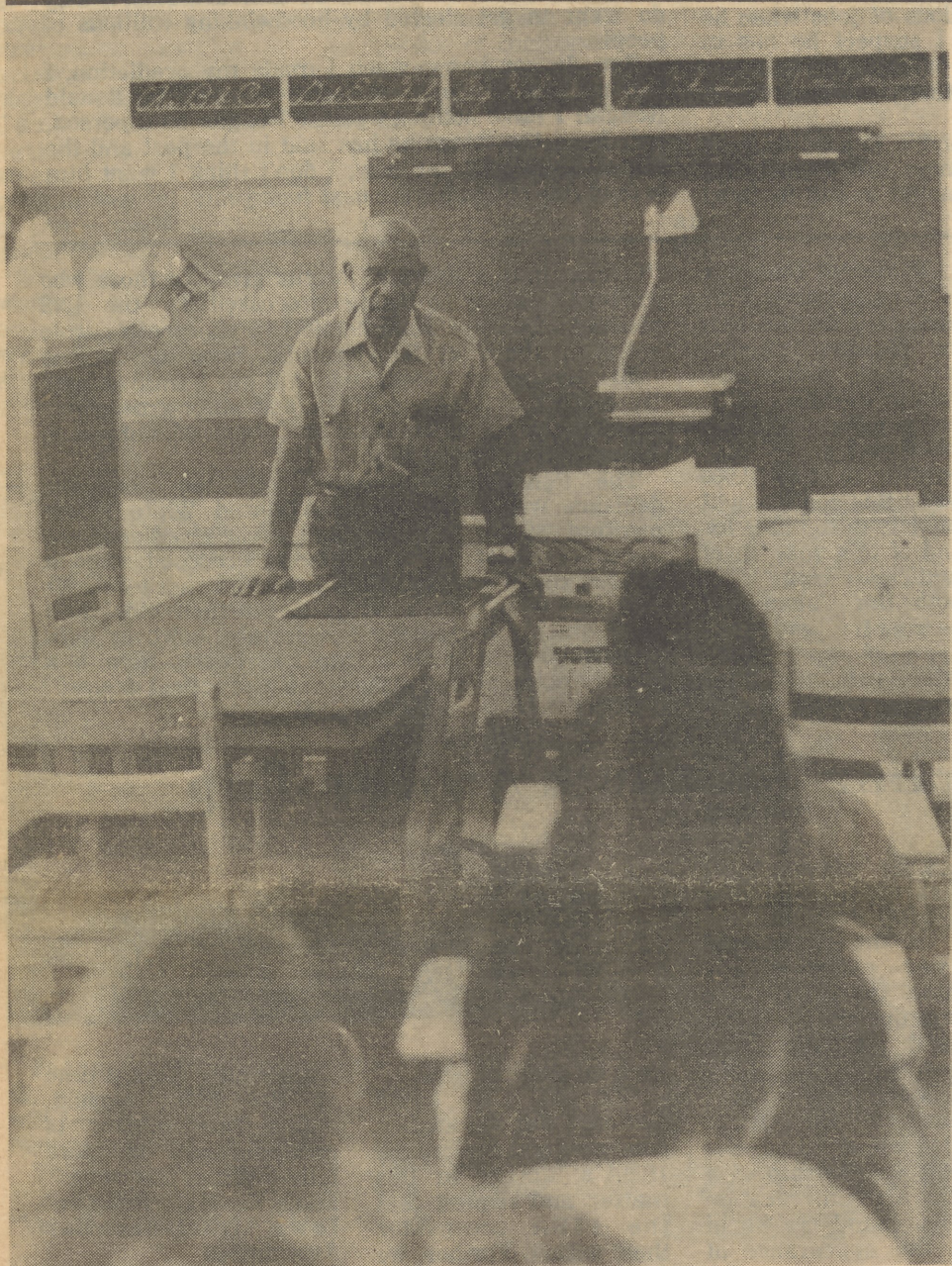

The Langston Hughes Company of Players opened its Fall tour with a performance of the production of "For Colored Girls..." by Ntozake Shange in Decatur, Illinois, for the Decatur Arts Council.

Anionette Simmons, Director of the Neighborhood Arts Program, hosted the Company. Simmons was a former librarian, at the Mid-City Library in Des Moines.

Next stop was the University of Northern Iowa, Ethnic Minority Cultural and Educational Center, Cedar Falls, Iowa, succeeded by Wartburg College, sponsored by The Black

Association Council Organization.

The production will be featured in the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, MN 40th Annual Celebration of Coffman Memorial Union, at Creighton University, Omaha, NEB, Grinnell College, Grinnell, Iowa. The OFF OFF BROADWAY THEATER, in Esterville, Iowa, & Simpson College, Indianola, Ia.

Included in this year's season tour is a musical excerpt from the long running Broadway production THE WIZ, "If you Believe." The choreopoem depicts the positive aspects of being female and related some of the dramatic experiences of the life styles, attributes and

inner personal relationships of women.

"If you believe, in yourself," culminates the theme of self-survival, understanding, getting and staying in touch with self. If one loves and believes in self, life's problems and obstacles can be coped with better.

The production also carries the flavor and artistic style of choreographer Dorian Williams-Burd, a masters candidate in the University of Iowa School of Dance.

## Vivian Receives Simpson Carver Award Oct. 16

Dr. C.T. Vivian, human race relations specialist, has been selected to receive the 1980 George Washington Carver Distinguished African American Lecture Award At Simpson College, Indianola.

Vivian, who is also an author and lecturer, will

deliver the sixth annual Carver address at 7:30 pm., Thursday, October 16, in Camp Lounge of the Brenton Student Center on the Campus.

Sponsored by the Ethnic and Minority Studies Program, the Office of Minority Affairs and the Simpson Forum, the talk is free

to the public.

Named for the noted black scientist, who attended Simpson in the

1890's, the Carver Award is intended to recognize persons for their personal achievements and their work at improving race relations in society.

Recipients are selected by a committee composed of college officials and faculty members.

Vivian presently serves as board chairman of the Black Action Strategies and Information Center Inc., in Atlanta, Georgia. This is the parent Corp. for the creation and development of religious education, human rights, and cultural programs projects and materials designed to solve basic minority-majority problems and conditions.

Prior to this position he was Dean of the Alternative Seminary Without Walls, for the Shaw U. Divinity School in Raleigh, N. Carolina. He served on Dr. Martin Luther Kings' staff of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

# IEWS and REVIEWS

About two years ago I wrote that I thought President Jimmy Carter would be a one term president. Now I am anxious to see how that prediction turns out.

This whole campaign hasn't really been a presidential campaign on the issues. Each man seems to make his issue the other fellow.

According to Reagan, Carter is either a liar or a crook, and according to the president, Reagan is afraid to come out and say anything on the real issues because he might put his foot in his mouth. And there you have it.

Reagan says he has a program that will aid black unemployed much more than the plans of the Democrats. That is to strengthen the entire economy and blacks will automatically benefit.

That was the strength of Roosevelt's New Deal. It dealt with people and wasn't limited to any particular group except the unemployed and those who were just barely getting by. But what happened then was that the black worker was the last to be hired, and when the unions became strong, they excluded blacks.

So if it had not been for WWII, nobody knows what would have happened to black workers. Now does anybody think that if the economy did get straightened out, black workers would get a fair shot at things. You know damned well they won't.

With all the millions of people out of work, the companies will take care of their white workers first, because they in most cases would have the most seniority. So, no matter how good the Reagan plan looks on paper and sounds from the platform, it won't mean too much to blacks who are out of jobs.

I don't know what President Carter means when he says that there will be millions of jobs when he addresses black workers, but I suspect he has in mind some sort of government programs. These are fine, but they can't replace a steady job that we all need.


And we can probably look for Sir Ronald to start dismantling all the government work and aid programs in much the same manner as did Richard

Nixon. Nixon tried to keep it on a low key, but nearly destroyed HEW and similar programs, and tried to hold up money to implement a school busing program that might have worked a lot smoother if he had backed as did President Eisenhower. Who said that he didn't agree with the Supreme Court decisions, they had to be enforced, and did just that.

I can't believe that either candidate would have the guts to do that today; make such an unpopular choice. You can know that by the way they run around making statements about the rights of the silent or moral majority.

Nothing looks more disgusting to me than to see a candidate wrap himself in an American flag, and wear a hatband of the same material as if he were the only American running. In spite of their differences, and what we think of them, all of the people running are Americans and I believe they all have the welfare of the country at heart, even if they do want to get elected by hoodwinking millions of people.

But, do you know, when I made my prediction, I had no idea that our next choice would be Ronald Reagan I have nothing against Reagan as a person, but, from the things he has said in the past and the things he doesn't say now, I don't think I want him to lead our nation for the next four years.



## Thoughts and Comments

It was reported by the news media several weeks ago that the federal government announced it would be consolidating most of the remaining Cuban refugees and known Haitian refugees at Fort Chafee. It also announced that it would move the two current refugee processing centers out of Florida. The problem with-in the refugee camps, the murder of a white woman sponsor allegedly committed by the Cuban refugee she sponsored, and the likelihood that some of the Cubans will remain indefinite wards of the government, have caused considerable resentment by members of the majority population toward the federal government.

Further, it currently costs the federal government a million dollars a week to run the camps and processing centers, and estimates of the total cost of the refugee efforts in this year alone run as high as 400 million dollars. Additionally, some federal officials estimate that it will cost an additional 65 million dollars next year to take care of those Cubans and Haitians who are not placed. Most recently (within last week) the Cuban-Haitian

Refugee Task Force, created by President Carter to deal with the issue, confirmed a report that Fort Allen Puerto Rico, has been designed as the new reception site for Cuban and Haitian refugees beginning October 15. After that date, they announced, all of the new arrivals in Florida will be sent to Fort Allen, and will not be transferred to any center within the continental United States.

It was expected that by October 15, the 10,000 Cubans now held at four centers in this country will have shrunk below the 10,000 capacity designated for Fort Chafee, and that by the end of this year all of them will have found sponsors and cleared out.

This decision will affect both the Cuban and Haitian refugees already in this country, and those who continue to arrive at the rate of two to three hundred daily. It was also reported that consideration was being given to revoking the

"Cuban-Haitian Entrant" status given to those who arrived and were being processed by the INS proceedings as of June 19, 1980 (a six-month parole entitling them to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) assistance, Medicaid, Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), and other emergency assistance) of any Haitians or Cubans who object to being sent to Puerto Rico.

The Pentagon immediately objected when the decision was announced at a closed White House meeting, saying that they had never envisioned the massive use of Fort Allen being proposed when it offered the site to the White House as an alternative spot for holding some refugees, but their objections were quickly overruled. It is certain, however, that this decision to locate refugees in Puerto Rico, is a strictly political one, rather than a practical one.

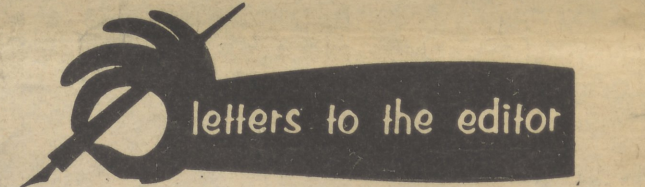
The Iowa National Bar Association and its members are dismayed and shocked over the recent disclosure that the Iowa State Bar Association is sponsoring a trip to the county of South Africa.

We feel that the sponsorship of such an event violates the spirit and practice of American jurisprudence as adhered to by the ISBA. Why would an organization whose principles provide for "justice for all" court a country where the majority of its inhabitants are not even citizens and are judged by the color of their skin?

Your literature announcing this "Grand Venture" paints an inaccurate and distorted picture of life in South Africa. The statement that South Africa is a "uniquely progressive democratic country" is not believable by South Africans themselves.

Does the ISBA endorse apartheid, minority

ruse, or slavery? We are of the opinion that the ISBA does not, but just as the cannons of lawyer responsibility prohibit the appearance of impropriety, the ISBA should refrain from appearing to tacitly endorse the racist policies of South Africa. It is clear that the ISBA's sponsorship of a South African vacation for its members would give the appearance of



such an endorsement.

We of the Iowa National Bar Association condemn and deplore the ISBA's action in this matter and request that the ISBA reconsider their action. Further, we

respectfully request time on the ISBA agenda, when this matter is reconsidered, to more fully address this issue.

# DM Police Cadet Recruitment Effort Announced

Des Moines Chief Police Billie Wallace has announced a recruitment program for additional police cadets. The Des Moines City Council has authorized the department to recruit 11 additional cadets.

Wallace is targeting his affirmative action efforts toward young minority men and

women, recently graduated from high school who have not yet chosen a career.

The Cadet Program provides an opportunity to examine police work to determine whether to be a police officer.

Only "qualified" applicants are chosen for the police officer position; however,

during a recruitment period they can hire someone who may not be "qualified" but is "qualifiable". There are special courses in English and other areas to make them qualified individuals by age 21.

It will allow participants to get a broad view of the department and after the minimum two-year

period, they will be eligible to become a Police Officer. Over the past 10 years, most beginning police officers started as cadets. The starting salary is \$10,700 with annual increments up to \$12,900.

Publicity for the recruitment of Police Cadets is aimed to stimulate interest of ministers, community leaders, school teachers, and other people in a position to seek out applicants and suggest minorities and women, to examine the program. Some of the responsibilities a cadet has: directing traffic, writing tickets, working in community, answering the phone in detective bureau. The cadet, can observe the work of a police officer for a year or two. Any interested applicants could contact City Personnel and/or Willie Robinson at 283-4213. The deadline for applicants will be October 27 at 5 P.M.

Willie Robinson, the Equal Employment

Officer for the City of Des Moines, emphasized the effort to recruit minorities and women for the cadet position in an effort to reach affirmative action goals. Robinson stated they did not reach affirmative action goals during the police recruiting period. The City will be developing new goals for

next year. Robinson stated "the salary is good, it would be a good training program and has excellent possibilities for the future. It is an experience to determine whether or not you want to be a police officer. If we can bring minorities and women on board during this recruitment program, this will help reach our goals next year."

1849 Forest Ave. — to hear community comments regarding crime in the minority communities.



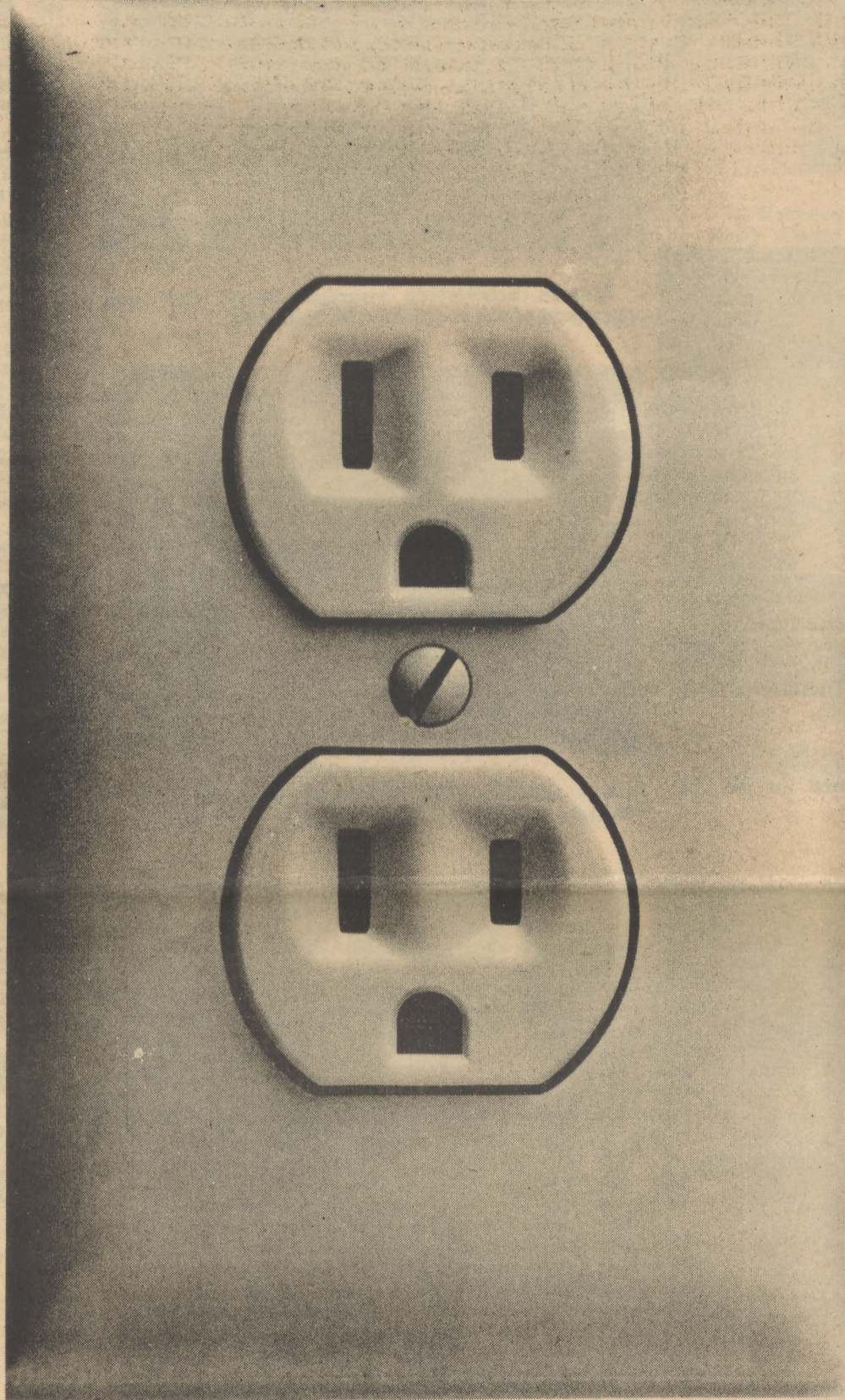

# ELECTRICITY CAN STOP YOU DEAD!



Electricity is a good friend. You've grown up with it and probably take it pretty much for granted.

But electricity can turn on you. And if you don't treat it with respect, it can stop you dead!

Whenever you use electricity, think about what you're doing and follow these "rules to live by."

#### Hands off!

NEVER touch any power line. If you're up on the roof working with guywires, or using a ladder or scaffold, keep yourself and your equipment well away from overhead power lines. And to be on the safe side, assume any line you see is loaded with potentially deadly electrical energy.

#### Downed lines

If you see a line that's down, following a severe storm or accident, keep well away from it. Post someone responsible to keep others at a safe distance while you notify Iowa Power and the police.

#### In your car

If a power line should fall on your car as the result of an accident or storm, stay inside the car! If you remain inside your vehicle, you are well-insulated against electrical shock. But if you step outside or if any part of your body or clothing touches the ground, you could be electrocuted instantly. Teach every member of your family this life-saving rule.

#### Adequate wiring

Today, the majority of homes are inadequately wired. For the most part, this is because we're all using more electrical equipment and appliances than ever before. Have your wiring checked by a qualified electrician to be sure it's adequate for the task required and that it meets current safety standards.

#### Eliminate unsafe conditions

Replace frayed or bare cords with new ones. Eliminate "octopus" outlets. Keep all combustibles away

from lamps and heating devices. And never allow children to play with or misuse electrical appliances or to play around outlets.

#### Water and electricity

The kitchen and the bathroom are the two places in the home where most electrical accidents occur. Do not operate or touch any electrical appliance with wet hands or when your clothing or the floor is wet. Keep hair dryers away from water-filled sinks and plug-in radios away from bathtubs. Look around your home for other unsafe combinations.

#### Using electricity outdoors

Be sure the electrical equipment you use outdoors was designed for that purpose. Outdoor wiring and outlets must be specially designed to protect against moisture. Never operate electrical tools or appliances in the rain or on wet surfaces. And be sure not to cut through or damage power cords when you're working with power tools.

#### Keep alert, keep alive!

Most of these safety rules seem simple enough. But it's easy to forget them when you're in a hurry or have something else on your mind. So remember, use your head when you use electricity!

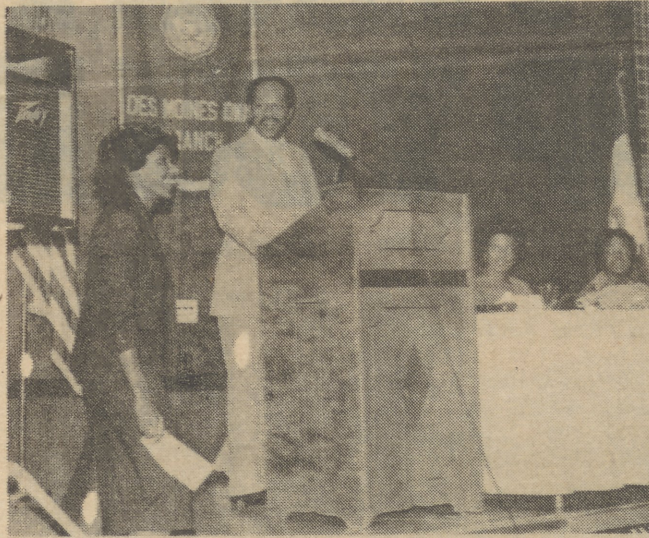
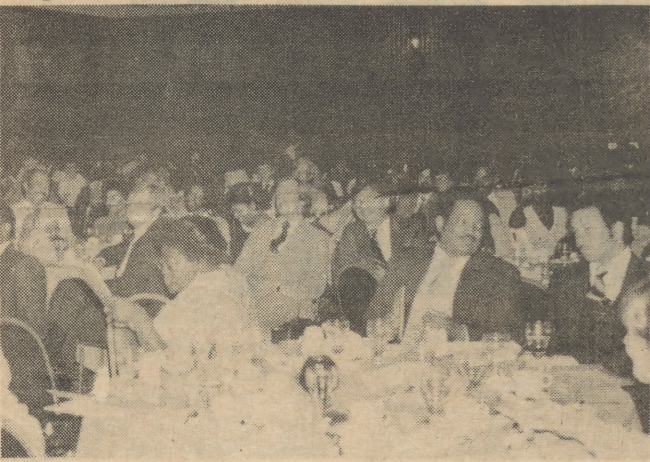

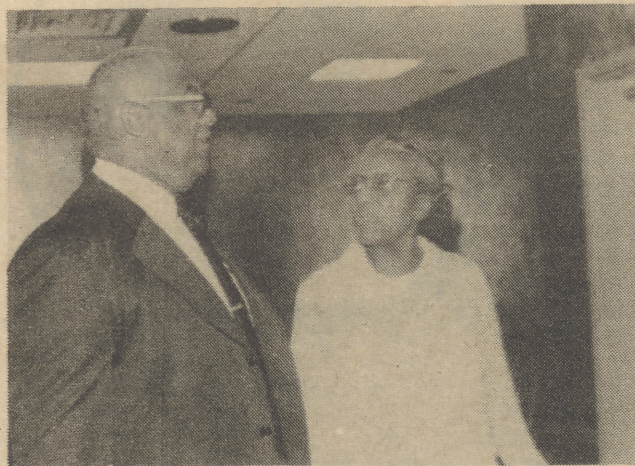

The 80's: Harvesting The Seeds Of The 60's was the theme of the 65th annual Freedom Fund Banquet of the Des Moines Branch of the NAACP at Hilton Inn Friday night, Sept. 26th.

Almo Hawkins, reporter and weekend anchor, KCCI-TV introduced honored guests on the dais as well as presided over events of the evening. The young musicians, including the vocal group ICE provided excellent and much appreciated dinner music while more than three hundred guests waited for the arrival of the guest speaker C. DeLores Tucker from an airport press conference.

Senator John Culver, able to leave Washington at only the last minute, made a surprise appearance and received a standing ovation when introduced. He shared some of the serious issues under consideration before Congress adjourns for the election campaign. In appreciation of the senator's active support of civil rights legislation and his overall fine voting record in Congress, he received a second ovation as he left for his next engagement. Des Moines Mayor Pete Crivaro expressed appreciation for his invitation.

State NAACP President Robert Wright, after a few brief remarks, introduced leaders from Cedar Rapids, Ft. Dodge, and other Iowa branches and Omaha, Nebraska.

C. Delores Tucker,

distinguished keynote speaker serves currently as national president of the Federation of Democratic Women. She is the former Secretary of State from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, serving in that capacity for six years (1971-77).

Among the many awards and honors received, she was named by the National Women's Political Caucus and Redbook Magazine as "woman best qualified to be ambassador to the United Nations" on a slate of 22 women who could save America.

In addition to being a member of the national board of the NAACP, C. DeLores Tucker serves as Vice Chair with Chairperson Julian Bond of Operation Ballot Box. Her activities span more than twenty organizations over the years. Many distinguished honors and degrees have been conferred upon Tucker.

The charming and charismatic speaker shattered lingering illusions of "having it made" with some sobering statistics. These are some of the points she made: There were 57 Black Congressmen in 1870. Two United States Senators. There were two Blacks who served as Secretaries of State in South Carolina.

Ten years later, our voting and civil rights were slipping away as the Ku Klux Klan became part of political organizations and governing bodies, locally and nationally. By 1900 there was not one Black

holding political office.

One hundred years later, the keynote speaker continued, in 1980, Senator Brooks is no longer the only Black senator in the last 100 years... UN Ambassador Young was forced to resign. Ms. Tucker paused to ask, "What happens to a dream deferred. Does it dry up like a raisin, or does it explode?— like Miami, Florida?"

42% of Blacks are functionally illiterate. Schools are more segregated than in 1954. There has not been sufficient commitment. The Kerner Report, 1968, called for new commitment and new will. We want performances instead of promises.

Frederick Douglass reminded us long ago, "Power concedes nothing without a demand." If Ft. Dix can teach a soldier to read in six weeks for war, why can't our young be taught for peace?"

The NAACP is a most American organization. Color has no virtue- it's what's in the heart. We have not done enough plowing to harvest the Seeds of The 60s. There is a lack of thunder and lightning, as expressed by Frederic Douglass.

Operation Ballot Box persuaded the Detroit Board of Education to deputize high school principals to register all students eligible to vote in the next election. This should be undertaken in high schools everywhere. We must protest with both the ballot and the dollar.

Those who revere Dr.

Martin Luther King and fail to vote do not understand the danger we face of losing the gains we have made. We have made gains. There have been appointments to the judiciary. More women have been appointed in the Carter administration than by all the presidents before him.

Nevertheless, we can no longer go across the world telling our friends about human rights and expect to be taken seriously by Third World nations while, in the words of the Kerner Report, we are two societies-- one Black and one White.

The dream of America is beautiful because of you here tonight. Black, White, Jew, Gentile, men and women, C. DeLores Tucker concluded.

Two J.B. Morris scholarship winners Cheryl Carl and Gloria Heard, were introduced by John Estes, Jr. to the guests and formally awarded their scholarships.

NAACP President Vincent Chapman gave presidential awards for 1980 to Catherine Williams, Deputy Commissioner, Social Services and to Bernard Mercer, Chairman of the Board, Preferred Risk Insurance Co.

Larry Carter, presented the Merit Employer Award to Robert E. Lee, President of Iowa Des Moines National Bank.

# Welfare Benefit Bankroll—How, Where And Who To Cut?

A classic administrative dilemma is taking place in Iowa. At issue is the reality of a sparse state budget versus the desire for adequate financing to feed, clothe, shelter and counsel the needy.

Caught in the middle of the clash is Iowa's largest and most visible agency, the Department of Social Services (IDSS), serving 320,000 citizens annually. IDSS provides such critical services as Aid to Dependent Children, Food Stamps, supplemental security income, foster care, adoption and adult corrections.

Since August, when Governor Robert D. Ray ordered all state agencies to share the brunt of dwindling state revenues, IDSS staff have been running a race against time and prevailing economic winds, trying to keep Iowa human services intact.

To understand the magnitude of Iowa's human service funding problem, is to grasp the scope of the numbers involved and analyze the effects these numbers have on welfare clients.

Governor Ray's ordered 3.6 percent reduction in fiscal year 1981 state allocations will result in a zero balance in the Iowa treasury. Such action means that all other deficits must be made up out of current remaining allocations with no hope for supplemental appropriations from the Iowa Legislature — standard procedure in the past. Thus, the 3.6 percent order reduces the IDSS allocation by \$12 million. Coupled with this cutback are other program deficits projected at more than \$17 million, mainly in the Aid to Dependent Children area.

But these are only state funds. A corresponding loss of \$24 million in federal matching funds accompanies the \$29 million state reduction. That's a grand total of \$53 million. Even when your budget stands at \$650 million yearly (\$333 million state dollars), that's a lot of trimming and program cuts to make.

Complicating matters further for Iowa Social Services are an upswing in public assistance caseloads caused by economic hard times; an increase in mental illnesses also tied to the nation's and the state's economic woes; and a rising prison population rapidly filling Iowa's correctional facilities to the rafters.

In the words of Social Services Commissioner Dr. Michael Reagen, "Inflation and recession are savaging the nation's economy, hitting hard at the Midwest and affecting all Iowans. But the paradox is obvious;

those citizens IDSS serves are suffering the most at a time when we are least able to help them.

"We've got to do everything we can to maintain basic services," Reagen challenged his staff to approach the task with these guidelines: 1) consider options which least threaten clients; 2) consider options which least threaten employees; 3) consider options which maintain acceptable service levels; and 4) explore all federal and state regulations enabling or restricting options.

Social Services' staff members set out by conferring with other states also experiencing forced reductions. They looked at economic indicators. They shared budget concerns with constituent groups and asked for constituent help in developing workable alternatives. Leaving no stone unturned, IDSS explored what Reagen termed "reciprocal relationships" with other Iowa state agencies to find ways to work together to better serve clients for whom they share joint responsibility.

Surprisingly, in the midst of this budget crisis, IDSS had several factors working to its advantage. During the past year Reagen had taken decisive administrative steps to save money. He spearheaded a successful drive to reduce the department's travel budget by over 20 percent. He also began to reorganize the agency, integrating services and improving efficiency.

"Those decisions have been successfully implemented," Reagen reported, "and have given us the ability to prepare, under the most seven constraints, what I believe is a responsible, sensitive plan for allocation reductions."

The end result of department efforts was a proposed plan to trim all but \$5.8 million of the projected budget shortfall while maintaining the most essential services to the most clients.

Reagen called the plan as thorough as it could be under the circumstances. "The staff's package of proposed cuts was not put together in cavalier fashion. We looked at every option you could think of, including ones you would not want to consider.

Foremost among the options included in the proposed budget reduction plan was deferral of a scheduled six percent increase in ADC benefits from Oct. 1 to June, 1981. Staff projected that this single item would save almost \$6.8 million, with \$1.7 million to be used toward the 3.6 percent

reduction and \$5.1 million going toward program deficits.

A second action listed in the plan was consolidation of the children's, adolescent and alcohol/drug abuse programs at two of the four department-operated mental health institutes. A parallel proposal called for the closing of an adolescent unit at a third mental health institute.

Significantly, funding at the Iowa State Penitentiary and the Women's Reformatory was kept as current levels in an effort to meet, at least in part, the department's need for \$1.3 million to manage an increasing prison population.

Under the proposed plan, homemaker and chore services would be reduced by lowering the Title XX income eligibility level of 27 percent of median income.

However, devising a plan was only the first hurdle for Commissioner Reagen and staff. According to Iowa law, all program action must be approved by the Council on Social Services, five private citizens appointed by the Governor.

It was the council which heard the first public presentation of budget options in early September. After a two-day review session, the council approved the majority of proposals with major exception. Council members, concerned about the devastating effects which an extended ADC deferral would have on the livelihood of more than 114,500 clients, resolved to postpone the increase only until the department and the council had "reasonable opportunity to review the second quarter ADC 1980-81 fiscal year expenditures."

The council pointed out that from this review, DSS staff can decide whether the deferral has saved enough money to meet the Governor's 3.6 percent reduction. Within the parameters of the council's resolution, DSS staff will present updated information regarding the ADC deficit to the council and the Iowa Legislature in January, 1981.

The only other contrary council action involved community services to juveniles. The council approved the department's plan for cutting community-based juvenile grants to meet the 3.6 percent request, but rejected further proposed cuts to handle program deficits.

In the wake of council action, IDSS is left with a \$10.6 million deficit as opposed to the \$5.8 million deficit allowed in the original plan. Department staff is currently working further money-saving ideas to meet deficits. IDSS estimates that

overall 129,000 clients could be affected by the reductions. Under the budget reduction plan, the IDSS workforce will be pared down by 65 employees — mainly in the mental health area — 45 workers will be relocated and 300 positions will remain unfilled. A hiring freeze which has been in effect at IDSS since April, 1980, has reduced department staff by 178.

But despite program reductions and the number of clients and workers who could be adversely affected by the cutbacks, Commissioner Reagen said his agency will continue to serve a significant number of Iowans:

- an average of 162,000 people in the Medicaid program, the state-operated public assistance medical program with annual payments of over \$200 million;
- about 115,000 ADC recipients;
- approximately 31,600 individuals covered by Title XX monies to the elderly, handicapped, troubled families and children who are placed out of the home;
- 60,000 Food Stamp cases;
- an average daily population of approximately 890 in IDSS mental health institutions and about 1,300 people in two state hospital-schools for the mentally retarded;
- a high prison population which is increasing at the rate of 30 people per month;
- capacity populations at the three state juvenile institutions;

A primary concern of all IDSS employees involved with the reduction plan was the effect less state funding would have at the county level. Because of the close relationship between human service programs and county/state funding, the necessary cutbacks mean a shift in financial demands for the counties.

Shortly after the budget plan was approved by the Social Services Council, IDSS prepared a preliminary report on how Iowa counties fared in the budget fallout. Findings show that counties could realize a net savings of over \$470,000. The reduction of operational expenditures at the mental health institutes and hospital-schools, as well as at the state juvenile home, means less costs assessed to counties.

With the new plan, Medicaid program services are more appropriately utilized rather than reduced, so no impact on the counties is expected. And because the county general relief standards are generally tied to state ADC income limitations, the deferral of the six percent

increase should have only minimal effect on counties' general relief funds.

The only area where IDSS foresees excessive county expenditures is in the Title XX program where reducing income eligibility to 27 percent of the median income is expected to affect 1,995 local purchase clients. If counties elect to continue services to these clients, an additional cost to the counties of almost \$1.1 million is projected.

Just what price Iowa Social Services clients and workers will have to pay down the road cannot be adequately gauged by any report or plan. All that a state caught in such delicate balance can do, as Iowa has done during the past two months, is shore up those resources which

are available and hope for the best.

As Commissioner Reagen reflected: "Our plan is not perfect, and its implementation has yet to be thoroughly developed. In our deliberations, it was unfortunately necessary to make judgements about the relative efficacy of programs — judgements over which persons of reasonable mind would and will differ. We expect differences of opinion and appreciate the concern they show for those clients whose services will be affected because of the necessary adjustments. Many citizens will not like recommendations. I assure you that neither I nor my staff like what we've had to do."

# Help Girls In Your Community - Be A Girl Scout Volunteer

Through Girl Scouting, you can continue the tradition of helping in a special way — of helping each other and the community. This week's Bystander salutes two special ladies who are actively involved in Girl Scouts.

Mrs. Rosetta Green is the first Black on the professional staff, Troop Program and Field Director for Moingona Girl Scout Council. Mrs. Green serves District IX — which includes all western suburbs, West Des Moines, Urbandale, Johnston, Grimes, Granger, Woodward, Perry, Waukee, De Soto, Van Meter, Booneville and Adel — approximately 1200 girls, 300 adults in 115 troops — 6 neighborhood associations.

Prior to this new assignment, Mrs. Green served District VII for 3 years working with Model Cities & other young serving agencies. She states, "I can see a great growth in adults and troops in District VII".

Mrs. Green feels her impact was favorable especially in light of the fact that troops started early in her years of service are still meeting. She feels District IX is a challenge to her as she attempts to develop the area.

Mrs. Green further comments: "The Girl Scouting organization is shifting its image from that of middle class to one which appeals to all girls. Many steps are being taken within our Council to make this happen.

Girl Scouting offers a variety of experiences and adventures that increase the girls understanding of themselves, each other and their communities.

For an adult, Girl Scouting experiences come in many forms — Black men and women can serve their communities and girls — from working directly with girls as leaders, assistant leaders, camp counselors — consultants — professional staff and board members.

Working as a 'Troop Program and Field Director' in Moingona Girl Scout Council is very challenging and rewarding. As a Professional Girl Scout, I have had the opportunity to grow, through attending Executive staff trainings, many workshops, program conferences, and a National Girl Scout Convention.

Girls need to see more Black staff — as role models — within all communities."

Mrs. Green is an active member of Shiloh Baptist Church, Past president of Des Moines PTA Council, presently on Board of Iowa State PTA, Des Moines Area Religious Council and works with ACT/SO, NAACP.

She has studied at D.M. Area Community College, Drake University & Stanford Research Institute at Palo Alto, California. She is married to Sylvester (Buzz) Green and is the mother of 3 children and has one granddaughter.

We also salute Willie Mae Martin who started in August 1980 & is Field Director for Moingona Girl Scout Council. Mrs. Martin works with about 200 adults and 1000 girls in 100 troops and 6 neighborhood associations.

Mrs. Martin states: "Girl Scouting, in the past, has been thought of as being a White Anglo-Saxon, upper middle class organization. I believe that Black adults have not always been willing to participate for this reason.

My being on the staff will give me an opportunity to help break down this stereotype on the part of Blacks as well as Whites, and to show that Blacks are needed and wanted at all levels of Girl Scouting."

Mrs. Martin serves the geographic part of the council known as District VII — all of north & east Polk County. She graduated from Drake University in 1975 receiving a BA in psychology.

She was previously employed in the insurance agency and with Des Moines Area Community College as a Vocational Guidance Specialist & Media Technician. Mrs. Martin born & raised in New Orleans has been in Des Moines since 1968.

She is an active member of New Bethany Church of God in Christ, is married to Louis Martin and has a 5 year old daughter.

Sharon Powell, Executive Director of Moingona Girl Scout Council says: "We're proud of Rosetta and Willie. Their dedication goes beyond mere job responsibilities. Their contribution to the community as a whole is commendable, and sets a fine example for other adults and the youth they are serving in Girl Scouting."

Girl Scouts enjoy a special heritage because

they share two cultures that are rich in history, customs, contributions & struggle. Girl Scouting encourages your daughter and her friends to know & to be proud of their heritage while mastering & strengthening the broader society of which they are a part.
