## Elections October 25 For Neighborhood Priority Boards

With less than 3 weeks left before election day candidates for public office are naturally pulling out all the stops to attract the attention of voters before they go to the polls on November 4th.

In Des Moines 6 prime service areas there are 137 residents of the city who are also running for public office — without the television and radio spots, and the handshake tours and public

appearances that accompany national and state campaigns. These 137 candidates are vying for seats on Des Moines Neighborhood Priority Boards.

Their campaign chest, so to speak, is their concern for conditions in the City's inner city neighborhoods. They are running on that commitment in order to be able to have something to "say" not only about how the city

spends its some \$6 million in HUD Block Grant Funds, but also about crime, economic growth, recreational opportunities and other issues which affect the lives of low and moderate income residents of Des Moines.

All 127 seats on the Neighborhood Boards are up for election this year. Residents of the prime service areas will be voting for their candidates on Saturday,

October 25th.

Unlike other elections, voters need not be registered, but must be a resident of the precinct in which they are voting and must sign an eligibility card indicating their home address.

Residents who are over 60 years of age, handicapped, homebound, temporarily residing outside the city or who will be out of the city on October 25, may vote by absentee ballot.

Persons wishing to vote by absentee ballot can request a ballot by

contacting any of the city's Neighborhood Development Site Offices and filing an absentee ballot request card by October 22, 1980.

The six neighborhood boards were set up by D.M. City Council in 1971 when Des Moines became one of 20 cities selected for the Federal Planned Variations Program. The city became a Community Development Entitlement City in 1975 and the boards have continued to advise the city on its expenditures of Community

Development Funds since that time.

Most recently, the boards have successfully made recommendations to the Central Advisory Board and City Council that have resulted in the adoption of the following elements in the city's 1981 Comprehensive Community Development Block Grant Plan:

\* An expansion of police security & crime prevention from 2 of the PSA'S to all six of the

## Receive Simpson Carver Awards

C.T. Vivian, human race relations specialist, has been selected to receive the 1980 George Washington Carver Distinguished African-American Lecturer Award at Simpson College.

Vivian, who is also an author and lecturer, will deliver the sixth annual Carver address at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 16.

Also receiving awards are: Vincent Chapman, personnel officer for the Amoco Oil Company in Des Moines and the president of the Des Moines Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and the Rev. Leslie H. Carter, director of field operations for the U.S. Commission of Proposals for the National Academy of Peace and Conflict Resolution and national coordinator of the National Black Christian Student

Leadership Consultation. Carter is a 1977 Simpson graduate.

Two Simpson seniors will also be receiving Carver awards. They are Rosalind K. Simpson, a speech major from Waterloo, and Gary L. Streaty, a physical education major from Anderson, Ind.

Named for the noted black scientist whom attended Simpson in the 1890's, the Carver Award is intended to recognize persons for their personal achievements and their work at improving race relations in society. Recipients are selected by a committee composed of college officials and faculty members.

Vivan presently serves as board chairman of the Black Action Strategies and Information Center Inc. in Atlanta, Ga., which develops religious,

educational, human rights and cultural programs.

Vivan holds a bachelor's degree in Christian education and Christian journalism from the American Baptist Theological Seminary at Scarritt College in Nashville, Tenn.

Prior to his present position Vivian was the dean and alternative education and national director at the Seminary Without Walls at Shaw University Divinity School in Raleigh, N.C.

During the 1960's Vivian was the national director of affiliates for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (S.C.L.C.) where he served on Dr. Martin Luther King's executive staff and served under his direct supervision. He continues to be affiliated with the S.C.L.C.

## Poet Brooks Visits Iowa University

Illinois Poet Laureate, Gwendolyn Brooks was a featured speaker at the University of Iowa, for the International Writing Program and Writers Workshop Lecture Series.

Don't allow anyone to tell you how or what to write," urged Brooks during an informal discussion with black students on campus. One can't be too proud of their heritage. She also encouraged students to write children's books, because the need is great.

During her scheduled appearances Brooks greeted the black student body in a reception at the Afro-American Culture Center, (A.A.C.C.), sponsored by the Afro-American Graduate Student Association.

Brooks, a versatile poet who has moved from meter and rhyme to free verse and occasional ballads, lectured in the U of I Physics building where she held the attention of an overflow audience which received her with

a standing ovation and concluded with one.

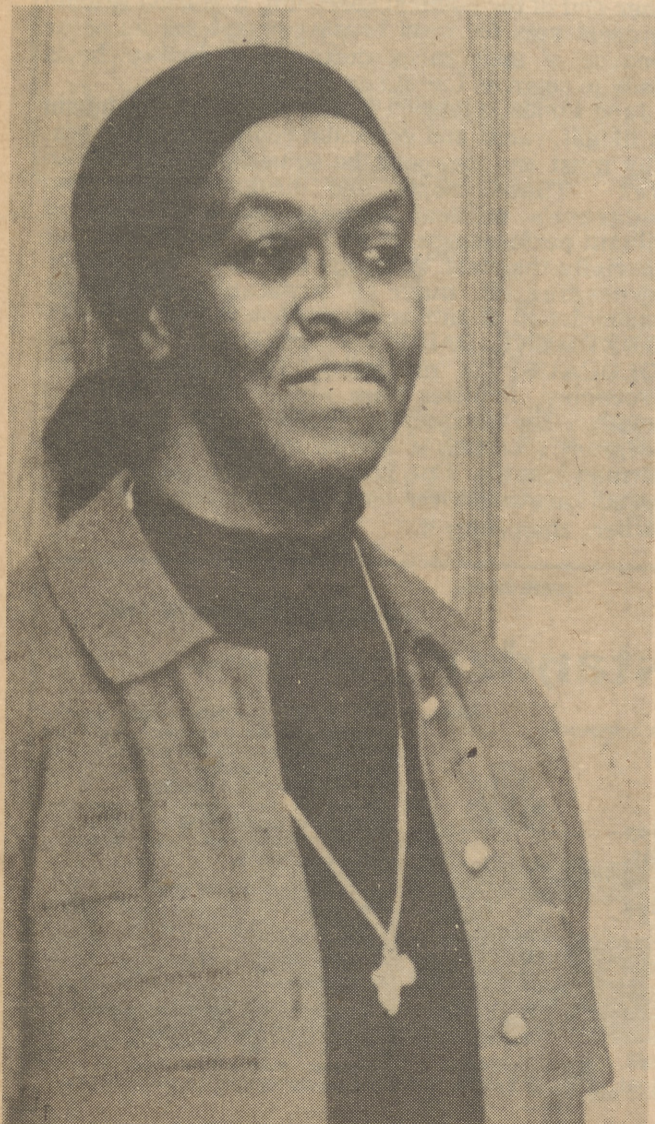
Her poems depict not only the struggle of being black and female and all the problems encountered in today's society, but she has embarked on recording the living conditions and struggles of oppressed people.

She was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for poetry, in 1950 with ANNIE ALLEN.

Speaking to the black experience has been a major thrust for poet Brooks. Her countless

contributions to poetry and brilliant messages will last a life time to every individual that hears her.

A very modest and warm person, Brooks responded to the curious imagination of a child attending the reception at the A.A.C.C., "What do you do for a living?" Her reply to the innocent concern of a child was "I go from campus to campus reading my poems; sometimes I'm paid, and some times I'm not. I'm not rich or anything, but I make a comfortable living."

You have to wonder how the political writers come up with their ideas and how much stock we can put in their words. For instance, the polls.

If we listen to the poll takers there would be no need to vote on election day. The writers would have our winner named and that would be that. Do you know, I happen to believe that is one of the reasons why more people don't bother to vote. If their candidate is behind in the polls, the voters figure their vote won't count much, so they don't go.

Then you read some writer who says that this statement or that slip of the tongue hurt this or that candidate, as if the contest were a boxing match and you had to inflict physical damage on your oponent.

Now, I realize that people running for office can damage their chances by some of the things they say, but I don't think their mouthings do as much damage as we would be led to believe.

Then there is the breaking down of the voters by groups. The Jewish vote, the Irish vote, the farm vote, the Polish vote, not to mention the black vote. Now we are supposed to think that one speech can make all of those voters turn right or left and march to the voting machines and pull their lever for somebody.

There is also the women vote that everybody is after, with President Carter telling how many women he has appointed to high offices and Reagan promising to name a woman Supreme Court justice if he is elected. Then I guess he will promise to appoint a black judge, and Italian judge if you vote for me.

All of the people in the various groups are individuals who vote as they please. It may be that enough of them happen to think alike to make a difference in a vote, but I find it hard to believe that they can all be swayed by a speech or promise.

The candidates are just about as silly themselves.


A guy will go out in the middle of a cornfield, climb on a tractor and deliver what he calls a major farm speech. Then he will go into a factory, and put on a work uniform, a hard hat to impress labor, and wave an American flag to show his patriotism. I have yet to see any candidate put on a dress to court the women voters. Maybe they will get around to that later.

If a person had a viable message to deliver and really believed in it, those speeches could be made from any hall and would have about as much effect. This political reasoning may have been all right in the days when bosses ruled the precincts and jobs of those in that precinct were at the mercy of the big boss.

Then there were an independent few who defied the order to pull the straight lever and split their ticket because they wanted to. If they had been found out, and some of them were, it meant the loss of a job.

Some day somebody is going to come up with a whole new line of political reasoning, and he or she will stage the biggest political upset in history, even bigger than that of Harry Truman in 1948.

I think the public is ready for a fresh new approach to political campaigns and I wonder why the various candidates can't sense it.



## Thoughts and Comments

The refugees sent there, quite obviously, will be the least congenial and placeable elements in the refugee population. They will be those who are mentally disturbed and those with serious criminal records, and will be mixed with those arriving after the reduced - capacity mainland center (Fort Chafee) is filled.

An editorial in the Chicago Tribune, reprinted in the Des Moines Register of October 1st, brings out the point that it is possible (and perhaps likely) that the White House felt that some votes might be gained by sending the obviously unwelcome dark - skinned refugees out of states with votes in the electoral college (Wisconsin, Florida, Pennsylvania and Arkansas) to Puerto Rico, which has no vote there.

The decision contributes nothing to the solution of the problems and issues these refugees raise, and in fact increases them. The decision invites a long series of explosive incidents, and is obviously offensive to Puerto Ricans, who are not favorably

inclined toward taking these refugees into a country already faced with poverty, acute unemployment and rampant inflation.

And it is further most unfavorable to the further assimilation and placement of Cubans into the mainland society. Extremist nationalist elements will be further incensed, as they should be, and may have little further trouble in attracting large numbers of Puerto Ricans to their cause. Most importantly, the last thing that the Cubans and Haitians who risked their lives to flee a Caribbean island to go to the United States want to happen is to be sent forcefully to "a medium - security prison" on another one.

If the majority population was afraid of what was happening in the Wisconsin center, they should (and probably do) expect much more to occur in Puerto Rico. They may be overjoyed that they have isolated those unwelcome "darkies" away from their persons, houses and property and in a place where the only possible "losers" in that regard will, by nature, have to be dark - skinned.

This decision to consign refugees to an army base in Puerto Rico that is unprepared to handle this assignment is thus no less racial in motivation than it is political, and must be thought of as reflection of the racial attitudes of those who make and enforce such a decision.

If the Carter Administration goes through with this policy, it will be detrimental not only to our national interests, but also the interests of those most concerned — the Puerto Ricans, the refugees and the

Army which must enforce the order. It will be a policy which will gain it no political advantage, and likely will be detrimental to its continued existence.


American blacks must keep their eyes on this situation, not only because of the racial connotations it obviously espouses at a time when the maker of that policy is seeking their votes for reelection, but also because the policy is subject to change at any time prior to the October 15 effective date of the policy.

We should register our protests (if the policy is in fact effected; not only to the White House, but also to those who circulate among us requesting our votes in November following its effective date. If this is the way that the current Administration looks to problems of those dark - skinned individuals whom it invites into this country, it is doubtful that America's current dark - skinned population can expect anything better.

There is no question in my mind that Reagan has absolutely nothing to offer to dark - skinned people, within or without the United States mainland. Further, Anderson has not specifically addressed this issue, but it is unlikely that his response, were he to acquire the office of President, would be any more positive.

If this is the sort of policy making we can expect from the candidate who has shown and continues to promise an above - average record in the area of civil rights and black political sensitivity, then it is likely that blacks will have to turn to other means outside of the political arena to improve their lot in the 1980's and thereafter.

## A Female Focus On The Issues

Waves of anti-semitism are engulfing France and other European countries. Neo-nazi organizations seem to be making inroads in government and other aspects of European Life.

Jewish concern and fear is rising and their alarm is quite understandable. On the other hand it disturbs and distresses me to find that Vanessa Redgrave's latest film venture PLAYING FOR TIME shown a few weeks ago had trouble finding respected national sponsors.

Jewish pressure against Miss Redgrave's portrayal of concentration camp survivor Fania Fenelon had been tremendous over the past year. I was surprised CBS carried the program at all; knowing corporate interests put money before art. As a long time admirer of the outspoken actress I'd like to assure one and all she is far from being an anti-Semite.

If she was would she have the sensitivity and compassion to portray the victim of Nazi oppression? Miss Redgrave, an avowed Trotskyite has long espoused unpopular left wing causes. She marched and protested for the rights of minorities in Great Britain, the poor, labor unions and many others.

She is one of the few whites I've ever heard praise the genius of Malcolm X or campaign door to door to elect left wing candidates to the House of Commons. If she were anti-semitic would she back black people in their struggle for their civil rights — usually the twin idiocies of racism and anti-Semitism go hand in hand.

It is again unfortunate many Jewish organizations and individuals equate anti-zionism with anti-Semitism. The PLO simply want Palestine back, not to exterminate Jews as did Hitler and his National Socialist Workers Party. Millions of homeless Arabs are not Nazis — there is simply a struggle concerning the ownership of land in the

Middle East.

Native Americans want reparation, for the theft of their lands by Europeans — possibly Palestinian Arabs feel the same. But since the Israeli government refuses to even mediate with the PLO there is a terrible impasse.

I believe most non-actors view Hollywood stars as narcissistic, vacuous empty headed hedonists caught up in their own publicity. But whenever one does become "Political" and campaign for their beliefs they seem to have hell to pay.

### JOHNSON ATTENDS WASHINGTON D.C. CONFERENCE ON JUSTICE FOR BLACKS

Morris Johnson, chairman of the Black Coalition and a member of the Iowa Crime Commission, will attend a U.S. Justice Department conference in Washington D.C. October 16-18' entitled "Towards Equal Justice Now."

U.S. Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti is scheduled to address the conference on issues concerning minority crime and inequities in the criminal justice system "Imperatives For System Change."

Homer Broome, Chief Administrator of the U.S. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration will speak on "Minorities and Criminal Justice — How To Achieve A Just System."

Johnson said he was concerned about these issues especially in light of a recent study demonstrating disproportionate number of blacks and other minorities imprisoned in Iowa.

Wayne and his films were not banned from theatres because he publicly stated in a '73 Playboy interview that he believed in white supremacy. But at the other end of the political spectrum, if Marlon Brando demonstrates for open housing or refuses an oscar because of their racist portrayal of Indians he is made to seem an ingrate or anti social.

Jane Fonda is labeled a traitor because she fought an illegal, racist and genocidal conflict in Indochina. Why must one viewpoint be squelched in American life? Those people who disagreed with Miss Redgrave's political leanings missed a host of brilliant performances in PLAYING FOR TIME and especially the stars. Although the show was terribly depressing it made a greater impact and denunciation of anti-semitism than GENTLEMANS AGREEMENT, DAIRY OF ANNE FRANK of the HOLOCAUST in my mind. The author of the screenplay, Pulitzer prize winner Arthur Miller is Jewish. The producer Linda Yeller, who fought for Redgrave's casting is Jewish and lost two aunts in German camps. I'm just sorry that some of my Jewish acquaintances chose to boycott the show rather, than enjoy it.

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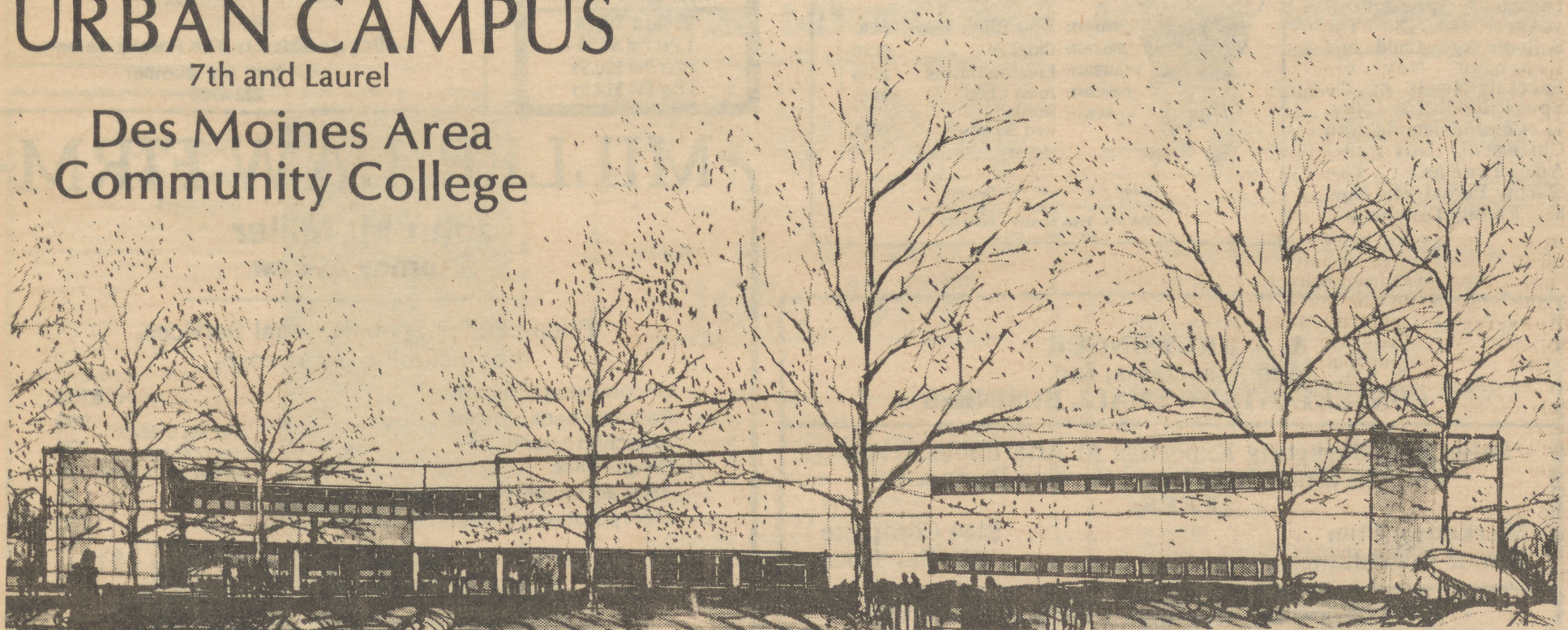

# Penitentiary Rally To Protest Treatment Of Black Inmates

About 50 persons attended a rally Wednesday (Oct. 15) outside the Iowa State Penitentiary at Fort Madison, protesting "injustices" stemming from a "racist frame-up" involving three black inmates, organizers said.

The rally, sponsored by several Des Moines-based organizations, was held at noon, in a show of solidarity for inmates Michael Ray Williams, Anthony Headspeth and Al Freddie Clark — all accused in two separate stabbing incidents last spring at the prison.

Protesters also raised the issues of bad living conditions at the aged, deteriorating prison, inadequate medical service, and the large black inmate population.

Speaking at the rally was Rev. Bob Cook, head of CROSS ministries in Des Moines; Kalonji Saadiq, currently running for Congress on the Socialist Party ticket; Rev. Lewis Grady, pastor at St. Paul A.M.E. Church, 1201 Day Street, and others.

Pickets carried signs, some bearing messages that read: "Human Rights Includes Prisoners' Rights," "Treat a Prisoner Like An Animal and He'll Act Like It," and "Fort Madison: Iowa's Dachau" — in reference to the Nazi concentration camp during WWII.

Williams, 26, of Des Moines, has been charged with aggravated robbery and attempted murder in an incident that rally organizers said was an act of self-defense to ward off an attack by two pipe and knife-wielding prisoners.

He has since been transferred to the Washington County Jail in Washington, Ia. Clark, 25, of Des Moines, and Headspeth, 25, of Waterloo, had been held in 24-hour lockup while prison officials said they were conducting an "investigation."

However, they were released Monday afternoon, apparently after prison officials learned of the rally, organizers said.

The Williams incident

stems from an altercation April 13 with two white prisoners. Prison officials said Williams started the fight and also took some property belonging to one of the inmates.

However, rally organizers said that witnesses to the incident saw a different version. They said Williams was returning to his cell, and seeing he was about to be ambushed by the two inmates, began to run. He was attacked but managed to get the weapon away from one of the inmates, and the stabbing occurred during the ensuing struggle, a spokesman for the organizers said.

The spokesman said Clark and Headspeth were unjustly accused of a stabbing of an inmate from Omaha three weeks after the Williams affair because of politics. When that occurred, Freddie Clark, who was instrumental in building support for Williams in the aftermath of the April incident, and Headspeth were said to be in areas away from the prison

gymnasium, where the stabbing happened, the spokesman said.

A written report by a guard said Clark was in his cell, the spokesman said, while witnesses to the stabbing of the Omaha man said Headspeth was not present during that attack.

Clark is a founding member and midwest representative of the New African Prisoners Organization (NAPO), one of the sponsors of the rally. NAPO is a national prisoners' group that has been active in advocating prisoners' rights, and has 16 chapters in 13 states.

Participants also demanded at Wednesday's rally that the prison staff hire a full-time doctor. Currently, when an inmate requires medical attention, a doctor must be called in from the outside, increasing chances of aggravating the illness or injury, the spokesman said.

Another issue voiced was the proposed creation of a community review board that would have the authority to investigate incidents independently at the prison, such as a stabbing.

Statistics were mentioned by speakers indicating that Iowa ranked fourth in the nation regarding the ratio of black prisoners compared to the general

population. Protesters demanded also that improvements be made in the diet of inmates. It now consists of greasy, unhealthy and repetitious meals, a rally spokesman said.

Sponsors of the rally included: Peace and Justice Center, Des Moines; National Conference of Black Lawyers, Chicago; Iowa Socialist Party, and NAPO.

# DM Schools Report Minority Enrollment

Enrollment in the Des Moines Public Schools for the 1980 - 81 school year totaled 33,161, a drop of 882 from the enrollment of 34,043 a year ago, a report showed today.

The 2.6 percent drop was a little more than half the 1,523 student decline that school officials had expected. A year ago the enrollment decline was 1,462.

Dr. William A.

Anderson, superintendent, pointed out that one reason for the better than expected enrollment total was an increase of 290 in the number of Southeast Asian students. Although the complete racial breakdown of the enrollment has not been completed, a handcount of the Southeast Asian students showed a total of 1,041 enrolled, compared to 751 a year

ago. The enrollment report showed an increase of 80 students in kindergarten, from 2,410 a year ago to 2,490 this year. However, there was an overall decline in the elementary school enrollment of 400. The drop in junior high schools was 28 and the senior high school decrease was 363. There also was a decline of 92 in the enrollment in

special schools and an increase of one student in the shared time category.

The report showed elementary school increases at Adams 5, Brooks 7, Cattell 19, Cowles 13, Dunlap, Hillis 40, Howe 10, Hubbell 2, Jackson 31, Mann 12, Mitchell 4, Monroe 18, Stowe 27, Wallace 33, Woodlawn 3 and the sixth grade at Hoyt 34. ## LEAF BURNING ORDINANCE

### CITY OF DES MOINES



**THE LAW...** The purpose of the City of Des Moines Leaf Burning Ordinance is to reduce the amount of leaf burning to prevent violations of health-related air quality standards. This Ordinance does not ban leaf burning, but it does restrict the hours during which leaves can be burned. The leaf burning period will be from October 15th through December 15th. Leaf burning will be allowed between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. No stumps, logs or large limbs (greater than 1 inch in diameter) may be burned.

**THE ORDINANCE PROVIDES THE FOLLOWING ADVANTAGES:**

- Reduce waste collection load at less cost to the taxpayer.
- Reduce the air pollution problem as caused by leaf burning.
- Reduce the danger of leaf fires.

**If you must burn leaves, please... OBSERVE THESE RECOMMENDATIONS to help improve the quality of your air!**

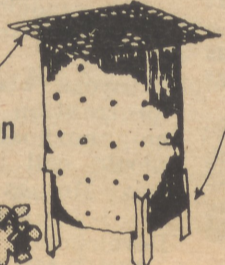

**HOW TO MAKE A LEAF COMPOST PILE:**

Select an out-of-the-way area that is accessible. Make a 2½ feet deep pit or enclose compost pile in fencing or other framework. Place leaves in loose layers alternating with soil and other vegetative waste (excluding garbage). Leaves will decompose faster if a high nitrogen fertilizer is added to each layer. Keep moist and cover to retain heat. Keep well aerated by frequently turning the pile every few weeks.
