## 85th Congress Expected to Wage War on High Court Next Year

Washington (ANP) — With Southerners filling important positions in the new Congress the legislative body is expected to wage an explosive war on the U.S. Supreme Court next year when the Democrat-controlled Congress of the United States convenes in January.

With Mississippi leading the attack, Southerners in the next Congress are expected to:

(1) Uphold state laws that are in conflict with federal laws unless Congress spelled out, when it passed the federal laws, that they were to supercede the state laws.

(2) Require a minimum of judicial experience, say five years, for persons nominated to serve on the Supreme Court or on any federal appeals or district court.

Many members of the Congress outside the South have been disturbed by what they regard as the Supreme Court's down-grading of state's rights in the matter of "right to work" laws and state laws on subversion or internal security.

These lawmakers feel that the Supreme Court majority has been prone to resolve too many conflicts between federal law and state law in favor of federal law. Even in some cases Congress, in enacting the federal law, plainly did not intend that it should take precedence over state law.

Education of higher learning stands out as a necessity. This is the only means of qualification.

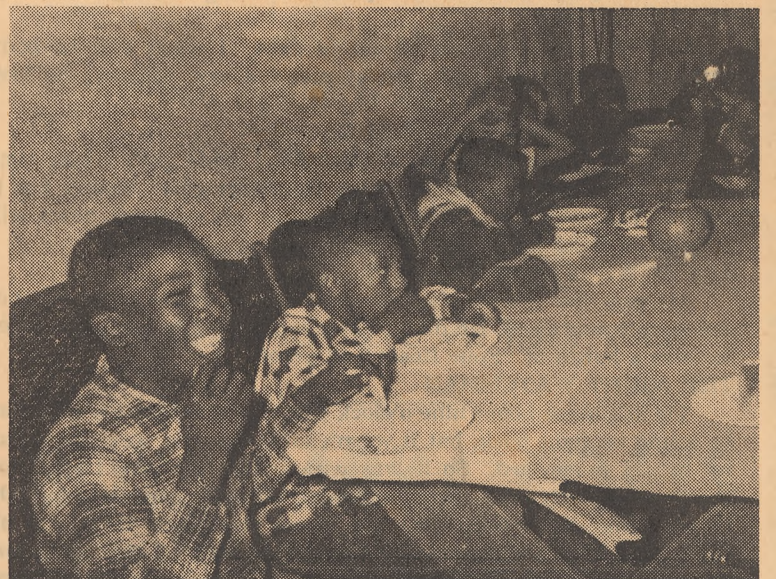
Whether it be for skillfulness of medical science, or the brilliant mind of the lawyer, or the alertness of the skillful labor.

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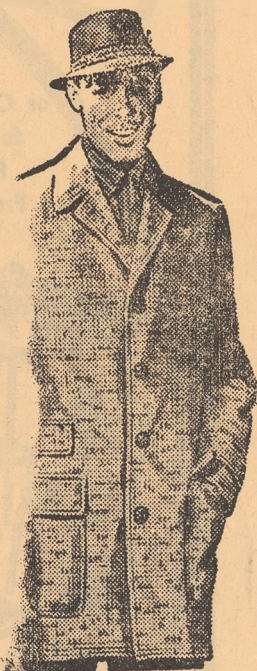
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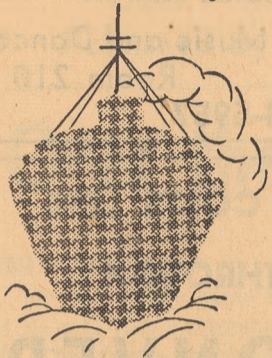

under fire for its decisions against segregation in the public schools, the Congress is not likely to pass any act that would set up any new standards for qualifications for service on the high tribunal.

Many legislators from non-Southern states feel that a vote for any such change might be looked upon as a direct reflection on those high court justices who joined in the school segregation decision.

But the Senate, for the next few years at least, can be expected to virtually demand a good background in the judiciary before it confirms nominations to the Supreme Court.

Back in May, 1954, two years before he became chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, the Senate's highest committee, Mississippi Senator James O. Eastland said in a Senate speech:

"None of the great American rights of human liberty are secure while these men in judicial robes, many without practical legal experience or sound judgment of the law, sit as a Congress and a constitutional convention combined."

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
