch we had done. The fellow began to ask questions about our Hilltop Club and thought we had a great big club, a fabulous clubhouse. If he had known that we were more or less in the park and that was it, I wonder what he would have thought.

As I recall, we got mentioned in one of the tennis publications that winter or spring. But the group associated with the Hilltop was for the most part dedicated to the game. I wonder how many dedicated people like that we could find today.

Looks as if we won't get the first two days of our juniors covered due to a lack of personnel, but that won't stop us.

first time since Ray was in office there was a Republican majority in the legislature. There has been no one to balance out his conservatism and to make him appear more liberal than he actually is. Now blacks and poor people are coming to realize the true meaning of having Republicans in power in Iowa. This realization has become painfully apparent."

Traditionally the Republican party has

been a majority supporter of interests in big business. Baker says looking at 1978 unemployment figures shows the Republican party has pushed the interest of business at the sake of working people. She says according to the 1978 unemployment rate, which averages 3.9 percent, 3.8 percent whites are unemployed and 8.6 percent blacks are unemployed.

"Just taking a look at the projected unemployment rate for

78 shows some significant things for blacks and particularly young blacks in the state. Black males 16 through 17 years of age average 30.2 percent in the unemployment rate as compared to their white counterparts 10.9 percent. Let's take another example, Black females total 11.0 percent and white females total 3.5 percent for ages 20 through 24. Taking another look at unemployment figures blacks still are at least two times higher than whites even in the ages of 35 through 44 and 45 through 64. To sum it all up in the state of Iowa as well as the rest of the nation blacks are disproportionately up in unemployment statistics."

"I think that all minority, poor and working people are going to see an attack on the rights of working people in 1979. Workmans compensation for manufacturing and factory jobs are going to be the target areas."

In the near future the Democratic Central Committee will be nominating a candidate to succeed State Senator Earl Willits who will be resigning effective July 30th. This is just one significant position some

new fresh and strong leadership for the Democratic party could be installed. A black candidate could even be elected to the position to insure the growing participation of blacks in the Democratic party.

"There is no reason why blacks cannot become more influential within the Democratic party. Nor occupy positions of leadership in elected office. They're are many blacks living in Des Moines alone with professional and political backgrounds as well as others with outstanding personal qualification. These qualified blacks are most able to effectively articulate and represent the concerns of both black and white Iowans."

"The Democratic party needs fresh, aggressive and effective new leadership. I believe that more black involvement would contribute to progressive goals of the party. For instance, Thomas Mann Jr. Director of the Civil Rights Commission who is now seeking the nomination for State Senate from District 31 on the Democratic ticket is a very qualified black. While Tom's candidacy is significant to black Iowans he will need the help of black community

leaders from precincts with District 31. Blacks need to get out and vote in the precincts on election day in order for him to win the seat. Also blacks need to help promote other strong leaders to key positions within the state to build a tradition of direct black involvement and input in the Democratic party. This will make the party very strong in a Republican state."

Baker says the Democratic party needs the type of black involvement that a strong black Democratic caucus will provide. She says a black caucus was active during the 1976 presidential election at the State Democratic convention, but that effort needs to be renewed and made more effective throughout the state on local levels. She says this will assure

black voters they do benefit by voting Democratic.

"In my opinion black Iowans should never consider a Republican candidate be they black or white in any district where there is a substantial black population. One token black Republican can in no way change the primary goals of the Republican party which are to perpetuate and maintain the status quo, in terms of government existing for the benefit of big business controlled solely by white males. Big business in the Republican eyesight will always be top priority over the concerns of people needs."

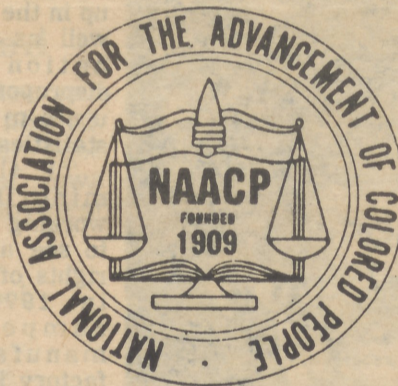
