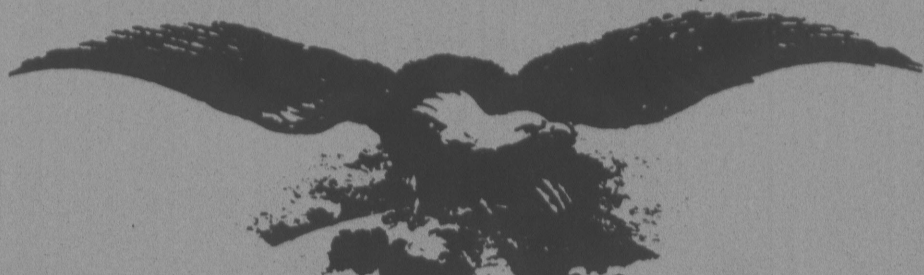

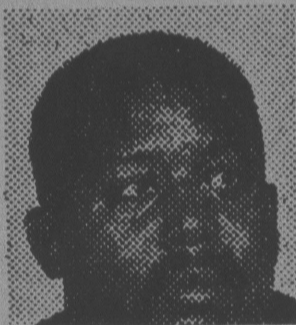

We inveighed against fratricide as the tool which the white man wanted the Negro to use in order to exterminate himself. Indeed, if one Negro killed another, it was difficult to get a conviction if a white man spoke of the good conduct of his "boy." My mother befriended the only Negro woman I remember who was convicted of killing another. The police, then, as now, are willing to let Blacks destroy themselves with a bit of callous unconcern. The pages of court records across the country are replete with fratricide among our people. Who then...

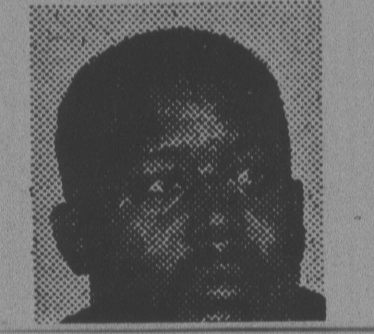

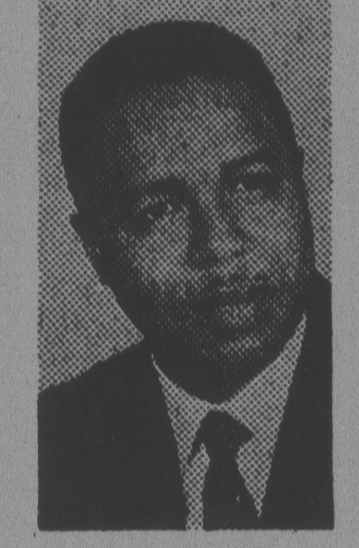
