Lecture-Demonstration Planned By Rod Rodgers

Rod Rodgers and four members of the Rod Rodgers Dance Company will appear at

Roosevelt High School, Sept. 24th, Monday, 8 a.m. to give a lecture-demonstration of

dance technique. This program is sponsored by Gateway Dance Theatre and partially funded by

the National Endowment of the Arts. The Roosevelt High School assembly will commemorate 25 years after desegregation of the public schools.

Rod Rodgers was in Iowa this summer to explore and assist in extending opportunities of cultural enrichment to schools above the elementary level and to five cities in Iowa. His appearance at Roosevelt is in keeping with his idea of bringing the dance as one form of cultural enrichment to a wider audience. The discipline of the dance is beneficial to both actors and athletes.

Dance Company is an integrated but predominately Black modern dance company which for the past fifteen years has toured extensively in the U.S. and more recently abroad. Over the years it has become clear that their programs successfully appeal to

audiences of all kinds.

Most recently the company is developing a collaboration with noted jazz musicians to create an unusual, highly structured approach to jazz dance that retains much of the special improvisational latitude which is characteristic of this musical form.

Hunger Hike Set For Oct. 7

Mann Announces Campaign Committee

Tom Mann of 4049 Lower Beaver Road, Democratic candidate for the Iowa Senate from Polk County's District 31, has announced the names of persons who will be serving on his campaign committee. The group held their second organizational meeting last week (Wednesday, Sept. 12) at Mann's home.

Mann, executive director of the Iowa Civil Rights Commission, was

nominated at a special convention called by the Iowa Democratic Party in August. The special election to fill the Senate vacancy will be held on Tuesday, November 6, in conjunction with the municipal elections.

Earl Willits of 2016 Chautauqua Parkway will serve as campaign chairperson. Willits resigned the District 31 Senate seat in July after representing the area for

seven years, to become an assistant attorney general for the state of Iowa.

He will be assisted in directing the campaign by State Representatives Norman Jesse of Des Moines and Richard Byerly of Ankeny, who represent the two House districts which make up Senate District 31, and Paulla Baker, 2016 Harding Road, and Judy Wilson, 4330 N.E. Eighth street.

Des Moines attorneys Jerry Crawford, former chairman of the Polk County Democratic Party, and Nolden Gentry will co-chair Mann's finance committee, and his wife, Leala Salter Mann, will be the treasurer.

Other members of the campaign committee, which is still in formation, include precinct committeepersons and other active Democrats

in Polk County and in the 28 precincts which make up the Senate district, which includes north central Des Moines, Saylorville and Ankeny.

using more cuss words than a drunken sailor. I would guess that most of this doesn't really come from the home, but the first time the parents hear their child using foul language, they think it is cute.

And then if you want to hear some what I call reverse English, just go to one of the Little League football or baseball games. And I suspect that if it were not for the behavior code in tennis, it wouldn't be angelic behavior on tennis courts.

One fellow said that our children take their attitudes toward life from their parents. They act towards other people the way they see or hear their parents act. So if a crowd of angry parents gather to prevent the addition of black or white kids to a newly integrated school, those kids form their impressions of the other race from that.

So, are you really sure that Johnny doesn't learn his cuss words and other foul language from someone close to him?

NIGERIA: AN AFRICAN STATE IN TRANSITION

By late 1978, more than half of the independent countries south of the Sahara Desert were ruled by their armed forces, and of that 19, only 4 (Upper Volta, Ghana, Dahomey/Benin and Sudan) have had the military return rule to civilians. Of that 4, however, the transition was voluntary in only 3 (it was necessary for civilian political forces to take power from the military by force in the Sudan).

In general, it can be said that once in power, few military rulers have shown any inclination to return rule to civilians after the reasons for the initial takeover have disappeared. There are, however, exceptions: 5 of the above mentioned 19 nations were planning to return rule to civilians, most of them in 1979. Of that 5 (Nigeria, Ghana, Rwanda, Mali and Upper Volta), Ghana and Nigeria were and are the only ones in which civilian rule will likely prosper in the long run.

There are currently but two countries (Gambia and Botswana) with working democratic political systems, although several of the others allow some electoral or political party affiliation choice. In Nigeria, it is clear that the process of returning to civilian rule is virtually irreversible because of the lifting of the military ban on party politics, and this situation is the result of a variety of factors.

Under normal circumstances, a military decision to return rule to civilians is an extreme remedy, taken only when: (1), the military suffers division in its ranks; (2), there is poor or faltering economic

performance; (3), there are strong and well organized civilian elements capable of sustained resistance to military rule; and, (4), there is such resistance and military repression leads to division within the military ranks.

In this situation, Nigeria has shown, at one time or another, characteristics similar to each of the above - listed factors, and the decision to return rule to civilians, as you will soon see, is the product of all of them.

Let us backtrack a little bit. Nigeria became independent from Great Britain in 1960. At that time, politically the nation was a loose federation composed of 3 regions, in each of which the dominant ethnic groups controlled the regional government through a single "political" party (although social and economic unity were also characteristics of them).

The primarily Muslim Northern Region, which was in fact the largest, most populous and traditionally oriented of the 3, was ruled by Fulani emirates (explained earlier) and the conservative Northern People's Congress (NPC). The NPC also controlled the federal government by means of a coalition with the Ibo - dominated party from the Eastern Region.

In reality, however, and largely as a result of Nigeria's ethnic diversity, politics on all levels of government were little more than chaotic and sporadic. It was little more than outright political warfare, with bitter and often violent contests for wealth and power which were the direct result of the extensive corruption within each of the regionally dominant parties.

As the NPC sought to expand its power base at the expense of the power and privileges of the other two regional parties and because of the close tie between political and ethnic identification, the dominant groups and a substantial number of minority ones all were struggling for their survival.

The three dominant political parties at the time were: (1) the National Convention of Nigerian Citizens (NCNC), founded by Nnamdi Azikiwe, an Ibo leader who was the appointed President of the

civilian regime; (2), the Action Group (AG), a Yoruba party founded by Chief Obafemi Awolowo, a former lawyer and trade unionist; and, (3), the NPC, founded by the late Sir Ahmadu Bello. Of these, only the Ibo - dominated NCNC could call itself a truly national party, controlling the regional governments of Eastern and Mid - Western Nigeria and the City Council of the federal capital of Lagos in 1965.

Although it had a sizeable following in the Yoruba - dominated West, it was still so closely identified with a particular ethnic group that it could not acquire substantial federal power. Each region also had a number of small opposition political parties which were of an ethnic nature. In the powerful Northern Region, the Northern Elements Progressive Union (NEPU), led by Aminu Kano, a Fulani teacher by profession, and the United Middle Belt Congress were the most significant.

In the Western Region, the Nigerian National Democratic Party, led by the late Chief Samuel Akintola, a lawyer and former AG leader, was the most important opposition group. In the East, the United Independence Party and the Dynamic Party were the most noteworthy.

In January of 1966, a group of young, predominantly Ibo army officers attempted to overthrow the civilian federal regime led by Prime Minister Sir Abubakar Tafawa Balewa (executing him and two of the regional prime ministers), but failed. So shaken was the federal government by the attempted coup that it handed its power over to the senior military officer, General Aguiyi - Ironsi (an Ibo who, for that reason, was suspect in the Fulani - Hausa North).

When he attempted to abolish the existing regions and designate new ones, Northern troops rebelled and the General was killed in the process. The victorious Northern officers chose then - Colonel Yakubu Gowon (a Northerner from a minority ethnic group) to be the federal head of state. There was widespread killing of and rioting against the Ibos, so most of them chose to move back into the Eastern Region. Although Gowon announced a

Any economic development during our present state of affairs will be piecemeal and not comprehensive enough to offset centuries of oppression.

We must do it right here in Des Moines. Right here in Des Moines. We can no longer allow ourselves to

be completely at the mercy of persons who could care less about us. We are scorned. Our weakness is recognized by those in power. They have nothing but contempt for us.

Look at how they react when we approach them with a problem that we deem important. We say we need a swimming pool and what do they say? "We have to do a feasibility study." Study hell! The very fact that we are here shows that it's not only feasible but that we as a people desire it!

Oh how they mock us. The mere fact that they procrastinate is indicative of their contempt. And yet we remain inactive from politics. Not only do we remain inactive but we allow ourselves to be divided. We're already a minority and yet we further minoritize ourselves by not developing the capacity to vote in a bloc.

"Jesus Christ buddy it's impossible to get every

Niggah to vote for the same candidate." Granted. It's even extremely difficult to get most people to vote period, but it can be done!

How? First of all we must be aware of our political potential. We must believe that we have the power. Then we must make it a virtual sin not to vote. If somebody don't vote we got to talk about'm like they killed they mama. The same must be done to combat black on black crime, but that's another story I'll save for later.

Through the church and other organizations we have we can make voting as natural as dancing or singing. That's the first level of developing our political potential to its fullest. We must become cognizant of the body politic and our own potential. Next comes the concrete steps.

A Black Look At Politics

Senator Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts seems to be getting all the headlines these days with his veiled hints at running for the Democratic Presidential nomination in 1980.

In recent weeks, Kennedy has gone from hazy "maybes" to not-so-subtle "definitelies". Observers fear a split in the Democratic Party as a result of all this, what with President Carter's vow to "fight to the (political) death," facilitating a Republican victory.

Many white "liberals" and black leaders have, in the last few months, expressed open dissatisfaction with the performance of the Carter administration

on a variety of social and economic issues. Unfortunately, these same people do not recognize the seriousness of the nation's economic woes; they apparently live in some dream world where Federal spending can solve unemployment and other problems particularly damaging to black America.

Similarly, many black and white liberal spokesmen see Ted Kennedy as the savior for the Democratic Party, able to smite any and all Republican challengers and solve the nation's economic and social ills. Such naive notions could prove politically disastrous for black Americans who would blindly flock to the Kennedy camp on the basis of a few vague promises. Where does the Senator stand on the issues of recession, inflation, unemployment, deficit spending, and foreign policy, especially as regards black Africa and the Middle East?

Nobody knows, as of this writing. While it is true that Ted Kennedy, on the basis of his name alone, attracts publicity and support wherever he goes, and makes many Republican Presidential candidates

quake in their boots, in many respects he is less politically acceptable to blacks than Jimmy Carter.

For one, Kennedy exudes a liberal position that many Americans find undesirable, especially in these times of economic uncertainty and increasing political conservatism.

The Senator appeals to a shrinking percentage of the population, mostly college students, organized labor, and minorities. While these groups could definitely provide the margin of victory in a close race, the American population is growing older, and that means more conservative views. Too, there are fewer people entering the work force — the job market is shrinking.

Kennedy has not voiced his stand on crucial issues, and has refused to offer workable alternatives to Carter's energy and anti-inflation programs.

If black Americans want to field maximum vote power in 1980, we had better make our decision based upon policies, facts, and issues, not on veiled promises and symbolic offerings. In other words, we'd better not judge a book by its cover.

The 175 religious leaders, members of the Religious Committee on SALT II, listened in silence in a large Senate hearing room Thursday, Sept. 13 as Senator Frank Church (D. Idaho), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said, "The Senate is not prepared to ratify this treaty (SALT II) as long as Russian combat units are stationed in Cuba."

This threat was repeated a few minutes later by Senator Jacob Javits (R. NY) in his appearance before the group of eminent clergymen, rabbis and theologians. The senators rushed off without taking questions.

But Rabbi Alexander M. Schindler, president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, drew a thundering ovation when he criticized Church and Javits for the Cuba maneuver. He said, "There are

tens of thousands of U.S. troops nearer to the Soviet border than Cuba is to the United States."

He added, "The logic of linking SALT II ratification to a resolution to the Cuban crisis ... eludes me. Either SALT II is good for America or it is not. If it is good for America, as I firmly believe it is, what purpose do we serve when we deny endorsement? We punish not the Russians but ourselves."

Schindler also denounced President Carter for threatening to boost military spending as "payment" for the votes of senate warhawks on ratification of SALT II. Among the nations of the world, Schindler pointed out, the U.S. now ranks 15th in literacy, 16th in doctor - patient ratio, 18th in life expectancy and 19th in infant mortality. Unless the horrendously expensive arms race is ended, he said, and the billions of tax dollars diverted to raise the standard of living of the people, these figures will worsen.

William Howard, president of the National Council of Churches, picked up Schindler's theme. Speaking at a news conference at the conclusion of the morning session, Howard, who is Black, declared, "I am deeply troubled that we are being sidetracked by

this issue of Soviet troops in Cuba. This must be labeled a diversion. It is a disservice to the nation to hold SALT II hostage to this question. SALT II must be ratified on its merits."

Cardinal John Krol, Archbishop of Philadelphia, similarly denounced NATO warhawks for their "counterforce doctrine" charging that this is a scheme to "gain acceptance for the idea of fighting a nuclear war ... Cardinal Krol said, "As believers in God and His law, we must reject such doctrines. With few exceptions, such weapons entail blast and radiation effects which are still morally unacceptable. As teachers of moral truth we call for the avoidance of any weapon weapons aimed indiscriminately at the destruction of entire cities or extensive areas along with their population."

The convocation of religious leaders met Thursday morning, Sept. 13 with President Carter and then went to Capitol Hill to lobby with 62 senators to demand SALT II ratification. The convocation included 27 national religious organizations and was described as the broadest gathering of religious leaders for a major peace initiative since the Vietnam War.

program for the return of civilian rule after a number of specified problems were solved, the resistance to the Ibo - dominated Eastern Region to any sort of federal rule led to a bloody civil war.

That war, which lasted from May of 1967 until January of 1970, socially and economically devastated the nation and, to this day, restoration and reconstruction of the affected areas has yet to be completed. The Ibos of Biafra, who were the losers in the conflict, have yet to be reintegrated into the military and governmental structures from which they were excluded in its aftermath, and continue to be a strong voice in favor of civilian rule.

Gowon, in October of 1976, announced that civilian rule would be reestablished in October of 1976 if the following specified problems had been dealt with: (1) the demobilization of the 250,000 man federal army; (2) settlement of the question of state numbers and boundaries; (3) a new census, due to the continuing dispute over the results of the one in 1963 upon which federal offices and revenue were distributed; (4) the eradication of corruption on all levels of government; (5) a new revenue allocation plan and implementation of a national Development Plan; (6) the promulgation of a new national constitution; and, (8) the holding of free elections.

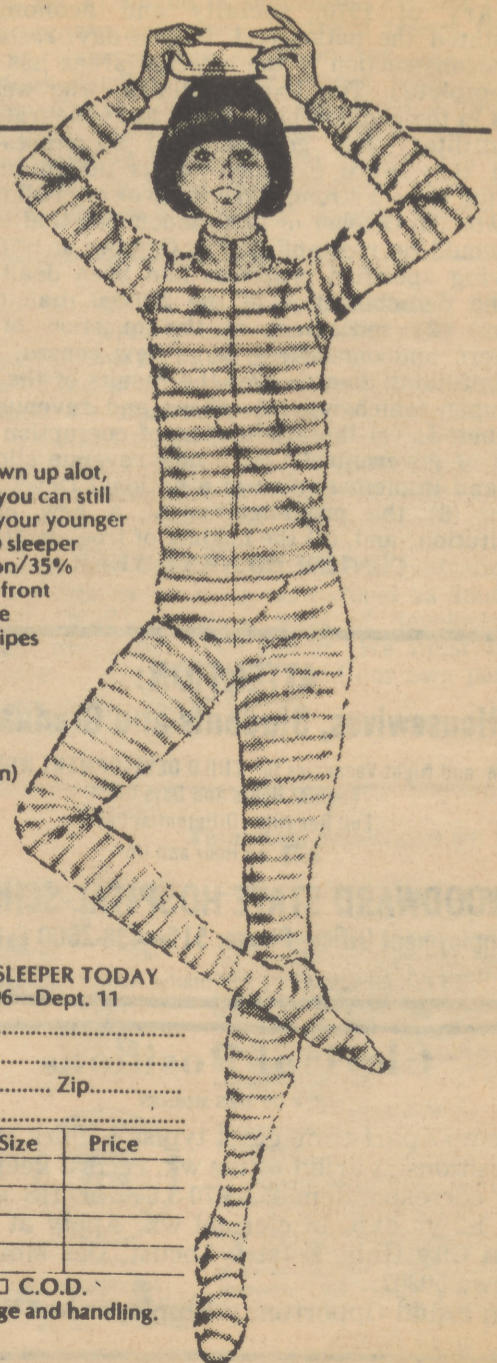

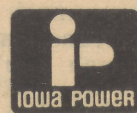

Soul...

Food and Thought

There are many ways to celebrate anniversaries, depending on the anniversary — pink champagne, an ocean cruise, the renewing of vows — Soul Food and Thought is celebrating its first anniversary; a year of coming into your homes with a bit of wit, humor, and fact. It has been fun to do the column and gratifying to realize that so many of you have taken the time to tell me you have enjoyed it. To celebrate this "momentous" occasion I decided to, for better or worse, give Soul — Food and Thought a new look.

While reminiscing about celebrations I enjoyed as a child I recalled Mother taking us in the cool grey dawn, to the old C.B. & Q. railway station to watch the greatest show on earth unload. We watched with

childish wonderment as lumbering elephants, with the prodding and cursing of roustabouts, helped with the unloading. Then came the parade! Painted wagons, circus bands, pretty girls, clowns, elephants all with gaudy trappings and uniforms that to my non-critical eyes, seemed so beautiful. There could be only one thing that would top a circus parade — the performance itself with the flying trapeze artists, horses, the grand march and the breathtaking effort of keeping up with the goings on in all three rings.

Fourth of July! How many of you remember the old fashion fourths, with the balloon ascensions and fireworks that were so beautiful one could only utter, "Ohhhhhh" as they burst and descended in cascades of color.

The Emancipation Proclamation was signed Jan. 1, 1863 but Iowa winters do not lend themselves to celebrations. So it became the custom to celebrate this day of Jubilee, Aug. 4. For many years my father was the chairman for our local celebration of freedom. Starting about 10:00 in the morning, the picnic grounds would start to hum with the arrival of celebrants loaded with tubs of cold "Nehi" pop, watermelon, baskets upon baskets of fried chicken, fish, potato salad, etc. Old timers setting up horse shoe pits, younger men organizing a ball game and

kids having a genuinely good time. Festivities would close with a dance at which often hams, blankets, etc. would be raffled off and more often than not I was allowed to draw the lucky numbers.

Birthdays in our home was a personal celebration. Mother never allowed doting grandparents to give the rest of us gifts on the same day as a birthday.

"Because," said mother, "one's birthday is his very own, no one else's, so no one should share it other than to help him celebrate by sharing in the ice cream and cake." But we all shared in the fun of turning the crank of the ice and salt packed freezers and licking the dasher when finished.

Below is mother's recipe for ice cream. She sometimes changed to chocolate or caramel, and for birthdays often added streaks of pink food coloring.

Pour off cream and put milk in a 2 qt. pan (preferably a double boiler). Heat to the scalding stage, add a pinch of soda and 1/2 c. sugar. Mix a little flour, 1 egg, 1/2 c. sugar to a thin paste. Add to hot milk. Stir until it slightly thickens. Remove from stove add the cream and flavor to taste with vanilla. Freeze. (You will note this recipe is adapted for the days when milk still came in bottles and good cream rose to the top.)
