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Des Moines Ninth Neighborhood Planning Conference

The City of Des Moines recently held the Ninth Annual Neighborhood Planning conference for the Neighborhood Priority Boards at the Hotel Savory. Guest speaker at the dinner on Friday evening was Cal

Wilson, Director of Consumer Affairs Office for Neighborhood Voluntary Association and Consumer Protection, HUD.

Chairpersons present representing the six prime service area boards were: Harry E.

Matney, Jr. - Southeast; Henry Bagby - Logan; Charles Morgan - Pioneer/Columbus; David Pickett - Model City; Herman Lewis - Woodland/Wilkie and Lillian Sims - Four Mile. Coordinators of the NPB present were: Paul

Walley, Loretta Deering, Leo Green, Ken Tuinstra and Charles Harvey.

Staff persons present were Martin Miller, Robert Schulte, Jon Schneider, Kent Forbes, Kathy Kahoun and Barb Ashton. About 100 members of the neighborhood priority boards were in attendance along with other members of the Central Advisory Board. Robert King, Chairman of the Central Advisory Board was Master of Ceremonies and introduced Richard Wright, Neighborhood Development Administrator who commented that this was the second step in the process of developing a comprehensive plan and that about 93% of what citizens have recommended are adopted by City Council.

Des Moines is recognized nationally for its high level of citizen participation. Wright commented that the

strategies that would be developed from this Conference should be specific and clear in order that representatives can convince others that the priorities should be in the plan that will be presented to the City Council.

Cal Wilson, in his speech Friday evening, stressed the importance of the strategy statement and how to develop one. He spoke of the need for an efficient and dedicated staff and neighborhood organization; cooperative partnership between public sector, private sector and neighborhood organizations that will produce favorable results.

Wilson stated that citizens must be able to efficiently identify needs, goals, strategies and introduced "SSS" - referring to the statements as being short, simple and

specific.

There must be an accountability of responsibility in the Neighborhood Development process. Neighborhood Development staff must conduct training sessions on a regular basis and neighborhood representatives must be willing and ready and able to compromise within the neighborhoods because the Federal government will never have enough money for all the needs at the same time. Neighborhoods will have to get together and support each other in this day and this economy in order to survive.

Wilson emphasized to the NPB's as they go into their planning sessions to "evaluate performances first and carefully of projects they intend to recommend; specifically develop need and strategy statements

Federal Investigation of Iowa City Discrimination

IOWA CITY, IA — The Civil Rights Division of the Office Of Federal Revenue Sharing (OFRS) (United States Treasury Department) has revealed its plans for a full - scale investigation into alleged practices of racial discrimination by the city of Iowa City.

Several complaints were filed with the OFRS including one by the Iowa City NAACP. The NAACP's complaint touched on several points:

The City has failed to adopt or implement a specific or functional Affirmative Action plan.

It has also failed to actively recruit, select and train minorities in accordance with applicable federal and state law.

The City has terminated black employees at rates disproportionate to white employees.

It has had two charges of racial discrimination filed against it internally and has completely ignored them even with

a "probable cause" finding by its won Human Rights Department over six months ago.

The City has also failed to implement city - wide purchasing programs geared toward assisting minority businesses.

The complaint also made it clear that this list was by no means all inclusive and a thorough investigation would uncover much more wrongdoing. NAACP President Robert Morris

predicted; "this federal investigation will not only substantiate our claims but will uncover a multitude of wrongdoings that have occurred and are occurring in Iowa City. It will be like Pandora's box - when the OFRS opens the lid - all kinds of ugly things will fly out."

On April 29, 1980, Morris read a prepared statement to the City Council airing the NAACP's concerns about wrongdoings taking place in City

government. The City Council, which contains an ultra - conservative majority virtually ignored the NAACP statement and the next day City Manager Neil Berlin released a statement to the press denying the NAACP's concerns and at the same time attempting to discredit the statement.

The NAACP, which had formulated a special committee to investigate the city, uncovered a tremendous amount of racial discrimination in

City operation and the committee recommendation led to the complaint to the OFRS.

Several individuals also filed complaints with the OFRS, some prior to the NAACP complaint.

Morris stated that; "even with all the coverup the city has attempted, with this federal investigation the truth is bound to come out and hopefully justice will be done."

Langston Hughes COP To Perform "JOHNNAS"

Downey a drama enthusiast since 1959 has participated behind the scenes as well as a performer.

The Des Moines Community Playhouse and other such groups have served as technical training ground for Downey. However, she admits that for a black the opportunities for parts in plays are very limited.

The Langston Hughes COP provide vehicles for changes to the ascribed situation. The predominately black COMPANY thrives on productions specifically

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"A BLACK LOOK AT POLITICS"

black Iowans, including black Republicans, show support for Senator John Culver. He has consistently voted for programs which benefit the needy, under privileged, and the elderly. While Culver has not been overly committed to affirmative action, he still supports programs for the institutionally deprived.

Even if you don't particularly like John Culver, if you're black, the choice between he and Charles Grassley is academic. Hopefully, right-minded Iowans will turn out for Culver next November. If they don't, Iowans will be burdened with having two hard-core conservatives in the Senate, and will likely remain the state nobody has ever heard of ("Iowa? Oh, yea — the potato state, right?")

Black Republicans had better support Culver, or at least refuse to back Grassley. They walked out on Barry Goldwater in 1964, and they'd better do so on Grassley as well.

I'll have to cut things short this week, but as I predicted a few months ago, President Carter appears certain of renomination. Senator Edward Kennedy won some impressive victories in the larger state primaries (especially New York and California), and continues to be a good friend to black Americans.

Hopefully, he will continue to support social aid programs for the disadvantaged in the Senate. Kennedy is also a strong supporter of the NAACP, incidentally.

In closing I should also like to point out that former Republican U.S. Senate candidate Tom Stoner, took the time to address the NAACP State Conference of Branches a few months ago. This impressed many of those in attendance, as Stoner had no real need to attract black voters in Iowa, since our numbers are so small.

While he said nothing really profound, perhaps it did indicate a change in thinking on the part of many Iowa Republicans. Then again, maybe Stoner figured he simply needed votes that badly, and judging by the beating he took at the polls last Tuesday, he didn't get them.

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Debate Held On Blacks And Womens Liberation

Approximately 60 men, women and children — black and white — gathered Tuesday night at the Willkie House to discuss the black women's role in the women's liberation movement.

The question the four-member panel addressed itself to was, "Can Black Women and White Women Really be Sisters?" Affirmative panel members were Dr. Carol Trufant and Peg Cass.

Dr. Trufant is a clinical psychologist at the Des Moines Child Guidance Center. While she is relatively new to the Des Moines scene, she obviously is not a novice when it comes to dealing with complex issues.

Dr. Trufant based many of her arguments on the premise that the black community cannot divorce itself from the system as a whole because blacks lack the power and the institutions necessary for survival.

"There are not enough black businesses to hire all of us, nor are there enough black colleges to educate us, therefore we must work within the total system" said Dr. Trufant.

While Dr. Trufant's position was somewhat unpopular with factions of the audience, her delivery and ability to defend her position gained her a great deal of respect.

Ms. Cass, Executive Director of the Iowa Women's Political Caucus, stated that the women's movement should appeal to any black women who are not satisfied with their status as "low woman on the totem pole."

Ms. Cass said she feels that the struggles of both black and white women are very similar and the battles should be fought together.

Ms. Cass has been a member of the caucus since 1974 and stated that her organization would like to see more black women as members.

While she admitted that the organization is composed primarily of middle-class white women, she said that this does not mean it is an elitist organization, but that the middle-class white women are the ones with the most time and resources to be active in struggles.

Ms. Cass' sincere and common-sense approach

to the issue added additional credibility to Ms Trufant's arguments.

Negative panel respondents were Rasheedah Abdullah, former Coordinator of Women's Affairs for the World Community of Al-Islam, and attorney Shirley Steele.

Ms. Abdullah presented her team's opening arguments not by saying that black women and white women could not be sisters.

Rather, she said that black people should not concern themselves with such issues but deal with real, grass-roots issues instead. Ms. Abdullah stressed the need for adequate education for black children in order to improve the condition of black people.

In addition to her involvement with the Nation of Islam, Ms. Abdullah is a computer programmer and has been active in PTA.

Ms. Steele posed a series of direct, to-the-point and thought-provoking questions to the Cass-Trufant team. She questioned whether black people needed the women's movement. She was also doubtful that racial and socioeconomic differences could be overcome to the point of black women and white women working together harmoniously for the benefit of black women.

Steele's skillful cross-examination was a tribute to the expertise she has gained through courtroom experience. Ms. Steele was the first black woman attorney general in Iowa under Richard Turner.

Following closing arguments by the panel, moderator Kelly Evans turned the debate over to the audience for their questions. A couple of women in the audience expressed concerns that the women's movement is anti-men and that black women must align themselves with their men.

In reply to this, Ms. Cass responded by stating, "The women's movement is not to put down men, but to uplift women."

A member of the audience addressed Ms. Abdullah by asking how black people can strengthen the family when there are so many black men with white women. Ms. Abdullah

agreed that this is a major concern, but stated also that there are instances where black women unintentionally drive their men away. She also said that much of the burden for keeping the family strong falls on the black woman.

The debate was lively — oftentimes emotional — and entertaining as well as enlightening. Few could argue that it was a valuable learning experience for everyone present.

The audience covered a broad range of people. Well-known personalities such as Catherine

Williams and Elaine Syzmoniak to concerned parents and teens were represented. The audience consisted of doctors, lawyers, secretaries, homemakers, social workers and government employees.

The debate was co-sponsored by the Willkie House and the Institute of Cultural Education (ICE). Kelly Evans, who acted as moderator, also was the coordinator of the debate and was responsible for setting up the questions, selecting panel members and executing the actual

program. The debate was a continuation of a series of activities the Institute planned in recognition of Black Women for the month of May.

The session Tuesday night was to be followed-up by a Wednesday night debate dealing with the sensitive issue of sexuality of Black women.

Four panelists Wednesday night will deal with the question of "Is the move toward sexual freedom creating a sexually irresponsible black woman?"

Still Time To Participate In 1980 Garden Project

The City of Des Moines is issuing a call to low-income neighborhood residents who are interested in cutting costs on this year's food budgets: it's still not too late to get a garden in this spring. And it's not too late to get in on the 1980 Neighborhood Development Garden Project.

Garden seeds and plants are still available at the Neighborhood development site office. The city has received a little over \$5,000 in federal funds from the Community Services Administration for the project, but, N.D. staff stress that, even with the federal aid, the garden project is a large success because of the efforts of volunteers.

Senior citizens at the city's community centers, for example, have spent many hours of their own time, sorting seeds, packaging them, and filling seed orders. Plants by the thousands, tomatoes, peppers, cabbages, etc. Have been grown and distributed through the site offices.

Many hours of volunteers time have been contributed to help till both small backyard and large community gardens. City officials say that some 280 gardens have been tilled this year, and about 60 of these are new gardens, not in the project last year.

Seeds and plants are still left, and tilling services are still

available. But residents who qualify for the program are urged to apply as soon as possible. The program will end on June 15. Getting a garden in - even a small plot - can mean a significant savings in the costs of fresh food over the coming months.

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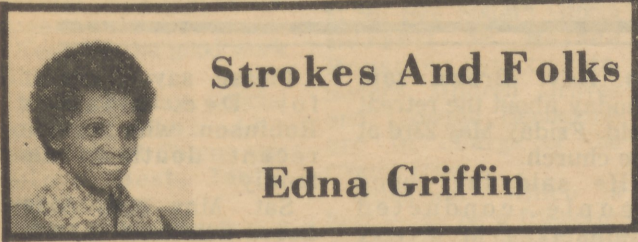

Gil Dawes is minister at the United Methodist Church in Comanche, Iowa. He has the rare distinction of being a man whose religious convictions are not limited to the pulpit on Sunday. He is concerned about the people on strike in Clinton. It is likely some of his parishioners work in nearby Clinton.

Rev. Dawes assisted in the research on the relationship of Clinton Corn Processing and Morgan Guaranty Trust in New York City. He has helped raise money for the strikers and has joined the picket line. The membership and the church treasury have grown. A few who were withholding their contributions in disapproval of the minister, are thought to have sent for the bishop.

The Comanche United Methodist Church was opened for the Angela Davis speaking engagement after the Local No. 6 union hall had been barred in March. No one mentioned this when I was interviewing at the union hall.

I am sorry I didn't have an opportunity to hear the

tape of the Davis speech. A second hand summary over the phone covered these points: praise and congratulation of the strikers wives, and special mention was made of Concerned Citizens, a support group of mostly women.

Need for unity and affirmative action were better understood through the hiring of 'scabs' to work with those union members who failed to join the strike.

Angela Davis explained company policy of replacing union members on strike with new workers, a high percentage of them from minorities... The Iowa Right To Work law makes it illegal for strikers to make any effort to stop 'scabs' from entering the plant.

Davis was able to illustrate with the Clinton experience the following points. The high percentage of Blacks applying for jobs makes clear why affirmative action in employment is important to all workers. I understand Davis sent an invitation to those picketing the Comanche Methodist Church to come in and listen. Three or four accepted the invitation.

The nation-wide effort to weaken unions shows that seniority has little meaning without affirmative action as a barrier to racist divisions.

Angela Davis explained briefly what the American communist is about. The tape of her speech has been promised. While waiting for it to arrive, some interesting experiences of my own floated across my mind after reading the half page spread on the Opinion page of the June 3rd, Des Moines Register.

The article was about the anxiety and consternation of inviting a Black woman communist

to Clinton to speak to members of Local 6 by another communist receiving American dollars for legal services and advice to the Clinton poor! The man in the photograph is Tim Yeager, a real live person protected by the U.S. Constitution and the State of Iowa.

Sure, a hangman's noose was found hanging from the backdoor of his house in Clinton, Iowa. He does not believe this symbol of hatred represents the feelings of his neighbors.

My husband and I met Tim Yeager Memorial Day weekend while in Clinton. The man we know is a musician — plays the accordion, piano, and organ. He owns a twenty year old cat who presides over his home like a king. This is the Tim Yeager we know. And the people of Clinton know, a large number without interest, necessarily in politics. They know he cares about people — all people.

I learned something today which made me very happy. I have no idea how many people shared my misunderstanding or how long, but I learned today that Marri Johnson would be pleased to visit with old friends by phone or in person when she feels up to it.

I for one, have missed her. Marri is listed in the phone book under John E. Johnson 1228-3rd. She used to write an interesting column for the Bystander with an interesting personal touch.

I seem to remember that she has lived here most, if not all, of her life. Perhaps a Marri Johnson Day could be put together. What do you think?

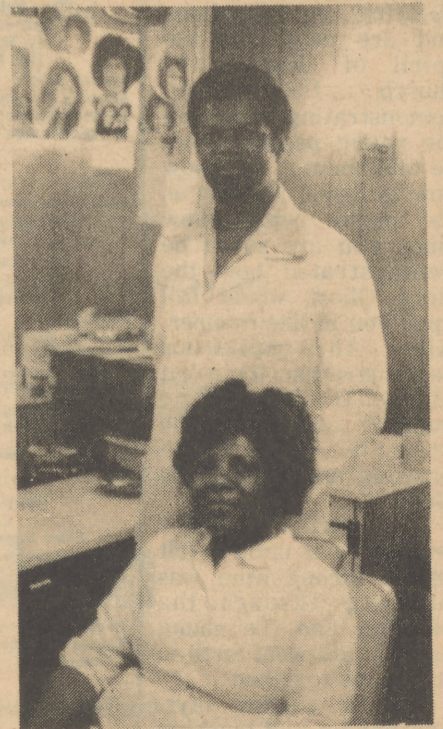

Friendship — one of the greatest assets, honors and pleasures allowed mankind. It is a treasure that is to be cherished, protected and enjoyed.

—Many of our acquaintances, too, are worthy of the same.

But, there is something quite "special" in being able to acknowledge the possession of a friendship with another human being.

As a student in elementary school, a favorite teacher once wrote in my autograph book:

"Friendship is like a chain,
we build it one link at a time.
Let's hope that our chain will be long and strong.
For a good friend is hard to find."

As the years have unfolded, those lines have come to be even more greatly appreciated and understood.

One's chain can be stretched across many years and across thousands of miles, — with the links of that chain remaining strong and intact. One may not frequently see the other links in that chain, yet we know that they are there, and somehow know, and feel within us, the strong and lasting bond that was established long before.

Sometimes in life, we may reach a point where we need somewhat of a support system, and we may need to lean temporarily. And even though we perhaps shouldn't, — we sometimes do — lean, and depend upon those that are close to us — our friends. Our leaning sometimes only consists of listening to us, loving us and simply being there.

— And then the time may come when they too must lean upon us, and we must reciprocate.

We pray, we regroup and we move on, for we must not lean too long or too heavy upon any one earthly being. We must learn to lean upon Someone much greater than ourselves. Someone who is capable of bearing our load — worthy of our trust, and with a great track record of being able to strengthen our every weakness.

A friend — a true and time-tried comrade — who supports and defends you against the forces, appreciates you without envy, refrains from criticizing you when you are wrong (and when you yourself know that you are wrong. A friend tolerates you when you get "cocky", loves you in spite of your faults, and abstains from an outright attack on your Achilles' Heel.

— And, could never be deceitful. For a friend cannot be deceitful, or, devious! If you say, "Yes, a friend can be deceitful and devious", — then you do not comprehend the meaning of friendship.

The bond of friendship can be strong, long-lasting and exceptionally durable — yet we should not attempt to try it — nor test it! For the natural sequence of time and circumstance itself is test enough.

One of the greatest gifts we can be granted is the warmth and comfort in knowing that someone whom we feel is our friend — IS!

Misunderstandings will and do occur between the greatest of friends. Yet misunderstandings can always be resolved when both parties recognize, admit and are apologetic for their contribution which led to that misunderstanding. Often is the case that one or both parties are unwilling to offer apology, or meet on a common ground. For the most part however, situations have a way of working themselves out.

Sometimes is the case that friendships do burn themselves out. Persons that were once very close friends, obtain the status of being acquaintances. And that is not so bad! For we too love many of our acquaintances. Also, often is the case that the close friends and relationships that we have had, served specific times and specific circumstances in our lives. And we love them for what and how they have shared themselves with us.

—Yet time goes on. Circumstances change. People change. Our lives, our interests, our needs, our ideas and our ideals reach a fork in the road where we branch off from those with whom we once shared mutual interests. And neither should that be considered bad, for we each obtain new friends and acquaintances who may share our presents interests.

We do not wipe people completely from our slates of life, — somehow they are always there. We simply make mental priorities by building circles around ourselves. We begin by placing those "special" loved ones closest to us in the inner circle immediately surrounding us, and then build each subsequent circle outwardly away from us. Yet even an outer circle can be warm, refreshing and supportive, because those individuals too, — are there because we want them to be, and because we have chosen them to be.

Perhaps the greatest compliment a person can pay their friend is in loving them, understanding them and taking the time to know the person that they acclaim to share a friendship with.

One thing that we must recognize is that we cannot be friend and foe at the same time. We either are a friend or we are not! We either are foe or we are not! We cannot be friend Monday through Thursday, and be foe Friday through Sunday. We cannot stand up for someone and stand against them at the same time. While we may like some things about them, and not like other things — that spells out a

neutrality, not a definite stand of either being totally for or against.

Hughes received his Social Arts Degree from Ellsworth, his B.A. from Simpson and a Master of Science from Drake University.

Like many young blacks who first come to Iowa to attend college, Hughes soon found the nearest black was some "miles" away and it was while at Simpson that he was instrumental in creating the "Indianola Herald" newspaper,

Inter-Collegiate Black Alliance in an attempt to unite minority students across the state by meeting monthly and discussing problems and means to eliminate "racism". By racism, Hughes refers to "racism not necessarily in color, but attitude because racism is not reflected in colors, just directed in colors."

Hughes was elected to Who's Who Among College and University Students in 1973. He was dorm college president and was instrumental in changing administrative policy as relates to independent housing complexes.

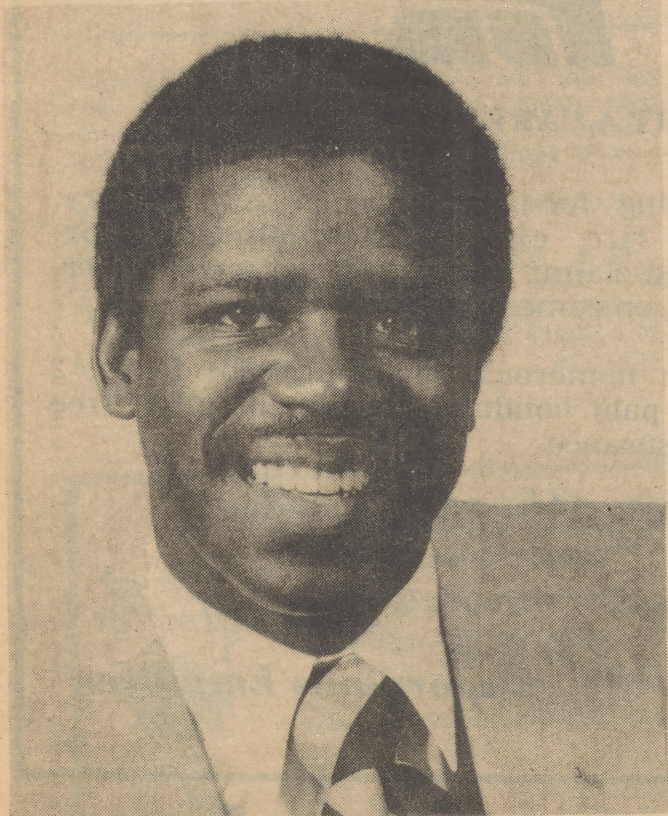
While in the Navy, Hughes worked in communications and TV and was a lithographer receiving award for outstanding services in the line of duty.

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Jubilee Day: Shriners 51st Celebration

June 1st, 1929. The plot had finally unfolded and was now in its final ebb. The stage had long been set, a denouement reached and we were now down to the closing act.

Since June 3rd, 1893 Prince Hall Shriners had been established and working. But for the last 14 years, litigation had extensively affected the

workings and productive activities of the Order. The case now rested with the Supreme Court.

White Shriners had sued to prohibit Prince Hall Shriners from calling themselves "Shriners" or from using shrine emblems, as well as wearing shrine regalia. The Prince Hall Shriners had in turn filed a counter-suit alleging that

we had as much a right to this designation as anyone else, and would exhaust all necessary means to settle the matter once and for all.

Realistically, the odds did not look good. The Lower Court held in favor of the White Shriners. The decision was appealed. The Appeals Court had also ruled in favor of the White Shriners. This decision was appealed. Now the highest court in the land, The Supreme Court of The United States had agreed to hear the case. Joy and jubilation abounded among Prince Hall Shriners around the world.

The Supreme Court requested that the Charter from the Mother Grand Lodge of England be brought in for examination. After carefully examining the Charter of African Lodge No. 459 and reviewing the facts and history of the case, on June 3rd, 1929 the Court held that:

"Prince Hall Shriners are as regular, if not more so, than other Shriners, and they are entitled to wear shrine regalia emblems and other accessories associated with the Order." Further, the court extended this ruling to apply to all other bodies tracing their heritage to African Lodge No. 459. The ruling of the lower courts were thereby reversed and the decision rendered in favor of the Prince Hall Shriners — and Masons — around the world.

It was indeed a gala and jubilant occasion for Prince Hall bodies around the world. In fact, it was such an occasion, that the Imperial Council decreed that from that day forward, Jubilee Day would be celebrated the 2nd Sunday of June by all Prince Hall Shriners around the world.

Sunday, June 8th, at 10:45 a.m., Jubilee Day

will be celebrated in Des Moines at Corinthian Baptist Church, 9th and School Streets, Rev. Frederick W. Strickland,

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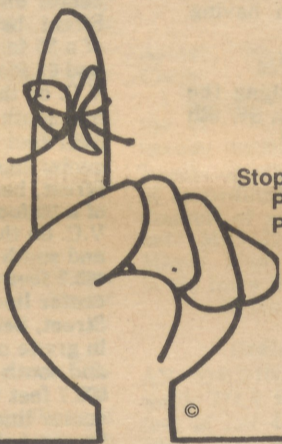
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Affirmative Action Coalition Meets With City Officials

We finally got the basketball season over. People I know who follow the game don't like the fact that while Kareem Jabbar was selected as the player of the year, Larry Bird was the rookie of the year. This in spite of the role played by Magic Johnson in the drive to the NBA title.

One of my guys who liked it the least argued that Bird was picked as the rookie of the year the minute he put on a Celtic uniform. It did seem that way as we listened to commentators whenever the Celtics appeared on television. You'd think that the Celtics starting five consisted of Bird and four stooges, and it wasn't like that.

The times the Celtics played the Lakers, Johnson outplayed Bird as much as he did in the NCAA final game, but you never heard about it unless you got a paper from the West coast. Now, don't get me wrong. Larry Bird is a fine player and so is Earvine Johnson and one had to come in second.

Black Folk In American Civilization

The Evolution and Meaning of the Ku Klux Klan (part IV)

Following the Supreme Court rendering the 1954 "Brown Decision," large numbers of anti-black groups other than the KKK sprang up all over the South.

Among these groups were the New Orleans based American Society for the Preservation of State Government and Racial Integrity, the Miami based Caucasian League, the Citizen's Segregation Committee of Birmingham, the Knights of the White Christians (New Orleans), the National Association for the Preservation of the White Race (Augusta, Ga.; Durham, North Carolina), Patriots of North Carolina (Greensboro), Southern Gentlemen's Organization (Baton Rouge), White Brotherhood of Atlanta, Georgia, and untold other groups.

Many of the members of these groups disdained the Klan for one reason or another. Still, when young suave and urbane David Dukes of Bogalusa, Louisiana would later come along as Imperial Wizard of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, he would attract many of the White Citizen Council type who previously disdained the Klan.

Now, with that out of the way, we can swing into the summer schedule.

Black Tennis magazine has a list of black teaching pros and it includes Ernie Green of St. Paul. Green comes to Ames every year and plays in the Esquire tournament there. He usually gets at least to the semis and we heard that they nearly made it to the doubles finals.

I suspect that the reason you don't see too many black tennis players on the pro circuit is because not too many blacks have the dough to hire a fifty dollar an hour teacher who will practically live with them during their earlier years when they need someone to help shape their game.

Then, right here in Des Moines there are not too many blacks who can afford to practice at the racket club during the winter. Those who do have the good jobs and certainly aren't looking to make a career of tennis.

And if you don't have a good job, forget it.

These "gentlemen" have always associated the Klan with thuggishness of the variety today led by Bill Wilkinson of Denham Springs, Louisiana, the leader of the Invisible Empire of the Ku Klux Klan.

The Citizens Councils had drawn most of their clientele from the business and professional men and politicians whose families were safe from the "threats" of racial desegregation. According to James Graham Cook, author of *The Segregationists*, this meant that if a black family moved next door to the average White Citizen Council member, he could afford to move to a white suburb.

This was a facet of the so called white backlash's flight to suburbia. If a black child entered the same public school of his child, he withdrew his kid and sent it to a private academy.

However, this is not to say that the Klan did not attract some prominent names. In Houston, Texas, Mayor Oscar Holcombe took pride in his Klan membership. Not all of "the good old boys" covered up their former Klan membership as though this had been simply a flaw of youth's frolic.

Among this latter group was Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black of Alabama, who once he made it to the Bench turned out to be a disappointment to his conservative cronies. Another prominent fellow who "fell prey" to his youthfulness was United States Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia who is still a conservative hero.

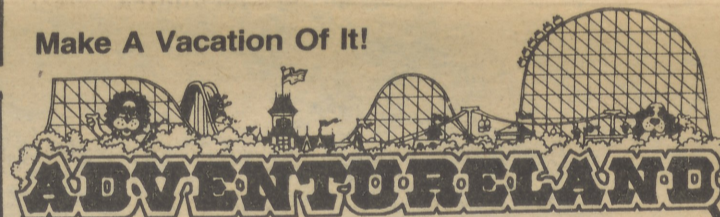
