**“For Colored Girls...” To Be Performed Here Nov. 22**

The Langston Hughes Company of Players a fine arts repertoire based in Des Moines, has successfully toured for three years with the controversial choreopoem by Ntozake Shange, **FOR COLORED GIRLS WHO HAVE**

**CONSIDERED SUICIDE WHEN THE RAINBOW IS ENUF.**

The Choreopoem will open in the Theater Underground, at the Des Moines Community Playhouse, 831 - 42nd Street, on Sat., Nov. 22, 8:00 p.m. & Sun., Nov. 23

in a 4:00 p.m. Matinee & at 8:00 p.m. Tickets on sale at the Playhouse. Advance \$3.00 & \$3,50 door.

Poet and playwright Shange has also written a novel titled **SASSAFRASS** which was originally published by

the Shameless Hussy Press. Her works have appeared in various publications: “Black Scholar,” “Yardbird Reader,” “Invisible City,” “Heirs, Arte,” “Third World Women,” “Time to Greez,” “Ms.” “The Little Magazine” and others.

Several months ago she began work on a new play, “A Photograph: Still Life With Shadows / A Photograph: A Study of Cruelty” and she started working with the saxophone player, David Murray, in “In the Bluesness”.

In “For Colored Girls...” seven black actresses murmur, chant, strut and intone about Shange’s ideas of

what it is to grow up black and also be a woman. A theme of determined survival pervades this choreopoem. It was first presented at the Bacchanal, a woman’s bar located outside Berkeley, California. They also performed the work at other bars and coffee houses.

The Langston Hughes COP has performed the choreopoem throughout the State of Iowa at community colleges, universities and community centers & organizations. Directed by Niambi D. Webster, the Company’s founder & director states “For Colored Girls...” shifts from one end of the continuum to the other;

on one hand it makes one angry at the mere existence of the harsh realities, cruelties, hate and pain experienced by women, which encompasses rape, abortion, broken relationships, wife abuse...yet, it also expresses the joy, sharing and spiritual love expressed by the performers. Every woman will identify with one scene depicted in the emotional drama.”

The show has been modified from time to time, prior to its opening on Broadway at Booth Theatre in September 1976, but it remained basically a statement evolving into a choreopoem.

**Iowa Power Rate Increase Public Hearing Nov. 19**

The Iowa State Commerce Commission will hold the public hearing on Iowa Power’s electrical and gas rate increases on November 19, 1980. The hearing to be held at the Wallace State office building

auditorium will be at 7:00 p.m. which will be the customers opportunity to speak directly to the Commission.

Iowa Power and Light Company is asking for a 31% electrical increase

and a 11% natural gas rate increase. Iowa Power contends that the electrical increase is necessary to restore investor confidence, repair cracks discovered at their nuclear power plant in Cooper, Nebraska, and to pay for construction costs for a new power plant in Ottumwa, Iowa.

James Lyon, President of Iowa Power, said at a Citizens for Community Improvement (CCI) neighborhood meeting on October 15th that the company could go ‘bankrupt’ without the increase.

The Iowa Power increase is in addition to a 18% natural gas increase proposed by Northern Natural Gas company. With an average winter this year, Iowa Power estimates home energy costs to be 50% higher than last year.

Voting analysts say that blacks and hispanics voted ninety per cent for Carter. If I had to guess I would say that ninety percent of the black vote that voted went to Carter, but only about half of the blacks who could have voted did so.

But it wouldn't have mattered much anyhow, perhaps winning the president one or two more states, but still not enough to give him enough electoral votes. But we didn't actually see what we had gotten ourselves into until the smoke cleared away.

Now we have Strom Thurmond, a black hater from away back, as chairman of the judiciary committee, and he has already begun talking about doing away with affirmative action, busing to achieve integration, and making certain federal crimes punishable by death. And you know who that is really going to hit.

We have to guess that he will do his damndest to circumvent the 1974 voting rights law, and just about everything in the way of a fair shake for blacks. When the Republicans were in the minority in Congress, the man often said he had nothing against blacks, but with the big Reagan win, he has come out of the woodwork as a genuine red neck, which he always was, but just didn't have the power to do anything very much about it.

Add this to Jesse Helms who has always tried to put the hammer to poor people and labor, and you can see what he will be in for. Of course, both of these guys will protest that they are acting in the interest of the nation, but we all are in that nation, too.

You have to laugh at the way the right wingers are yelling about how they elected Reagan and some congressmen, and "They better watch how they vote, or out they will go." So we will have the country run, not by Congress and the president, but the gang of conservatives who will want to inflict their brand of thinking on the rest of us, and we had better like it.

What would you guess will happen in the next four years? Will the nation split further apart with the different groups going their separate ways, and the next presidential election decided by who can yell traitor the loudest?

Will people who believe in the equality of persons be forced to deny their beliefs in order to save their hides? You get inklings of what to expect by

watching the newspapers now. The brutal murder of black children, the marching of the Ku Klux Klan, and the activities of the other "Concerned groups" let you know that those who would like to see anything but their ideas crushed will try to come into power. The thing that will likely save us is that most of these organizations want to wield all of the power, and there will be a merry scramble to see who gets on top, and while that is taking place, decent people can take back the power they gave so freely because they were mad at one man.

Wonder how our blacks who have it made will fare? I would guess they would have to line up with us and do their bit in the struggle if they are to survive. Now I get the feeling that lots of them look at our battles and struggles as something that can't touch them, or at least won't, but they are as much the object of the right wingers as we poor people are, and don't let them forget it. We can come out all right, but it will take everything we have as a people working together to do it.

Just to give an idea of the thinking that some of the Reagan supporters have, a panelist was asked how the next president is going to implement the young unemployed blacks into the main stream of labor. The panelist didn't hesitate one second, but replied that he really shouldn't be very much concerned about that because most of those blacks are unemployable anyhow. All I can say to that is WOW!

## Thoughts and Comments

Another notable fugitive slave case in the early history of Iowa occurred in Iowa in mid-1850. This case, titled **Ruel Daggs, plaintiff, vs. Elihu Frazier, et alss., defendants**, came before the United States District Court for the Southern District of Iowa, sitting in Burlington, during the June term of 1850, Judge J. J. Dyer presiding. It was a civil action initiated by Daggs, a slave owner in Clark County, Missouri against Elihu Frazier, Thomas Clarkson Frazier, John Comer, Paul Way, John Pickering and others of Henry County, Iowa for the purpose of recovering compensation for the services of nine slaves who escaped into Iowa, and were afterwards assisted to elude the control and custody of his agents by all or some of the defendants. A little background information here about the "Underground Railroad", the organization of Iowans, largely Quaker in religious orientation, who actively assisted runaway slaves to reach freedom in Canada.

The "Underground Railroad" in Iowa was only a part of a complete system with trunk lines and branches which extended through most of the northern United States. The main line entered the State in its southwest corner near Tabor, passed through the towns of Lewis, Des Moines, Grinnell, Iowa City, West Liberty, Tipton, DeWitt, and Low Moor, and crossed the Mississippi River at Clinton to connect with a route in Illinois. There were, however, at least three parallel lines of this "railroad" branching from Tabor and running eastward to the river. Besides these main lines, there were innumerable branch lines and "spurs" which connected with them. The presence of these many routes was due to the fact all of the escaping slaves did not enter Iowa in its southwest corner. In fact, they entered the State at various points along the southern border wherever the opportunity came. Although this machinery existed to aid the escapees, in fact the vast majority of the slaves effected their escape alone and unaided by anyone. In the southwestern part of Iowa there were several short routes with initial stations at Croton, Bloomfield, Lancaster, and Cincinnati, all of which connected with one of the main lines of the "railroad" with a terminus at the Mississippi River. Farther east was the Quaker village of Salem, conveniently surrounded by numerous woods and streams which made the concealment of fugitives quite easy. At night they could proceed to almost any of the Quaker homes in the community, for almost without

exception, residents of Salem were willing to aid any escapee who requested it.

Of course, not all of the slaves who set out for Canada were able to reach their goal. Black slaves represented a considerable sum of wealth to southern slave owners and they were obviously quite reluctant to see their "property" disappear without a chance of compensation. Therefore, they made every effort to recover their property, often resorting to unpleasant and unlawful methods to accomplish that recovery. Armed slave catchers and owners were often close on the heels of escaping slaves, and irate slave owners threatened to hang or shoot those helping the escapees and burn their buildings. Ruel Daggs had lost a considerable number of slaves by the Salem route, and was especially violent in his threats and methods. At one time, he had a cannon set up in front of the Henderson Lewelling House, in which he claimed some of his escaped slaves were hiding. Another time, he came into Salem with a large number of armed men proposing to burn down the entire community, but again the Quakers remained unperturbed and unafraid. In early June of 1848, nine slaves who escaped his plantation successfully evaded the armed patrols of Missourians maintained on the roads to Salem, until discovered approximately a mile from the town. That which happened following the discovery of these escaped slaves will be discussed in succeeding articles.

I am dedicating this column to a man who has meant so-much to so-many in the state of Iowa and the nation. A man that can truly be called a symbol of progress for black Iowa.

Attorney Robert A. Wright Sr. is the man of whom I speak. He has often been referred to as "Mr. Civil Rights in Iowa," and has worked hard over many years to earn such recognition.

On October 25 of this year, Robert Wright retired from his position as President of the NAACP Iowa/Nebraska State Conference of Branches, at the NAACP Convention in Cedar Rapids. His commitment to the struggle for equality began over three decades ago, and is as strong now as it ever was. While many black professionals get ahead and forget about other less fortunate blacks, Robert Wright has consistently performed as a gallant warrior for the advancement of all black Iowans not just a certain privileged group.

Most people never realize how demanding an NAACP State Presidency, or branch presidency, really is. To do the job efficiently requires the sacrifice of great amounts of time, money, and effort. Robert Wright has traveled all around the Midwest helping black people, a task for which he

has received little recognition, and has exhibited great personal caring for the well-being of black Iowa, and black America.

As an NAACP leader, Robert Wright has long shown a commitment to the growth of the organization. While some black leaders in Iowa shy away from aggressively tackling controversial issues Wright has not hesitated to fight for what is our right as Americans. While some NAACP leaders in Iowa have sought, due to their own insecurity, to discourage younger blacks from assuming leadership roles in the mainstream of the organization, Robert Wright has always supplied strong support to anyone, regardless of age, who was willing to participate.

I can personally attest that Robert Wright was my main inspiration in founding the NAACP branch in Iowa City. Certain other NAACP leaders sought to discourage me by claiming that I was too young to

perform such a complicated task, and that I lacked the credibility to form such a branch, and preside over it.

Robert Wright urged me to disregard their petty comments and get to the work at hand; the branch grew quickly, and Wright was a key factor, especially on the state level. Robert Wright realized that in order for the NAACP to remain strong, young people must be given an equal chance to advance within it — an advancement opportunity based on performance, not seniority.

We are all indebted to Robert A. Wright Sr. for what he has meant to us all, whether in Civil Rights, Law, or progressive inspiration. He is a "Knight in Shining Armor" if there ever was one.

To Robert A. Wright Sr. — I salute you for a job well done — you are a truly exceptional man, and I am proud to be your friend.

The Black press reflects growing concern about violence against Blacks across the nation. The Carolina Times, Durham, North Carolina, had this to say last week: "Those who own the major establishment newspapers, T.V., and radio stations are fond of lambasting 'extremists of the left and right' piously placing themselves in the so-called vital center have no difficulty programing Klansmen David Duke and Bill Wilkinson on the

'boob tube'."

The editorial continued: "On the other hand, when was the last time you saw a so-called left extremist., e.g. Angela Davis, on a talk show?" If one goes abroad, say to Africa, and is asked about Blacks other than Muhammad Ali, Angela Davis is the person most frequently asked about. Yet, Ms. Davis is running for vice-president on a platform calling for outlawing the Klan, but has received minimal media coverage.

The Carolina Times asks, is a double standard at play here? Why is it so apparently easy for Bill Wilkinson to appear on the Tomorrow show and other programs, while those who would ban the Klan are invisible?

The Atlanta Voice takes issue with the concept

that the rash of murders against Afro-Americans were committed by one man. The column is entitled: "Conspiracy To Kill Blacks." When Vernon E. Jordan was shot in Fort Wayne, Indiana, the columnist wrote...we are witnessing the manifestations of a deeply ingrained hate for Black people which is being fostered, taught and encouraged by the KKK and neo-nazi groups. J. B. Stoner, the self-proclaimed racist, met in Belgian neo-nazi group last Saturday..."

The columnist continues, "Moreover it is strange to me that the one person, Joseph Paul Franklin, who is implicated in these shootings up to his neck, was allowed to escape after being arrested in Florence, Kentucky.

"Sadly enough, John Paul Franklin is not alone. Six Blacks have been slain in Buffalo, N.Y., two in Salt Lake City, Utah, and many others attacked across the nation for no apparent reason.

"We who live in Atlanta are peculiarly affected. In the past 15 months ten Black children have been murdered and four are still missing," the Atlanta Voice columnist points out.

The Pittsburgh Courier reprinted an editorial, October 25, entitled, "Candidates Omit Issue of Violence On Blacks." The editorial refers to President-elect Reagan's first press conference where Reagan pledged to add more to the military budget and end government regulations which include affirmative action while saying nothing about terrorism against Afro-Americans.

The national candidates are only talking about how much money is needed to be put in the military to guard us against the threat of foreign invasion. The editorial concludes, The only way these violent acts will stop is for the powers-that-be to make a real commitment now to stop the violence.

## Community Education Enrollment

Enrollment in community and adult education classes of the Des Moines Public Schools during the fall term totaled 7,362, the school district reported.

The report showed physical fitness was the most popular category, drawing 1,561 persons. Business education classes were the next most popular, the report said, with an enrollment of 714, followed by leisure time skills with 621 persons, journeyman and apprentice classes with 475, home and family life classes with 452, crafts with 434 and special interest classes with 429.

In addition to the classes, 476 persons attended family learning sessions and 322 persons were served by the home economics outreach program, the report said.

The report also said 256 children were served in the prekindergarten classes, 256 children enrolled in the learn to swim program, 237 children attended extended day kindergarten classes and 158 persons were in classes for handicapped persons.

There were 276 persons enrolled in trade and industry classes, 381

in Americanization classes, 321 in adult basic education classes and 82 in the adult diploma classes.

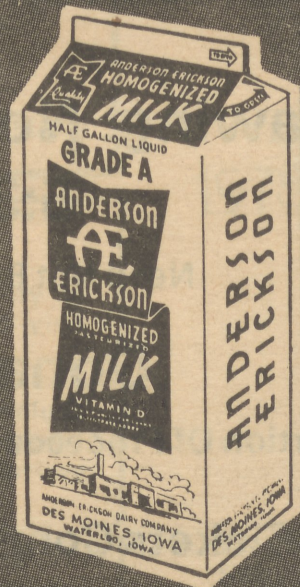

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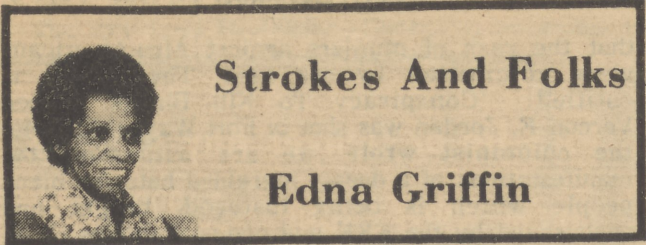
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**Strokes And Folks**

Now that the political dust of elections has settled, hail President-elect Reagan! News from London Tuesday morning of royal blood flowing his veins took my mind off the defeat of Senator John C. Culver for a moment.

According to the evening paper, our President-elect put his foot in his mouth before dark the same day. This is what he said, according to D.M. Tribune Tuesday, at his first press conference: "I don't think that you can turn away from some country because here and there they do not totally agree with our concept of human rights, and then at the same time maintain relations with other countries, or try to develop them, where human rights are virtually non-existent."

This 'foot-in-mouth' comment was made at a time when 35 member nations of the Helsinki Conference meeting in Madrid, Spain are struggling to preserve a peace agreement made five years ago. The Tuesday Tribune made this editorial comment: "We wonder what countries Reagan had in mind when he talked about human rights violations that occur only 'here and there'. Chile? South Africa? South Korea?"

In those and other countries that Reagan seems to believe are "basically friendly", human rights violations are not occasional events but "official policy" (my emphasis). Many will agree, I think, with the D.M. Tribune editorial comment.

I would add that Reagan's comment also creates uneasiness at home as well as abroad on the subject of human rights and equal protection under law.

We'll know soon enough.

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One small but important victory in San Diego, California is real cause for celebration. KU Klux Klan Grand Dragon Tom Metzger, running on the Democratic ticket, was defeated after considerable uproar within the party that caused the withdrawal three days before elections of official endorsement.

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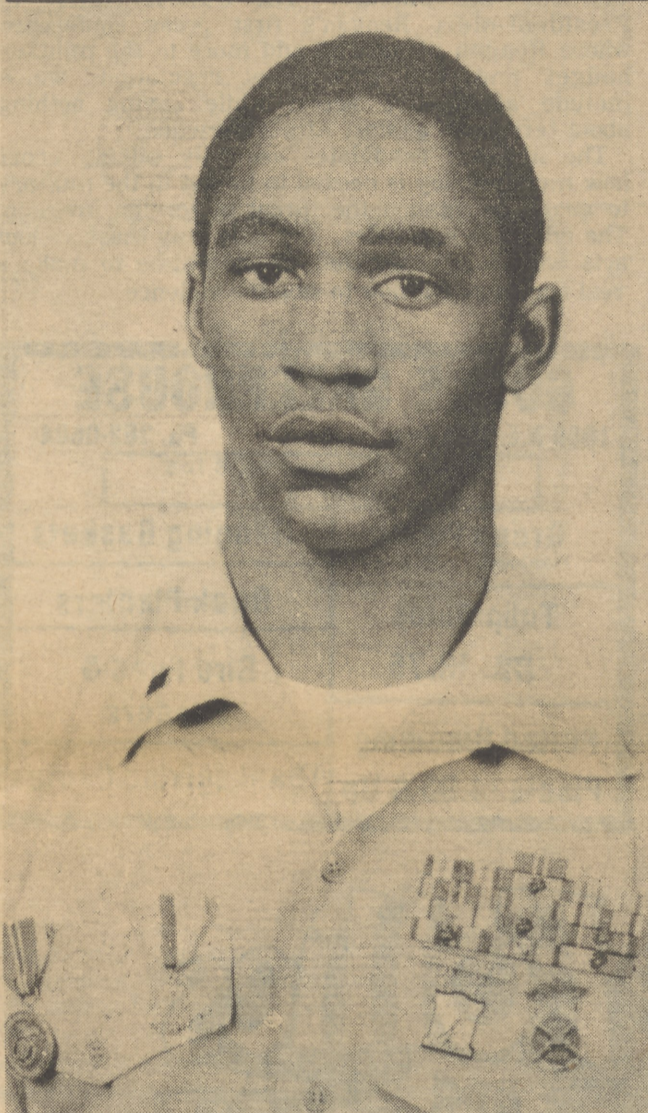

It is encouraging to read that the president of the United Methodist Council of Bishops is not intimidated by a layman's charges that church monies were being used for pro-Marxist causes. Bishop Roy C. 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## Minority Business

### NEW LAW TO EASE BURDEN OF REGULATIONS ON SMALL BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, D.C., October 20 — A new Federal law aimed at easing the regulatory burden on small business is of special importance to Black - owned firms, officials of the U.S. Small Business Administration said today.

The new law, the Regulatory Flexibility Act of 1980, requires all Federal regulatory agencies to consider the impact of their regulations on small businesses, publish a list

of proposed regulations and take the special needs of small business into account before putting new rules into effect.

SBA Administrator A. Vernon Weaver said, "The new law, will benefit all small companies. But it will especially benefit Black - owned firms, nearly all of which are small, with limited capabilities and assets to complete Federal paperwork forms and comply with Federal regulations."

"Black - owned firms are in dire need of relief from paperwork and other Government regulatory

requirements," added William A. Clement, Jr., SBA Associate Administrator for Minority Small Business and Capital Ownership Development. "This new law will help accelerate their entry into the economic marketplace as competitive entities," he added. Less Government regulation was a major recommendation of the White House Conference on Small Business that met in January.

In signing the Regulatory Flexibility Act, President Carter

noted that actions have now been taken on 11 of the Conference's 15 priority recommendations.

Black - owned firms who wish to obtain information on the Regulatory Flexibility Act should contact their nearest SBA District Office, which is listed under "U.S. Government" in the telephone directory.

Too frequently do we continually put off dealing with those personal issues and confrontations in our lives that require from us additional amounts of courage, stamina and of actually coming face-to-face with such situations.

How many times have we heard someone say that they wished that they would have done more for a loved one now gone? Or, been able to express words and feelings, or embraces? But, somehow through their own short comings or reasons, didn't take the time...or were always putting it off until another day...until it was too late.

There are many people who surround us daily who simply cannot bring themselves to deal with painful realities. **No one wants to deal with pain!** But pain is destined to come with life. And, if we are to face and live life to its fullest, then we must learn and prepare to face unpleasant and painful realities.

When is it that we realize that we must put our own weaknesses aside and pull from our reserves the strength that God has given us? And, with His help we become able to climb mountains of realization, swim across oceans of helplessness and climb out of valleys of sorrows.

We fail to realize that a person who may be dying is also living! When we hide ourselves away from loved ones who are terminal, and offer them excuses for our absence...we are only fooling ourselves. And, nothing becomes so apparent and painful to a terminally-ill person as to when their visitors become fewer and fewer...especially those whom they have held closest to their hearts during the duration of their lifetime.

There comes a time when we as humanistic beings must learn not to be so selfish and self-protective of our own feelings, but learn and genuinely understand that at times the feelings of others become more important than our own. It can be hard! But who said everything in life had to be easy?

the rate increases will permit customers presenting oral testimony to the Commission on how the rates will affect them. Customers will also have the chance to question Iowa Power representatives directly on any part of the rate increases.

The Commerce Commission has the final authority on whether Iowa Power receives the entire increase, part of the increase, or no increase. **ORDINANCE NO. 9854**

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, as amended by Ordinance No. 9781, passed June 23, 1980, by repealing subsection (5) of Section 23-242, repealing Section 23-243 and subsection (11) of Section 23-244 thereof and enacting a new subsection (5) of Section 23-242, a new Section 23-243, and a new subsection (11) of Section 23-244, all relating to the development of a public skywalk system in downtown Des Moines.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That the Municipal Code of Des Moines 1979, as amended by Ordinance No. 9781, passed June 23, 1980, be and is hereby amended by repealing subsection (5) of Section 23-242, repealing Section 23-243 and subsection (11) of Section 23-244 thereof and enacting a new subsection (5) of Section 23-242, a new Section 23-243 and a new subsection (11) of Section 23-244, all relating to the development of a public skywalk system in downtown Des Moines, as follows:

Sec. 23-242. THE CITY'S RESPONSIBILITY.

5. The City shall pay for the maintenance, repair and operational expenses for that portion of the skywalk system which traverses a City - owned building and shall pay the same share of such expenses for all skywalk bridges connecting to such City - owned building as if the City were a private property interest.

Sec. 23-243. OBLIGATIONS OF THE PRIVATE PROPERTY INTERESTS.

1. In addition to granting the easements required by section 23-241 of this Code, the owners of any private property interest traversed by the skywalk system and the skywalk - level tenants of such property (hereinafter "the private property interests") and their successors or assigns:

(a) May grant the City at no cost an easement for skywalk purposes for so much of a nodal area as exceeds the skywalk corridor easement. The location of these easements shall be as approved by the city council and shall be shown on the Official Skywalk Map. The private property interests shall have the right to change the location of such nodal area easements upon notification to and approval by the city council upon the advice of the skywalk commission, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld, and upon construction of the relocated portions of the skywalk system. The private property interests shall have the right to terminate any such nodal area easement upon three weeks written notice to the city council.

(b) Shall construct or otherwise provide at their own expense all portions of the skywalk system traversing their property and shall construct or provide such skywalk system according to the minimum design standards and criteria of this ordinance.

(c) In the event that the portion of the skywalk system traversing private property is so damaged or destroyed as to be unusable, shall be responsible for providing either an immediate temporary route around the damaged portion or construction of a temporary route to the ground level and a temporary route back to the skywalk system at the other end of the damaged portion and shall rebuild or otherwise replace the damaged portion of the skywalk system as soon as is reasonable, but in any event within three (3) years, unless the city council for good cause shown extends said three (3) year period, subject to such reasonable conditions as it may impose, for such reasonable period of time as is necessary to complete the repairs or replacement. Any person aggrieved by the decision of the city council may request binding arbitration by the same procedure as provided in subsection 23-240(3)(b) of this code.

(d) Shall be responsible for the

costs of operation, maintenance and repair of that portion of the skywalk system traversing their private property and shall be responsible for that share of such costs for each skywalk bridge connected to their private property as is determined by the following ratio: 1/N, where N equals the number of private properties connected to such skywalk bridge at any given time which are subject to a skywalk agreement then in existence; all in conformance to the operation, maintenance and repair standards set by the skywalk commission. In the event that a particular private property interest fails to fulfill its responsibilities for operation, maintenance or repair after notice to do so from the City, the City shall secure such operation, maintenance or repair and assess the cost of performing such operation, maintenance or repair against the private property upon reasonable notice and hearing before the city council.

(e) May enhance, to the extent they choose, a nodal area dedicated to the city by erection of sculpture, art work, plantings or other amenities as approved by the skywalk commission.

(f) Shall provide liability insurance for the portion of the skywalk system traversing their property in an appropriate amount, naming the private parties and the City as insureds, and shall carry casualty insurance in an amount sufficient to rebuild the skywalk system that traverses their private property.

(g) Shall be entirely responsible for any additional construction or costs necessary to provide security or separation between the skywalk system and the private property.

2. The obligation of a private property interest shall cease if it transfers its interest to another who assumes its obligation under the skywalk ordinance. The obligations of the private property interests and their successors and assigns shall cease if the private property is taken by an exercise of the power of eminent domain, or if the portion of the skywalk system traversing their property is formally abandoned by the City as part of the skywalk system. In addition, any time after thirty (30) years from the date they entered the skywalk agreement, all private property interests in a property, or their successors or assigns, may jointly terminate their obligations upon two (2) years written notice to the city council, which notice may be given at any time after twenty - eight (28) years from the date of such skywalk agreement; provided, however:

(a) that if the City makes significant capital repairs or replacements to a skywalk bridge abutting on such private property interests' property on or before fifteen (15) years from the date of their skywalk agreement, then they cannot so terminate their skywalk agreement until twenty - five (25) years after completion of such significant capital repairs and replacements or thirty (30) years from the date of their skywalk agreement, whichever is later; provided that in such event the prior written notice referred to above in this subsection may be given at any time after twenty - three (23) years from the completion of such significant capital repairs and replacements or twenty - eight (28) years from the date of their skywalk agreement, whichever is later; and

(b) that if the city makes significant capital repairs or replacements to a skywalk bridge abutting on such private property interests' property after fifteen (15) years from the date of their skywalk agreement, then they cannot so terminate their skywalk agreement until any time on or after forty (40) years from the date of their skywalk agreement; provided that in such event the prior notice referred to above in this subsection may be given at any time after thirty-eight (38) years from the date of their skywalk agreement.

"Significant capital repairs or

replacements" shall include only those capital repairs or replacements for which the city expends money not derived from insurance or the proceeds of a judgment awarded the city in an amount which exceeds 50 percent of the original cost of the skywalk bridge to which such capital repairs or replacements are to be made as such original cost is increased or decreased by the change in the index for "Building Cost" for Kansas City contained in **Engineering News - Record** from the date of award of the contract for original construction of the skywalk bridge to the last known figure for such component prior to the date of first action by the city council on such proposed significant capital repairs or replacements.

**Sec. 23-244. SKYWALK SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT CRITERIA.**

11. Those skywalk bridges, skywalk corridors and vertical access facilities which are designated by city council as fire exits or paths to fire exits must be open in accordance with the applicable fire ordinances of the City of Des Moines, as the same may be from time to time amended, and all Fire Prevention Code requirements as to the construction of skywalk corridors to a point of access to the outside must be observed. Private property interests may not use skywalk bridges or skywalk corridors as fire exits without specific permission from the city council.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Ordinance No. 7226, passed by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa on July 12, 1965, as amended, by repealing Section 2A-4, subsection (A) of Section 2A-25 and repealing Section 2A-27 thereof and enacting a new Section 2A-4, subsection (A) of Section 2A-25 and a new Section 2A-27, relating to Zoning Regulations.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa:

Section 1. That Ordinance No. 7226, passed by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa, July 12, 1965, as amended, be and is hereby amended by repealing Section 2A-4 thereof and enacting a new Section 2A-4, relating to establishment of Zoning Districts, as follows:

Sec. 2A-4. ESTABLISHMENT OF DISTRICTS.

In order to carry out the purpose and intent of this ordinance the area of the City of Des Moines, Iowa, is hereby divided into seventeen (17) Zoning District classifications as follows:

- "R-1" One Family Residence District
- "R-2" One and Two Family Residence District
- "R-2A" General Residential District
- "R-3" Multiple Family Residence District
- "R-4" Multiple Family Residence District
- "R-5" Mobile Home Park Residence District
- "R-6" Planned Residential Development District
- "C-0" Commercial - Residence District
- "C-1" Neighborhood Retail Commercial District
- "C-2" General Retail and Highway Oriented Commercial District
- "C-3" Central Business District Commercial District
- "C-4" Shopping Center Commercial District
- "M-1" Light Industrial District
- "M-2" Heavy Industrial District
- "M-3" Limited Industrial District
- "U-1" Flood Plain District
- "FW" Floodway District

Sec. 2. That Ordinance No. 7226, passed July 12, 1965, and amended by Ordinance No. 9783, passed July 21, 1980, be further amended by repealing subsection (A) of Section 2A-25 thereof and enacting a new subsection (A) of Section 2A-25, relating to off - street parking areas, as follows:

**Sec. 2A-25. OFF - STREET PARKING AREA REQUIRED.**

A) In all districts, except the "C-3" Commercial District, in connection with every industrial, commercial, business, trade, institutional, recreational, or dwelling use, and similar uses, space for parking and storage of vehicles shall be provided in accordance with the following schedule. Required off - street parking facilities shall be primarily for the parking of private passenger automobiles of occupants, patrons, or employees of the principal use served.

1. Automobile sales and service garages - one (1) parking space for each six hundred (600) square feet of gross floor area.

2. Barber shops and beauty parlors - two (2) spaces per operator.

3. Bowling alleys - five (5) spaces for each lane.

4. Church - one (1) parking space for every eighty (80) square feet of principal auditorium, including balcony, if any. Where no auditorium is involved, one (1) parking space for each two (2) staff members.

5. Dance halls, assembly halls, skating rinks - one (1) parking space for each one hundred fifty (150) square feet of floor area used for dancing or assembly or one (1) space for every four (4) seats.

6. Day care centers, nursery schools - (1) parking space for every two (2) staff members, plus stacking space for three (3) vehicles.

7. Drive - up financial offices - with no walk up facilities, one (1) parking space per two (2) employees plus three (3) stacking spaces per teller.

8. Dwelling.

a. Single family dwelling - one (1) parking space.

b. Two family dwelling - one (1) parking space per dwelling unit.

c. Townhouse (where each individual unit directly fronts on a public street) - one (1) parking space per dwelling unit.

d. Multiple family dwelling (includes those townhouses not mentioned above) - one and one - half (1½) parking space per dwelling unit.

9. Financial, business and professional offices - one (1) parking space for each four hundred (400) square feet of gross floor area, but in no case less than five (5) parking spaces.

10. Funeral homes, mortuaries - one (1) parking space for each five (5) seats in the principal auditorium.

11. Furniture and appliance stores, tailors, household equipment, furniture, TV and radio, and shoe repair shops - one (1) parking space for each six hundred (600) square feet of gross floor area, with a minimum of

three (3) spaces.

12. **Fraternity or sorority houses** - one (1) parking space for each two (2) persons residing on the premises.

13. **Gamerooms, pool halls and billiard parlors** - one and one-half (1½) parking spaces for each one hundred (100) square feet of gross floor area for any establishment other than one with a liquor license or beer permit.

14. **Hospitals** - one (1) space for each five (5) beds, plus one (1) space for each two (2) employees, plus one (1) space for each two (2) staff doctors.

15. **Hospitals (animal) kennels, animal grooming shops** - one (1) space per doctor plus one (1) space per employee, plus one (1) space for every four hundred (400) square feet excluding dog confinement area.

16. **Apartment hotels** - one (1) space for each two (2) units.

17. **Hotels, motels, lodging houses** - one (1) space for each two (2) bedrooms, and one (1) space for each three hundred (300) square feet of restaurant, coffee shop, lounge and meeting rooms.

18. **Housing for the elderly or handicapped** - one (1) space for every two (2) units.

19. **Manufacturing plants** - one (1) parking space for each two (2) employees on the maximum working shift, plus one (1) space for each four hundred (400) square feet of office space.

20. **Mini-warehouse** - one (1) space for each ten (10) storage spaces, stalls or lockers equally distributed throughout the storage area; plus (1) one space for any caretaker's quarters; plus five (5) spaces located at or near the project office for the use of prospective customers.

21. **Nursing care homes, special placement residences** - one (1) space per eight (8) beds, plus one (1) space per two (2) employees, plus one (1) space for each resident staff member.

22. **Printing shop, plumbing shop** - three (3) spaces plus one (1) space per two (2) employees.

23. **Restaurants, taverns and night clubs** - one (1) parking space for each one hundred fifty (150) square feet of gross floor area.

24. **Retail stores, shops, super markets, etc., over four thousand (4,000) square feet gross floor area** - one (1) parking space for each two hundred (200) square feet of gross floor area.

25. **Retail stores, shops, super markets, etc., with gas sales under four thousand (4,000) square feet gross floor area** - one (1) parking space for each three hundred (300) square feet of gross floor area; without gas sales: one (1) parking space for each four hundred (400) square feet of gross floor area.

26. **Schools.**

a. **Elementary and intermediate** - one (1) space for each two (2) employees, plus ten (10) spaces for visitors.

b. **High school** - one (1) space for each two (2) employees, plus one (1) space for every ten (10) students.

c. **Business, trade, and other** - one (1) space for every two (2) employees, plus one (1) space for every five (5) students.

27. **Sports arenas, auditoriums, other than in schools** - one (1) parking space for each six (6) seats.

28. **Tennis courts, racquetball courts** - two (2) spaces per court.

29. **Theatres, assembly halls with fixed seats** - one (1) space for each six (6) seats.

30. **Wholesale warehouses and establishments** - one (1) space per five thousand (5,000) square feet of gross floor area for the first one hundred thousand (100,000) square feet plus one (1) space per ten thousand (10,000) square feet of gross floor area over one hundred thousand (100,000) square feet, or one (1) space for each three (3) employees, whichever is greater.

Sec. 3. That said Ordinance No. 7226, passed by the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa, July 12, 1965, as amended by Ordinance No. 8476, passed October 30, 1972, be further amended by repealing Section 2A-27 thereof and enacting a new Section 2A-27, relating to

special permits, as follows:

Sec. 2A-27. **SPECIAL PERMITS.** The Board of Adjustment may by special permit after public hearing authorize the location of any of the following buildings or uses in any district from which they are prohibited by this ordinance.

1. Any public building erected and used by any department of the city, township, county, state or federal government.

2. Airport or landing field.

3. Community building or recreation field.

4. Hospitals, non-profit fraternal institutions, provided they are used solely for fraternal purposes, and institutions of an educational, religious, philanthropic or eleemosynary character.

5. Pre-schools.

6. Public cemetery.

7. Private golf courses, country clubs, and tennis or swimming clubs.

8. Bus terminals.

9. Pet cemetery.

10. Home occupations which do not cause or produce unreasonable traffic, noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odor, heat or glare, and which are not in any other way detrimental to the neighborhood.

11. Temporary off-street parking areas for more than five (5) vehicles, which do not satisfy the standards of Sec. 2A-25, in situations where such areas are planned to be developed for buildings within eighteen (18) months from the date of hearing, or where it is reasonable to allow time for new deposits of fill to settle before applying the standards of Sec. 2A-25 to the area; provided that no such special permit shall be granted for a longer term than eighteen (18) months, and provided that every such special permit granted shall be conditioned on maintenance of both a dustless surface and a drainage system approved by the City Engineer.

Applications for a special permit under the terms of this section shall be accompanied by evidence concerning the feasibility of the proposed request and its effect on surrounding property and shall include a site plan defining the areas to be developed for buildings, the areas to be developed for parking, the locations of sidewalks and driveways and the points of ingress and egress, including access streets where required, the location and heights of walls, the location and type of landscaping and the location, size, and number of signs.

Before issuing any special permit for any of the above buildings or uses, the Board of Adjustment shall review the conformity of the proposed building or use with the standards of the Comprehensive Plan, and with recognized principles of civic design, land use planning, and landscape architecture. The Board may approve the special permit as submitted or before approval, may require that the applicant modify, alter, adjust or amend the proposal as the Board deems necessary to the end that it preserve the intent and purpose of this ordinance to promote public health, safety, morals, and the general welfare.

In granting any special permit under the terms of this section, the Board of Adjustment may prescribe appropriate conditions and safeguards in conformity with this ordinance. Violation of such conditions and safeguards, when made a part of the terms under which the special permit is granted, shall result in revocation of the special permit.

In the event a special permit is granted under the terms of this section, any change thereafter in the approved use or site plan shall be resubmitted and considered in the same manner as the original proposal.

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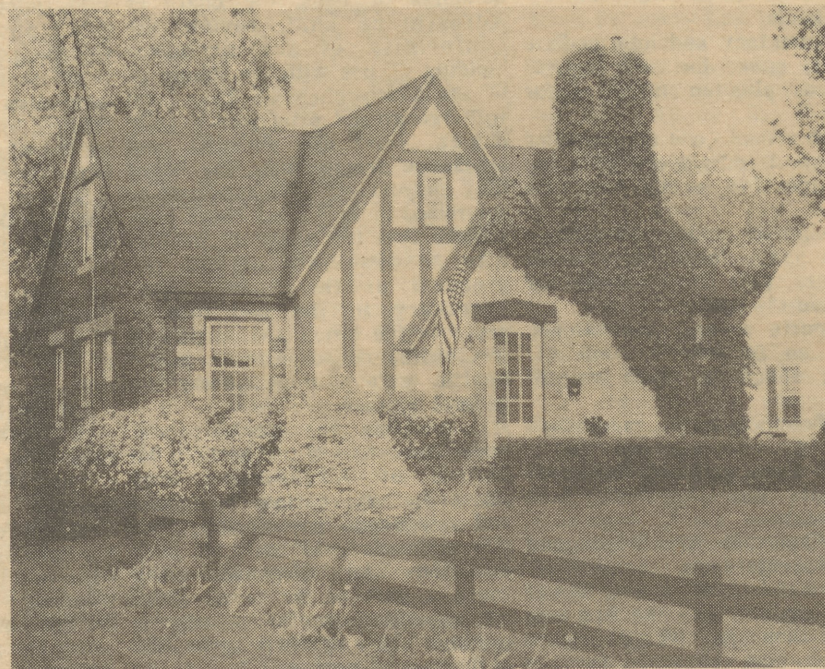

I don't know how many of the guys were there, and I won't give any names because I would surely

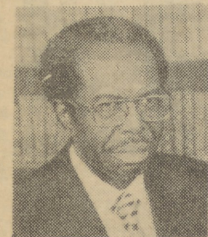
leave out someone who deserved to be included. However, the fellows always thought that the late Jack North, who really promoted the district and state softball tournaments, didn't like them.

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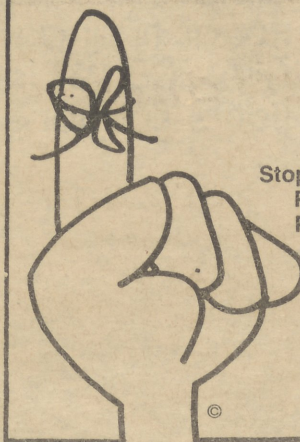

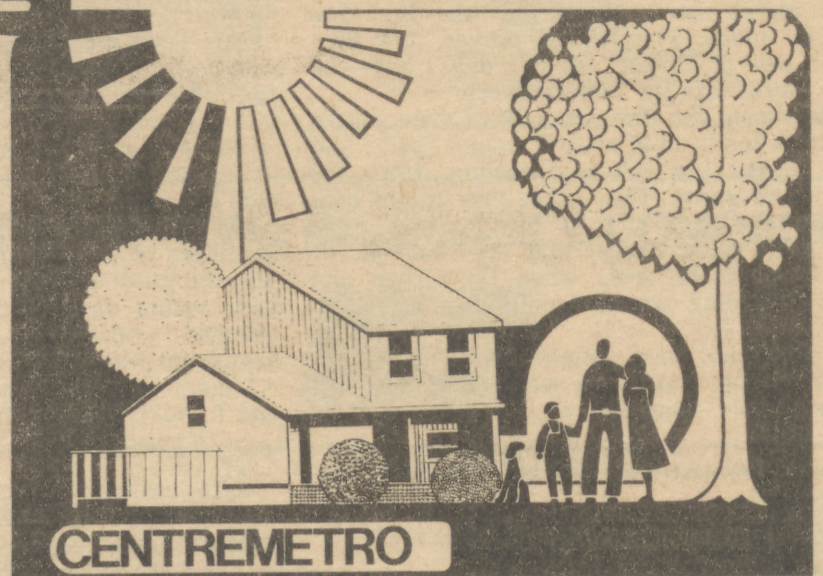

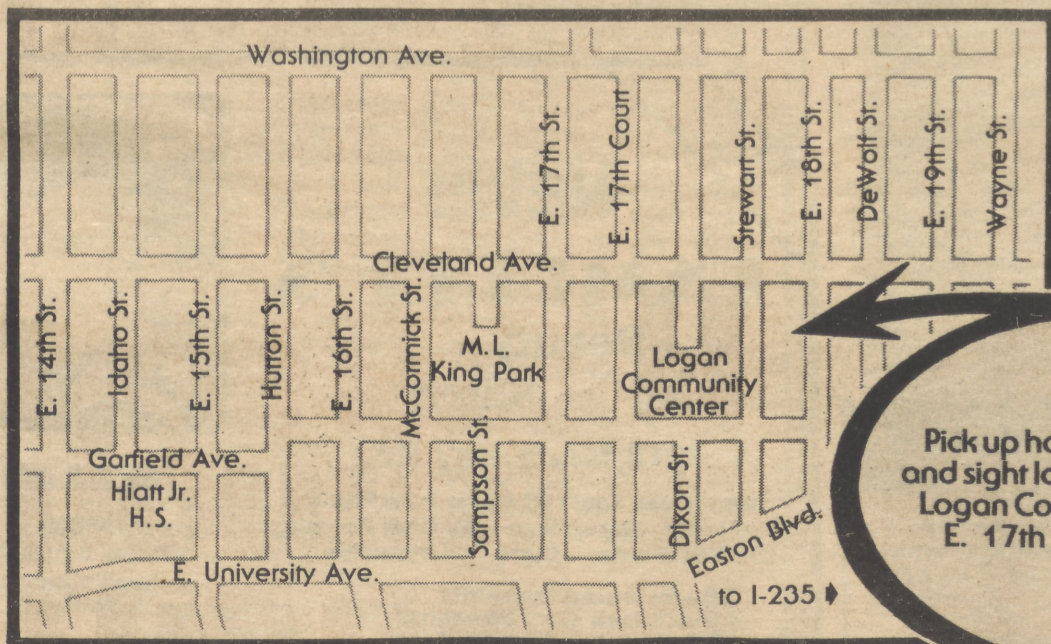
