Red Cross Needs Nurses' Aides

Civil defense mobilization is protection against many war-caused dangers, not just protection against possible bombings. A major danger is our hospital's inability to continue to provide adequate medical care to meet everyday needs, much less meet enemy-caused emergencies.

Civil defense authorities have asked the Red Cross to train thousands of nurse's aides so that every community's hospitals will be assured of the much-needed, specialized help these trained volunteers provide. Officials of the local Civil Defense have requested your chapter to train an unlimited number and classes to provide this training will start March 2 at 7:30 P.M. at Allen Memorial Hospital.

This will be the prescribed American Red Cross course and will be taught by Miss Wilma Hackbart, R. N., supervisor of obstetrics at Allen Memorial Hospital. Part of the 80 hours of training will include supervised practice in St. Francis Hospital, Schoitz Memorial Hospital and Allen Memorial Hospital, where volunteers will learn to apply classroom experience to actual situations.

Such assistance was recognized as a vital contribution to hospital staffs during the critical nurse and doctor shortages of World War II — shortages which never were fully overcome and which will increase with the present emergency. Now, facing increasing shortages of staff, and as a preparation for the sudden medical care demand that enemy attack would create, it is urgent that training quotas be met to fill requests for nurses' aides.

Candidates for this service may register either by phone 3-3593 or come in person on Registration Day February 20th to the Black Hawk County Chapter office, 412 E. 4th Street, Friday, February 20th from 9:00 A. M. to 5:00 P.M. will be the final day for enrolling in the class beginning March 2nd.

Candidates for this course must be between the ages of 18 and 55, must be in good health in order to pass the complete physical examination required, have a high school education or its equivalent, before they are accepted for training.

There is no cost other than the blue and white uniforms and white shoes.

La Benskey has been found guilty this week of illegal possession of two guns, one of which, a 28 calibre Spanish automatic, was used in the killing of two Negroes.

Parents Keep Children Home From School

Washington, D.C. (CNS) — The all Negro Payne Elementary School could only pretend carrying on business as usual this week for tough teachers, clerks and Principal appeared at school at the usual morning time, there were no children to teach.

Hundreds of children in this much overcrowded school were being kept at home by enraged parents who say, "We can't do anything else but strike. We've talked and talked and we don't get anywhere. We told them there would not be enough room for our children in this school with an eight room addition. We told them they were wasting money to build the addition. School officials call this strike "deplorable" and School Board members are fuming. Since it is embarrassing to the new administration in Washington, Senator Francis Case, who is chairman of the Senate District Committee has entered the picture by sending the committee clerk over to the Payne neighborhood to get the facts. Senator Case is also exploring ways "to see if this matter can be straightened out."

Meanwhile the parents of children going to the Payne school, picket the school quietly from 8:30 until 9:15 in the morning and from 12:30 until 1:15 in the afternoon. Two policemen stand at the corner to see that order is preserved. A few children cross the picket line furtively as if they know they are wrong in not staying out with the rest. As to how long the strike will last, parents say they do not know. It depends on when and if their demands are met.

Gets Six Months On Assault Charges

Isam McClain, Waterloo, 32, of 620 Mobile St., was sentenced to six months in the Black Hawk county jail, when he pleaded guilty Tuesday morning before District Judge George C. Heath to a charge of assault with intent to great bodily injury.

The court was told by Don Frank, assistant county attorney, that the defendant had attacked three men when McClain became angry because they would not roll dice with him.

McClain wanted to "shoot craps" with Curtis Mosely of 820 Beech St., Arthur Williams of 125 Bates St. and Anderson Walker of 614 Glenwood St., in a shed at the rear of 111 Oneida St., on January 21. When they refused he lunged at them with his knife and slashed his own hand as well as Williams' shirt and hat, the court was told.

McClain had a previous record, the prosecutor related.

# "A Word From Your Marine Recruiter"

Most of the young men in the United States today are faced with the fact that sooner or later they will have to serve two or more years in one branch of the Armed Forces. This brings up the question of whether a man should enlist in the branch of his choice, or wait until he is called by his selective service board.

This is a question that each man will have to answer for himself. In all fairness to himself, I feel that a man should visit the different Recruiting Stations and learn just what each service has to offer before answering this question. For those of you who may not have the opportunity to visit the Marine Recruiting Station, I would like to briefly describe what the Marine Corps has to offer you, and what the requirements for enlistment are.

First of all, the Mental and Physical requirements for enlistment in the Marine Corps are the same as those of any other branch of the Armed Forces. The Physical and mental exams are given in Des Moines at the Armed Forces Examining Station where all men, enlisting or being inducted, in this area, are examined.

Moral requirements require that a man must not have been convicted of any offense by a court, including a juvenile court, or that he has not committed an act that would render him liable to prosecution in such a court. In cases where the offense was of a trival nature, such as a traffic violation, the violation of a local ordinance or any other minor offense not triable in Federal or State courts, and provided no jail or reformatory sentence was imposed, a waiver may be granted.

The enlistment periods in the Marine Corps are for three, four, or six years. Every man enlisting in the Marine Corps in this area, will be sent to San Diego, California, for approximately nine weeks of basic training. At the completion of this training, the Marine is normally granted a ten day leave to return home to his family and friends. After this leave, he will receive four weeks of advanced training at Camp Pendleton, Oceanside, California. From Camp Pendleton the Marine will be assigned to a school or a training course to prepare him for the job he will do throughout his tour of duty in the Marine Corps.

This brings up the question of what jobs or specialties the Marine Corps has to offer, and how a man is assigned to his particular job. The Marine Corps has over 430 different jobs and specialties which cover duty on land, sea, and in

the air. The Marine Corps knows that a man will do the best job if he is doing the type of work he likes, so whenever possible, a man will be assigned the job of his choice. In general there are these factors which govern what job a man will be assigned to. There are: 1. What a man is qualified to do; 2. What a man wants to do, and 3. What jobs are available at the time. This guide is used regardless of the race, color or creed of the Marine.

After a Marine has been assigned a particular type of work, and has completed his four weeks advanced training, he is then sent to a school or training course to prepare him for this job. The Marine Corps have over 140 different schools with experienced instructors who are experts in their fields. In some cases, Marines are also assigned to Army, Navy, or Air Force schools. In addition to the regular service schools, a Marine is offered the opportunity to take correspondent courses through the Marine Corps Institute of the United States Armed Forces Institute. For the Marine who wishes to continue his education in either high school, college, or vocational courses, the opportunities are unlimited.

As I have said before the Marines serve on land, sea and in the air. On land there are the three Marine Corps divisions: one on the East coast; one on the West coast and one in Korea. Marines Guards in the friendly capitals throughout the world. Marines normally furnish the security forces for the Navy bases in the United States and overseas.

In closing, I would like to say that the Marine Corps has much to offer the young men today. Why not visit the Marine Recruiting Station in the basement of the Post Office Building, Waterloo, and learn more about your opportunities in the Marines. My office is open from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. every week day and from 8:00 A.M. to noon on Saturdays. For those of you who are unable to visit the office during these hours, I will be glad to make an appointment to meet you some time at your convenience.

# Beating The Gun

BETWEEN ROUND NOTES . . .

Lightweight champion Jimmy Carter last week won a 10-round one-sided bout from someone called Archie Whitewater, a Cherokee Indian, out in Oakland, Calif. It was a nontitle affair. . . .

Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano has been named the Winner of the Edward J. Neil memorial plaque as the fighter of the year. He will receive the honor Jan. 15 from the Boxing Writers association at its annual dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria.

During the year 1952, the Chicago Stadium did not draw very well as far as boxing shows are concerned. For 17 boxing shows, promoted by the International Boxing Club, the Stadium attracted 90,697 fans who paid \$536,672.72 to see some action.

Of this total 23,361 fans contributed \$335,458 including \$80,000 from TV, to see middleweight champion Ray Robinson knock out Rocky Graziano. This was a record indoor crowd, but not a record gate.

Second largest crowd also saw Graziano lose—11,970 paid \$83,630 to see Chuck Davey out dance the slugger for 10 rounds.

Financial snafu of the year resulted from a Johnny Saxton—Virgil Akins fight which drew only 1,972 who paid 03,436.10 for the privilege of seeing the bout.

Boxing commissioner Enoch P. Waters, Jr. was honored by the Club Flamingo in Chicago for his contributions to sports and as a citizen. Called the Flamingo Sports award, it is given to persons "who have distinguished themselves in the field of sports."

Ezzard Charles, former heavyweight champion of the world, won the first of these awards. Both presentation programs have been excellent.

It appears that welterweight Gil Turner will not get a chance soon to avenge his loss to Bobby Dykes. The bout, originally scheduled for Dec. 1, was called off because something happened to Dykes. Tough Joe Miceli was to face him on Dec. 15, but Turner had a training camp accident, and the bout had to be postponed again. The likely date now is Dec. 29, still in Philly and televised.

MIDDLEWEIGHT TOURNNEY COMING UP . . .

Although Ray Robinson, the middleweight king, says he will fight once more, the International Boxing Club is proceeding with plans to promote elimination bouts for what they think will be a vacated 160-pound crown.

CHARLES WANTS ANOTHER CHANCE AT TITLE

Detroit, Mich. (CNS) — Having disposed of 23 year old Tommy Harrison in a ninth round technical knockout, Ezzard Charles chose the time to announce that he would challenge the winner of the Rocky Marciano — Jersey Joe Walcott fight on April 10th.

"I'm ready now for a title fight any time now," 31 year old Charles said. "And I think I should be the first one to get a shot at the Mariano-Walcott winner. I plan to keep fighting at least once a month until the championship fight comes."

The former champion may have to wait quite a while for that "big" one. For International Boxing Club has already announced that it will match the Mariano-Walcott winner against the winner of the Feb. 13th bout in New York between Rex Layne and Roland LaStarza in a summer title battle.

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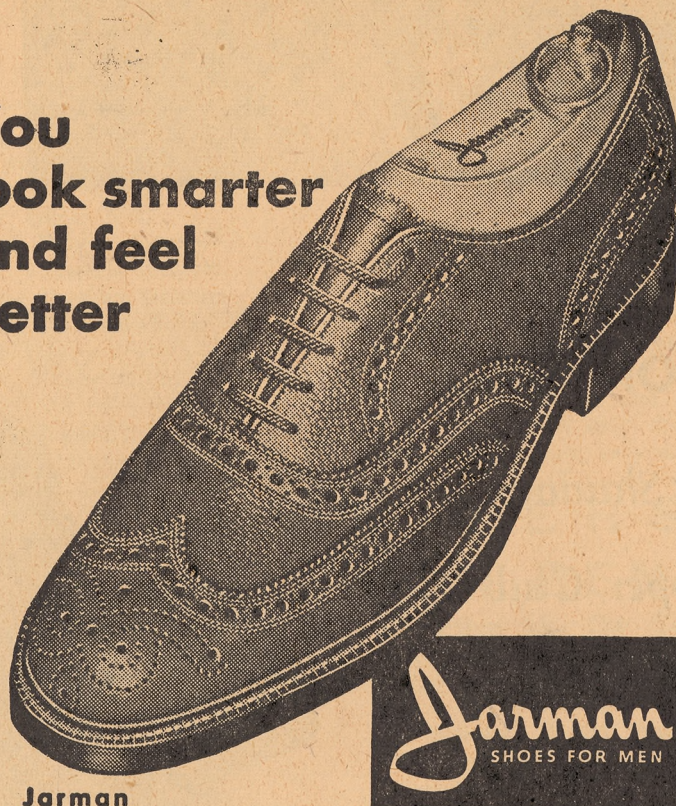

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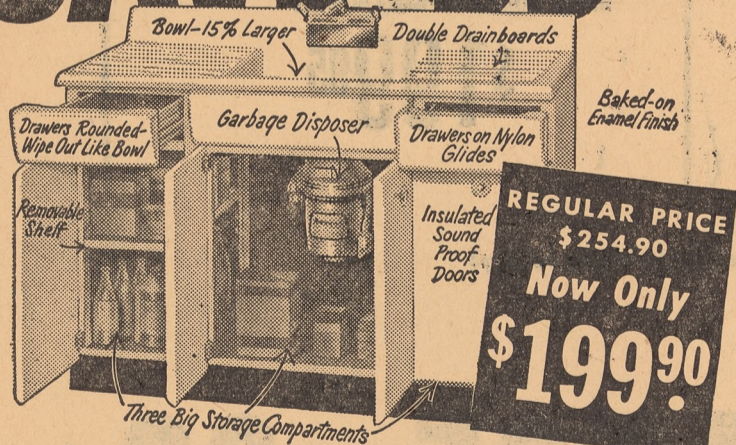

## EIGHT CIVIL RIGHTS BILLS IN SENATE

Washington (ANP) — Eight civil rights bills were introduced last week by a group of eight senators headed by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, Democrat of Minnesota.

The eight civil rights bills call for legislation to make lynching a federal crime; to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting; to reorganize the department of justice for the protection of civil rights; to provide relief against certain forms of discrimination in interstate transportation; to strengthen existing civil rights statutes in accordance with recommendations of the justice department; to tighten our federal laws to protect the right to political participation; to tighten the anti-pionage statutes in accordance with recommendations of the justice department; and to establish a joint congressional committee on civil rights.

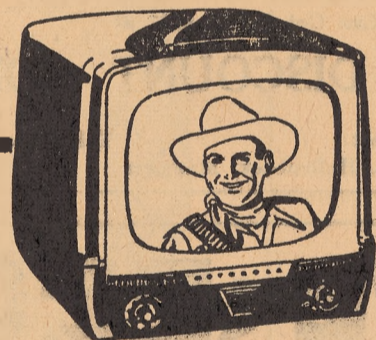
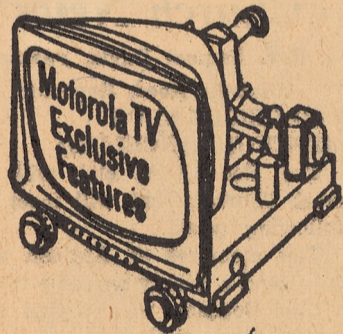
