Call Disturbance A 'Rebellion'; Not A Riot

Everyone is calling the disturbance July 7, 8, and 9, a riot; but the Defender calls it a rebellion. A riot is when two groups meet and fight. This was a rebellion by young Negroes to show the people downtown they are fed up. Fed up with present conditions in the ghetto; and fed up with broken promises from the man downtown.

The police department gives no credit to the work done by Negro leaders; leaders such as Dr. Warren Nash, Rev. Parker, and members of other civil rights groups and the Civilian Patrol. These Negro leaders and lay men kept the violence and damage to a minimum; no one was killed or even seriously injured by the Negro youngsters, and very little property damaged occurred. Targets

Detroit Man Being Held

A 23 year old man from Detroit, Roosevelt Green, is being charged with instigating the disturbance in Waterloo on July 7-9. He reportedly had moved here from Detroit within the last three months, and was picked up on lesser charges the night of the disturbance. Since then, he has been accused of being one of those responsible.

The Defender editor, knowing Mr. Green, and also knowing the circumstances of the disturbance, feels that he was certainly not the cause of the trouble, or the catalyst. This trouble has been brewing for much longer than three months, and it would not take any outsider to set it off. In fact, if he did come here to incite a riot, he didn't do much of a job. It will be interesting to see just how much of this the city officials can fob off on a "Bogey Man" from the outlands.

for the brick throwing were carefully chosen; only white owned and run businesses were damaged.

The Defender would not attempt to tell the Waterloo Police department how to run things; but it seems apparent from the lack of respect shown Negro citizens by the police, and vice versa, that some training in race relations is needed by our policemen. We were recently told that some training along this line was being given, but it might be profitable to have more 'in depth' sessions on 'How to win friends and influence people, without use of riot sticks and billy clubs.'

This rebellion could break out again, any time, any place. This time, however, it would be harder to contain, and could be much worse for all involved. Negroes don't want violence, or damage of any kind, they are all constantly trying to avert violence. After watching the TV special, "Outbreak," Sunday evening, and hearing our police chief's statements, it appears he is a prejudiced person who may never be able to shed the old stereotype relationship of white against black. With this type of leadership, it is no wonder that the police department itself seems caught in a vicious circle of suspicions, fear, disrespect.

Facts About On The Job Training

On-the-Job Training is a federally financed program for reimbursing private and public employers for the extra time they take to draw up and supervise a skill training program on their business premises for unemployed or less than full-time employed people who are unskilled in the employers trade, craft or business.

Some basic requirements an employer must meet to qualify as an on-the-job trainer are:

1. He must hire the trainee as a full time employee, (40 hours a week) paying the going wage for similar jobs in the area.
2. The basic hourly wage must be at least \$1.40 an hour.
3. He must pay time and a half for over 40 hours a week.
4. The job must offer reasonable expectation of being continued on a full time basis after the training period.
5. He must make a reasonable attempt to teach all the skills that were specified in his contract.
6. He may select his own trainee, but the trainee has to be certified as being unemployed or underemployed and in need of skilled training, by the OJT Job Developer.

Contact the On-the-Training Coordinator in your area for further information.

If you are in need of training, the only requirements you need to be eligible for on-the-job training are that you are unemployed or employed less than forty hours a week. Also, if you wish training in a specified field, it would be necessary to undergo some testing and counseling at the Iowa State Employment Service to indicate that you have some basic aptitudes for the training you are interested in.

Listed below are some things that OJT can and cannot do for you.

1. OJT can help you get started in a job and a training program by reimbursing an employer for the extra time he spends training you. The employer makes the final decision as to whom he will hire, however. Therefore, it might be necessary for OJT to suggest that you spend a short time in a classroom training program to better prepare you for a job and to indicate to a potential employer that you have established a work record.

OJT cannot place you in a part-time, or summer only training situation.

3. OJT cannot place you in a series of training situations. If you fail to complete a training program without good cause, you are not eligible for other training for a year.

4. OJT cannot negotiate training programs for you if you are fully employed, unless you can show that your current job is only

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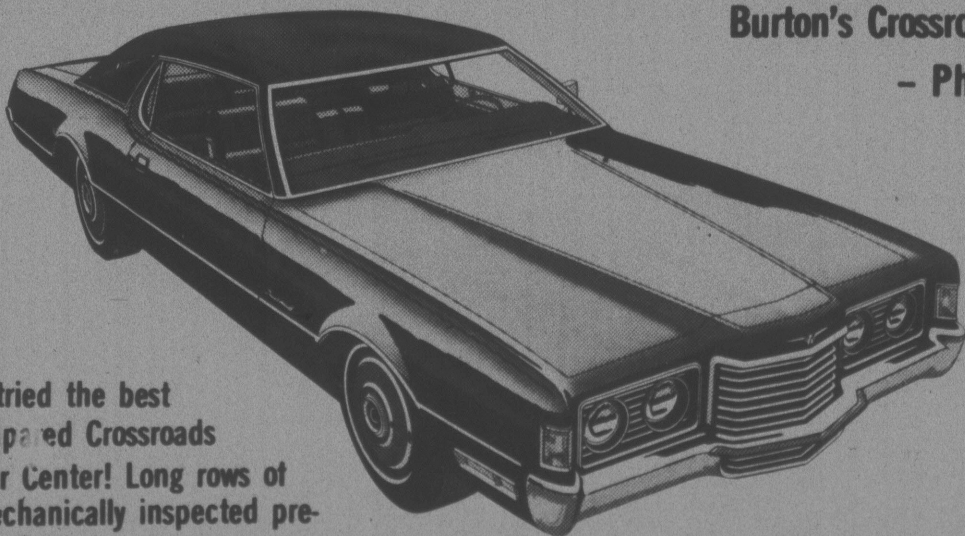
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Segregated school ruling

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — (UPI) — Private, segregated schools will have to find new places for their sports events because of a ruling from a federal judge.

U. S. District Judge Frank M. Johnson Jr. ruled that the city's policy of letting the schools use public fields and facilities was unconstitutional.

Johnson said the policy was unconstitutional regardless of whether the private schools had a "declared" admissions policy regarding race.

"The test is whether the city's aid frustrates the right of black citizens to a desegregated public education," the judge said.

The city had been making its football, basketball, and baseball facilities available to such private groups as schools, churches, civic clubs and charitable groups.

Angela trial is postponed

SAN JOSE, Calif. — (UPI) — Angela Davis' murder, kidnap and conspiracy trial was postponed for a third time while the judge hears pending defense motions on a "day to day basis" starting Jan. 31.

Miss Davis, who celebrates her 28th birthday next Wednesday, was escorted without handcuffs and wearing a striking blue outfit for the closed door meeting between attorneys for both sides and Superior Court Judge Richard E. Arnason.

Prosecutor Albert Harris estimated the delay would take "about two weeks," but Chief Defense Counsel Howard Moore Jr. said it would more likely last "up to a month."

The former UCLA philosophy instructor's trial was previously set for Sept. 27, Nov. 1 of last year and Jan. 31 of this year, and each time was delayed because of defense petitions.

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A Better Quality Of Life For All Iowans

An interview with Senator John Tapscott, candidate for Iowa's next governor.

Question:

What do you feel are the major problems facing the state of Iowa and the United States?

Answer:

We are running our campaign on the number one priority and that is to begin the eradication of poverty by the process in which legislative bodies and executive branches of government appropriate money to programs and of course with that goes the whole area of social reform. We are basing this campaign on changing the priorities in Iowa, things over people to people over things. With that we'll call for the necessity of appropriating additional money for such programs as the category of grant programs, the alcoholic program, the drug abuse program, accelerating our work incentive program whereby we are rehabilitating people who are on welfare and are able to get gainful employment. In penal reform we are advocating the ultimate closing of the Fort Madison penitentiary and Anamosa, going to the regional concept of correctional centers for those people who must have maximum security but at the same time offering comprehensive rehabilitation programs, offering minimum security facilities other than jails, leaving the people who are incarcerated as close to their own local environment as possible.

Question:

You mentioned increasing spending in poverty programs. How do you feel about the present federal spending?

Answer:

Well, of course, as most programs that have come from the federal level the vast sums of money have been used for the administrative costs and the money never seems to get to the people. The President's projected family assistance program is, of course, totally inadequate. I support a guaranteed minimum wage for every citizen, every family in the United States. I think that this is not necessarily the goal of such programs. Those programs are supposedly initiated to rehabilitate the structure of a community until you have full employment or adequate income to give those people the dignity that is necessary to be viable in society. We are paying, as an example, an old age assistance recipient \$117 total monthly income, and an ADC mother \$243 with a family of four total subsistence. I can see no way any kind of federally sponsored program or whatever program, to really upgrade the total environment and the quality of life in that community and I think that all we are doing is establishing additional bureaucracies and additional jobs for administrators. Regardless of the type of rehabilitation program that is initiated under any federal sponsored or federal-state-local program, there are people in this society because of the limitations of children, etc., who are unable to work. Now it seems to me that first of all we should be dealing with the problems that affect people in their daily lives and they are subsistence in food, adequate health care and adequate housing.

Question:

In discussing financial assistance to low income people, what do you see as a realistic income level which the state can support?

Answer:

The Iowa Department of Social Services requested this year 100 percent of basic minimum need and the governor took seven million dollars off this request, the legislature cut four million dollars off his request, which is a total of 11 million dollars. And that reduced the asking of 100 percent basic minimum need to all people in categorical assistance grants

down to the 81 percent of basic need on 1969 standard of living. I think that the state has the obligation to at least meet the 100 percent of basic minimum need. Now we talk about a guaranteed annual wage. We have never had a governor who has stood up and openly asked for federal legislation for guaranteed annual wage because there are those people in this society who immediately talk as if that is a socialistic approach to the problem and as I view our society, now, it is really socialism for the rich, capitalism for the poor. Yet we can continue to guarantee at the federal level such amounts as 250 million dollars to Lockheed Aircraft and we continue to subsidize the John Waynes in America at 810 thousand dollars a year by farm subsidies and using the tax loopholes that are available to them. But when we talk about a guaranteed minimum wage for all people in this country, there are those because of their own self interest and special interest who like to talk that as socialism. But in answer to your question I think that the state has first of all the obligation to be sure every citizen in Iowa has the basic minimum needs met in health care and housing and, of course, in food and that is only going to become a reality when one governor and one legislative body comes to grips with that problem. The only way I can see that we are going to come to grips with that problem is when someone who is governor of the state takes the legislature head on if they fail to pass such a program. So beyond that, anything that would be guaranteed as a minimum wage would have to come from a federal level. I think the governor, if joined by other governors in the country, could be a moving force in that direction.

Question:

What role do you see the business community playing in your overall plan if you are elected governor?

Answer:

Paying higher taxes. Frankly, it is the Chambers of Commerce throughout this country that have opposed increased public assistance grants and any type of guaranteed annual wage because they know the grants are going to have to be met through taxation. They are willing to pay the rate of taxes they are paying presently to support the military-industrial complex of this country because they partake in the return of profits. They don't feel there would be that great a return economically if they were to support through taxations a greater amount of money to the welfare system. Now when I say what part they are going to play I guess maybe I don't understand the question other than I see that the business community now paying a disproportionate share of taxes. As an example, we will be proposing legislation to increase the corporation tax formula that would bring in an additional 30 million dollars into the state revenue. We will be proposing an in-

come tax proposal (progressive income tax) that will bring in an additional 70 million dollars in revenue. Now 70 percent of that 70 million dollars will come from 15 thousand dollar and above income levels and of course that goes predominantly to the business community. That is the part we see them playing.

Question:

In regard to the social change that is needed in the crisis existing in Iowa and the United States what legitimate means do you see a citizen using to effect change when he is basically in a politically powerless position?

Answer:

First of all, I understand why many people don't participate in a political system. They have been lied to for so long that obviously they have very little faith in anyone in the political system. What we are attempting to do in the educational process of this campaign as well as trying to turn on some of the middle-class affluents to social reform -- is to convince the people that have been disfranchised and haven't been part of the system that we have the kind of meaningful campaign philosophy that is going to begin to change their way of life and bring them into this structure. We mean it when we say we will not in total appoint anyone from an industry to regulate that industry. No longer will there be just bankers commission, just realtors, on Iowa Commerce commission just experts and professionals from utility companies, from grain exchange companies to regulate these industries. We are saying that there will be people from the grass roots level. For example: A housewife serving on the Iowa Commerce commission. Most of the regulatory bodies that have been formed over the past two years supposedly form to serve the best interest of the consumer and obviously people haven't witnessed that and particularly people who are living in impoverished areas. People who have been disfranchised are the ones who have no one to turn to in any one of these bureaucracies of government because there is no one there who is sensitive to their needs and their problems.

Question:

In attempting to reach the goals which you have outlined, many of these deal with attitudinal changes that will have to take place within the citizenry. What are some of the basic changes of attitudes that you see that the citizens of Iowa may have to go through to accept some of the things that you have presented?

Answer:

Supporting the theological belief that they have harbored over the years is the Judeo-Christian thing to do; yet, when it comes right down to dealing with controversial people-programs, somewhere along the line either they have been misguided or they have been misinformed or they don't follow the dictates of their conscience.

Because of political financial influence, it is probably a combination of both. One of the things that we are relying on presently is not to see a complete and total change in attitude in relation to social reform, but that there are a great number of people who are disillusioned, frustrated, over the lack of credibility by elected officials. That elected officials are not being totally honest with people. We are attempting to be totally honest. We sometimes have to do some soul searching ourselves, but we are certainly attempting to be totally honest and tell it like it is. We have found that this has been very effective in many areas and many people have come up and told us, "Well, we don't necessarily agree with some of the things you say but at least, by God, you are saying it and that is the kind of thing that I think people are looking for." Along with that of course we hope through this educational process that we talk about in this campaign that we will change a few attitudes along the way.

Question:

Where do you feel that the youth of today realistically can expect to make the greatest input for social change in regard to our present structure?

Answer:

Considering our present structure, we have to deal with the political system that we are involved in presently. I'll be frank; I am rather concerned. I have heard a lot of concern by the 18-year-olds and upwards as to the system, structure of the establishment, etc. The corruptness, I certainly would have to agree with, because I think they have a great insight. I am concerned, however, at the numbers who are not registering to vote in the forthcoming primary. Many of them are talking about voting in the general election. I think if they really want to effect the kind of philosophical change that is going to be necessary to start the reformation in the political system and ultimately in government, they are going to have to put forth efforts in primary elections because that is where you are going to pick the philosophical candidate that is going to represent either party. We are only kidding ourselves at this point in time if those who are registering as independent and talking about the possibility of a third party movement and the possibility of an independent candidate. It is just not viable and I am certainly not an alternative. It may well be but it is not here. We are dealing with the present and even though our campaign is very idealistic, you still have to deal with what is now. I think that there are just too many young people copping out. They are going around talking about the uninvolved of their father and mother who are hung up on materialism, and I would have to tend to agree with them. But by the same token, they are showing me nothing in relationship to involving themselves in a populist campaign particularly. We need people with that kind of insight. When they don't involve themselves in that kind of campaign, then I feel that they are guilty of the same kind of thing that they are accusing their parents of. It's a difference between materialism and do-nothing-ism. Those who have involved themselves in this campaign and those who are actively engaged in trying to register 18-25-year-olds are doing it because they know this is the only way. Dealing in the present-day situation, it is the only way we are going to be able to effect any kind of a social change in this structure. There will be close to 100 thousand voters that would be eligible to vote in the June primary. There is an estimation now that there will be less than 20,000 that will actually cast their votes in the June primary. So

when they wake up the day after the primary and they have two candidates, one for each party, with basically the same philosophy they have no one to blame but themselves.

Question:

As the June primary nears for the Democratic candidates, why should someone who wants society changed vote for John Tapscott and not the other candidates running?

Answer:

Well, I have been in politics 20 years. I came up through the ranks, as a president of Young Democrats, as a precinct committeeman, and as I mentioned earlier, for John F. Kennedy, worked for L. B. Johnson, supported Hubert Humphrey up to the Chicago fiasco. I am not trying to establish credibility in that area, but I have been through the whole process. I have seen back-room politics. I have been part of the back-room politics; I played the game. I have played the game in the business world, lost a business because I would not conform to the board of realtors' wishes in relationship to racial matters. I met with them at their own private club. At some point in time my life began to change. I began to realize that personality cults and personality campaigns were just package and sell Madison Avenue campaigns and I no longer wanted to become involved in truly a movement of people who are moving in the direction, to grab a phrase from Gardner, "a common cause." I suppose that the only thing I could say to the individuals who question why me over someone else, get involved in this type of campaign. There are many people throughout the state working who have never been active in politics before: Black, chicano, white, poor white, physically handicapped people, old age assistance recipients, and I think you have to get it from the vibes of the whole campaign, not from me individually as a candidate, but from the people who are involved in the campaign. It really comes as a matter of vibrations that you are involved in a populist movement. We actually don't just try to run a personality campaign. Refer to those people who still have the memorials to Jack and Bobby Kennedy and memorials to Martin Luther King in their homes with the black shroud and the candle and say when they died, I died with them. They didn't understand the kind of movement that those kind of people were involved in and we are saying to people that if you are working for John Tapscott simply and purely because he is John Tapscott and the personality of John Tapscott, you are really not very viable to this campaign, because what we are talking about are long-range programs in all areas of the state where people can become involved in their own local communities.

Question:

If people want to get involved in Tapscott for Governor Campaign who should they contact?

Answer:

We don't have a structured type of a campaign. I have Harlan Lemon who does a lot of the coordinating. We have a number of people who work here every day and the office is open from 9:00 a.m. till usually 9-10 p.m. The address is 1339 W. 19th Street, Des Moines, Iowa, phone 243-4535, and anyone who is here will certainly see that anyone who comes in or calls will be involved in some way, shape, or form. We have no chiefs in this campaign - everybody has to play the role and everybody gets chewed out including myself. We try to avoid speeches if at all possible and just get into rap sessions. So, anyone willing to get involved in this kind of campaign can come over here or just give us a ring.

Pledge must be kept

The promise made to black leaders by Democratic National chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien that he would do all he can to give Negroes at least 20 percent of the action in party affairs, will have to be kept if the party expects more than token support from the blacks.

But the demands of black leaders will not stop at representation on the credentials and platform committees at the 1972 national convention. On the basis of proven statistics showing that one of every five Democratic voters in 1968 Presidential election was black, black leaders are demanding that 25 blacks be included in the National Democratic Policy Council.

They want delegate slates in contested primaries to consist of at least 20 percent blacks. They insist on more than double the budget of the minority affairs division of the National Committee, increasing the funds from \$130,000 to \$300,000.

O'Brien promised to encourage black candidates for federal, state and local office and to expand the policy-making role of blacks in party affairs. Unless these promises are fulfilled, blacks may boycott the national convention or sit out the national campaign.

A 3-year degree plan

A brand new approach to one of the gnawing problems of higher education came to light when the Chancellor of the New York State University announced the receipt of a \$343,760 grant from the Carnegie Corporation for the development of experimental time-shortened baccalaureate-degree courses at four of the university's campuses.

The programs are grounded on two cardinal premises — that the four-year baccalaureate program can be reduced to three years without loss of quality or content, and that high school-college experience can be successfully compressed to seven years instead of the current eight years.

This would be a bonanza to students of mediocre means who often drop out at the end of the third year in college because the strain was beyond their emotional and financial resources.

Dr. Boyer said that today's high school students were much better educated than any previous generation of young people and that there was too much overlap in what they learned in high school and in the early years of college.

Under the plan, students who have completed their third year of high school will be accepted as freshmen at the New York State University in the fall. They will complete their requirements for a high school diploma as well as freshmen college requirements during that year. They then will complete the rest of their college requirements in three additional years.

This plan should much appeal, particularly to black poor who cannot bear the financial burden of the traditional period required for completing their education.





When we add Willie revolutionary fielding, a phase in which he clearly outclassed any of the five rivals, above, it is easy to see why Atlanta and Houston, successively, honored him in formal deliberation, with proper accompanying fanfare and

awards: as "the greatest baseball player of the century."

That is easy to understand of course. Willie lost 124 games of what would have been his sophomore year, and all of what would have been his third — as a soldier in the armed forces.

Ruth, was 22, 23 and 24 years of age, in the years of U. S. participation in World War I. He was not drafted, did not interrupt his career; a thing which those who keeps prating about Mays' bid for all-time home run kingship, willy-nilly, should remember.

What Atlanta and Houston enthusiasts remember, all of them being Caucasians, is that Willie's two vacant

years cost him at least 375 extra bases.

We get an idea of Willie's

immensity, at once, when we note that the great Bob Clemente, last week, owned departmental "extra base totals of 997 supplemented by 65 stolen bases — for a grand total on only 1,062, after 12½ seasons. He trails Aaron by 1,100 bases; Mays, by nearly 1,600!

Behind the big six, in the cake-icing department of "extra bases," are Ted Williams (2254), Mel Ott (2254) and Hans Wagner (2178).

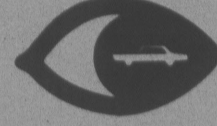
Among moderns, Hank Aaron is now edging past Mickey Mantle into 9th place, in the all-time "extra base" sweepstakes. In fact, Aaron — another star whose career has not been interrupted by military call — seems destined to move forward, at least to third place.

At last look, Aaron (with 176 steals) had 2141 "extra bases," Mantle (2140), Ed Mathews (2137). No other players of history, as yet, have climbed above 2100 "big punch" swings. Tris Speaker closed at 2,019 and Rogers Hornsby, at 1937. Next time you see Mays, tell him steal just 17 more bases (for 300) and become the game's one enduring.

If you don't want to be "it" when some guy in a hurry starts playing bumper tag, just slow down. He'll probably go around you. Even if he doesn't, you'll open up enough interval between you and the car ahead to avoid a possible sudden stop and sock.

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Your best route to acquire job training is to apply at the Office of the Iowa State Employment Service. They might have a current job opening of interest to you as they maintain a complete file of available training programs, and they can give you the testing and counseling to best determine your training aptitudes. If on-the-job training seems indicated for you they can quickly refer you to OJT with certain recommendations that might aid a Job Developer in helping you find a satisfactory training program and job.

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Congress passed the Manpower Training Act in 1962. This was the first nation-wide program whereby vocational training could be provided for the unemployed individual. During the years following the passage of the act, local manpower problems had to be identified, analyzed and hopefully overcome by training. The Department of Labor delegated this function and responsibility to the local employment offices.

The Iowa State Employment Service, Waterloo office has and will continue to provide this service to

the community. The City of Waterloo, Iowa State Employment Service, and local industry have provided the proving grounds in which this program will be evaluated. What is the effectiveness of MDTA in Waterloo?

Following are the courses offered by the Manpower Development Act and the number of persons who have completed training:

Machine Operators, 116; radio and TV repair, 11; mech. drafting, 19; comb. welders, 145; auto body repair, 69; auto mechanics, 71; nurses aides, 12.

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
