Sept. 25 Deadline For Neighborhood Board Candidates

Time is running out for candidates for the city's six Prime Service Area boards who haven't yet filed nomination papers for their upcoming neighborhood elections. Only 5 days are left before next Thursday's filing deadline. (September 25).

All 127 neighborhood board seats are up for election this year, the first time in its 9 year history that the city's entire citizen participation structure has had to stand the test of a neighborhood vote.

Richard Wright, neighborhood development administrator, said that "Des Moines has an exemplary process for involving citizens in their city government. Priority board elections allow citizens to have some 'say' in the

decisions that affect their neighborhoods. The city is encouraging any resident of the prime service areas to run for election to their board."

The city's NPB's were set up in 1971 by the city council under what is now the city's community development program to provide residents of Des Moines neighborhoods with a chance to have a "say" about problems that face their communities. The boards identify needs in their areas and provide recommendations to the Central Advisory Board (CAB) which is composed of representatives from each neighborhood as well as persons appointed by the mayor to represent the public and private sectors. The CAB, in turn, makes recommendations to the

city council for final council action.

Wright said "the neighborhood foot patrol, the city's housing programs, and the construction of community centers are examples of programs the city undertook, because to a large degree they met community needs expressed by the boards. Yet in any city there are still neighborhood problems that involve housing, transportation and economic development that need to be solved. The priority boards give neighborhood residents a chance to have an impact on those problems."

The city's office of neighborhood development — which is the administrative arm

for the yearly HUD allocation and the local community action agency for the distribution of community services

administration anti-poverty funds — provides staff support to both the neighborhood boards and the central advisory board.

According to the election policy approved by the city council, any person who lives, owns property or a business in

Simon Estes Featured In Civic Music Concert

Simon Estes will be one of the featured artists of the 1980-81 concert season of the Civic Music Association of Des Moines.

Estes, a baritone, will be featured in the second concert on December 9, 1980. One of the truly international stars of opera, and one of the few blacks, he has sung over 80 roles with opera companies on four continents, as well as having performed with virtually all the world's leading orchestras.

His last two seasons have included a series of triumphant debut appearances — Arkel in "Pelleas and Melisande", the Pharaoh in Rossini's "Moses" at La Scala, King Phillip in the new Ponnelle - Kubelik "Don Carlos" at the Hamburg State Opera, and the title role of the "Flying Dutchman" at the Bayreuth Festival, Vienna State Opera and the Zurich Opera.

Critic's superlatives have followed this majestic, handsome, 6'1" Simon Estes since he won the Munich International Competition in 1965. In 1966, he came into even greater fame when he was a winner of Moscow's First

International Vocal Competition which resulted in a command performance at the White House.

A native of Centerville, Iowa, Mr. Estes supported himself through three years of pre-med, a year of theology, and four years of Social - Psychology at the University of Iowa prior to his studies at the Julliard School of Music in New York. Estes' career since then has been extraordinary.

Nothing illustrates this more clearly than the fact that his 1980 - 1981 schedule, including his debut with the Paris Opera, is already sold out.

The Civic Music Association of Des Moines has offered a professional music series for over fifty years, making it one of the oldest continuing music series in the country. This year, its 56th season, promises to be one of the most exciting — offering a diversity to enchant both young and old alike.

On October 28, 1980, at the Des Moines Civic Center, Alicia de Larrocha, pianist, will open the 1980 - 1981 concert season. Mme. de Larrocha is one of the

world's most recorded artists, and among her awards for her many exclusive London Records recordings, she numbers two Grammys in a row; one in 1974 for the 'best classical performance as soloist without orchestra (for the complete Iberia) and one in 1975 as best classical performance with orchestra (for two Ravel concertos and the Faure Fantasia).

In June of 1978, her recording of Govescas was honored with the Dutch Edison Prize, one of Europe's most prestigious awards. It is Mme. de Larrocha's second Edison award. She also has received the Padrewski Memorial Medal and the Grand Prix de Disque.

Alicia de Larrocha announced her determination to play the piano when she was two and a half years old. At age five she made her recital debut and by the time she was nine, was playing Mozart with the orchestra in Madrid. Although she is the world's greatest authority on spanish keyboard music, she did not begin her specialty

The appearance of the company is part of an extended series of activities being developed in Iowa. Gateway Dance Theatre has been pivotal in the co-ordination of this on going project.

IEWS and REVIEWS

The political scuffles get hotter and hotter. I was one of the blacks who thought I might sit out this one, because I didn't think much of any of the presidential candidates.

But, after thinking it over, and listening to some of the Reagan speeches and quips, I think that a non vote is a vote for him, so I guess I will have to pull a lever.

I woke up when I heard that stuff about states rights, with each state taking over its social programs. We went through that in the thirties and we know what that meant to blacks.

Then the man says things that keep his followers explaining what he didn't mean. Now, I don't think Carter is a ball of fire, but, at least he comes a whole lot better than the former cowboy actor.

Reagan's experience as an actor helps him put a good front on things and dress them up so you have to really be on your toes to separate the wheat from the chaf.

And John Anderson? He has a long history of anti-labor votes and anti-social votes in Congress that make any blue collar worker have rocks in his head to vote for him. And you can imagine what sort of a federal court system we will get under Ronald. The Nixon court will look like a left wing liberal court. They might repeal the 1964 civil rights bill and just about everything connected with it.

Actually, it won't be that bad, but blacks had better get out and vote in large numbers against the Reagan man.

There was an interesting article in the paper the other day to the effect that Iowa sheriff's offices are largely white and male. That rated headlines as if it was just discovered yesterday, we knew that all along.

I remember the scuffle my late brother Lucius had trying to get into the Association of Identification workers, because they didn't take blacks. And when they placed him in charge of the identification department, wise politicians said that he should do the work, but there really ought to be a white man in charge, even if he didn't know a damned thing, because the public would never stand for that. Well, to the sheriff's credit, he didn't pay any attention to

the noise and made his appointment.


The situation hasn't changed that much. There are still only a token number of blacks in sheriff offices around the state and in the largest cities which should have more, they are nearly non-existent, because the people say the qualified ones don't want the job, and I don't blame them.

Here in Des Moines the local political leaders have always made what I have always thought was a big mistake. Whenever a city or county office changed hands, there might be one black in the office. Well, instead of trying to build up on what they had, local blacks went after each other, trying to get the one job and displace the holder.

The late J.B. Morris told me once that he thought that different political factions should get together, and even if they were on different sides, agree on what jobs they wanted, keeping the ones we already had and trying to get some more.

This to a large extent, is one of the reasons why not many minority people are in offices like sheriff and police. We could fight for our people, and after they won or lost, we should come together and see what we could do about getting some jobs for people who were qualified, no matter which side they were on.

How did this come up? Don't know, but I still think we ought to help keep a certain cowboy out of the White House.



Thoughts and Comments

There is not very much I can add this week to the subject I have been addressing the past few weeks. This is not due to any practical or substantial difference in the circumstances of the black community in this city and state, but to the fact that planning is the key to the success of any effort, regardless of its direction.

Again I must emphasize that community solidarity is a critical necessity, not only because of the percentage of the city's (and state's) population which is black, but also because of the fatal consequences which follow from individual or group special interest assertiveness. Many a self-improvement effort has fallen by the wayside because groups or individuals within that segment of the population have become dissatisfied by their position or power within the movement itself, to say nothing of the destructive influences of those elements of the community or society which oppose it.

To this point in time, there has not been, outside of several community meetings, a chance for the mass of the community to show that solidarity in a public forum situation, in a situation in which a policy-making body with the power to make real and wide-spread decisions for our betterment. We need to be allowed to flex our muscle, such as it is, to give us an idea not only of what support we can draw from within our own community to carry on, but also what degree of commitment is necessary to make our goals attainable. Such an opportunity approaches.

As I said before, we must direct our efforts at all time to those individuals, businesses or governmental units which have the express power to improve those deficiencies in our community which most disturb us. It is useless to lobby or attempt to influence groups or individuals which are merely advisory in nature, and which have no innate power to improve our lot.

If directed toward the media, for example, we should not hesitate to present our concerns only to those with the influence, rather than to underlings designated by them to receive complaints. If directed toward a governmental unit, it should approach the individual or body governing, rather than to underlings with expertise in limited areas. As a self-improvement effort is only as large as its base of support, we must first flex our muscle toward those particular people or representatives within this area.

The Des Moines City Council is the place to start,

and attendance and participation by members of the black community should appear at its next scheduled meeting on Monday, September 22, at 6:30 PM, held in the Council's Chambers in City Hall, on East First Street between Locust and Grand. If we can show our solidarity by appearing at this and subsequent Council meetings, we will be influencing that body in the same fashion as members of the majority who wish its help in accomplishing something.

Further, we cannot overlook the fact that the civil rights movement in this country, since the beginning, has looked for support and solidarity to its churches. In this situation, we must also look to them for leadership in recruiting and inspiring our movement.

Much too often, similar efforts have failed because of the lack of spiritual and moral fiber and solidarity, so religious involvement in our circumstances is a must. Our ministers must inspire our population to stand up and act to make positive changes in the state of our community, and have the sort of widespread access to our community on a regular basis which cuts across all social, economic and political divisions with it.

Their facilities are necessary to the evolution and progress of our struggle, and must be recognized as the sorts of places that no one should, for any reason, hesitate to gather. They also are necessary to the acquisition of resources, monetary or otherwise, which is the lifeblood of any movement. Regardless of the degree to which groups or individuals are willing to donate their time and attention to our cause, we must and generally can always depend upon our churches to make up the difference.

They should not only be lauded for their past efforts, but also encouraged to provide the kind of varied support we need to overcome the sort of problems we face today.



More information will be forthcoming on this program in the future. It was encouraging to see the good number of residents who attended this meeting. This meeting was held last Monday evening in the Logan Center.

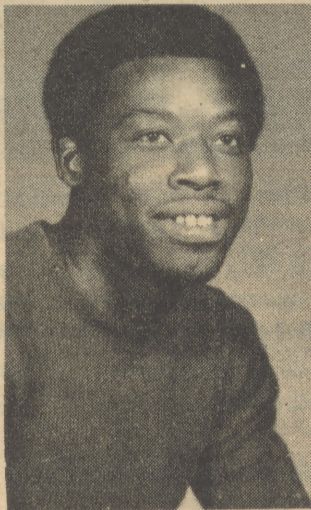

Logan Teacher Receives Award

Michael Thomas, age 26, originally from Waco, Texas, recently received an honor worth mentioning. Thomas was nominated and selected by the Jaycees as one of the "Outstanding Young Men in America." This award is usually given to young men in the field of education or other related areas of study that render needed services.

Thomas is presently teaching at Logan Junior High School, and views his position as quite a challenge. He is director of the "Success Center" (which is an In-School Suspension Program), that serves as an alternative learning

environment for the entire student body. Thomas feels good about the accomplishments he

has made here at Logan with the students, and says he feels especially grateful to be associated with such a good staff! Since coming to Logan two years ago, the total number of referrals for the year has dropped fifty percent says Thomas. This, in part is due to a more positive attitude brought about by Thomas, through his counseling techniques and educational background.

Thomas is very active in the community as well as his involvement on the job. He is a graduate student at the University of Northern Iowa, completing his Master's Degree in Guidance Counseling. He has served as Advisor to Minority Students at Wartburg College for one year, and has worked with the Waterloo Recreation Commission for four years.

Before coming to Logan, Thomas taught

classes at the Martin Luther King Center and worked with summer playgrounds through the Y.M.C.A. After turning down an offer to play professional football, Thomas served as Intra-mural Director at UNI through the cultural center, and compiled quite an impressive record. He is also actively involved in coaching here at Logan and has done an excellent job in that area.

Thomas still has some thoughts about professional athletics, but feels that his education is more important at the moment. Thomas says his greatest accomplishment at the University of Northern Iowa was to establish a chapter of "The Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity" on campus, in hopes of bringing about "unity" and "brotherhood" among the students.

Bob King has been an employee at Younkers for approximately 34 years. This means he was employed in about 1947. Do you remember there was not a single Black clerk behind a single counter. There were Black women elevator operators, Black stockroom personnel. Black men were janitors at Younkers.

In those days Younkers was considered liberal! I remember how frequently it was possible to run into openly racist attitudes among white clerks. There was much to remind us that we were Black — in shoe stores, restaurants, and clothing stores. I mention this by way of background for what I believe has happened to Bob King.

Raymond was employed by Iowa Power in 1969 after 2 years in the United States Air Force. Raymond was also a Air Craft specialist for the Air Force.

Raymond has been employed by Iowa Power 11 years.

I am assuming the position of assistant manager of Younkers' warehouse represented a promotion for Mr. King at some point in his employment. It is not, however, important to the point I wish to make.

Verbal permission to dispose of damaged or defective merchandise to church bazaars and other charitable causes was given at Younkers. The practice was known in the community by those involved in fund - raising activities.

A distinction must be made, it seems to me, between the warehouse through which most, if not all, merchandise clears. There are records of what and how much passes through. Inventories are taken periodically. How are we to believe that wrong - doing has just been discovered? I cannot recall seeing the manager's name mentioned in all the news coverage. What is his responsibility?

Younkers was sold to an insurance company sometime in 1979, is my understanding. Can it be that Younker employees at the management level became a bit uneasy about their jobs? Warehouse management would hardly pass inspection as efficient in regard to decisions about damaged or defective merchandise.

The ass't manager has not kept records approved by upper management with a signature. Someone has 'passed the buck' to the assistant manager of the warehouse. It is my personal opinion there were 'leaks' to the press before the Grand Jury was in session.

These were some of my thoughts while returning home from the weekend. Anger is a frustrating condition when you are without facts. Let's see how close I have come to understanding the situation without benefit of legal training. One thing I do know - justice is approximate.

My thoughts drifted to a bit of Black history. I got to thinking about slaves who trusted 'massa' to set them free at his death. The difficulty most ofen was 'massa' didn't even put it in his will.

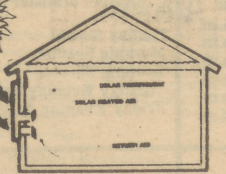

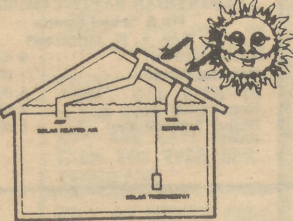

DM School Administrators Analyze Tax Levy Defeat

The economy — inflation, rising property taxes, and utility rate hikes — was given credit for defeating the school tax levy which would have financed the move of Tech High to the North High campus.

But School Board incumbents and leaders on both sides of the Tech - North issue said there were other factors involved, such as the opposition of North area residents.

And following last Tuesday's election, there are still unanswered questions. The main one is — how will the School Board solve the problem of declining enrollment and diminishing finances?

On Wednesday, the following comments were made by people who had played key roles in the tax levy issue:

Nolden Gentry, who was re-elected to his fourth term on the School Board and favored the Tech - North move, analyzed its defeat by saying, "It was a combination of things — the economic picture, and also (the election was) an opportunity for the persons affected by it, (tax levy) to have an effect on the outcome; and they said "no."

"In the areas where the votes would be expected to be in favor of it, many people did not come out (to vote)."

Gentry added that the defeat of the tax levy "doesn't resolve the question. The School Board needs to determine the closing of a high school."

He said the Board will ask the Administration for a recommendation on which of several alternatives should be taken. He said it is possible the tax levy voted down Tuesday would be resubmitted to the voters another time.

Ray Palis, School Board incumbent also re-elected September 9 was more willing to blame North area organizations for the defeat of the levy and school merger, but added that the economy also influenced voters. As for the heavy south-side vote against the additional tax, Palis said, "Why would the Catholics vote for a tax levy?"

And according to Palis, seventy per-cent of the city's population no longer have a direct (parent - child) relationship with schools. Therefore, with rising taxes and utility rates, the school tax levy "was not received with great excitement."

The School Board will have to look at alternatives for dealing with declining enrollment problems, said Palis. Those he mentioned were closing a school, doing away

with Tech, scattering the technical - vocational programs among the other high schools, and bringing the Tech - North proposal before the voters again.

As for his own preference, "I am worn out on the subject," said Palis, "I don't know how we could improve on the recommendation (Tech - North merger.)"

Dr. Francis Keith, chairman of North Central Community Organization and a leader of the opposition to the Tech - North move, said "it was a

poor time to propose a tax levy," blaming inflation and rising costs to property owners.

He also said, "Now it's time for the Board to rethink their decision — to be innovative. They should spend as much time and effort in studying the alternatives as they have in trying to prove the feasibility of the Tech - North merger."

Attorney Arthur Davis, chairman of the citizen's committee organized to promote the tax levy, said, "voters are apprehensive about the

economy," but he added that he believes an additional concern among voters in the North High area was the fear of changes to be made in the school.

If the tax levy comes before the voters again Davis said he would not repeat his role as chairman for the campaign, but he said, "I'm not sorry I tried. But if you do not succeed... it is wise to let someone else try. I would be willing to help."

Said Davis, "I feel it (Tech-North proposal) was the best solution to a

problem that is not going away." But he added that he is totally committed to the democratic process and is willing to accept the voters' "no" on the issue.

Although solving the dilemma of declining enrollment and rising costs is up to the School Board, the Administration will play a part. Superintendent Dr. William Anderson said that in his view there are three important points that must be taken into consideration:

1) With the large drop in school enrollment and prediction of further decline, high school space will have to be reduced.

2) It would not be efficient or effective to break down the Tech program and distribute it among the five remaining high schools.

3) It would not be logical to close a building built as a high school, rather than one built originally to house a factory.

Anderson concluded that the next decision made by the School Board has to include many components of the previous plan to merge Tech and North High Schools. He said it may be possible for the Board to modify the proposal, if they do decide to resubmit it to the voters.

Targeted Job Tax Credit Program

Today's unemployment picture needs all the help it can get, and the Federal Government has a plan to help. The Targeted Job Tax Credit Program, a Federal income tax incentive for employers to hire the handicapped and disadvantaged, is one of the most sensible programs established by the Federal Government.

The program allows businesses, which hire workers in one of the seven categories the government defines as eligible, an income tax reduction on a varying amount of the employee's salary. The eligible categories include disadvantaged youth, handicapped

persons, welfare recipients, ex - convicts, Vietnam - era veterans, SSI recipients and co-operative education students.

The program is funded by the U.S. Labor Department's Employment and Training Administration (ETA) and administered by the state Job Service Offices. Richard G. Miskimins, Kansas City Regional Administrator of ETA, indicated that the idea of the tax credit program is to get the disadvantaged person onto a payroll in the mainstream of the labor market. When asked whether the people hired under this program were any less productive, Miskimins said, "Many

of them have not participated in our economic system. All they need is a chance and once they get it, they are as dedicated or more so than anyone else."

Since the tax credit became available in early 1979, employers nationwide have received certifications for approximately 250,000 workers. Within the four state region an estimated 13,113 persons have been determined eligible under the incentive program, broken down as follows: Iowa.....3,983; Kansas.....2,149; Missouri.....5,849; Nebraska.....1,132.

The tax credit has basically two purposes: to encourage employers to hire persons having difficulty finding employment and to provide capital to help businesses to expand. An employer is allowed to credit either formation for newly hired workers or on a retroactive basis for anyone hired after September 26, 1978.

Although many workers have been eligible for the tax credit program, there are thousands more who could and should be included. It's a rare kind of Federal program where everyone involved has much to gain and no one has anything to lose.

Flu Vaccine Necessary For Some

Influenza—or the flu—strikes people of all ages, bringing fever, chills, cough, headache and muscle aches. Most of its victims recover fully after a few days.

For certain individuals, it's not that simple.

Some suffer from

complications such as pneumonia. Some may even die.

"The risk of complications and death from influenza is highest for people 65 years of age or older or those with chronic health problems such as

diabetes, diseases of the heart, lungs or kidneys; severe anemia, or chronic illnesses which lower the body's resistance to infection," explains Fred Appleton, director of Iowa's Immunization Program.

Appleton urges individuals in the high risk group to get vaccinated against influenza now — before the flu season is fully upon us.

"Influenza vaccine is the most effective way of protecting the elderly and chronically ill from the flu and its possible side effects," he says.

Having previous

influenza vaccinations or having had the flu before

may not prevent a person from getting the flu again. Influenza viruses are unpredictable and often undergo changes. These changes make it possible to catch influenza even though immunity may have been developed against previous strains of the virus. A doctor should be consulted before taking the influenza vaccine.

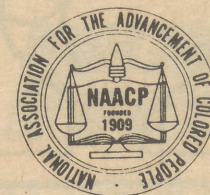

until she was seventeen.

She made her public debut in 1929, and was later given a paternal pat on the head by her renowned colleague, Arthur Rubinstein, when she met and played for him in her native city. She then embarked on a career which has become in recent years one of the fanatical devotion from concertgoers throughout the world and uncommon praise from the press, public, and peers.

In 1979, her golden anniversary of performing, she played an unprecedented twelve times in New York City alone, including four performances of the Schumann Concerto with Zubin Mehta and the

New York Philharmonic; all five Beethoven Piano Concertos in three Concerts with the Pittsburgh Symphony under Andre Previn; her first two chamber music appearances in this country of the Schumann Quintet with the Quarneri Quartet; her regular Avery Fisher Hall Recital; and special concerts at the United Nations. Her performances of both Spanish and non-Spanish repertoire have left no doubt that she is one of the world's truly great pianists.

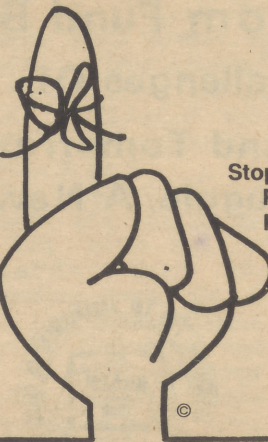

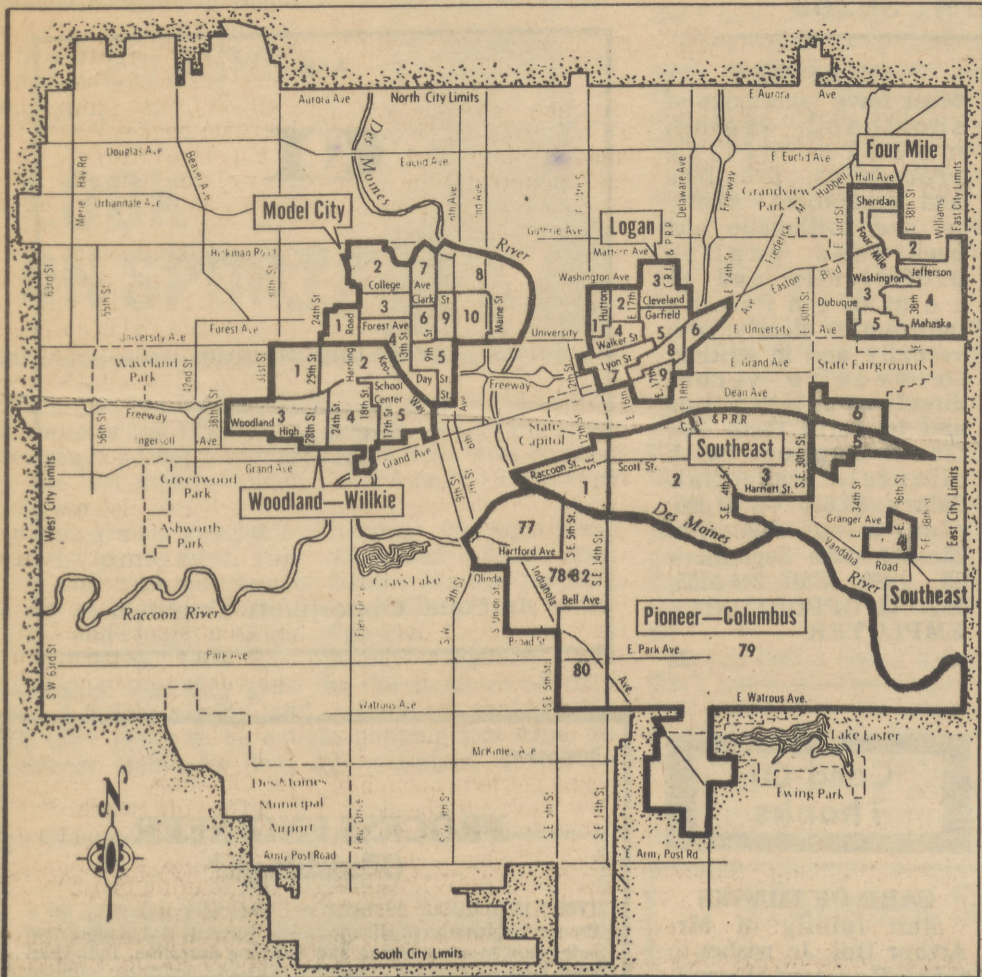

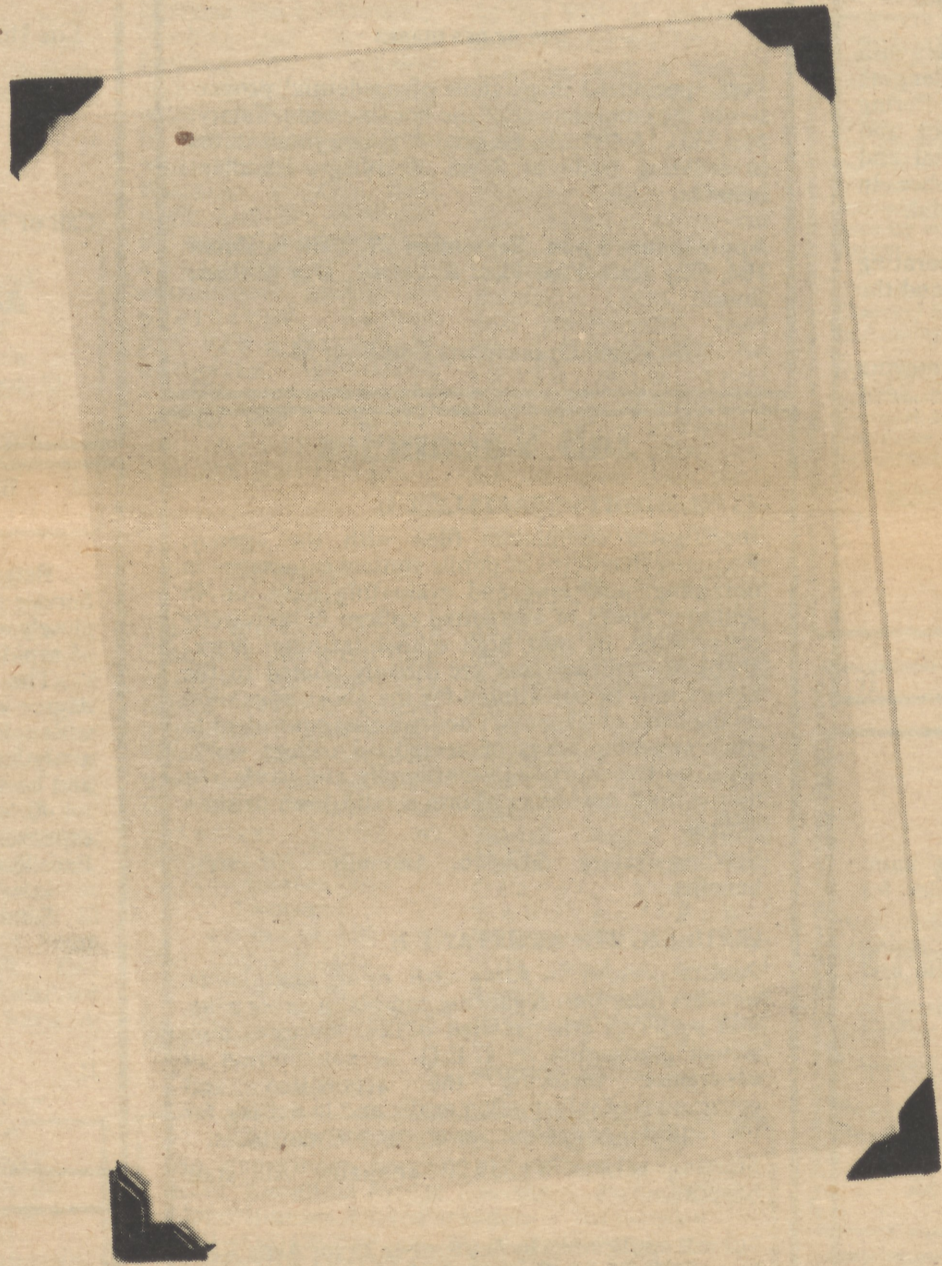
