## Clinton Participating In Horse Shows

"Special hunter under saddle", "Novice working hunter under saddle" are some of the words that have become incorporated into the vocabulary of one Miss Judith L. Clinton.

Clinton was participant No. 109 in the Iowa - Nebraska Horse Show, August 3-5, at the Valley Park Stables. Iowa's only black entry, she participated in four classes riding her own recently - purchased horse, "Jared". (Show Name "London Town")

Class 39 — Special Hunter Under Saddle, consisted of the rider maneuvering the horse through an exercise of walking the horse, trot, canter, reverse walk, from canter to walk, trot, reverse into walk.

Class 30 — Novice Working Hunter Under Saddle and Class 36 —

Adult Working Hunter Under Saddle were also classes in which the judge was judging how well the horse responded to the rider's instructions. Class 9, Equitation on the flat — Adult, consisted of the judge looking at how well the rider is poised and sits in saddle. Judith was among 55 other contestants and what made this horse show special was the fact that she was riding her own horse for the first time.

A graduate of the University of Northern Iowa and a Copy Editor at the Des Moines Register & Tribune Co., she recently purchased the seven - year old Thoroughbred Hunter from Oklahoma.

Clinton, who has been riding for about 3 years has received ribbons from the Raccoon Valley

Schooling Show 1977 and the Robin Hill Schooling Show 1978. She also entered the Des Moines Spring Show 1978 at the State Fairgrounds.

It was quite a challenge in riding this horse for the first time, because of the teamwork involved.

She looks forward to showing her horse in future Horse Shows. "Hard work and long hours are the ingredients to success," says Miss Clinton. She rides about 5 days a week and has lessons once a week — lessons for her horse and for herself — it is more than just getting on and going, there is a way you have to ride and a way to jump, it's a style, a tradition.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Clinton, Des Moines, Iowa.

## Mann Wins Nomination For State Legislature

Democrats in Senate District 31 have picked Thomas Mann Jr. as their candidate to replace Earl Willits in this fall's election. This would not normally be an election year for District 31. The seat has been left open as a result of Willits taking a job as an assistant Iowa attorney general. District 31 runs from University on the south, through all of Highland Park, to Saylor Township and Ankeny.

Mann, 29, of 4049 Lower Beaver Road, is

the first black candidate to run and receive such a nomination, defeated six other candidates running for the post. Senator Earl Willits, who represented the district for the past seven years, resigned last month to become an assistant attorney general.

The 29 - year - old Mann was born on a farm in Haywood County, Tennessee. He is a graduate from West High School in Denmark, Tenn., and Tennessee State University in Nashville. Mann is also a

graduate of the University of Iowa college of Law. He has worked as an assistant attorney general for the State before becoming director of the Civil Rights Commission. Mann at the age of 26 was one of the youngest to receive such an executive position in the country.

Mann says he will be a "consumer candidate". He says unemployment and unemployment benefits will be an issue in his campaign. He said he will work for the restoration of

unemployment benefits which were reduced by the "Republican controlled" legislature last year.

In an interview with the Highland Park News,

Mann said he is interested in pushing for the establishment of a consumer relations office on the state level that might argue the position of the consumer before such groups as the Iowa Commerce Commission.

He also supports greater spending for mass transit by the state. Mann said the Department of

Transportation should look at spending more on mass transit as an energy conservation measure.

Mann has "some

sympathy for labor concerns." "I think I would find myself

Jones, prevailed.

A fellow and I were discussing the Black Coalition. This fellow said he thought they were a useful group and could do some good around town. He said they were young and inexperienced in dealing in the things they were into.

Said that their handling of the Catherine Williams deal was merely an example of their inexperience. They let the media get them to say things they should have left unsaid. As this fellow put it, "You can say a lot of things to a man in his office that you can't or shouldn't say to the news media."

But he didn't think the Williams woman had a chance to get the job no matter what, and neither do I.

But my friend thought this group of young men and women could do the black community some good if they held together and continued to fight for what they believed in.

There is sure to be some flak come up about the Good Park swimming pool. The same old cry that

"We are studying the problem" surfaced. Studying what? The best way to take the thing out of the neighborhood before we can realize what has happened? If it comes down to a question of whether Ashworth or Good gets some money spent on it, you have to think that it will be Ashworth, or at least the people who decide these things will build a pool out of the Good Park area and say it serves the greater number of people.

It has never been a secret that the Good Pool was neglected for all these years and very little money spent on it may be because it was Good Park, although people in high places will deny that on a stack of Bibles. Common sense will tell you that if the pool had been properly inspected like the rest of


them around the city and money spent on the maintenance of it, it would still be a good place to swim.

You have to wonder why our kids have to be the ones to walk or be bussed to other pools around the city when this pool is right there. They say that is too much money to spend on the thing. If people could see the big crowds in Good Park over the weekends, they might think the money wouldn't be wasted.

But it seems as though every time an issue concerning black people comes up, the tactic is to appoint a group to "study the thing" and then do what the people in power want to.

The Black Coalition could make itself be felt if they could get to the people and try to enlist the aid of some good thinking white people. You just can't go off into a battle by yourself. There are some white people in the city who would probably be glad to help you swing a stick.

We can yell and raise hell, but we just don't have enough votes to bother anybody in an elective office, but if we got some right thinking white folks on our side, speaking for our cause, you might be surprised what that would do.



## Thoughts and Comments

Reactions to the Supreme Court's decision in the Weber case have been mixed, with divergent opinions expressed by many about its impact on companies, unions and collective bargaining. Some observers think that the ruling will drastically speed up the process of affirmative action to create numerous new job opportunities for minorities and women.

Others feel that the case will remove the uncertainties from existing programs but will not generate a new wave of affirmative action programs. And some believe that the decision still leaves employers and unions unsure about the responsibilities and liabilities in the area of preferential hiring, promotion and training. To fully understand the thrust of the Court's ruling, a discussion of its theoretical and moral underpinnings will be helpful.

The obvious bottom line in this case is that the plight of racial minorities constitutes a severe political, social and economic problem to American

society, regardless of the underlying causes. Poverty in this country continues to be racially disparate in its impact and past or present discrimination is but a distinct compounding factor in it. The major social consequence of it is that the goal of racial integration is severely impeded but, most importantly, the political effect is that racial minorities, seeing no stake in the system, become more deeply alienated.

This alienation is amplified by the fact that many white Americans are convinced that, in general, Blacks have "made it" in society, that substantial equality of opportunity has been achieved, and that further special efforts are unnecessary. Recent polls have consistently found that white Americans think that the period for special consideration is over and that now everyone must compete on an individual colorblind basis, which was at the heart of Brian Weber's demand.

It would seem obvious that Brian Weber and the other white workers involved in this case viewed the concept and practice of seniority as giving them legal and perhaps natural rights over the "newcomers". But one must keep in mind that seniority rights flow from the labor-management contracts creating them and are little more than articles of labor peace rather than dictates of natural law.

In this context Weber's appeal to the trade union principle of seniority parallels Allan Bakke's appeal to the bourgeois principle of merit; both principles are theoretically reasonable, but neither has an absolute value that cannot be outweighed by other public interests. Although seniority is a necessary

barrier against arbitrary assignments, layoffs and other inequitable employment practices, the law allows employers and unions to alter seniority voluntarily and to enhance Blacks seniority status at the expense of whites, if done to promote a strong public policy.


The concern for individual merit is at variance from the traditional concept of interest group politics whereby important social and economic gains are made by various segments of the population which have managed to acquire some power, usually by numbers and intergroup cohesiveness (although not all members of the group are equally meritorious or worthy of the gains made).

To suddenly require a "merit" standard, especially in the situation where that standard may not be readily identifiable, may be theoretically, intellectually and morally praiseworthy yet arbitrary at this point in history. In recent years, American law has singled out special groups for special treatment (like unions), either because of a strong moral claim or an effective political lobby. There is shown no moral or practical reason why Blacks should not be the beneficiary of either the laws or consciences of the American people in this instance and racial quotas, as utilized in this situation, are a means to reach that desired result.

Racial quotas as used here were not ends in themselves, but only the means to reach the desired social goals. They were utilized only to create opportunity rather than to promote privilege as Weber had argued. As such, the quota is not an objectionable or otherwise unacceptable practice.

## A Black Look At Politics

Last week I had the unique opportunity to meet and discuss national issues with a distinguished member of the Washington political clique, notably, a certain Mr. Carter. No, it was not the President of the United States, but it was his son, Chip Carter, who is currently travelling throughout the midwest, talking to diverse groups of citizens. From the outset, the young Mr. Carter was late, and only a handful of interested men showed up, due to (intentionally?) poor publicity.

Nonetheless, the meeting was informal, open, and discussion touched on a wide range of issues, from agriculture and Iowa's railroads, to energy, inflation, unemployment, and recession.

Aside from answers that could be considered political "payola", or pre-election year gung-ho, many issues, particularly those most important to black Americans, were objectively analyzed. As to the main focus of the Carter administration, inflation is still the number one enemy of the economic policy, with the interrelated energy (oil) crunch a close second.

The Administration has finally admitted that America is in a "mild" recession, but economic experts are split (as usual) over how severe the recession will be. Thus, it must be expected that unemployment will go up, as the nation's productivity declines. Young Carter admitted that black Americans and other minorities (i.e. Hispanics) will have to put up with at least short-term high unemployment rates, despite the fact that the Administration has created several hundred thousand new jobs since 1976.

Chip also offered up the incorrect assertion that his father had reduced black unemployment by some 45 per cent. If this was the case, blacks would be in much better economic shape than they are; as most of us know, minority joblessness runs as high as 75 per cent for inner-city teenagers, mostly male. While I have no figures as to black unemployment in Des Moines, I would guess that it runs at least 35 per cent, and could be as high as 60 per cent, in certain areas.

The unworkability, or unfeasibility, of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act

(CETA) was thoroughly reviewed, with Mr. Carter admitting the shortcomings of the program. Alternatives to the short-term (8-12 months) CETA program were discussed, but one big roadblock always popped up: a shortage of available Federal funds, especially with the President's goal of balancing the Federal budget by 1980.

While my familiarity with the field of macroeconomics, along with fiscal and monetary policy, is rudimentary at best, I don't believe the Federal deficit could be wiped out for many years, due to a variety of factors, not the least of which is an ever-increasing allotment for Defense.

Young Mr. Carter was optimistic about his father's chances for reelection next year, and said that Senator Ted Kennedy will not, in all likelihood, seek the Democratic nomination for President. I asked him who the Republican candidate might be, and he replied Ronald Reagan of California.

The possibilities of synthetic fuels were tossed about, especially the potential of nuclear plasma fusion in providing a plentiful and clean source of power. The President's son clearly stated, however, that nuclear power as we now know it, is only a short-term source, totally unfit for long-term use, due to its radioactive waste products. The "Synfuel" program will not give viable results for many years, due to the lack of previous research.

Getting back to the economic picture, everyone present more or less recognized the long-term trend of steadily declining economic growth in this country. The possibilities for a tax reduction in the coming months was approached cautiously; what would be the first thing you would do with a tax refund?

Answer: in all probability, you'd spend it. This would mean more dollars in circulation, reducing the value of each, hence fueling, not reducing, inflation. Republican plans for large tax cuts are totally unrealistic, therefore, and must be viewed as empty campaign promises. The only tax reduction being considered by the President is a cut in Social Security taxes. Even this option has its price, as America's population grows older, and fewer people enter the work force.

All in all, the meeting proved quite informative; young Mr. Carter was candid, open, and friendly, as was his staff. Crucial national issues were examined, and potential solutions to a variety of problems were debated.

If the race for President comes down to a choice between Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan, or any other Republican candidate so far "in the running",

black Americans should not have a very difficult choice.

And, despite the actions of several black leaders who have openly broken the ranks, and turned on the President, the choice would not be voting for the "lesser of two evils". Then again, as the meeting adjourned, I cautioned Chip Carter against having his father take the black vote for granted. After all, look what happened to George McGovern back in 1972.

# Social Services Appointment

## OPEN LETTER

### To The Concerned;

The Department of Social Services is the largest and possibly the most complex in the state of Iowa. There is a local agency in each county. There are 16 districts.

At the state level are consultants to counties in matters of standards and procedures. Each local unit has a budget. Federal money is involved and must be allotted to county and district units. The Department of Social Services receives funds from the federal government as well as the state. The commissioner of Social Services is responsible for preparation of a budget for presentation to the Iowa legislature.

The department receives the largest portion of state funds. The political cross-currents are swift and not always visible. Gov. Ray must be prepared to present the budget and justify recommendations to the Iowa legislators. The fact is, the Department of Social Services has become so large and complex there is a growing concern for possible reorganization.

Against this roughly sketched background, it is possible to view qualifications for the position of commissioner in a new light.

Deputy Commissioner Catherine Williams has studied, worked and studied further during her twenty-five years in the Dept. of Social Services. She has a master's degree in social work from the University of Iowa. She has accepted responsibility for orientation of two white male commissioners in the Department of Social Services.

Mrs. Williams became acting commissioner when Mr. Preisser resigned recently. Does it mean, "Catherine Williams is not qualified"? Gov. Ray stated in his first meeting with the Black Coalition that she is not qualified in the preparation of the Dept. of Social Services budget.

Suppose Gov. Ray had discussed this opinion privately with Mrs. Williams and proposed the idea of hiring a deputy commissioner expert in the area of budget systems clearly understandable to state legislators. The deputy would teach county and district units to use the same system. The deputy would be responsible for coping with rules and regulations of federal funding.

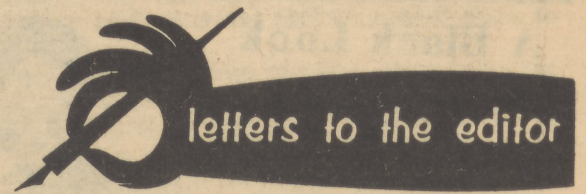
Both the deputy and the commissioner would, of course, need to work together on priorities. People are the business of the social services department. Competition for funds creates political pressures on the governor. For him there is no hiding place.

It becomes clear that an expectation that one person be equally qualified in such diverse areas as administration of social services and budget making is unrealistic. Suppose Gov. Ray shared with Mrs. Williams the idea of hiring a deputy commissioner with the duties suggested.

We would direct the Social Services board to search for a deputy commissioner with budget qualifications. This would provide the additional support needed for hearings on the budget. Mrs. Williams would become commissioner with whatever understanding she might wish to share regarding retirement.

Poor timing is the difficulty with this brainstorming. It should have taken place immediately following the resignation of Mr. Preisser. Someone knew Mrs. Williams had applied for the position. Someone else knew the governor was writing Mrs. Williams off as unqualified.

The lone Black member of the Social Services board seems to have been more concerned with proving he was not a racist rather than examining



the meaning of 'unqualified' in this particular instance. "Unqualified" has many meanings as applied to Black people.

Black leaders at all levels in the Black community have missed the boat. Gov. Ray feels he has fulfilled any obligation he might have in the Black community with two or three appointments to meals and travel expense commissions. The Black Coalition welcomes these appointments but fails to see their relationship to unemployment and inflation.

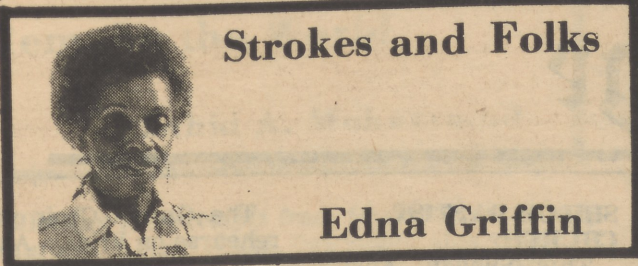

(Following are excerpts from Imam Wallace Deen Muhammad's New World Patriotism Day address, delivered in Chicago's Grant Park on July 4, 1979.)

It only takes an act of courage to break out of your smallness, and that's what we need in America. That's why I come out here, the son of the Honorable Elijah Muhammad, and carry the American flag proudly.

I know this is not the season for it. Caucasians even don't want to carry the American flag proudly, and the flag has meant their glory. They don't want to raise the flag high because for once, America is trying to fulfill its promises at home, and trying to keep the same image and the same face abroad that is has at home.

There was a time when America showed the

outside world one face and was a devil within her own borders. Now, America has dignified her image at home and we have an Administration that said we are going to practice the same thing abroad that we practice at home. We stand for the principles of human dignity at home, we stand for the principles of human dignity in Zimbabwe and all over the world.

This kind of America deserves some kind of recognition from us. I think God will punish us if we don't get the heart to at least say America has done something good — and America is doing something good.

There are many countries that say man is equal, but when you go there, you find as many doors locked in your face as you find here — and maybe more.

There are many countries that say everything is beautiful and right, but go there, as I have gone, and you will find that human prejudices exist all around this Earth.

I don't think you will find in any other spot on the Earth as many good forceful elements coming together to establish human dignity for all people.

You won't find anyplace other than in America, as many good forceful elements coming together to bring about a healthy respect for what is morally right, for what is just and true and right for everybody all over this globe, unless it's Iran.

Iran right now is in a political thing, and is not quite as free as we are, emotionally, to deal with the job of raising up the human being and giving the common human being his proper respect. We are not involved in a lot of political things right now.

America is blessed right now not to be involved in so many political things. The average American citizen is not worried about what's happening across the waters. We don't even turn our lights down because we don't know there's an energy crisis.

We are still burning too many lights, we are burning too much gas, we are wasting the fuel because we don't know what's going on; our mind is on our own human needs.

There is a human awakening in America that's greater than anything I've seen anywhere I've been, and believe me, this is the season. Your mind is out of season if you think this America should be divided on any color lines.



# ALLEN ASHBY with a LOOK ON SPORTS



With our Hilltop Open tennis meet out of the way, we can look back on it a bit. We didn't have quite as many entrants as we usually had, maybe due to the fact that tennis is seeming to have run its course, and then, again, maybe it was because there are more tennis meets than ever in the city. We had juniors in just about every division, but were short of adults.

The thing went off smoothly with practically no goofs in the juniors and one in the adults. And it could have been resolved if the affected parties had been willing to play, but they obviously didn't want to, so it came out all right. One thing that we have noticed about the meet is the increasing number of black players in it, and the fact that the juniors are doing pretty well in the thing, which was the goal we had in mind when we started this thing. Junior players have come out of Minnesota and have given

good account of themselves. Maybe we will have some good ones here.

In the adult divisions our best players are in the women's division and in the fifty five year old division. Esther Snype seems to own the women's singles, having won the thing eleven times. That has to be some sort of a record. Of course the top women players in the state haven't been getting in the meet, but the players ranked in the top ten, but not in the top five have and they have had their problems with Esther.

Her forte is condition. She walks all over town in the hottest weather and never misses a day practicing at the park, as we call Good, no matter how hot it gets. And that park is just about the hottest place in town to play tennis. The sun bounces off those high cement walls around the swimming pool and with the artificial playing surface, makes the heat terrific.

If it is ninety five for the day, it is probably one hundred twenty on the tennis courts, and people who play there only once or twice a year, simply can't take the heat and Snype's steady returning balls, no matter how hard one hits them. One fellow said, "She looks like any one of nineteen players could beat her, but let them try it."

During the last couple of years we have had a little trouble making people know that our Hilltop isn't just a black meet. For instance, one woman asked me the other day if we had our meet at Good Park. I told her that we held the finals there. She replied that she had noticed that there was a meet being

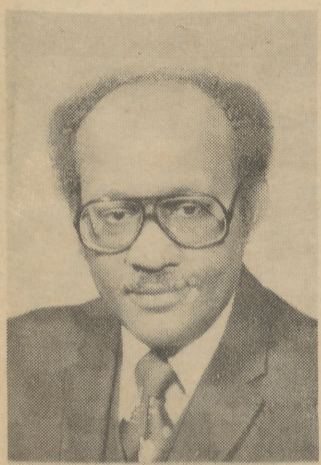
held at Birdland and wondered how we could share the courts with that one.

We informed her that that was our Hilltop, and she was surprised. Then your 'sisn't an all black meet? Sometimes I think that the people who handle tennis around the city and who have just come into town think the same thing, judging from their actions.

They came out three times to check on how many courts we were using, and how many people were playing at once. It has always been our policy to turn the courts back to the public as the need for them diminishes like getting down to the quarter or semifinals, and it made us wonder if that had been done to the Hawkeye meet and why not if it hadn't.

But, on the whole we had a good meet, and I forgot to mention that after seventeen years the Bill Ashby doubles trophies were retired by Arden Stokstad and Gregg Russell who won them for the third time. And John Stauffer got his name on the Louis Myles singles trophy for the second time, and we have to think he will come back to try to retire that one.

And for the first time since he entered the Hilltop at least twenty years ago, Erling Jensen of Ames didn't win anything. Duke Green of St. Paul won the fifty year old crown, with the guy he beat, Harold McCullom putting Jensen out. And in all of my fifty odd years around tennis nobody had ever asked about whether there is a rest period between the second and third set in mixed doubles. Do you know I had to go home and look that one up? Yep, there is if somebody wants it. The book says where women are involved, and that would have to mean mixed doubles.

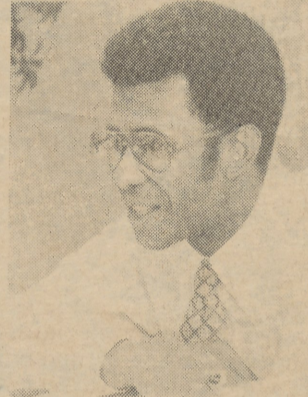

supporting the kinds of concerns that working people would be raising from time to time," he said.

As executive director of the Iowa Civil Rights Commission, Mann has been critical of six - girl basketball in the state, saying he feels it discriminates against the girls since they only learn to play offense or defense. At the college level, women must play both.

Mann says if he is elected, six - girl basketball would not be an issue he would raise. Referring to a **Des Moines Tribune** story which stressed his position on the subject Mann said, "I think it was blown totally out of proportion . . . I don't really see it as an issue at all."

Mann has indicated he would like to take a leave of absence from the Civil Rights Commission job in order to have more time to campaign. This comes at a time when some commission members are being critical of the backlog of cases at the commission. Mann says that criticism is based on "less than accurate facts." "We do have a skilled administrative staff here at the Civil Rights Commission . . . I'm not an indispensable party," he said.

No date has been set by state Republicans to select a candidate to run against Mann in the November 6 election.

Skateboarders already entered in the tournament warm - up during practice sessions prior to each event.

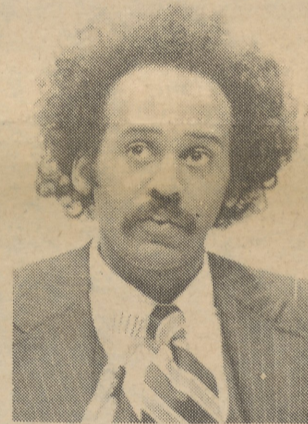
### ACORN MEMBERS TO APPEAR ON WHO-TV

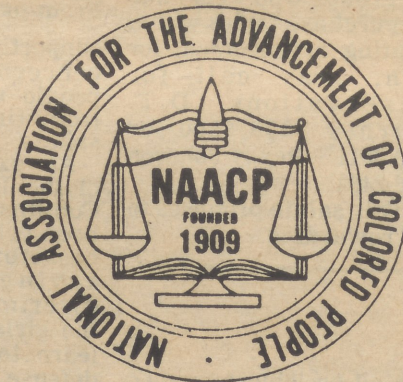
