Simon Estes

Simon Estes Recital At Civic Center

Iowa-born bass-baritone Simon Estes will give a recital at the Des Moines Civic Center on Tuesday, December 9th at 8 p.m. Mr. Estes will perform two Verdi arias, songs by Schubert, Wolf, and Samuel Barber and a medley of spirituals arranged by Burleigh.

With Simon Estes' triumphant appearances for three successive years in "The Flying Dutchman" at Bayreuth, the Wagner shrine, he has achieved the international stardom that was predicted for him after winning Moscow's first International Tchaikovsky Vocal Competition in 1966.

Since then, with over 80 operatic roles and 55 oratorios to his credit, he has appeared in most of the world's major opera houses and with all of the leading orchestras in concert, recital, and in such operatic roles as King Philip in "Don Carlos," Arkle in "Pelleas et Melisande," Wotan in the complete "Ring," "Boris Godounov," and King Mark in "Tristan und Isolde."

Additional highlights of his career have included a White House command performance, his appearance with the National Symphony Orchestra on the inaugural program for the J.F. Kennedy Center

for the Performing Arts, the 25th anniversary celebration of the founding of the U.N., and his singing the Beethoven 9th at the opening of the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich.

He is scheduled to make his Metropolitan Opera debut this April with a gala Wagner evening with Birgit Nilsson and James Levine. Negotiations are also underway for Mr. Estes to appear in his first film: Franco Zeffirelli's "Aida" to be filmed in Cairo and conducted by Leonard Bernstein.

Simon Estes is also known to music lovers through his numerous recordings on RCA, Angel, and Columbia.

Des Moines Notables Participate In Quad Cities Black Family Conference

Nov. 13 was declared Black Families Day by the mayors of the Quad Cities, as the second annual Black Families Conference got underway at Davenport's Blackhawk Hotel.

The conference, sponsored by the Western Illinois Assoc. for Black Social Workers and the Illinois-Iowa chapter Southern Christian Leadership Conference, had pre-registration and a cold buffet on Wednesday evening with Joyce Tucker setting the mood with an intense speech dealing with black history and its many complexes.

Tucker, director Illinois human rights commission, political activist and former member of the Illinois fair employment practice commission of Chicago,

led her listeners through the maze of captivity to the paradoxical freedom years.

Billie Lloyd, program analyst for Council for Children at Risk, Moline, Ill. and Co-ordinator for the conference said, the theme of the conference — Decade of the 80's where have we been and where are we going — was selected in conjunction with the overall concerns for the next ten years already expressed by black leadership.

In keeping with the desires of the committee to make the conference something for everyone, a new program was tried a

Youth Assembly with the full cooperation of area school officials. This event proved to be an overwhelming success; with programs aimed at motivating and supporting black youth in the community. The areas of concern were professional careers, sports careers, employment opportunities and community programs.

Simon Acres Thomas the robot, with his creator proved to be popular with the students as Gregory Thomas, a electrical engineering student at Souther Ill. Univ. at Edwardsville, Ill. put his

IEWS and REVIEWS

There is a growing argument around the country about whether stiff prison sentences cut down crime. From all of the things I have read and listened to, I would have to say it doesn't.

Recently I heard of a judge who gave everybody who appeared before him a second time the limit. He said that at least those criminals would be out of circulation for some time, and that would cut down on the crime rate. But does it?

I recently read that we had over three hundred thousand prisoners in all of our penal institutions, enough for a fair sized city. And how does a former prisoner get back in the system so easily?

Some theories have been advanced that the present system fails badly because it does not rehabilitate the inmate and turns the criminal out to take up where he left off, and in some cases more dangerous than

before. In fact, I think the whole system has broken down.

Juveniles will commit crimes and then tell the arresting officer that they can't be touched because they are juveniles. That is one criminal element that I have argued for years that should be treated as adults for adult crimes, and their names published instead of saying that John Jones and a juvenile did so and so. The juvenile gets off and John Jones bears whatever weight the crime carries.

Now I believe that the publishing of names and the involvement of parents in the commission of a juvenile crime would help cut down on this section of crime. Parents wouldn't want to see their names in the court record especially if the parent had had a record of no crimes. And then to have a child drag his name around might motivate the person to see to it that he kept a better check on his offspring. Then the offender would realize that he could no longer hide behind the anonymity of the juvenile law, and might think twice before doing some of the foolish things kids do today.

Now, I don't know how we could go about improving our present penal system of rehabilitation, but I do know that it is long overdue for some sort of change. Maybe the places where prisoners are sent to just before they get out are too lenient.

So often you hear of prisoners running away from the halfway house or honor farm and robbing or stealing. So, you say, why give them any sort of a

chance? But, if it were much harder to make that first step towards parole, maybe that would help.

I would guess that right now the country needs at least a thousand new prisons and countless city or county jails to house the influx of prisoners. Part of our trouble here is that we take so long to bring a person to justice that the crime is no longer fresh when the trial comes up.

And some have gotten off because the law says that each person accused of a crime must have a speedy trial, and if he doesn't get it, the case is tossed out.

Then we have so many lawyers who specialize in getting criminals off on technicalities, something that lots of them count on. But the fact of the deal is that if you are poor or black, your chances of getting off on a technicality are reduced to two, slim and none.

Another thing that might help is the reinstatement of the work ethic. Time was when it was somewhat of a stigma not to work, but today people boast of getting by without work. Welfare? Make welfare so that people would work as we all did in the early WPA days.

And, how would you drag a person off a big welfare deal to take a job? In my day, we thought everybody had to have some sort of job, or at least work, but howinhell are you gonna instill that in people today in these days of giveaway? And if they don't get it, there will be chaos. Now, I got you into it, you figure a way out.

The second count alleges a rescue, but the above remarks apply also to this count. The third count for concealing, and the fourth, for harboring and concealing, were considered together. These terms, the judge explained, are synonymous, and have the same meaning in the statute on which this action is founded.

To harbor and conceal is to do some act by which the fugitives from labor are prevented from being discovered by the owner, either by hiding, secreting, or transporting beyond the reach or knowledge of the owner. Talking to or performing the common offices of humanity, such as feeding the fugitives when hungry,

or conversing with him without an intention to violate the law, is not harboring or concealing within the statute.

If, however, the party accused has notice that the persons who are charged as fugitives from labor are such, any act, save one of humanity, which will cause the loss of services of such fugitives, will render that party liable. If the fugitives are carried or taken to any place beyond the reach or knowledge of the owner, whether he takes him from the possession of the owner or his agent or not, he has done that which this statute prohibits him from doing.

It must be borne in mind, however, that: (a) the offender must have knowledge, notice or information that the person concealed is a fugitive from labor, and that this knowledge may be imparted by anyone whom it is presumed may know the fact; and, (b) it must be shown by the evidence that the party concealing or harboring does so with the intention to defeat the means of the claimant to secure the fugitives.

The fifth count is for hindering an arrest. If the evidence is that an arrest was made by Slaughter and McClure before any of the defendants interfered, they cannot be found guilty under this count. The sixth count is for hindering and preventing agents from reclaiming and seizing. In this regard, he instructed

the jury to weigh the evidence and decide whether any or all of the defendants hindered or prevented the legal agents of plaintiff from reclaiming and seizing persons whom the defendants knew to be the slaves of plaintiff.

Further jury instructions were requested by both sides, but they were little more than to expand upon various facets of the discussions already presented.

In closing, the judge finished his statement to the jury by saying:

"...You, gentlemen, have patiently and calmly heard this case, and thereby shown that you appreciate its importance...with the general excitement on this subject, and the many plans for its settlement on some satisfactory basis, we have nothing to do."

Our business now is with the laws and the Constitution as they are, and not as we think they ought to be; and I doubt not, gentlemen, that you will come to the investigation of this case in your retirement with minds unbiased, unprejudiced, and with a sincere desire to render your verdict in accordance with the law and evidence submitted to you."

With that the case was submitted to the jury with the defendants fate in the balance.

A Female Focus On The Issues

As we approach the Christmas season, the lavish abundance and wealth within the U.S. is brought home to us — families spend huge amounts on gifts, toys, clothes and foodstuffs for the coming holidays. Much on the above will be used and consumed by small children.

Thinking of children reminds me of the thousands of black children in the Horn of Africa (Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya) who have perished due to malnutrition during the current drought of the past three years.

Actor John Amos and a Catholic priest appeared on the Today Show last month with horrendous film of the area and the suffering. Twelve year old children were weighing 25 pounds; black children laid dazed with huge distended bellies and hair turned red and grey from lack of food; mothers whose milk had long dried up trying desperately to feed near dead babies.

Where is the national publicity — the world wide publicity? Why are not the three networks carrying nightly news bulletins of this human tragedy? Why aren't U.S. citizens approaching this situation as they

mounted the all out campaign against hunger in Cambodia and Southeast Asia? Where is the U.S. government in all this? Isn't Washington concerned about babies dying horrible, lingering deaths from hunger?

No, many Americans do not know of the life and death struggle in East Africa. The media, newspapers, radio, TV and national magazines have not seen fit to make this story of human misery a nationwide concern. But most of the blame needs to be laid on the shoulders and at the feet of a racist, apathetic U.S. State Department and U.S. foreign policy, which is destined to become even more rightwing, conservative and uncaring towards third world nations under Reagan's administration.

The U.S. Congress just this week vetoed matching funds for third world hunger relief from other U.N. countries. As a father from the Catholic World Relief Agency told Today listeners, only 2/10ths of one percent of the U.S. gross national product goes to third world nations — brown, black and yellow people.

In a college text book, I read at least ten years ago, I spied another disheartening figure: on a world map I learned the amount of foreign aid a country receives

from the U.S. is directly proportional to the color of the peoples' skin in that particular country — So Canada and Western Europe get the most foreign aid from the U.S. with black Africa getting the least — hopeless racism.

The wealthy, highly "advanced", highly industrialized Caucasian countries who need the money the least get the most — sheer lunacy.

Last, the U.S. government's "color bound" policy of foreign aid also secretly maintains that countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America should be aided primarily by the former imperialist colonizers who ruled and tormented the native peoples in the 17th through the 20th centuries.

Now that European countries don't control the governments of third world nations why should they want to feed the starving peoples in those areas.

If the U.S. government won't help we have to. Please everyone dig deep in your pockets and send any amount of aid to the following relief services to prevent anymore black children from dying of malnutrition: Famine Relief, Box 627, FDR Station, NY, NY 10150 or CARE, East African Appeal, Box 576, NY, NY 10056.

with his guest appearance with Simon makes his goal more realistic. "I don't like to push kids toward a career in science but I tell them if they do choose it they will probably have a good life. I stress the importance of being happy."

Another popular person at the youth assembly was Dr. Arthur E. Thomas (no relation) This dynamic speaker who said, "We need to tell it like it is. We need to tell the facts. We need to present our ideas. We need to express our opinions. We need to let everyone know the complexity of the situation. We need to understand the variety of options open to us, and we need to act on them."

Thomas, Vice Pres. Academic Affairs Central St. Univ. Wilberforce, Ohio, had the unique gift of bringing the above beliefs to the students in such a dynamic, explosive manner that many times the kids rose to their feet yelling, cheering and clapping as his integrity and self-honesty endeared him to the point of self identity.

Nationally known and community professionals addressed such issues in the conference workshops as community services, the judicial system, education, employment, economics, health and the military. Among the workshop leaders were Tom Jones

Dir. of Affirmative Action Dept. Public Safety, Des Moines. Des Moines Honorable Luther Glanton district court judge of the 5th judicial dist. of Iowa, and Ms. Evelyn Davis director and founder of Tiny Tots Day care center.

Among those addressing employment and economics were Don K. Jones, manager development program manager for IBM, Bergenfield, New Jersey. Charles Jenkins Dist. administrative mgr. for NCR Davenport.

Dorthea Akers coordinator expanded food and nutrition program Univ. of Ill. Rock Island and Aldeen Davis, Muscatine, spoke about adequate nutrition for the Elderly.

Featured speakers included C.T. Vivian well known for his Urban Potential workshops and recipient of the George Washington Carver Distinguished African-American achievement Award, who

in a stirring speech decried the terror of Cheap religion. "The toughest job" said Vivian, "is to be a black man."

In his staunch speech Vivian attacked the terror of the Klan, the cheap religion of the fundamentalist Christian movement and the ineffective politics of leaders in the country. "The struggle has not ended; we must reach America at a deeper level. "This is not just for ourselves but for all America."

Vernon Jarret, a black Chicago Tribune syndicated columnist, brought in a low key fashion a very thought provoking, awakening type message in his awards banquet speech. He reiterated the fact that it was tough to be a black man.

"We've got to have more meetings like this (conference) and work out strategy. Or else we're going to be singing spirituals, giving code words for a new kind of

underground railroad." "Industry is now being refined", concluded Jarrett "and racism is increasing which spell out one thing — that we are going to have to think more than asking the Lord to bear our burdens; because the Lord needs some help"

Glenn Proctor, black writer for the Quad-Cities Times, pulled it all together the last day of the conference by charging Blacks to get involved. "Everybody can be a leader"

Proctor said, "A fancy title and a fancy suite is not necessary but we must get back to communicating, organizing and back to the church. We have Middle-class-itis that has brought us to the point that we have forgotten where we come from". "We have to get back into the game or we'll be sitting on the bench getting splinters"

Panel discussions were moderated by Roy Harley, acting Dir. of Council on Children at Risk. Panel members were: Don Jones management, IBM, Bergenfield N.J., Mary Curran Dir. Nutrition Program Rock Island, Ill.

Dr. Nathaniel Willis Dir. Physical Science Dept. Kennedy-King Center Chicago, Ill. Barbara Norman, Pres. Quad-Cities chapter LINKS Moline, Ill. Roland Sneed Reg. Dir. Nat'l Center on Child Abuse Wash. D.C.
