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## First Poor People's Congress In Nation Held Here

Iowa is the first state to hold a Poor Peoples' Congress; two-day meeting, Sept. 19 - 20 at the Hotel Savary.

Approximately 304 delegates represented 99 counties. The Congress was funded by a \$65,000 grant from the U.S. Community Service Administration. Judge Leo Oxberger presided over the delegates' skillful discussion and debate of major concerns stated in the printed resolutions with many specific additions by the end of the Congress.

The Poor Peoples' Congress purposes are clearly stated in the preamble:

**That every human being has the right to safe and habitable housing;**

**That every human being has the right to equality of educational opportunity and self-improvement;**

**That every human being has the right to a healthy and nutritious diet;**

**That every human being has the right to necessary and competent medical care;**

**That every human being has the right to full employment in meaningful work;**

**That every human being has the right to enjoyment of a peaceable family life free from undue intrusion by the federal government;**

**That every human being has the right to fulfillment of his or her potential;**

**and That these rights belong to all people regardless of race, sex, national origin, age or infirmity, or economic station.**

To these ends, the poor people of Iowa will strive unceasingly.

The defeat of a proposal to omit 'poor' from the title of the Congress illustrated an impressive unity and feeling of identity at the conference. The phrase, low income, as a substitute was rejected as too general.

"Poor people are proud people" was the way several delegates defended Poor Peoples' Congress as a question of identity.

The degree of painstaking concern and attention given to the needs of children, senior citizens, the handicapped, prisoners, energy costs, women, and minorities were in evidence throughout the entire Congress. Every resolution deals with down-to-earth needs of the poor.

Funding of abortions through Medicaid aroused considerable

debate before passage by a narrow margin of 26 votes.

It is interesting to note the passage of a resolution forbidding cutting of funds for minority employment. Among the new approaches to funding was a resolution urging that half of all marriage license fees be used in the area of child abuse, a creative possibility.

It is clear that funds must be secured to meet the unmet needs of the poor. The Poor Peoples Congress is determined to follow through with lobbying in the state legislature. An opportunity to visit with a few of the delegates from Delaware and Maquoketa Counties revealed a common concern to follow through with the Congress program and to report progress at the next Poor Peoples' Congress.

A deep concern for

senior citizens in rural areas and small towns was expressed by a woman, herself a senior citizen still very active. "A hot line is very much needed to keep in touch. Transportation is needed in these areas to take senior citizens for medical care, shopping, and to social centers".

Lois Eichacker, director of Burlington Community Action Agency estimated there were between 10 to 15 Blacks present as delegates. MS. Eichacker expressed approval of the Congress and hope that it would persevere and meet again in 1981.

The contrast between the poor of the twenties and those of the '80s is startling. The present day poor seem much smarter and 'together'.

Perhaps the delegates are responsible for such an impression. They are among the more aware and active.

## Energy Workshop In Ankeny

Interested in saving money on your energy bills this year? A day-long workshop on energy conservation and renewable energy sources will be held October 4 at Des Moines Area Community College in Ankeny.

The "Energy for Iowans" program will provide practical information on such diverse subjects as passive solar design, wood as a heat source, super home insulation and solar hot water heating.

Instructors for the seminars will include Iowans who have

successfully applied energy saving techniques.

For instance, Bob Williams of Mondamin will explain his home wind energy system, Earl Mason of Waverly will discuss changes he made on his car's engine for efficiency, and Gilbert Kopp of Maquoketa will talk about his earth sheltered home.

Dr. Laurent Hodges, an Iowa State University physicist will present a three-hour session on understanding and applying passive solar design.

A "hands-on"

workshop will also be offered, in which participants will build a mock up of an attached solar greenhouse, gaining experience in framing, glazing and flashing as well as some basic principles of solar energy. Cost of the "hands-on" is \$10 and pre-registration is required.

Registration for the general sessions begins at 8 a.m. in Building 2 at the Ankeny campus and is \$3 for individuals and \$5 for families.

I listened to part of the great debate last Sunday night, and it was about what I expected. Reagan came across as a polished speaker who just might sell refrigerators in the Arctic, while Anderson sounded like a man with what he thought was a message.

Who do I think won? Don't really know, and I think that President Carter was smart to stay out of it. They both could have leveled on him and he would have had to defend himself against two Republicans—for no matter what you call them that's what they are.

Anderson ran in every Republican primary until it was established that he had no chance, and then he didn't leave the party, but struck out on his own.

Now, what would you call it? His message is the same one that he hammered on during the primaries, except that now he includes Carter.

He is a good speaker and has tons of facts at hand, including the fact that he voted against social programs and labor bills for such a long time in Congress.

I don't know how much he did for blacks in California, but I do know that he won his first term as governor by running against welfare deadbeats, and, since a vast majority of folks thought most of the welfare recipients were black, it went over big.

A good part of his campaign for the 1976 campaign for the presidency was also directed at welfare chatters, too. Now, he comes to a black church, sings the song about equal rights for everybody, especially if you vote.

Like I have said, I don't think too much of our incumbent president, but I have to rate him over the

other two.

I don't think too much of the various columnists who tell why each candidate has helped or hurt himself. I have come to believe that it depends on who the expert is for. Then he can give you dozens of reasons why his man has done badly or well in the polls. So, I would guess that one had best make up his own mind and let the opinions of experts go to you know where.

I have to recognize the observations of Edna Griffin on the Bob King case. I have seen so many situations just like that where the straw boss lets his man do things that the big boss doesn't know, and when it comes out, says he didn't know anything about it.

And as she said, how many farms and homes in the South were taken away from blacks after the boss had given them to the first owners? I have a friend that I was personally involved with something like that.

He worked for a company for years and purchased his home and truck through the company, and died thinking his family had a home.

But the boss man had only loaned the family the house and truck, so he took them back, and the family went on welfare until they could get straightened out. Edna, I wish I had said that.

## Thoughts and Comments

There was to have been a presentation made by various speakers from the group of black citizens which has recently organized to attempt to bring out positive changes in the social, political and economic status of this community's black population at the last meeting of the Des Moines City Council, but it was delayed by the need for further preparation and a lack of coordination between the organization and its proposed spokesmen and women.

Although it is necessary to request a spot on the Council agenda some time in advance of the meeting, this is not a serious hurdle in rendering an effective presentation to that body which would (or could) lead to acceptance of our arguments and demands. What is more serious, and perhaps most important, is the need to back up the speakers with an overwhelming black attendance at the meeting.

Time and time again, other groups have lobbied

the Council in a similar fashion and gotten that which they have sought by that method, so there is no reason to believe that would not work for us. There is strength in numbers, and there is no reason why we cannot take a page from their "play-book" and use it to our benefit. When I become aware of the time set for presentation, I will relay it to you sufficiently far in advance, I hope, to allow you to make plans to attend.

Additionally, we must keep in mind that there are few things the majority of this community and those who govern it wish from the black community. Outside of paying taxes and doing those types of jobs which members of the majority are too proud to accept, our most important asset which they most often ask is our vote.

Without the voting support which their candidates receive (directly from a cast vote or indirectly from those who do not or refuse to cast votes), then one or more of the social and economic divisions within that community would thereby be jeopardized.

I continue to be amazed to see how few blacks, eligible and registered to vote, can't even take the time to utilize the "weapon" that our predecessors fought and died for not so many years ago. Today, fewer and fewer candidates take the time to actively seek the black vote as they did in the 60's and early 70's, and that is not so surprising when one considers the minimum numbers of blacks who choose to utilize the franchise and the percentage of total votes which blacks present.

Today, black people are more than ready to publicly chastize those politicians who do not theoretically or practically respond to the problems facing their community, but when it comes around to actually doing something to remedy that situation by nominating or electing individuals who can alleviate or solve those problems, they always have some excuse for not going to the polls.

We must continue to, as we have in the past, think in terms of ourselves and our place proportionately in this society. We must realize that in the 1976 election, 27. % of this country's eligible voters elected Jimmy Carter as President, 26% voted for Gerald Ford, and 47% did not vote at all. In the 1978 Congressional elections, only 37.9 percent (approximately one-third) elected those now serving in Congress.

In the 1976 election, 10,000 more votes in Ohio and Hawaii could have swung the electoral victory from Carter to Ford. As the economy worsens and the number of voters who actually cast votes decreases consistently, we of the black community have a rare opportunity to make ourselves felt in the local, state and national political scene.

If you are registered to vote already then turn out on election day, and if you are not, do so as soon as possible. Ask your friends to register, and take them with you to vote on election day. Just make your presence felt, and vote for the candidate of your choice.

## Getting Ahead

The candidates for Iowa's U. S. Senate seat squared-off in a debate last Sunday which was, for-the-most part, a review of the same criticisms they have thrown at each other all-campaign long. Incumbent John Culver and challenger Chuck Grassley both represent, in some way, a political system which is attempting to move farther away from black Iowans and other racial and ethnic minorities.

Chuck Grassley, the Republican challenger, represents no real choice for black Iowans. Grassley, who aligns himself with "ultra-conservative" or "right-wing" forces, has displayed an anti-black and anti-poor attitude which can easily be construed as being dangerous to black Iowans, but is at the same time very representative of the "new-right."

Grassley was the only member of the Iowa Congressional delegation to vote for last year's Mottl Amendment — an anti-busing bill which was defeated soundly. Where Republican moderate Tom Stoner might have given black Iowans some political choice, this year, Grassley gives none.

Any black person who supports Charles Grassley is indeed a fool in the fullest sense of the word.

A different type of problem is evident with incumbent John Culver. Senator Culver represents a Democratic party in this state that is also moving farther away from black Iowa, but for different reasons.

As the Grassley supporters are actively hostile to the interests of black Iowans, the Culver administration pays as little attention as possible to the same interests, taking any black votes or activity, for granted.

The Iowa Democratic party has long been accused

of ignoring black Iowans and the truth is that this attitude is growing and becoming quite visible in the Culver administration. Even though Culver has an impressive voting record in the Senate, in the state he has made little or no effort to communicate or interact with black Iowans, which suggests a true lack of respect for our political well-being.

What Senator Culver fails to realize is that in all probability, he will need every vote he can get to defeat Charles Grassley. Blacks represent about 3.8 per cent of Iowa's population — enough, with a good turnout, to make the difference in a close election. Culver need not worry about blacks voting for Grassley; what he should consider is that black voters who would, with some personal contact, support him, just won't vote — which is a vote for Grassley.

The feedback I, as an NAACP branch president, get from around the state is that blacks, on the average, are turned-off by Culver's arrogance and lack of contact, and thus will not vote for him. It's a shame that John Culver will waste many votes, due to his administration's political ignorance in this

area.

I was personally told by a Culver worker, whom I will not name, that Senator Culver did not speak at our First Freedom Fund Banquet last week because he feared alienating white moderate support by appearing favorable to the "radical" style of high-pressure politics being practiced by the Iowa City NAACP. This style is currently unique in this state to the Iowa City NAACP.

These actions by Culver may or may not be true, but the overall picture indicates a strong possibility of just this very "nonchalance".

This week, Culver will speak in front of the Des Moines NAACP which he "stood-up" last year — if he shows up at all this year.

The point I am trying to make is that it is indeed disgraceful that black Iowans are treated this way by our so-called "liberal" candidates. We are given, on the one hand, anti-black conservatives, and on the other, "inconsistent" liberals.

How can we attack this situation? Tune in next week.

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## Councilman Concerned About Use Of Development Funds

Mayor Pete Crivaro and Members of the City Council:

At a recent meeting of the Des Moines City Council, I requested information relative to the Urban Community Broadcasting Company which the City Council has tentatively allocated \$25,000 from Community Development Block Grant Funds. I requested this information for the reason that I was not certain that such an expenditure would be allowed by the appropriate Federal regulatory agency.

The accounting firm of Ernst and Whinney has made available to us its audited financial statements and other information relative to the City of Des Moines, Iowa Community Development Block Grant program for the period of time from March 5, 1975 to and including December 15, 1979.

The CPA report found a total of \$700,000 in questioned costs for which the City might have to repay unless HUD is satisfied that the City has acted in good faith and in accordance with its regulations.

Since the repayment to Housing and Urban Development could be from the City's General Fund as shown on Page 29 of the report. I do not personally ever intend to vote for any expenditures of Federal money which could be subject to repayment unless the City has, through its appropriate agencies, sought and received from HUD advance approval as required by its guidelines and regulations.

On Page 31 of the report at Note G, you will find the method and manner by which the City is refunding certain unallowed expenses. This obviously cuts into money that would be otherwise

available for legitimate programs.

At Page 40 of the report, the Auditor states that 24 CFR Section 507.504 provides that recipients of Community Development Block Grant Funds shall not obligate or utilize such funds until the recipient has received prior HUD approval.

Among those projects which the City has not previously secured approval for expenditure is the Family Violence Project, the Community Center improvements and Fair Housing for the Handicapped, together with funding for Homes of Oakridge. Since the City is blazing a new trail by allocating money to the project which has not been historically considered to be within the scope of the Community Development Block Grant program, it is quite obvious that we should secure conditional approval under HUD Form 7015.14 and Section 570.607 of the CDBG regulations, all as pointed out and exemplified on Page 41 of the audit report.

It is my understanding of the law that if a member of the City Council does not act under advice of legal counsel or with fore-knowledge that certain expenditures are approved, that that Councilman could be held personally responsible for expenditures from the fund.

I therefore call upon the Council to direct the City Manager and its corporate counsel to seek in advance and to obtain approval as required by HUD regulations of all new programs and proposed expenditures before any of the proposed projects and expenditures are presented to the Council for review and approval.

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

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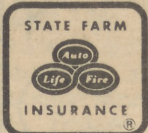

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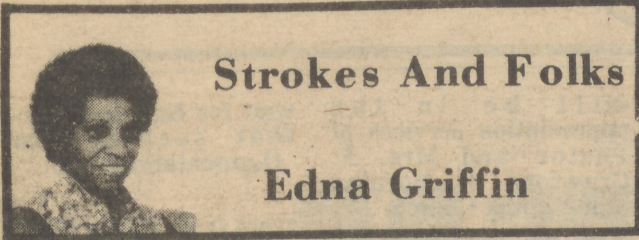

Last Saturday night at Drake University, those who attended witnessed an outstanding performance by the Rod Rodgers Dance Company in support of Gateway Dance Theatre.

The precision and grace displayed in the seven numbers presented created a personal desire to call the whole city to come see what happens when dance moves freely across dance traditions to create whole new images and possibilities.

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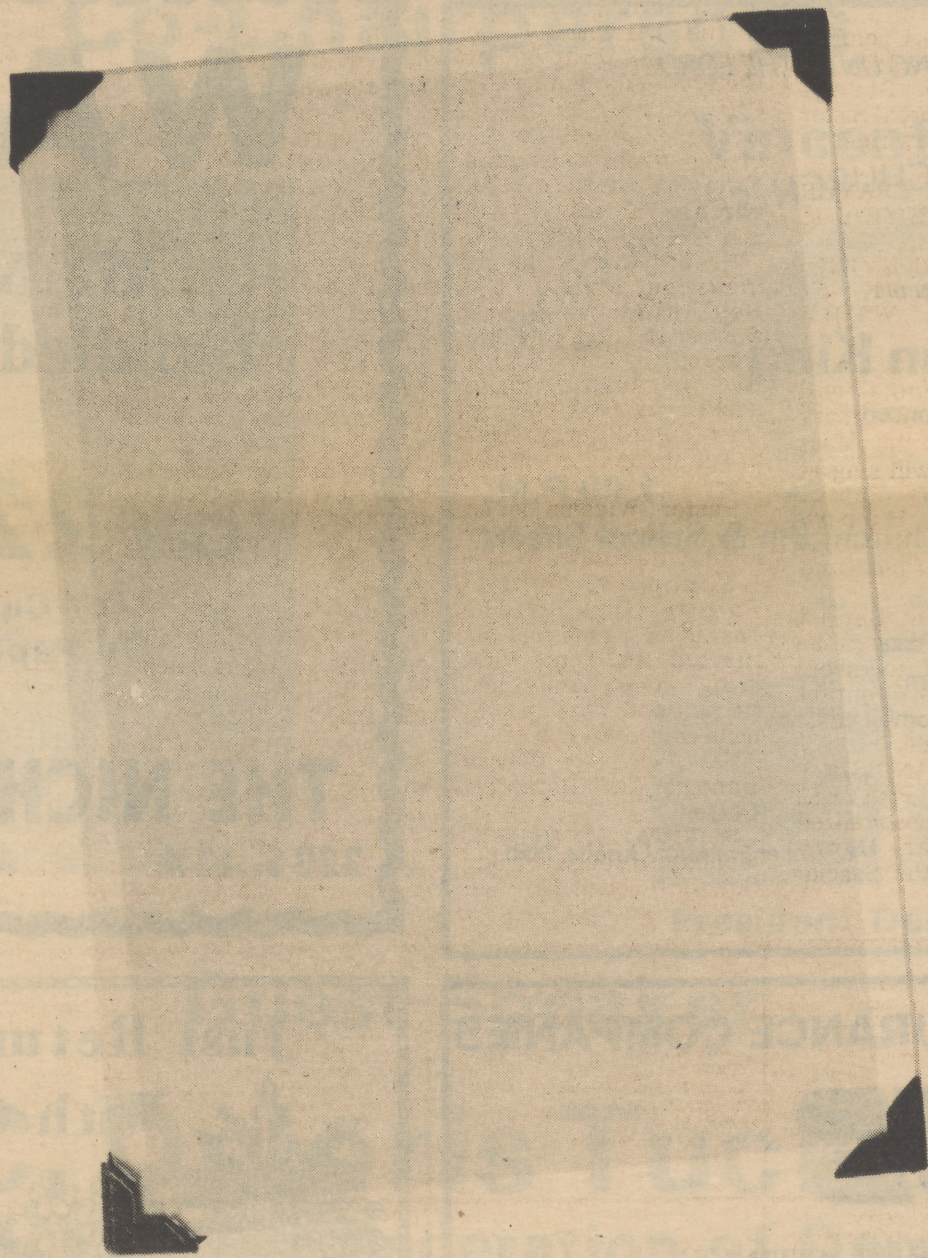

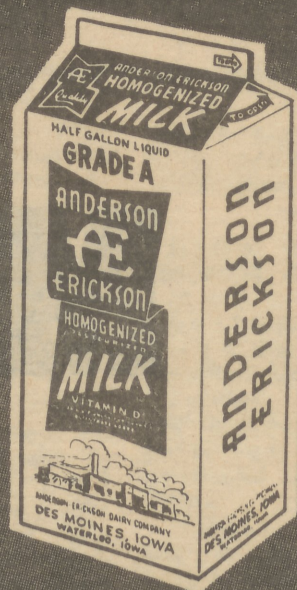

**CORRECTED PUBLICATION OF SECTIONS 11-15, 11-17, 11-20(a)(1) and 11-22(g) (4) OF ORDINANCE NO. 9785, SAID PUBLICATION HAVING APPEARED ON JULY 31, 1980.**

Sec. 11-15. USE OF CANDLES AND OPEN FLAMES.

(a) Only the following open flame lighting devices, in accordance with the following restrictions, may be used in any place of assembly. All other open flame lighting devices are prohibited in any place of assembly.

(1) Where necessary for ceremonial or religious purposes, open flame lighting may be permitted under such restrictions as are necessary to avoid danger of ignition of combustible materials or injury to occupants.

(2) Open flame devices may be used on stages where a necessary part of theatrical performances, provided adequate precautions are taken to prevent ignition of any combustible materials.

(3) Gas lights may be permitted provided adequate precautions are taken to prevent ignition of any combustible materials.

(b) Portable cooking equipment, not flue - connected, shall be permitted only as follows:

(1) Equipment fueled by small heat sources which can be readily extinguished by water, such as candles or alcohol burning equipment (including "solid alcohol"), may be used provided adequate precautions are taken to prevent ignition of any combustible materials.

(2) Candles may be used on tables used for food service if securely supported on substantial noncombustible bases, so located as to avoid danger of ignition of combustible materials. Candle flames must be protected.

(3) "Flaming sword" or other equipment involving open flames and flamed dishes such as cherries jubilee, crepes suzette, etc., may be permitted providing necessary precautions are taken.

**Sec. 11-17. LIGHTING.**

(a) All lighting shall be by electricity with lamps properly protected to prevent ignition by radiation.

(b) All wiring conductors shall be of a type approved for the class of service and be protected against over-current. Loads for feeders and branch lines shall be limited in accordance with the carrying capacities as specified in the National Electrical Code. When deemed necessary by the electrical inspector conductors shall be trenched and covered.

**Sec. 11-20. INSTRUCTIONS.**

(a) The person in charge of the premises on which a refrigeration system containing more than 50 pounds of refrigerant is installed shall place a card conspicuously and as near as practicable to the refrigerant condensing unit giving instructions for the operation of the system, including precautions to be observed in case of breakdown or leak as follows:

(1) Instructions for shutting down the system in case of emergency.

**Sec. 11-22. SMALL ARMS AMMUNITION, SMALL ARMS PRIMERS, SMOKELESS PROPELLANTS AND BLACK RIFLE POWDER.**

(g) Black rifle powder.

(4) Black rifle powder may be stored in commercial establishments for wholesale or resale use in quantities not to exceed 25 pounds, provided it is kept in original shipping containers in covered wooden containers of one inch nominal thickness. Black rifle powder shall not be displayed in commercial establishments and the location or storage shall be approved by the fire chief.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9825**

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing Section 1-2 thereof and enacting a new Section 1-2, relating to definitions and rules.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by repealing Section 1-2 thereof and enacting new a Section 1-2, relating to definitions and rules, as follows:

**SECTION. 1-2 DEFINITIONS AND RULES.**

In the construction of this code and of all ordinances of the city, the following definitions and rules of construction shall be observed, unless they are inconsistent with the intent of the city council or the context clearly requires otherwise:

"Board of health" means the board of health of the city as provided for in section 2-19 of this code.

"The city" or "this city" means the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk, in the state of Iowa.

"City council" or "council" means the city council of the city of Des Moines.

"Code" means the Municipal Code of Des Moines and all amendments thereto.

"Computation of time." The time within which any act provided by law is to be done shall be computed by excluding the first day and including the last, unless the last day is Sunday or a legal holiday, and then it shall also be excluded. If the day succeeding such Sunday or holiday is also a holiday or a Sunday, then such succeeding day shall also be excluded.

"County" or "the county" means Polk County in the state of Iowa.

"Gender." Whenever the masculine gender is used, females as well as males shall be deemed to be included.

"Health officer" means and refers to the legally designated health official of the city of Des Moines or a designated representative acting in behalf of the city.

"In the city" or "within the city" means and includes all territory over which the city now has, or shall hereafter acquire, jurisdiction for the exercise of its police powers or other regulatory powers.

"Joint authority." Words purporting to give a joint authority to three or more public officers or other persons shall be construed as giving such authority to a majority of such officers or persons.

"Month" means a calendar month.

"Number" Whenever any words in any section of this code import the plural number, the singular shall be deemed to be included and whenever the singular number shall be used it shall be deemed to include the plural.

"Oath" includes an affirmation, and the word "sworn" includes the word "affirmed."

"Occupant" or "tenant," applied to a building or land, means any person who holds a written or oral lease of or actually occupies the whole or part of such building or land, either alone or with others.

"Or, and." "Or" may be read "and" and "and" may be read "or", if the sense requires it.

"Owner," applied to a building or land, includes any part owner, joint owner, tenant in common, tenant in partnership, joint tenant of the whole or a part of such building or land, either alone or with others.

"Person" means a natural person, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, and also includes a firm, partnership or corporation, its or their successors or assigns, or the agent of any of them.

"Personal property" includes every species of property except

real property as defined by this section.

"Preceding" and "following" means next before and next after, respectively.

"Property." The word "property" includes real and personal property.

"Real property" includes lands, tenements, and hereditaments and shall embrace all chattels real.

"Shall" is mandatory. Use of the word "shall" negative modification shall constitute a prohibition within the meaning of section 1-11 of this code.

"Sidewalk" means that portion of a street between the curb lines, or the lateral lines of a roadway and the adjacent property lines, intended for the use of pedestrians.

"The state" or "this state" means the state of Iowa.

"Statute references." Whenever reference is made to "Code of Iowa, section—" without year designation, this shall mean and have reference to the current Code of the state of Iowa.

"Street" means the entire width between property lines of every way or place of whatever nature when any part thereof is open to the use of the public, as a matter of right for purposes of vehicular traffic.

"Tense." Words in the present tense include the future.

"Written, in writing." The words "written" and "in writing" may include printing and any other mode of representing words and letters, but when the written signature of any person is required by law to any official or public writing or bond required by law, it shall be in the proper handwriting of such person, or in case he is, unable to write, by his proper mark.

"Year" means a calendar year unless otherwise expressed.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9826**

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing Sections 2-34, 2-53 and 2-54 thereof and enacting new Sections 2-34, 2-53 and 2-54, relating to organization of City departments.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979 and is hereby amended by repealing Section 2-34 thereof and enacting a new Section 2-34, relating to organization of City departments, as follows:

**Sec. 2-34. ORGANIZATION OF CITY DEPARTMENTS.**

The administrative services and functions of the city, under the city manager, are hereby organized into 10 separate departments as follows:

- (1) Department of aviation. The department of aviation shall be under the supervision of the director of aviation.
- (2) Department of building. The department of building shall be under the supervision of the director of building and shall be composed of the following divisions: Building; electrical; housing inspection; mechanical; plumbing; sanitation and vector control; and zoning enforcement.
- (3) Department of civil defense. The department of civil defense shall be under the supervision of the director of civil defense and shall be administered as provided in sections 2-55 through 2-66 of this code.
- (4) Department of city

engineering. The department of city engineering shall be under the supervision of the city engineer and shall be composed of the following divisions: Engineering and building services.

(5) Department of finance. The department of finance shall be under the supervision of the director of finance and shall be composed of the following divisions: Administrative; accounting; audits; central services; data processing; purchasing; research and budget; and treasury.

(6) Fire department. The fire department shall be under the supervision of the chief of the fire department, also known as "fire chief", and shall be administered as provided in sections 2-109 through 2-115 of this code.

(7) Police department. The police department shall be under the supervision of the chief of police and shall be administered as provided in sections 2-127 through 2-144 of this code.

(8) Department of public works. The department of public works shall be under the supervision of the director of public works and shall be composed of the following divisions: Sewage treatment; street maintenance; sewer maintenance; refuse and street cleaning; and equipment maintenance.

(9) Department of traffic and transportation. The department of traffic and transportation shall be under the supervision of the director of traffic and transportation and shall be composed of the following divisions: Services and engineering.

(10) Department of urban development. The department of urban development shall be under the supervision of the director of urban development and shall be composed of the following divisions: Urban renewal and neighborhood improvement.

Sec. 2. That said Code be further amended by repealing Sections 2-53 and 2-54 thereof and enacting new Sections 2-53 and 2-54 relating to the Building Department, as follows:

**Sec. 2-53. DUTIES OF DIRECTOR.**

The director of building shall be responsible to the city manager for the enforcement of vector and sanitation control and the building, electrical, plumbing, mechanical, and steam power equipment codes, the zoning ordinance, and such other ordinances as shall assign him this function. For the purposes of enforcing such codes, he and his designated inspectors may enter any building or premises for the purpose of inspection or to prevent violation of such codes upon presentation of the proper credentials. He shall be accountable for the issuance of all permits and the inspection of all work done under the provisions of such codes and the safety inspection of all premises. He shall perform other duties as may be required by the city manager or by city ordinances including the administrative supervision of the housing inspection division.

**Sec. 2-54. DIVISIONS ENUMERATED.**

The department of building shall be composed of the following divisions:

- (1) Building division.
- (2) Electrical division.
- (3) Housing inspection division.
- (4) Mechanical division.
- (5) Plumbing division.
- (6) Sanitation and vector control division.
- (7) Zoning enforcement division.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**Sec. 6-6. PERMIT FOR CIRCUSES AND CARNIVALS.**

No permit for a circus or carnival shall be issued until a permit is issued by the building department, upon the showing that the premises to be occupied by such circus or carnival can be maintained in a sanitary and healthful condition.

Sec. 2. That said Code be further amended by repealing Section 6-65 thereof and enacting a new Section 6-65 relating to public dances, as follows:

**Sec. 6-65. ISSUANCE OF LICENSES; INSPECTIONS.**

The city clerk shall issue annual or occasional dance licenses only upon a showing that the building, structure, or premises to be used for dancing has the approval of the city's building department and the fire marshal.

Sec. 3. That said Code be further amended by repealing Section 6-75 thereof and enacting a new Section 6-75 relating to roller skating rinks, as follows:

**Sec. 6-75. LICENSE QUALIFICATIONS.**

All public roller skating rinks are hereby prohibited unless duly and regularly licensed in accordance with this subchapter. A license to conduct and operate a public roller skating rink may be granted by the city clerk to persons who shall have first satisfied the city clerk of their fitness to properly conduct and operate a public roller skating rink in accordance with law and propriety and upon a showing that the building, structure or premises to be used for roller skating has been approved by the director of building and the fire marshal.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

Sec. 7-7. CONSTRUCTION OF POULTRY HOUSES.

Any building or part thereof, used for housing live poultry shall be well ventilated and its walls, floors and ceilings shall be tight and of such material, satisfactory to the building department, that they may be readily washed and disinfected. All walls and ceilings shall be whitewashed at least every three months.

Sec. 7-11. DEAD ANIMALS.

(c) The owner, possessor or all persons having knowledge of any dead animal in the city shall report the same to the sanitation and vector control division of the building department, giving the name of the person who owned or had possession or control of the animal prior to its death and the place where the same may be found. The sanitation and vector control division of the building department shall immediately notify the person who owned or had possession and control of such animal to cause the same to be removed and desiccated or cremated as provided by subsection (b).

**Sec. 7-12.02. DISPOSITION OF ANIMALS UPON OWNER'S REQUEST.**

An animal may be humanely destroyed by the poundkeeper or other officer of the police department in the event that the owner of the animal requests that such animal be destroyed and signs a release holding the city harmless and certifying ownership of the animal.

**Sec. 7-12.03. DISPOSITION OF DISABLED ANIMALS.**

An animal may be humanely destroyed by the poundkeeper or other officer of the police department in the event that such animal is disabled and unfit for further use and the owner or person in control of the animal requests that the animal be destroyed or there is no known owner or person in control of the animal.

Sec. 2. That said Code be further amended by repealing Sections 7-13 and 7-28 to 7-33, both inclusive, thereof and enacting new Sections 7-13 and 7-28 to 7-33, both inclusive, relating to dogs, as follows:

**Sec. 7-13. DEFINITIONS.**

Unless otherwise expressly stated or the context clearly indicates a different intention, the following terms shall, for the purpose of this chapter, have the meanings in this section.

"Chief of police" means the legally designated chief of the Des Moines police department or a designated representative.

"Director of public health" means the Polk County Health Center Director or a designated representative acting in behalf of the city of Des Moines.

"Dog" means and includes both male and female animals of the canine species.

"Owner" means any person owning, keeping or harboring a dog.

"Poundkeeper" means the city employee designated by the city manager to administer the municipal animal pound.

**Sec. 7-28. POUND — DUTY OF CITY MANAGER.**

Any public or municipal animal pound established and maintained by the city shall be conducted and operated by the police department under the supervision, direction, and control of the city manager. It shall be the duty of the city manager to cause such pound to be kept in a sanitary condition and free from offensive odors. It shall be the further duty of the city manager to provide for adequate and wholesome food for animals impounded therein, to provide careful and humane treatment toward such animals, to isolate diseased animals, and to provide for humane destruction of animals when necessary.

**Sec. 7-29. USE OF IMPOUNDED DOGS FOR FOOD OR VIVISECTION.**

No person employed in the police department, and no person employed by or connected with the animal pound or any society or organization operating or maintaining such pound under lease or contract with the city, shall sell, give away or dispose of through any pretext, or by any

device or means whatsoever, any dog impounded in such pound to any person for the purpose of using such dog as food, or for the purpose of medical experimentation unless the institution desiring such dog for medical experimentation is duly approved and authorized by the state to conduct such experimentation or for any other purpose except for pets and watchdogs, and except further that any dog restrained or impounded may be redeemed by the owner of the animal as provided in this subchapter.

**Sec. 7-30. NOTICE OF IMPOUNDING.**

The police department, acting under the direction of the city manager, shall cause to be taken up and impounded any dog found to be at large within the city, as defined in this subchapter, and shall give notice thereof in not less than two days to the owner if such owner's name and address appear on the dog's collar or is otherwise known.

**Sec. 7-31. IMPOUNDMENT PERIOD.**

All dogs found without a license, collar or similar identification shall be kept for not less than three days after being impounded unless sooner redeemed by the owner in accordance with this subchapter. Dogs with identification shall be kept not less than seven days after being impounded unless sooner redeemed by the owner in accordance with this subchapter. Any owners given notice by the police department within 48 hours prior to the appropriate expiration date will be allowed 48 hours in which to redeem the dog.

**Sec. 7-32. REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED DOG.**

(a) **Licensed dog.** The owner of an impounded licensed dog which is not required to be held for observation as provided by section 7-33 of this code, may claim and redeem such animal upon payment of a \$10.00 impounding fee for a spayed or neutered dog or \$15.00 for a dog that has not been spayed or neutered, plus the cost of food and care or any vaccines administered in a reasonable amount to be determined annually by the city council plus any additional expenses incurred by the police department in locating or notifying the owner or person in control of the dog. If, within a year's time, the same dog is impounded a second time, the impounding fee shall be increased to \$15.00 for a dog that has been spayed or neutered or \$20.00 for a dog that has not been spayed or neutered. If, within a year's time, the same dog is impounded three or more times, the impounding fee shall be increased to \$25.00 for a dog that has been spayed or neutered or \$30.00 for a dog that has not been spayed or neutered.

(b) **Unlicensed dog.** The owner of an impounded unlicensed dog which is not required to be held for observation as provided by section 7-33 of this code, may claim and redeem such animal upon payment of the impounding fee if redeemed within 48 hours plus the cost of food and care or any vaccines administered in a reasonable amount to be determined yearly by the city council, and any additional expenses incurred by the police department in locating and notifying the owner or person in control of the dog, and upon payment of the usual license fee, if any, including any penalty, for such dog; provided, however, that such dog may not be unconditionally released to such owner or the license issued until the dog receives the required vaccinations including a vaccination against rabies or satisfactory proof is furnished to establish the prior vaccinations of such dog within two years prior to the impounding of such dog if the vaccination was by modified live virus vaccine of egg embryo origin or one year if the vaccination was by killed tissue vaccine, such prior vaccination not expiring within a period of six months from the date of the issuing of the license. If the dog requires any vaccination the poundkeeper or other police department official may, after payment of the required fees, release such dog upon the condition that the dog is vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian within 24 hours of such release and that a certificate of such vaccination is

furnished to the poundkeeper or other police department official to entitle the owner to the issuance of the license tag for such dog. It shall be the duty of the poundkeeper or other police department official to ascertain the name and address of the veterinarian to which such dog will be taken by the owner for vaccination and to make it known to the police department if proof of such vaccination is not furnished within three days after the conditional release of the dog to the owner; and if proof of vaccination is not provided within three days, the police department may immediately pick up and impound such dog.

**Sec. 7-33. DISPOSITION OF UNREDEEMED DOGS.**

After the expiration of the appropriate impoundment period as provided in this subchapter, at the discretion of the chief of police, an unredeemed dog may be humanely destroyed, may be sold for the purpose stated in section 7-29 of this code, or may be put up for adoption. An unredeemed dog may be adopted by a person, other than the dog's owner, as follows:

(1) A person seeking to adopt a dog shall submit a sealed bid on a form prescribed by the chief of police, which bid shall be held by the city and not opened until the expiration of the appropriate impoundment period.

(2) The bid shall be in an amount not less than the license fee, the cost of food and care of the dog during impoundment, the cost of a current rabies vaccination unless the dog does have a certificate of current rabies inoculation, and deposit to be applied toward fee for medical examination of the dog by a licensed veterinarian.

(3) The person submitting the highest bid shall be allowed to adopt the dog upon payment of the bid amount. The conditions of the adoption shall be established by the chief of police.

(4) The provisions of this section relating to the adoption of unredeemed dogs shall also apply to any adoption agencies seeking to obtain unredeemed dogs from the city.

(5) The city shall reserve the right to reject any and all bids for any purpose the city deems necessary.

(6) No dog shall be put up for adoption if a request has been made for that dog for scientific research by an institution authorized by the state department of health pursuant to chapter 351A of the Code of Iowa.

(7) The city takes no responsibility nor makes any warranties or assumes any liability for the condition of the dog adopted.

**Sec. 3.** That said Code be further amended by repealing Sections 7-35, 7-36 and 7-37 thereof and enacting new Sections 7-35, 7-36 and 7-37 relating to animals suspected of being infected with communicable disease, as follows:

**Sec. 7-35. QUARANTINE FOR A MINIMUM PERIOD OF 14 DAYS.**

(a) It shall be the duty of the health officer to order the owner of any animal which has bitten a person or another animal, or any animal suspected of being infected with rabies to confine such animal for a period of 14 days at the animal shelter, a veterinary clinic, or a registered kennel. The health officer may allow a dog or cat which has bitten a person or another animal while on the owner's property and which is either probably under six months old or is properly licensed, in the case of dogs, and has a current certificate of inoculation for rabies to remain in quarantine for that period on the property of the owner so long as the dog or cat is there confined and out of contact with members of the public or other animals during the quarantine period. Such home quarantine shall not be allowed where there is a reasonable belief that the dog's or cat's condition requires observation at the animal shelter, a veterinary clinic, or a registered kennel, or where the dog or cat does not remain in quarantine in the manner prescribed by the health officer for the 14 day period. In the latter event, the animal shall be apprehended and impounded and confined in the animal shelter for 14 days.

(b) If the animal is claimed by

the owner after the 14 day period, the owner shall pay for the cost of confinement. If the animal is not claimed after the 14 day period, it may be humanely destroyed or, if a dog or cat, may be put up for adoption as provided in section 7-33 or 7-43 of this code.

**Sec. 7-36. REQUIREMENT WHEN ANIMAL HAS BITTEN PERSON**

The owner of any animal shall report at once to the police department the fact that his animal has bitten or attacked a person or domestic animal, and all persons having knowledge of such fact shall report the same to the police department. Any person claiming to have been bitten by an animal must go in person to the police department or to a physician to show proof of bite if deemed necessary by the director of public health. Children claiming to have been bitten by an animal must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.

**Sec. 7-37. REPORT OF PERSON WHOSE ANIMAL HAS BEEN BITTEN**

Every person owning or having possession, custody, or control of an animal which is known to have been bitten by an animal infected with rabies shall immediately report this fact to the police department and shall have the exposed animal placed in isolation and quarantine as provided by section 7-35 of this code.

**Sec. 4.** That said Code be further amended by repealing Sections 7-41, 7-42 and 7-43 thereof and enacting new Sections 7-41, 7-42 and 7-43 relating to cats, as follows:

**Sec. 7-41. IMPOUNDMENT**

(1) Any cat without a current rabies tag shall be impounded by the police department for a period not to exceed three days, provided, however, that any such cat having a collar or similar identification shall be kept not less than seven days after being impounded unless sooner redeemed by the owner in accordance with this subchapter.

(b) The police department shall make reasonable attempts to notify the owner of the impoundment. Any owners given notice by the police department within 48 hours prior to the appropriate expiration date will be allowed 48 hours in which to redeem the cat.

**Sec. 7-42. REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED CAT.**

The owner of an impounded cat which is not required to be held for observation pursuant to section 7-35 of this code may redeem the cat upon payment of a \$10.00 impounding fee for a spayed or neutered cat or \$15.00 for a cat which has not been spayed or neutered, plus the cost of food and care of any vaccines administered plus any additional expenses incurred by the police department in locating or notifying the owner or person in control of the cat. Such cat may not be unconditionally released to its owner until the cat receives a vaccination against rabies or satisfactory proof is furnished to establish the prior vaccination of such cat within two years prior to the impounding of the cat if the vaccination was by modified live virus vaccine of egg embryo origin or one year if the vaccination was by killed tissue vaccine. If the cat requires vaccination against rabies the poundkeeper or other police department official may, after payment of the required fees, release the cat upon the condition that the cat is vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian within 24 hours of its release and that a certificate of vaccination is furnished to the poundkeeper or other police department official. It shall be the duty of the poundkeeper or other police department official to ascertain the name and address of the veterinarian to whom the cat will be taken by the owner for vaccination and to make it known to the police department if proof of vaccination is not furnished within three days after the conditional release of the cat to the owner; and the police department may immediately pick up and impound such cat if proof of vaccination is not furnished within three days after release.

**Sec. 7-43. DISPOSITION OF UNREDEEMED CATS.**

After the expiration of the

appropriate impoundment period as provided in this subchapter, at the discretion of the poundkeeper, an unredeemed cat may be humanely destroyed or may be put up for adoption. An unredeemed cat may be adopted by a person, other than the cat's owner, as follows:

(1) A person seeking to adopt a cat shall submit a sealed bid on a form prescribed by the chief of police, which bid shall be held by the city and not opened until the expiration of the appropriate impoundment period.

(2) The bid shall be in an amount not less than the cost of food and care of the cat during impoundment, the cost of a current rabies vaccination, and deposit to be applied toward the fee for medical examination of the cat by a licensed veterinarian.

(3) The person submitting the highest bid shall be allowed to adopt the cat upon payment of the bid amount. The conditions of the adoption shall be established by the chief of police.

(4) The provisions of this section relating to the adoption of unredeemed cats shall also apply to any adoption agencies seeking to obtain unredeemed cats from the city.

(5) The city shall reserve the right to reject any and all bids for any purpose the city deems necessary.

(6) The city takes no responsibility nor makes any warranties or assumes any liability for the condition of the cat adopted.

**Sec. 5.** This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9829**

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing Sections 8-391, 8-392, 8-393, 8-394, 8-398, 8-404, 8-406, 8-413, subsection (c) of Section 8-421, Sections 8-430, 8-432, 8-435, 8-437, 8-445, and 8-447 thereof and enacting new Sections 8-391, 8-392, 8-393, 8-394, 8-398, 8-404, 8-406, 8-413, subsection (c) of Section 8-421, Sections 8-430, 8-432, 8-435, 8-437, 8-445 and 8-447, all relating to the regulation of public swimming pools.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by repealing Sections 8-391, 8-392, 8-393, 8-394, 8-398, 8-404, 8-406, 8-413, subsection (c) of Section 8-421, Sections 8-430, 8-432, 8-435, 8-437, 8-445 and 8-447 thereof and enacting new Sections 8-391, 8-392, 8-393, 8-394, 8-398, 8-404, 8-406, 8-413, subsection (c) of Section 8-421, Sections 8-430, 8-432, 8-435, 8-437, 8-445 and 8-447, relating to regulation of public swimming pools, as follows:

**Sec. 8-391. DEFINITION.**

Unless otherwise expressly stated or the context clearly indicates a different intention, the following term shall, for the purpose of this article, have the meanings in this section.

"Swimming pool" means any artificial basin of water which has been modified, improved, constructed, or installed for the purpose of public swimming, and includes but is not limited to pools at apartments and municipal park and recreation areas. This article does not apply to pools at private residences intended only for the use of the owner and guests, clubs, camp, schools, institutions, motels, hotels and other commercial establishments.

**Sec. 8-392. SCOPE.**

(a) These regulations shall apply to all swimming pools, as defined herein. These regulations shall apply to all auxiliary structures and equipment thereof such as locker rooms; shower and dressing rooms; toilet facilities, filtration, pumping, piping, disinfecting and safety equipment provided and maintained in connection with such facility.

(b) Installations which were in compliance with this code in existence at the time such installations were made shall be presumed to be safe and proper, which presumption can be rebutted by evidence that the installation may be dangerous to health or safety.

**Sec. 8-393. SUBMISSION OF PLANS.**

(a) Plans for the construction of a swimming pool shall be submitted to the building department and shall include:

(1) Drawing to scale, pool plans longitudinal pool section, and cross pool section, at least at the deepest point in the pool;

(2) Complete working drawings for the mechanical facilities, including pumps, filters, chlorinator, chemical feeders, and other appurtenances if required;

(3) A complete layout showing sizes and types of piping, including main drains, skimmers or scum gutter piping, and returns to the pool; and

(4) A statement of the surface area of the pool, volume in gallons, and electrical layout.

(b) Four copies of the plans are required for distribution as follows:

(1) One copy to the owner;

(2) One copy to the building department;

(3) One copy to the contractor; and

(4) One copy to the job.

(c) The building department shall forward one copy of the approved plans to the owner.

**Sec. 8-394. SHOWER AND TOILET FACILITIES.**

(a) Bather preparation facilities consisting of dressing room space, toilets, and showers shall be available for the use by patrons of swimming pools.

(b) Adequate provisions shall be made for disposal of liquid wastes, in accordance with the existing plumbing codes.

(c) This requirement does not exist where toilets, showers, and handwashing facilities are available within 200 feet of the pool and where access does not require crossing public streets; or to pools at apartments if other required facilities such as showers are available at the apartments.

**Sec. 8-398. SHAPE, DESIGN, AND SLOPES.**

(a) The pools shall be designed and constructed of such shape, contour, and the like, that efficient and safe control of the pool and bathers can be accomplished. The pool bottom shall have definite slopes to the outlet.

(b) The acceptable variations in this requirement are numerous so that each design must necessarily be judged upon its own merits at the time of submission to the building department.

**Sec. 8-404. INLETS.**

(a) Inlets shall be submerged, and be located to produce uniform circulation of water, throughout the pool without the existence of dead spots, and to carry pool bottom deposits to the outlets.

(b) This section shall be deemed to have been satisfied when:

(1) Rectangular pools not exceeding 40 feet by 75 feet have inlets across the shallow end which serve a maximum lineal distance of eight feet.

(2) Rectangular shaped pools with outlets more than five feet from the deep end wall are provided with additional inlets at the deep end on a maximum of 12 foot centers.

(3) In pools larger than 40 feet by 75 feet inlets are provided on not more than 20 foot centers in the side walls, in addition to the spacing indicated in subsection (b)(1) of this section for end wall inlet fittings.

(4) All inlets discharge at a depth of ten to 18 inches below the pool overflow level.

(5) Proof can be furnished to the satisfaction of the city building department that adequate circulation can be obtained by other inlet arrangements such as in

the case of upward or "reverse flow" circulation systems where inlet fittings are proposed for installation in or near the pool bottom.

**Sec. 8-406. POOL SKIMMING.**

(a) Every swimming pool shall be provided with overflow gutters or skimmers or a combination thereof, and the design and appurtenances shall be capable of continuously withdrawing at least 75 percent of the required recirculation capacity to provide continuous skimming of the surface. For pools with overflow gutters, a surge tank or other hydraulic arrangement shall be provided which will produce continuous surface skimming action.

(b) Other type overflow arrangements and pool edges, including deck level pools, may be installed when approved by the building director. No such pool shall be installed or built when a safety hazard may result.

**Sec. 8-413. WATER SUPPLY.**

(a) Water supplied to any swimming pool shall be from the Des Moines Water Works or from some other source approved for the purpose by the health officer.

(b) There shall be no direct connection between any domestic water supply system and the swimming pool, or the swimming pool piping system, unless protected against backflow in a manner prescribed by the building director.

**Sec. 8-421. FILTRATION EQUIPMENT.**

(c) Sand filter units designed for performance at high rates of filtration are acceptable for installation at pools of small to moderate size and which are planned to accommodate only light swimmer loading; provided further that such filter units have been tested and approved by a nationally recognized testing laboratory to function satisfactorily at the rate or rates specified. If a high-rate sand filter unit installed at a swimming pool fails to produce results satisfactory to the building department it must be replaced with an adequate and approved filter unit of conventional design.

**Sec. 8-430. CHLORINATOR OR DISINFECTANT FEEDERS.**

Only positive displacement electrically driven chlorinators will be accepted. All such chlorinators must receive approval by the building director prior to inclusion in plans. The building department will recommend gas-type chlorination when the pool contains more than 100,000 gallons.

**Sec. 8-432. WASTE WATER DISPOSAL.**

(a) Provisions shall be made for disposing of material cleaned from filters and of backwash in a manner which will not create a nuisance.

(1) Where sand filters are used, the backwash water shall be disposed of in accordance with requirements of this code to sewer system, dry well, or, where space and conditions permit and when approved by the building director and city engineer, after determination that no pollution or nuisance will result, such water may be disposed of by surface or subsurface irrigation.

(2) There shall be no direct connection of the pool or recirculation system with the sanitary sewer.

(3) When drainage to the sanitary sewer is permitted by this code, drainage shall be through an air-gap type separation.

(b) A receiving chamber shall be installed to collect waste diatomaceous earth and to provide for disposal of water mixed therewith unless discharge to the sanitary sewer is permitted by this code or otherwise authorized by the building director.

**Sec. 8-435. HANDLING AND STORAGE OF CHEMICALS.**

(a) All disinfectants, chemicals, and special cleaning supplies shall be stored in a manner recommended by the manufacturer and in accordance with existing safety regulations of the building and fire departments. No disinfectants, chemicals, or special cleaning supplies shall be stored where they are readily available to the users of the pool.

(b) Where chlorine gas is used as the disinfectant, it shall be placed

in a separate locked room which is used only for the feeding of chlorine into the pool system and for storage of spare containers of chlorine gas. The room shall be equipped with a scale and securing chains for cylinders and be provided with positive ventilation at an exhaust rate sufficient to provide 12 air changes per hour. Intake for the exhaust system shall be placed not over six inches above the floor.

**Sec. 8-437. CLARITY OF WATER.**

The recirculation and purification system shall be operated and maintained so as to keep the pool water clean and clear. Under no circumstances shall the pool be used when a black disc, six inches in diameter on a white field, when placed at the bottom of the pool at the deepest point, is not clearly visible from the sidewalks of the pool at all distances up to ten yards from such discs. Such a pool shall be closed and shall not be reopened until the water is clean and clear, and upon specific approval of the building director.

**Sec. 8-445. HEALTH OF EMPLOYEES AND PATRONS.**

(a) No person having a communicable disease shall be employed at a public swimming pool.

(b) All patrons known to be, or suspected by the management of being afflicted with an infectious disease, suffering from a cough, cold or sores, or wearing bands or bandages shall be excluded from all public bathing places, except on presentation of a written statement of current date as approved by a licensed physician.

**Sec. 8-447. REVIEW OF OTHER MATERIALS.**

(a) For any items not specifically covered in these requirements, the building director is hereby authorized to require that all equipment, materials, methods of construction, and design features shall be proven to function in such a manner as to produce a safe and healthful swimming pool. No materials, devices, or design features shall be used until they are approved by the building department except:

(1) When performance has been proven as a result of full scale operation of similar units under normal conditions of use; or

(2) For testing, when such tests are approved by the building director and are conducted in accordance with procedures established by the building department and are necessary to satisfy item (a) hereof; or

(3) When the applicant has presented sufficient factual data to show his device will properly function so as to qualify for approval.

(b) It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to provide such data, tests, or other adequate proof that the device, material or product will perform the function for which it is intended, before such item shall be approved or accepted for tests.

(c) The building department may publish reports of the results of these examinations or investigations.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9830**

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 13 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing Sections 13-1, 13-18, 13-18.01, 13-27, 13-29, 13-33, 13-35, 13-36, 13-38, 13-44, 13-63, 13-65

to 13-72, both inclusive, 13-76, 13-78 and 13-79 thereof and enacting new Sections 13-1, 13-18, 13-18.01, 13-27, 13-29, 13-33, 13-35, 13-36, 13-38, 13-44, 13-63, 13-65 to 13-72, both inclusive, 13-76, 13-78 and 13-79; by changing the title of Article I thereof to read "Health Officer", by repealing Sections 13-2 to 13-5, both inclusive, thereof; by repealing Article II thereof being Section 13-6 to 13-16, both inclusive; by repealing Sections 13-17, 13-39 to 13-43.01, both inclusive, thereof; by repealing Article VI thereof, being Sections 13-45 to 13-48, both inclusive; and by repealing Sub-chapter 2 thereof being Sections 13-49 to 13-62, both inclusive; all relating to Health.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That Chapter 13 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by repealing Section 13-1 thereof and enacting a new Section 13-1, by changing the title of Article I thereof to read "Health Officer", and by repealing Sections 13-2 to 13-5, both inclusive, thereof, all relating to the health officer, as follows:

**ARTICLE I.  
HEALTH OFFICER**

**Sec. 13-1. APPOINTMENT; POWERS AND DUTIES.**

The health officer shall be appointed by the city manager. He or she shall be responsible for all matters pertaining to health and sanitation in the community, and shall perform duties that may now or hereafter be assigned by law, ordinance or the city manager. He or she shall perform duties in line with the policies set forth by the board of health and the city manager.

Sec. 2 That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Article II thereof, being Sections 13-6 to 13-16, both inclusive, relating to communicable diseases.

Sec. 3 That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Section 13-17 thereof relating to enforcement of Article III of Chapter 13.

Sec. 4. That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Sections 13-18 and 13-18.01 thereof and enacting new Sections 13-18 and 13-18.01, relating to filling or draining of depressions and excavations, as follows:

**Sec. 13-18. DUTY OF OWNER OR OCCUPANT OF PREMISES.**

When any depression or excavation upon any lot or premises in the city shall from any cause whatsoever become the repository of stagnant water or any other decayed or offensive substance, liquid or solid, the owner or occupant of the premises, within three days after receiving written notice from the department of building, shall cause such depression or excavation upon any of such premises to be drained or filled with clean earth within the time specified in said notice.

**Sec. 13-18.01. DUTY OF OWNER OR OCCUPANT OF PREMISES — BREEDING PLACES FOR MOSQUITOES.**

No person shall allow stagnant water likely to afford breeding places for mosquitoes within the corporate limits, including stagnant water in fish ponds, swimming pools, tires, open barrels, ravines and other substances holding water. When such a situation is discovered the building department shall notify the owner and occupants of the property on which the violation exists, in writing, of the remedial action required and shall allow a specified time reasonable for performance of the required action. Failure on the part of the owners and occupants of the property to take such remedial action shall be violation of this section.

Sec. 5. That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Sections 13-27, 13-29, 13-33 and 13-35 thereof and enacting new Sections 13-27, 13-29, 13-33 and 13-35, relating to manure, as follows:

**Sec. 13-27. REMOVAL OF MANURE.**

The owner or occupant or tenant or keeper of any boarding, sales, livery, other stables, or other premises where any horse, mule, cow or other animal is kept, shall remove or cause to be removed, all

manure from such stables or premises at least twice weekly from March 15th to December 1st or oftener as deemed necessary and once a week from the first of December to the 15th day of March. The owner, occupant, tenant or keeper shall be required to store in fly-proof receptacles, not accessible to flies, all such manure pending its removal.

**Sec. 13-29. DUMPING MANURE.**

No manure shall be dumped or left on the street, sidewalk, alley or open area or lot in any inhabited section nor be used to grade, in whole or in part, any sidewalk, street, alley, open area or lot in such section.

**Sec. 13-33. RECEPTACLES FOR MANURE.**

Every person owning, controlling, operating or having in charge any stable, barn or other place where horses, mules, cows or other livestock are kept, shall have and maintain at all times upon the premises a fly-tight receptacle of sufficient dimensions for the purpose of containing the droppings of manure from stock. The same shall have a top or lid so arranged as to be fly-tight and to exclude therefrom all flies and therein to deposit promptly all droppings from stock. The lid shall be kept thereon, except when necessarily open for the purpose of depositing therein or removing therefrom, and shall be closed in such a manner as to prevent the ingress of flies. Every person having or keeping manure in the city shall cause the same to be removed from the premises at least once a week or oftener if required by the department of building.

**Sec. 13-35. ENFORCEMENT.**

The department of building shall enforce the provisions of this article. Every member of the police department, upon being advised or discovering that any of the provisions of this article are being violated, may report the same through the chief of the police department to the department of building.

Sec. 6. That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Sections 13-36, 13-38 and 13-44 thereof and enacting new Sections 13-36, 13-38 and 13-44, relating to miscellaneous sanitary regulations, as follows:

**Sec. 13-36. PERMIT FOR DUMPING ASHES AND REFUSE UPON PREMISES.**

(a) No person owning or occupying any premises within the corporate limits of the city, and no city officer controlling or in charge of city premises, shall cause any ashes or refuse to be placed thereon, or shall allow such premises to be used as public dump for ashes, refuse or other material, without a permit from the department of building and only in accordance with the permit.

(b) Such permit shall be in force for six months and may be renewed thereafter for periods not exceeding one month each by the department of building.

**Sec. 13-38. ENUMERATION OF PUBLIC NUISANCES.**

The following are hereby declared to be public nuisances;

(1) Bakeries, restaurants, and all other places where food is prepared or served, which are not kept in a clean and sanitary condition; or in which there is evidence that rats, mice or vermin are present.

(2) Barns or stables, hog pens, chicken yards, rabbit hutches or other places where birds or animals are confined, manure piles or accumulations of organic material so maintained as to offer a breeding place for flies or engender offensive odors.

(3) Rabbit hutches within 50 feet from any well or house and hog pens within 300 feet from any well or house.

(4) The discharge or exposure of sewage, garbage or any other organic filth into, or on any public place in such a way that transmission of infective material may result therefrom.

(5) The deposit of any poisonous material or thing on any premises, so as to allow access to it by any animal or person.

(6) Privies, in populous places, not screened against flies, privies likely to pollute the ground or surface water from which water supply is obtained, or privies within 75 feet of a well.

(7) Transportation of garbage, night soil or other organic filth, in other than tight-covered trucks, which prevent leakage or access of flies.

(8) Stagnant water likely to afford breeding places for mosquitoes.

(9) Buildings, or any part thereof, which are in a dilapidated, or filthy condition which may endanger the health of persons living in them, or in their vicinity.

(10) Unoccupied buildings or shed, that remain standing open for a period of 30 days or more.

**Sec. 13-44. ENFORCEMENT.**

The department of building shall enforce the provisions of this article. Every member of the police department upon being advised or discovering that any of the provisions of this article are being violated may make a report of the same through the chief of the police department to the department of building.

Sec. 7. That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Sections 13-39 to 13-43.01, both inclusive, thereof relating to miscellaneous sanitary regulations.

Sec. 8. That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Article VI thereof, being Sections 13-45 to 13-48, both inclusive; relating to sanitation of stock yards.

Sec. 9. That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Subchapter 2 thereof, being Sections 13-49 to 13-62, both inclusive, relating to hospitals and sanitariums.

Sec. 10. That Chapter 13 of said Code, be further amended by repealing Sections 13-63, 13-65 to 13-72, both inclusive, 13-76, 13-78 and 13-79 thereof and enacting new Sections 13-63, 13-65 to 13-72, both inclusive, 13-76, 13-78 and 13-79, relating to rat and pest control, as follows:

**Sec. 13-63. DEFINITIONS.**

Unless otherwise expressly stated or the context clearly indicates a different intention, the following terms shall, for the purpose of this article have the meanings in this section.

"Business buildings" shall mean any structure, whether public or private, that is adapted for occupancy for transaction of business, for rendering of professional service, for amusement, for the display, sale or storage of goods, wares or merchandise, or for the performance of work or labor, including hotels, apartment buildings, tenement houses, rooming houses, office buildings, public buildings; stores, theatres, markets, restaurants, grain elevators, abattoirs, warehouses, workshops and factories. It shall also include all outbuildings, sheds, barns and other structures on premises used for business purposes.

"Health officer". The health officer or any employee or representative authorized by such officer shall be the legally designated health official of the city of Des Moines and shall have the responsibility for administering and enforcing this subchapter.

"Occupant" shall mean the individual, partnership or corporation that uses or occupies any premises or building, or part or fraction thereof, whether the actual owner or tenant. In the case of vacant premises or buildings or vacant portions thereof, the owner, agent or custodian shall have the responsibility as occupant.

"Owner" shall mean the actual owner, agent or custodian of the premises or building, whether individual, partnership or corporation. The lessee shall be construed as the "owner" for the purpose of this article when building agreements hold the lessee responsible for maintenance and repairs.

"Rat eradication" shall mean the elimination or extermination of rats either on premises or within or without buildings by any or all of the measures accepted by the public health procedures or pest control service.

"Rat harborage" shall mean any condition which provides shelter or protection for rats, thus favoring their multiplication and continues existence in, under or outside of any structure or on any premises.

"Ratproofing" applies to a form

of construction to prevent the ingress of rats into business buildings from the exterior or from one business building or establishment to another. It consists essentially of treatment with material, impervious to rat gnawing, all actual or potential openings in exterior walls, ground or first floors, basements, roof and foundations, that may be reached by rats from the ground by climbing or by burrowing.

**Sec. 13-65. NOTICE TO BEGIN WORK.**

Upon receipt of a written notice or order from the health officer the owner of any business building specified therein shall take immediate measures for ratproofing the building.

**Sec. 13-66. FAILURE TO COMPLETE WORK AS REQUIRED BY NOTICE.**

Unless the work and improvements have been completed by the owner in the time specified in the written notice required by the preceding section, in no event to be less than 15 days, or within the time to which a written extension may have been granted by the health officer, the owner shall be deemed guilty of an offense under the provisions of this article.

**Sec. 13-67. FAILURE TO BEGIN AND MAINTAIN WORK OF ERADICATION.**

Whenever the health officer notifies the owner or occupant of any building or any premises improved or vacant or any open lot or alley in the city in writing that there is evidence of rat infestation, the latter shall immediately institute rat eradication measures and shall continuously maintain such measures until the premises are declared by the health officer to be free of rat infestation. Unless such measures are undertaken within five days after receipt of the notice, it shall be construed as a violation of the provisions of this article and the owner or occupant shall be held responsible therefor.

**Sec. 13-68. DUTY OF OWNERS.**

The owners of all ratproofed business buildings are required to maintain the premises of such buildings in a ratproof condition and to repair all breaks or leaks that may occur in the ratproofing without a specific order of the health officer.

**Sec. 13-69. INSPECTION BY HEALTH OFFICER.**

The health officer is empowered to make unannounced inspections of the interior and exterior of business buildings to determine full compliance with this article. When any evidence is found indicating the presence of rats or openings through which rats may again enter business buildings, the health officer shall serve the owners of occupants with notice or orders to abate the conditions found.

**Sec. 13-70. AUTHORITY TO ORDER MAJOR REPAIRS.**

Whenever conditions inside or under occupied business buildings provide extensive harborage for rats, the health officer is empowered, after due notification in accordance with section 13-65 of this code, to order ratproofing pursuant to that section and rat eradication pursuant to section 13-67 of this code, he or she may also order, if necessary, the installation of suitable concrete floors in basements or replacements of wooden first or ground floors with concrete or other major repairs to facilitate rat eradication.

**Sec. 13-71. INSTITUTION OF CONDEMNATION AND DESTRUCTION PROCEEDINGS IN UNOCCUPIED BUILDINGS.**

Whenever conditions inside or under unoccupied buildings provide extensive harborage for rats, the health officer is empowered to require compliance with the provisions of section 13-66 of this code. If such conditions are not corrected within a time period specified by the health officer, the health officer is empowered to institute condemnation and destruction proceedings.

**Sec. 13-72. BARN AND SHEDS.**

Whenever conditions inside or under sheds, barns and other structures on all premises provide extensive harborage for rats, the health officer is empowered, after due notification, in accordance with section 13-65 of this code, to

institute condemnation and destruction proceedings.

**Sec. 13-76. STORAGE OF ANIMAL FEED.**

All food and feed within the city for feeding chickens, cows, pigs, dogs, birds, horses and other animals shall be stored in rat-free and ratproof containers, compartments or rooms unless stored in a ratproof building.

**Sec. 13-78. ACCUMULATION OF GARBAGE, RUBBISH, AND TRASH.**

No person shall place, leave, dump or permit to accumulate any garbage, rubbish or trash in any building, dwelling, or on any premises, improved or vacant, or on any open lot or alley in the city so that the same shall or may afford food or harborage for rats.

**Sec. 13-79. STORAGE OF LUMBER, BARRELS, BOTTLES, CANS AND CONTAINERS.**

No person shall permit to accumulate on any premises, improved or vacant, or on any open lot or alley in the city, lumber, boxes, barrels, bottles, cans, containers or materials if the same may be determined by the health officer to constitute a rat harborage. The health officer is empowered to order such materials or articles placed on open racks that are elevated not less than eighteen inches above the ground and evenly piled or stacked or otherwise order such materials or articles be stored in such a manner so as to not constitute a rat harborage. This section shall not apply to any person manufacturing or dealing in the above articles or commodities.

**Sec. 11.** This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9831**

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing subsection (a) of Section 19-8, and Sections 19-9 and 19-10 thereof and enacting a new subsection (a) of Section 19-8 and Sections 19-9 and 19-10, all relating to ambulance service.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by repealing subsection (a) of Section 19-8 and Sections 19-9 and 19-10 thereof and enacting a new subsection (a) of Section 19-8 and Sections 19-9 and 19-10, all relating to ambulance service, as follows:

**Sec. 19-8. REPORTS.**

(a) Each licensee of an ambulance licensed under this subchapter shall maintain accurate records, upon forms provided or prescribed by the building director, of all pertinent details of all requests for ambulance service within the city of Des Moines. The records shall also contain such information as may be required by the building director concerning the transportation of each patient within the city and the employment of ambulance personnel. Such records shall be available for inspection by the building director, police chief, or their authorized representatives at any reasonable time. Any licensee who makes application for and is granted an ambulance license pursuant to the terms of this subchapter shall be deemed to have consented to the inspection of his records as provided in this section.

**Sec. 19-9. STANDARDS FOR AMBULANCES.**

(a) Each ambulance shall comply with all applicable laws relating to health, sanitation and

safety and shall be equipped with lights, equipment, sirens and special markings as required by law to designate it as an ambulance.

(b) Each ambulance shall be maintained in good mechanical condition, and contain first aid equipment as approved by the building director for dressing wounds, controlling hemorrhage, splinting fractures, and providing oxygen and artificial respiration. It shall also contain a two-way radio, safety seat belts for all occupants, and a fire extinguisher approved by the fire marshal.

(c) The building director, or his authorized representative, shall inspect each licensed ambulance, its equipment and the premises housing the same to determine compliance with the standards prescribed in this subchapter prior to the issuance of any ambulance license hereunder and thereafter whenever an inspection is deemed to be necessary, but in any event no less frequently than twice each year. The periodic inspection required under this subchapter shall be in addition to any other safety or motor vehicle inspection required to be made for ambulances under applicable laws. Any licensee who makes application for and is granted an ambulance license pursuant to the terms of this subchapter, shall be deemed to have consented to the inspection provided in this section.

**Sec. 19-10. STANDARDS FOR AMBULANCE PERSONNEL.**

Each ambulance attendant shall have a currently valid certificate evidencing successful completion of a course of training equivalent to the advanced course in first aid given by the American Red Cross and such other training as may be designated by the building director and made available by local medical societies without cost. Both driver and attendant shall be of sound physique and shall possess good eyesight. Each ambulance driver shall be at least 21 years of age and shall hold a currently valid chauffeur's license.

**Sec. 2.** This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9832**

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 21 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing Sections 21-4, 21-5, 21-10, 21-13, 21-15, 21-17 and 21-18 thereof and enacting new Sections 21-4, 21-5, 21-10, 21-13, 21-15, 21-17 and 21-18, by repealing Subchapter 3 thereof, entitled "Scavengers", being Sections 21-21 to 21-33, both inclusive, and enacting a new Subchapter 3 to be entitled "Contractors", being Sections 21-21 to 21-31, both inclusive, by adding thereto new sections to be known as Sections 21-20.01 and 21-20.02, and by repealing Section 21-20 thereof, all relating to sewage disposal.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That Chapter 21 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by repealing Sections 21-4, 21-5, 21-10, 21-13, 21-15, 21-17 and 21-18 thereof and enacting new Sections 21-4, 21-5, 21-10, 21-13, 21-15, 21-17 and 21-18, and by adding thereto new sections to be known as Sections 21-20.01 and 21-20.02, all relating to toilet facilities, as follows:

**Sec. 21-4. DETRIMENTAL USE OF PRIVIES, WELLS OR VAULTS; CORRECTIVE MEASURES.**

Whenever the use and maintenance of any privy, well or vault located

upon any premises in the city is found by the building director to be detrimental or dangerous to life or health he is authorized and empowered to prohibit its use upon any such premises, to order it to be disinfected and filled with fresh earth, to order a septic tank to be constructed upon any such premises and to order the plumbing installed in any building located upon such premises to be connected with and drained into a properly constructed septic tank.

**Sec. 21-5. NOTICE TO COMPLY.**

Whenever the public health or public safety requires that any lands, buildings or premises be connected with the public sewer or otherwise drained in the manner provided in section 21-4 of this code, the building director shall cause to be served upon the owner, agent or occupant of such premises, a notice in writing specifying the time within which the connection must be made, which shall not exceed 30 days from the date of notice.

**Sec. 21-10. CLEANING ON DISCONTINUANCE OF PRIVIES.**

Whenever the use of any cesspool or privy vault is discontinued it shall be cleaned and filled with clean earth, ashes or other suitable material designated by the building department.

**Sec. 21-13. CARE AND CLEANLINESS OF PRIVIES.**

All privy vaults and cesspools shall be kept clean at all times and the contents thereof shall not be permitted to accumulate within one foot of the surface of the ground at the tip of the vault. The door of the privy building shall not be allowed to remain open at any time unless there is a self-closing screen. No wash water, garbage, kitchen slops or liquid wastes of any kind shall be thrown into any privy vault, and no night soil from any person suffering from typhoid fever or other serious infection of the bowels or urinary tract shall be deposited in any privy vault or cesspool without being previously disinfected in such manner as may be approved by the attending physician or the building director.

**Sec. 21-15. NOTICE TO CLEAN PRIVY VAULTS.**

If the building director shall find a privy vault which has not been cleaned within a year, or a privy vault or cesspool, the contents of which are within one foot of the surface of the ground at the top of the vault, or a privy vault or cesspool found to be a health menace, source of filth, cause of sickness or otherwise a nuisance jeopardizing public health or safety, he shall order the same cleaned by notice in writing to be served on the owner and occupant of the premises upon which the vault is located.

**Sec. 21-17. CLEANING BY CITY; COSTS.**

If within three days after service of the notice referred to in section 21-15 of this code, the privy vault or cesspool has not been cleaned, the building director shall report the condition to the board of health. Thereafter the board of health may cause the privy vault or cesspool to be cleaned and certify the cost thereof to the county auditor for the purpose of assessing it against such property to be collected as other taxes.

**Sec. 21-18. HOURS OF WORK OF EMPTYING, CESSPOOLS.**

The cleaning, emptying and removing of the contents of privy vaults and cesspools shall be done between the hours of 6 A.M. and 7 P.M. All work done upon privy vaults or cesspools after the hours mentioned shall be done only by and with the consent of the building department.

**Sec. 21-20.01. REMOVING CESSPOOL CONTENTS.**

Contractors shall remove all of the contents of the privy vaults or cesspools and shall report to the department of public works all cases in which not all of the contents are or can be entirely removed and the reason therefor.

**Sec. 21-20.02. COMPLETING WORK AND LEAVING BUILDING IN GOOD CONDITION.**

Any contractor having begun any work shall without undue interruption or delay finish the same, and shall in every instance leave the privy building in as good condition upon the vault as when the work was undertaken.

**Sec. 2.** That Chapter 21 of said Code be further amended by repealing Section 21-20 thereof relating to dumping grounds.

**Sec. 3.** That Chapter 21 of said Code be further amended by repealing Subchapter 3 thereof, entitled "Scavengers", being Sections 21-21 to 21-33, both inclusive, and enacting a new Subchapter 3 to be entitled "Contractors", being Sections 21-21 to 21-31, both inclusive, relating to contractors, as follows:

**SUBCHAPTER 3. CONTRACTORS**  
**Sec. 21-21. CONTRACTOR DEFINED.**

Any person engaging in the activities permitted by this subchapter shall be referred to herein as contractor. Contractor shall be subject to the following limitations and conditions.

**Sec. 21-22. LICENSE.**

No person shall remove or transport the contents of any privy vault, cesspool, septic tanks, chemical toilets, or acceptable industrial wastes within the corporate limits of the city without first having procured a license as a contractor. Acceptable industrial waste shall conform to the provisions as outlined in the industrial waste regulations set out in subchapter 3 of chapter 16 of the Municipal Code.

**Sec. 21-23. ISSUANCE OF LICENSES.**

The contractor's license shall be issued by the license collector upon written application, upon which is endorsed the approval of the department of public works to the effect that the applicant is capable and in possession of the proper facilities for his business.

**Sec. 21-25. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO INSPECT, INVESTIGATE AND APPROVE.**

The department of public works, sewage treatment plant division, upon application, shall inspect the equipment of the applicant for a contractor's license and investigate his qualifications for complying with the conditions of this subchapter. If he is found to be qualified and has equipment necessary to conduct such business, approval of his application for a license shall be endorsed thereon by the department of public works.

**Sec. 21-25. LICENSE FEE AND BOND PREREQUISITE TO ISSUANCE.**

Upon filing an application, as required in this subchapter, and the payment of a fee of \$50.00 to the license collector for each vehicle used by the applicant in the exercise of his business as a contractor, and posting a bond with reasonable surety in the penal sum of \$5,000.00 for the faithful compliance with the provisions of this subchapter, the license collector shall issue a license to the applicant, which shall expire on the 30th day of June next after its issuance.

**Sec. 21-26. TRANSFERABILITY OF LICENSE.**

Licenses for contractors shall not be transferable.

**Sec. 21-27. FORFEITURE OF LICENSE.**

Any licensed contractor who violates any rules or regulations of the department of public works shall subject his license to forfeiture by order of the city council.

**Sec. 21-28. SIGNS ON TRUCKS.**

Each vehicle used in the conveyance of the material outlined in section 21-22 of this code shall have signs displayed on each side of the truck body. Such signs shall be furnished by the city department of public works and shall bear the license number and the year issued. Such signs shall not be displayed on contractor equipment until approved by the department of public works.

**Sec. 21-29. HOURS OF WORK.**

Every contractor desiring to do work after 7 P.M. shall make written or verbal request to the department of public health at least 24 hours in advance of the date the work is to be performed. The request shall state the location of the property, the name of the owner and the hour the work is to be commenced.

**Sec. 21-30. TRANSPORT VEHICLES.**

Each vehicle used in the conveyance of materials outlined in section 21-22 of this code shall be water tight, tank truck style

approved by the department of public works, sewage treatment plant division. All vehicles shall be kept clean and all valve fittings, hoses and equipment shall be maintained to prevent leakage of contents.

**Sec. 21-31. DISPOSAL STATION.**

Contractors shall dispose of material permitted in this subchapter at the location designated by the department of public works, sewage treatment plant division. Contractors shall maintain this location in a clean, orderly condition to avoid noxious odors.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**ORDINANCE 9833**

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing Section 5-5 and subsection (a) of Section 5-11 thereof and enacting a new Section 5-5 and a new subsection (a) of Section 5-11, relating to alcoholic beverages.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by repealing Section 5-5 and subsection (a) of Section 5-11 thereof and enacting a new Section 5-5 and a new subsection (a) of Section 5-11, relating to alcoholic beverages, as follows:

**Sec. 5-5. CONDITIONS AND REGULATIONS FOR APPROVAL OF LICENSE OR PERMIT.**

The following conditions and regulations must be met by an applicant for a liquor control license or beer permit:

(1) The applicant must consent in writing on the application, that members of the fire and police departments and the building inspector may enter upon the premises without warrant to inspect for violations of the provisions of state law and of this chapter.

(2) The premises for which a beer permit or liquor license is sought must be located within an area where such business is permitted by the city zoning ordinance and must otherwise conform to the zoning requirements of this city.

(3) The premises of a class "B" beer permit shall, at the time of the application, continue to be equipped with sufficient tables and seats to accommodate 25 persons at one time.

(4) All permits and licenses provided for in this chapter shall be displayed in a conspicuous place on the premises of the permit or license holder and at all times shall be subject to inspection.

(5) No liquor control license or beer permit shall be approved for premises which do not conform to all applicable laws, ordinances, resolutions, and health and fire regulations.

(6) No licensee shall have or maintain any interior access to residential or sleeping quarters unless permission is granted by the director in the form of a living quarters permit.

(7) No signs or advertisements advertising beer or liquor or relating to the sale thereof shall be lighted within or on the premises where beer or liquor is sold when such premises are not legally open for the sale of beer or liquor.

(8) No loud or boisterous language shall be permitted in any place where beer or liquor is sold

and such place shall be conducted in a quiet and orderly manner.

(9) No state liquor store shall be located within 300 feet of a public or private educational institution unless a lesser distance is specifically authorized by ordinance.

(10) Class "C" permits shall conform with the following:

(i) No permit or license herein provided for, other than a class "C" beer permit, shall be granted to applicants whose premises are within a church or school area as herein set out:

(A) In fire zones Nos. 1 and 2, as now established by chapter 11 of this code.

(I) Within 150 feet if applicant's place of business and the church or school front upon the same street.

(II) Within 75 feet if applicant's place of business fronts upon a different street than that upon which the church or school fronts.

(B) Outside fire zones Nos. 1 and 2:

(I) Within 300 feet if applicant's place of business and the church or school front upon the same street.

(II) Within 150 feet if applicant's place of business fronts upon a different street than that upon which the church or school fronts.

(ii) No class "C" permits herein provided for shall be granted to applicants whose premises are within 150 feet if applicant's place of business and the church or school front upon the same street, and within 75 feet if applicant's place of business fronts upon a different street than that upon which the church or school fronts.

(iii) In determining the distances set out in this section, measurements shall be taken on a direct line from the main entrance of the premises upon which the place of business of an applicant for a permit or license is located, and over which such applicant has control, to the point on the property line of the parcel or parcels of real estate upon which the church or school building is situated which is closest to the said main entrance of the said premises of such applicant. Measurements shall be taken on a direct line from the main entrance of the building or storeroom occupied by the place of business of an applicant for a class "C" permit, and over which such applicant has control, to the point on the property line of the parcel or parcels of real estate upon which the church or school building is situated which is closest to the said main entrance of the said building or storeroom of such applicant. These area restrictions shall not affect the right of present permit or license holders who have qualified under the main entrance to main entrance rule heretofore in effect or their successors by purchase from renewing their permits or licenses in their present locations.

(11)(i) Except in the geographic areas identified in section 8-19 of this code as fire zones 1 and 2, neither new permits or licenses nor transfers of existing permits or licenses, other than class "C" beer permits, will be granted for locations not currently operating under a permit or license, unless 75 percent of the property abutting on both sides of the same street as the premises for which the license or permit is requested and extending 200 feet to the right and left from the center point of such premises facing such street is either currently put to a commercial use or is commercially zoned by the Des Moines zoning ordinance.

(ii) In measuring the above distances, right-of-way of intersecting city streets and alleys shall be excluded.

(iii) Where the premises involved are located on a corner lot at the intersection of two streets, it will be sufficient if the usage or zoning so measured along either intersecting street meets the requirements of subparagraph (i) hereinabove.

(12) The area restrictions hereinabove set forth shall not affect the right of present permit or license holders or their successors by purchase from renewing their permits or licenses in their present locations. No property whose principal structure shall be used wholly or in part for residence purposes shall be deemed "actually devoted to commercial uses" unless more than 50 percent of the

gross floor area of the structure shall be devoted to the commercial use.

(13) The above provisions concerning the location of new or transferred permits and licenses shall not apply in the case of an application for permit or license by a college or university where 75 percent of the real estate, exclusive of street right-of-way, within 200 feet of the structure for which the permit or license is sought is owned by the college or university.

**Sec. 5-11. INVESTIGATION OF APPLICANT AND PREMISES.**

(a) Upon receipt of an original application for a liquor license or beer permit by the city clerk, information shall be forwarded to the chief of police, who shall conduct an investigation and shall submit a written report on the applicant as to the truth of the facts averred in the application. It shall be the duty of the building inspector and the fire chief to inspect the premises to determine if they conform to the requirements of the city, and no license or permit shall be approved until or unless a report has been filed with the city council by such officers.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9835**

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 16 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, as amended by Ordinance No. 9675, passed January 8, 1980, by repealing Subchapter 1 thereof, entitled "Air Pollution", being Sections 16-1 to 16-64, both inclusive, and enacting a new Subchapter 1 to be entitled "Open Burning", being Sections 16-1 and 16-2, by repealing Sections 16-78, 16-93, 16-94, 16-108 and 16-135 thereof and enacting new Sections 16-78, 16-93, 16-94, 16-108 and 16-135, all relating to pollution control, and repealing Ordinance No. 9675.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That Chapter 16 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, as amended by Ordinance No. 9675, passed January 8, 1980, be and is hereby amended by repealing

Subchapter 1 thereof, entitled "Air Pollution", being Sections 16-1 to 16-64, both inclusive, and enacting a new Subchapter 1 to be entitled "Open Burning", being Sections 16-1 and 16-2, as follows:

**SUBCHAPTER 1. OPEN BURNING**

**Sec. 16-1. DEFINITIONS.**

Unless otherwise expressly stated or the context clearly indicates a different intention, the following terms shall, for the purpose of this subchapter, have the meanings in this section.

"Health officer" means the director of the Polk County Health Center or any employee or representative authorized by such officer.

"Open burning" means the burning of any material wherein air contaminants resulting from combustion are emitted directly into the ambient air without passing through a stack or chimney from an enclosed chamber. For the purpose of this definition, a chamber shall be regarded as enclosed, when during the time combustion takes place, only such apertures, ducts, stacks, flues or chimneys as are necessary to provide combustion air and to permit the escape of exhaust gases are open.

"Refuse" means garbage, rubbish, and all other putrescible and nonputrescible wastes, except sewage and water-carried trade wastes.

**Sec. 16-2. OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED.**

(a) No person shall open burn or allow the open burning of any refuse within the city of Des Moines. Except as provided below, this includes all waste paper, boxes, market wastes, garden wastes, trees, tree limbs, automobiles and any other material other than that used as a fuel in a furnace, fireplace or boiler.

(b) The city manager may permit the residential burning of leaves, twigs, small tree branches, and similar types of plant material, on the premises where grown or deposited by the elements. This burning may only take place between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. daily each year during the period commencing October 15th and ending December 15th and during the period commencing April 1st and ending May 15th. However, when the city manager, on the advice of the health officer, determines that the burning may create a health hazard due to atmospheric conditions, he or she may order additional pollution monitoring or ban open burning under this subsection or order any combination of the above actions.

(c) During other than the above stated periods, the health officer may permit open fires for the following purposes and subject to the stated conditions:

(1) City crews operating under the authority of the public works department.

(2) For public gatherings under the legitimate sponsorship of civic, fraternal, religious, educational or similar organizations. The health officer shall not grant authorization for an open fire when the fire chief has prohibited outdoor fires under section 11-13 of this code.

(d) The fire chief may permit open fires for the following purposes and subject to the stated conditions:

(1) For the instruction of public employees in the methods of fighting fires.

(2) On private property used for industrial purposes for the instruction of employees in the methods of fighting fires.

(e) This section shall not apply to outdoor fireplaces or barbecue grills used solely for entertainment or the noncommercial preparation of food. Fireplaces and grills may not be used for burning refuse or other wastes.

Sec. 2. That Chapter 16 of said Code be further amended by repealing Section 16-78 thereof and enacting a new Section 16-78 relating to anti-litter, as follows:

**Sec. 16-78. CLEARING OF LITTER FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY BY CITY.**

(a) Notice to remove. The building director is hereby authorized and empowered to notify the owner of any open or

vacant private property within the city or the agent of such owner to properly dispose of litter located on such owner's property which is dangerous to public health, safety, or welfare. Such notice shall be by certified mail addressed to the owner at his last known address.

**(b) Action upon noncompliance.**

Upon the failure, neglect or refusal of any owner or agent so notified, to properly dispose of litter dangerous to the public health, safety, or welfare within a time set by the building director or his designee, after receipt of written notice provided for in subsection (a) of this section, or within this set time after the date of such notice, in the event the notice is returned to the city post office department because of inability to make delivery thereof, provided the notices was properly addressed to the last known address of such owner or agent, the building director is hereby authorized and empowered to pay for the disposing of such litter or to order its disposal by the city.

**(c) Assessment of costs, schedule of assessments, notice to property owners, adoption of schedule of assessments, certificate for collection and allocation of costs.**

When the city has effected the removal of litter from private property or has paid for its removal, the actual cost of removal of such litter shall be paid by the owner of the property and shall be assessed against such property and collected as set forth in sections 23-168 to 23-173 of this code, in the same manner as provided for the removal of snow and ice from sidewalks.

Sec. 3. That Chapter 16 of said Code be further amended by repealing Sections 16-93, 16-94, and 16-108 thereof and enacting new Sections 16-93, 16-94 and 16-108 relating to solid waste, as follows:

**Sec. 16-93. ENFORCEMENT OF SUBCHAPTER.**

The director of public works shall enforce the provisions of this subchapter.

**Sec. 16-94. DEFINITIONS.**

Unless otherwise expressly stated or the context clearly indicates a different intention, the following terms shall, for the purpose of this subchapter, have the meanings in this section.

"Agency" means the Des Moines Metropolitan Area Solid Waste Agency.

"Director" means the director of public works of the city of Des Moines, Iowa or any authorized employee or representative who shall have responsibility for administering and enforcing this subchapter.

"Disposal site" means a sanitary landfill transfer station or other facility for receiving or disposing of solid waste.

"Multiple chamber incinerator" means any incinerator used to dispose of combustible refuse by burning, consisting of three or more refractory lined combustion furnaces in series, physically separated by refractory walls, interconnected by gas passage ports or ducts and employing adequate design parameters necessary for maximum combustion of the material to be burned, the refractories having a Pyrometric Cone Equivalent of 31, tested according to the method described in the American Society for Testing and Materials, Method C-24-56.

"Owner" in addition to the record titleholder, includes any person residing in, renting, leasing, occupying, operating or transacting business in any premises, and as between such parties the duties, responsibilities, liabilities and obligations hereinafter imposed shall be joint and several.

"Person" means and includes an individual or group or association of individuals; a firm or any member thereof; a corporation, or any executive officer, manager, person in charge or employee thereof; and the use of a pronoun specifying the masculine gender shall include the feminine and neuter gender.

"Residential premises" means and includes single family dwellings and any multiple family dwelling up to and including four separate family quarters. Garden type apartments and row type

housing units shall be considered residential premises regardless of the total number of such apartments or units which may be included in a given housing development.

"Solid waste" means useless, unwanted or discarded materials resulting from commercial, industrial, domestic and agricultural operations and other normal community activities. Wastes which are solid or semi-solid containing insufficient liquid to be free-flowing are considered to be solid wastes; and include in part the following: garbage; rubbish; ashes and other residue of incineration; street refuse or sweepings; dead animals; solid animal waste; decrepit automobiles and parts thereof; agricultural, commercial and industrial wastes; construction and demolition wastes; sewage treatment solid residue.

**Sec. 16-108. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS.**

No person shall deposit in a solid waste container or otherwise offer for city collection any hazardous solid waste. Hazardous materials shall be transported by the owner, responsible person or his agent, to a place of safe deposit or disposal as prescribed by the director of public works or his authorized representative which place of deposit or disposal may in exceptional cases be a place other than an agency operated site or may be otherwise subjected to special condition or limitations. Hazardous materials shall include: explosive materials, rags or other wastes soaked in volatile and inflammable materials; drugs, poisons; radio active materials; highly combustible materials; soiled dressings, clothing, bedding and/or other wastes, contaminated by infection or contagious disease; and other materials which may present a special hazard to collection or disposal personnel or equipment or to the public.

Sec. 4. That Chapter 16 of said Code be further amended by repealing Section 16-135 thereof and enacting a new Section 16-135 relating to water, as follows:

**Sec. 16-135. ENFORCEMENT.**

The building department, all police officers and all officers of the fire department, so far as they have authority under the ordinances of the city, shall enforce the observance of this subchapter.

Sec. 5. That Ordinance No. 8675, passed January 8, 1980, be and is hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by repealing Section 17-60 and subsections (b) and (e) of Section 17-63 thereof and enacting a new Section 17-60 and subsections (b) and (e) of Section 17-63, relating to massage technicians and establishments.

Be It ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by repealing Section 17-60 and subsections (b) and (e) of Section 17-63 thereof and enacting a new Section 17-60 and subsections (b) and (e) of Section 17-63, relating to massage technicians and establishments, as follows:

**Sec. 17-60. DEFINITIONS.**

Unless otherwise expressly stated or the context clearly indicates a different intention, the following terms shall, for the purpose of this subchapter, have the meanings in this section.

"Applicant." The term applicant means any person defined in section 1-2 of this code applying for a license to operate or conduct a massage business and in addition thereto shall include all partners in a partnership and all stockholders of a corporation where the controlling interest of the corporation is held by five or less persons or legal entities.

"Director." The term means the building director of the city or his duly authorized representative.

"Massage establishment." The term massage establishment means any place of business wherein any of the treatments, techniques, or method of treatment referred to in the definition of "massage or massage service" are administered, practiced, used, given or applied.

"Massage or massage service." The term massage or massage service means any method of treating the external parts of the body, consisting of rubbing, stroking, kneading, tapping, or vibrating; such treatments being performed by the hand or any other body parts, or by any mechanical or electrical instrument.

"Massage patron." The term massage patron means any person who receives, or pays to receive, a massage or massage services from a massage technician for value.

"Massage technician." The term massage technician means any person who engages in the business of performing massage services on or for other persons by use of any or all of the treatments, techniques or methods of treatment referred to in the definition of "massage or massage service".

"Person of good moral character" as used in this subchapter shall mean any person who meets all of the following requirements:

(1) He has such financial standing and good reputation as will satisfy the issuing authority that he will comply with this subchapter and all laws, ordinances, and regulations applicable to his operations under this subchapter.

(2) He has not held a license under this subchapter which has been revoked during the year last preceding the date of application.

(3) He has not been convicted of a felony involving moral turpitude. However, if this conviction of a felony occurred more than five years before the date of the application for a license, and if his rights of citizenship have been restored by the governor, the issuing authority may determine that he is a person of good moral character notwithstanding such conviction.

**Sec. 17-63. LICENSES FOR MASSAGE BUSINESS.**

(a) Application procedures. Any person, firm or corporation seeking a license to operate a massage establishment shall make application to the city permit clerk. The permit clerk shall cause an investigation of such application to be made by the police department to determine if such applicant is of good moral character. The permit clerk shall also cause an investigation to be made by the fire department and building department to determine that all requirements of this subchapter have been satisfied and that the applicant has fully complied with all applicable ordinances and regulations relating to buildings, zoning, fire and health.

**Sec. 17-63. LICENSES FOR MASSAGE BUSINESS.**

(e) Issuance of license. The building, fire, and police departments shall make written reports of their investigations and shall submit such reports to the city permit clerk within 45 days of the date of the application, who shall place the matter before the city clerk. If the city clerk finds that the applicant has fully complied with all requirements of this subchapter and all applicable ordinances and codes regulating, fire, buildings, health and zoning, and that the applicant is of good moral character, then the city clerk shall approve the application

and shall authorize the issuance of a license to conduct a massage business at the location designated in the application. Said license shall expire one year from date of issuance. In the event that the city clerk determines that the applicant has not fully complied with all the requirements of this subchapter for a new or a renewal license, or any other applicable ordinances or codes regulating fire, buildings, health or zoning, or may not be of good moral character, or may have falsified his or her application, then the city clerk shall, after consultation with the legal department, advise the city council of the basis for questioning the applicant's qualifications, and the procedures for notice and hearing as set forth in section 17-64 of this code shall apply before the license shall issue.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

**Sec. 18-45. ASSESSMENT CREDIT REQUIRED.**

(a) In connection with its community development program, the City of Des Moines has allocated from funds made available by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, a sum sufficient to provide a credit, in accordance with criteria and limitations hereinafter set out, to homeowners resident within the corporate limits of the city of Des Moines whose homes are located on parcels assessed for certain projects for the construction of sanitary, storm and combined sewers, street grading, paving, curbing and guttering. Such credit shall be subject to the City's receipt of the required environmental release of funds from HUD for each respective public improvement assessment subsidy.

**Sec. 18-48. ELIGIBILITY FOR CREDIT.**

(a) The city finance director shall certify eligibility and requisition payment of a credit equal to 100 percent of the assessment, plus interest, for public improvement, except with regard to persons referred to in subsection (c) of this section when all of the following items of criteria are fully met:

**ORDINANCE NO. 9838**

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 6 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, by changing the title of Subchapter 3 thereof to read "Gamerooms, Bowling Alleys and Amusement Devices", and by repealing Sections 6-27, 6-30, 6-31, 6-34, 6-35, and 6-37 thereof and enacting new Sections 6-27, 6-30, 6-31, 6-34, 6-35 and 6-37, relating to the regulation of gamerooms, bowling alleys and amusement devices.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That Chapter 6 of the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, adopted by Ordinance No. 9616, passed July 23, 1979, be and is hereby amended by changing the title of Subchapter 3 thereof to read "Gamerooms, Bowling Alleys and Amusement Devices", and by repealing Sections 6-27, 6-30, 6-31, 6-34, 6-35 and 6-37 thereof and enacting new Sections 6-27, 6-30, 6-31, 6-34, 6-35 and 6-37, relating to the regulation of gamerooms, bowling alleys and amusement devices, as follows:

**SUBCHAPTER 3. GAMEROOMS, BOWLING ALLEYS AND AMUSEMENT DEVICES**

Sec. 6-27. DEFINITIONS.  
Unless otherwise expressly stated or the context clearly indicates a different intention, the following

terms shall, for the purpose of this subchapter, have the meanings set forth in this section.

"Amusement devices" means any type of game or entertainment device or table including, but not limited to pool, billiards, snooker or ping pong tables, pinball machines, electronic games, and juke boxes, which can be played by any number of participants. The term also includes any coin-operated or slug-operated or electronically, electrically or mechanically controlled still or motion picture machine, projector, or other image-producing device maintained to show images to five or fewer persons per machine at any one time.

"Bowling Alley" means any commercial establishment where the game of bowling or ten pins is played.

"Gameroom" means any commercial establishment featuring amusement devices for use by the public for a fee. The term "gameroom" does not include single family residences having such machines nor does it include games, gamerooms or recreation rooms of multiple family residences provided the use of such rooms and the machines or tables contained therein is restricted to the residents thereof or their guests.

**Sec. 6-30. LICENSE FEES.**

The license fee for the gameroom or bowling alley under the provisions of this subchapter shall be as follows:

- (1) For the first amusement device, \$25.00 per year.
- (2) For the second and all other additional amusement devices, \$5.00 for each device per year.
- (3) For each indoor bowling alley bed or lane the sum of \$50.00 per year shall be charged and \$6.00 per year shall be charged for each additional bowling alley bed or lane, if located in the same hall or place.

All license fees must be paid prior to receipt of the license by the applicant.

**Sec. 6-31. LICENSE DURATION.**

(a) All licenses issued pursuant to this subchapter shall expire on December 31st of the year of issuance.

**Sec. 6-34. HOURS OF OPERATION.**

A gameroom which has more than three amusement devices on the premises but does not have a liquor license or a beer permit shall not be open or permit patrons inside such premises between the hours of 1 a.m. and 6 a.m. Gamerooms having liquor licenses or beer permits shall not be open or permit patrons to play or operate amusement devices for a fee between the hours of 2 A.M. and 6 A.M.

**Sec. 6-35. DISORDERLY CONDUCT.**

No gameroom or bowling alley licensee or employee or agent thereof shall permit such licensed premises to become or be disorderly. The term "disorderly" as used herein means permitting or allowing any of the following on the premises, its parking area, or on property contiguous to the licensed premises, where the disorderly conduct was initiated or commenced, and permitted to continue, on the licensed premises:

- (1) fights or affrays,
- (2) disturbance of the peace and quiet,
- (3) consumption of alcoholic liquor or beer by persons under legal age for consumption of such beverages,
- (4) disposal of trash or litter on public streets or sidewalks contiguous to the licensed premises,
- (5) trespassing upon private property,
- (6) gambling in violation of chapters 99B and 725 of the Code of Iowa,
- (7) consumption of alcoholic liquor or beer during the hours the premises are open for business, unless such licensee also holds a valid liquor license or beer permit for those premises,
- (8) pimping, pandering, or prostitution in violation of chapter 725 of the Code of Iowa or chapter 17 of the Municipal Code,
- (9) public indecent exposure in violation of chapter 17 of the Municipal Code,
- (10) any other violation of state

or municipal law affecting the health, safety, welfare or morals of the community.

**Sec. 6-37. SUSPENSION OR REVOCATION OF LICENSE.**

(a) Any license issued pursuant to this subchapter may be suspended or revoked for violations of this subchapter. No suspension or revocation shall issue except upon notice delivered to the licensee by mailing the notice in the regular mail addressed to the licensee at the licensed premises, a minimum of ten days prior to the date set for hearing before the council. Such notice shall inform the licensee of the time, date and place of hearing, the purpose of the hearing, and shall set out briefly the reasons therefor.

(b) If, after such hearing, the city council makes a finding based on substantial evidence that a violation of this subchapter did in fact take place as alleged, the city council may suspend or revoke the license; the determination of whether to suspend or revoke such license shall be in the discretion of the city council and shall be dependent upon the circumstances surrounding the violation and its severity.

(c) A licensee whose license has been revoked shall not be eligible for another such license for a period of 180 days after such revocation. Any premises having its license revoked shall not be re-licensed under this subchapter for a period of 180 days after such revocation.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.
