## Stringent Restrictions On Sterilizations Propped

WASHINGTON -- The government has proposed new restrictions on sterilizations in clinics supported by federal funds to protect the rights of 100,000 low-income and legally incompetent persons.

The order by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare follows guidelines issued on Aug. 3 by the agency following the involuntary sterilization of two young black girls from Montgomery, Ala. Later, there were reports that some Aiken, S. C. welfare mothers were forced to

undergo sterilization as a precondition to obstetrical care.

The immediate effect of the regulations is to continue a freeze on family planning and Medicaid until early next year for sterilization of minors and legally incompetent persons to control fertility.

"We are a long step closer to our basic commitment to ensure that the rights of the individual are always paramount, always observed and always secure," HEW's Secretary Caspar Weinberger said.

## Form Shadow Government, Jackson Urges Bankers

WASHINGTON -- Civil rights activist Jesse Jackson has urged the nation's black groups and organizations to form a "shadow government" so that they can speak on behalf of the black community.

Claiming black organizations were being "ripped off little caucus by little caucus," Jackson said they needed to meet in one place and organize to create "enough power to make ourselves heard."

"This is no pie-in-the sky," he told the black mortgage bankers, architects, and contractors. "We must authorize a broader base of leadership -- immediately . . . We must project the most

. . . 'unhateful' enough to elect and project somebody."

Of the surviving black mortgage banking companies, the conference was told, 25 percent have been purchased by groups outside the black community.

He said that such a broad-based organization would give an "authorized black point of view on any move the federal government made." When the pay board was created, as an example, Jackson insisted that "we haven't authorized (anyone) to speak for us. Who is our banking spokesman? Our agriculture spokesman? Our labor spokesman?"

"We must be 'unjealous' enough."

## Crime-Busting Doesn't Pay, Guard Learns

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- The man who blew the whistle on the Watergate burglars and in so doing led to the uncovering of one of the nation's greatest political scandals is now unable to find a job.

Frank Wills, former security guard at the Watergate apartments where the Democratic National Committee once had its offices, has been drawing a \$65 a week unemployment check for nearly two months.

"I've looked all over but employers seem afraid to hire me. I don't know if they are being told not to hire me or if they are just afraid to hire me," said Wills.

It was Wills who, on June 17, 1972, discovered masking tape over a door lock late at night at the Watergate. Thinking someone had been moving items that day and forgot to take off the tape, Wills removed it and fastened the door.

Fifteen minutes later he returned to find the lock taped again. He called police and the Watergate story has been front page news ever since.

"Lots of people tell me I should have kept my mouth shut. I'm beginning to think they were right, even though I know I would do the same thing today. If you're on a job to do something, you do it," he said.

Wills quit his guard job at the Watergate, he said, when another guard was promoted over him who had less seniority. "I never missed more than one day of work and then I was sick. I did a good job, but they promoted this other fellow just because he was white." He was fired from his next job when he took two days off to visit his South Carolina home and hasn't been able to find a job since.

## Virginia Prisons To Be Probed

RICHMOND -- A special grand jury has been ordered empaneled to look into conditions at the state's penal institutions.

Of primary concern is the Virginia State penitentiary, which is a century-old red brick prison and sits just a dozen blocks from the state capitol.

Commonwealth Attorney Aubrey Lavis asked that a circuit judge order the investigation when a prison official told the judge the penal officials have "lost control" of the prison which houses 800 inmates.

The prison official made the contention during the trial of an inmate charged with possession of a weapon in the prison.

## Kissinger Opposed by Black Group, Called Racist

WASHINGTON -- Representatives of a black civil rights organization have voiced serious concern over the nomination of national security adviser Henry Kissinger as Secretary of State. In so doing, the blacks charged that Kissinger had shown clearly that he was a racist.

Rev. Douglas Moore and Ab-salom F. Jordan Jr., representing the United Black Front of Washington, D. C., said that Kissinger was "a functional racist" since "there is not one black in a policy-making position" on the National Security Council staff.

"Dr. Kissinger has ignored our cry for justice in Southern Africa," in Portugese Angola, Rhodesia, and Mozambique, Moore

said, "but he has made sure that Jews in Russia be heard. This is racist."

Moore also called Kissinger "a Europeanist or Eurocentric," whose "preoccupation" with Europe and big-power foreign policy "can only bring nightmarish results in the future of Africa."

Although nine organizations and one individual, former Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, voiced disapproval of Kissinger, particularly mentioning his involvement in the Vietnam War was the chief policy maker, there appears to be little doubt he will be confirmed by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Many Senators have said they would support him inspite of his involvement in the war.

facilities when the normal money channels dry up, the AFL-CIO told a Congressional committee last week.

AFL-CIO legislative director Andrew Bleimiller also asked that an investigation of the Federal Reserve Board be undertaken, since its policies need to be brought into harmony "with the needs of the American People for a balanced economy and full employment, rather than the wishes of money lenders alone."

"The only way to get banking money into housing is to make it mandatory," Bleimiller told the House Banking and Currency Committee.

"Socially important investment needs protection against the fluctuations of the money markets so that, in periods of tight money, all available credit is not channeled to meet the demands of the major corporations at the expense of housing, community facilities and similar investments."

Later, consumer advocate Ralph Nader proposed various reforms of the financial regulatory systems, since they favor industry and not the public.

Nader was also supportive of the AFL-CIO's proposals that would allocate more money to housing and other social matters.

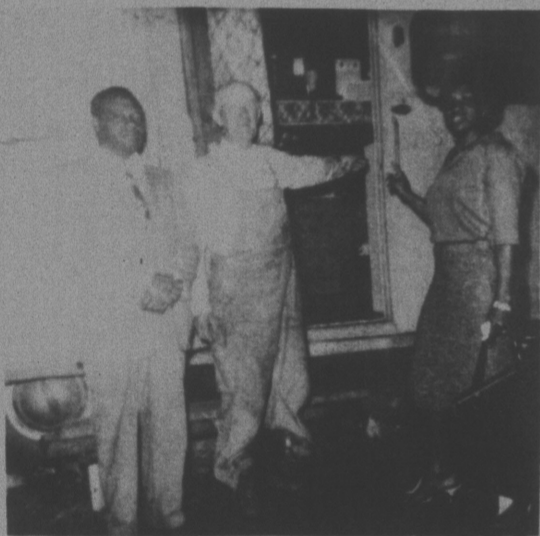

Since the unsigned handbill was distributed in our area pretending to point out examples of faults in our program, I have had mixed emotions. My first impulse was one of despair. "Who would be behind this thing," I wondered. "Who would want to say such terrible lies for the sake of a political office?" I am used to being misquoted in the press. I am used to having my motives misunderstood. I am used to hearing people say false things about me. But this is the first time that anyone has ever dared to say that a vote for me would sell out the Negro. I have been in many hot battles for civil rights, but this is one time I felt like crying- then the wonderful phone calls started to come in, commending me and saying, "I know your record." All I can say is thank you, and God bless you, each and every one of you, for calling and commending our work in the past.

I then thought of ignoring the whole thing- I realized that the voters are not stupid and they recognize a smear when they see one. My committee, the folks helping me, were angry- very angry, and they have insisted that I answer and so, only at their insistence, I do answer the unsigned charges here and now.

We listed 13 points in our original handbills. Mr. Klan, or whatever his name is, said in this unsigned handbill, "Let's take the points one by one,"- then they listed the following: 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 where they felt we were wrong. Counting these over, it seems that there are only eight points, not 13, with which they disagree. They do then give me credit for 5, these being:

- No. 2. Insisting upon brick additions for our youngsters' schools (Long-fellow and Grant)
- No. 4. Opening up employment at supermarkets, Kresge's, Woolworth's and May's Drug stores.
- No. 11. The fact that I won a trophy for leadership in Civil Rights at U.P.W.A.
- No. 12. That our Youth Achievement League is presenting Negro history records to public schools.
- No. 13. That I fought for and won jobs for the first Negro girls at the telephone company.

Now, it seems to me that as long as they admit we are right on these five points, they have admitted being wrong in saying a vote for Anna sells out the Negro.

Let's not drop it there though, let's go right through each one of the issues raised and set the record straight.

1. This is a reference to a threatened lawsuit, after which policy changed.
2. They admit it is true.
3. We did not say they were working at supermarkets, we said they were working. Ask anyone how hard we worked on this.
4. They admit to be true.
5. Caused disruption in what community? Waterloo? Cedar Falls? Non-sense, they were made welcome and thoroughly enjoyed the day- Check- see how many of these youngsters are going to college. Also, get this straight, Mr. Tom' or Klan or whoever wrote this unsigned poison pen handbill, if you knew anything about local government, you would know that the school board does not decide on field trips, this is an administrative decision and the administration gave permission, other wise the kids could not have gone.
6. (a) I admit that I am outspoken and I do not always attract the wealthier people to my cause. I have nothing against them, but they were not the fighting bunch we needed then. We did our best, we sent invitation after invitation to some of the Johnny-Come-Latelys to join N.A.A.C.P. They would not do so. Remember the times? Once it was not "fashionable" to be in N.A.A.C.P. Yet we did win the Ike Small for the most progressive and most members in the state during my term as president.  
(b) In an effort to help out at home and continue my work, I ran a small ad sheet, selling ads. As far as I know, no one was ever cheated out of an ad, and if I can find a copy of this ad we will print it in this handbill.
7. Winning a case- what does it mean? I am not a lawyer and don't anybody ever dare call me one to my face. A case, to me, means a problem. I did go to the governor and, God bless him, he did intercede and show mercy. Was this not winning? The problem was solved.
8. What does benefit mean? It can mean money, but it can also mean something else. Everyone should realize the benefit a youngster gets from seeing a hero in the flesh- here is someone who has made it! -in sports, in show business or, as in the case of Dr. King, at the international level. This educates not only the young people, but also those who forget that Negroes can do something besides menial jobs. We did not lose money so I say it was worth while.

As for the second part of this ridiculous statement, the question is stated wrong, it should not say "How many" but rather "Were there any-" My honest answer is- None that I know of-- This is like the old lawyer's trick question-- "Have you stopped beating your wife?" They assume you guilty in asking the question. Shame on you, Mr. Mystery, don't you think any more of the voters' intelligence than that?

9. The Jr. Chamber of Commerce finished it. Yes, they did and again I say God bless them. Don't you see this is a victory- when we can enlist the aid of a powerful organization like the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the battle is won. We gave the Jr. Chamber the facts and asked them to take-over. If only we could enlist the aid of more groups a lot of us would be spared the feeling of heartbreak and despair when we look at our children and know from experience what waits for them. We went to do battle a lot of times with only our courage, no money and a will to win. I have suffered many financial problems that I feel to have been the result of my work. If you, Mr. Hide your Head under a Bed Sheet or whatever your name is, have no financial difficulties and will publish your financial dealings for the last few months, I'm sure it will make more exciting reading than mine.

10. Number 10 on the mystery handbill had nothing to do with number 10 on our handbill, which merely stated that the first F.E.P.C. ordinance passed was engineered by me as chairman of the Civil Rights Committee of Local 46. This statement is true and can be looked into by anyone.

The number 10 in Mr. Klux's handbill says that I have been given money by another candidate to support my campaign. I will answer it this way, Mr. Klux. If you will sign this handbill in front of witnesses, I will promise you your day in court. Do I make myself clear?

As I said, I did not want to bother with replying to such foolish charges. I do not think voters will believe any of it. I did so only at the insistence of my committee. I would rather take a positive stand, let me do so now.

Here once again is my background, my program and my ideas.

1. I tried to show, by giving my background, that I am not afraid of hard work and the smears that are bound to come as a result of this type of activity.
2. I want everyone, of both races, to realize that if they elect me, they will have someone that will go to bat for Ward Four and not be afraid of what people say.
3. Are you concerned about taxes? So am I. We are homeowners, we know the high cost of education, of medicine, of food and lodging. Taxes that are too high hurt all of us - it hurts our buying power and this in turn hurts all - business men and consumer alike.
4. Worried about Urban Renewal? I have some things to say about this expensive program. We lost on our home through this, despite pleading, talks, committees and the rest. This is just getting started in Waterloo - I pledge a fight for fair play.
5. What about racial difficulties? We have laws now that only came about through hard work and people all over the country having the courage to stick their necks out, unafraid to be smeared or unpopular. Times have changed now. We now must work for education, for here is the best answer to jobs, to security, to brotherly love and human understanding. The Negro must be educated to be proud of his heritage and his race, and to qualify for the jobs he needs. The White must be educated to realize that the Negro is, for the most part, an aware and sensitive person, quite able to detect the false heartiness and friendship. We are not a race of Rochesterers, Step n Fetchits or Amos and Andys, we are a race of people who can be good to know, and welcome true friendship when it is sincerely offered.

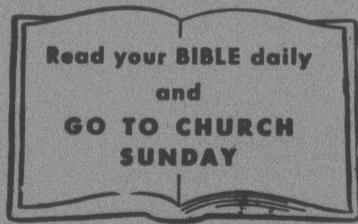
I promise not to be perfect---there was only one perfect person and He did not win a popularity contest in His day. I promise, as I say, not to be perfect, but to do my best to do the things He would do, as I see it.

Win or lose, I will support the councilman from Ward Four and bear no ill will, even though I do feel I have been unfairly treated. If I do win, however, I promise you an interesting two years.

Finally, I would like to thank all of you, my wonderful family, my husband Gene, the committee that worked so hard with so little money, all of you who helped in this almost overwhelming fight - yes, thank you from the bottom of my heart. I am proud to say, at the end of this campaign, as Paul says in Chapter 4, Verse 7 - I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith.

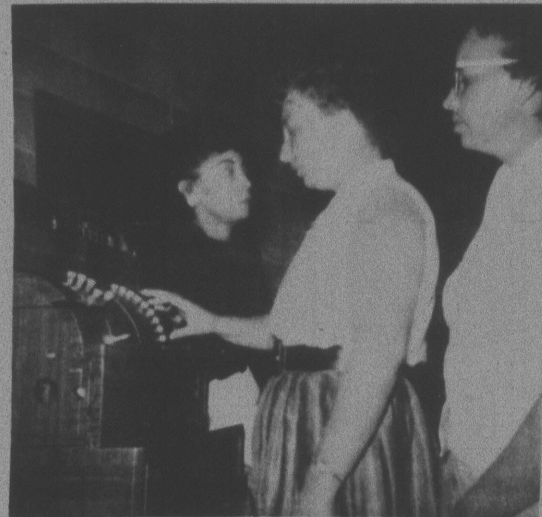
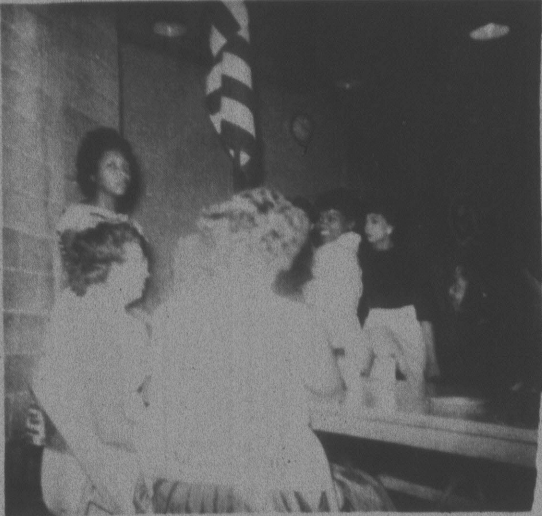

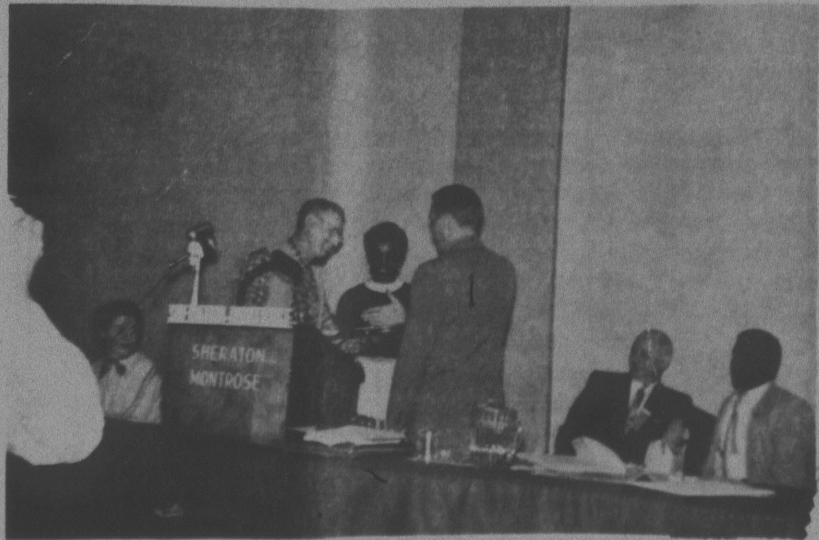

# Chemistry Instructor Learns And Works At Kodak

ROCHESTER, N. Y. -- Lina Caldwell considers experience the best teacher.

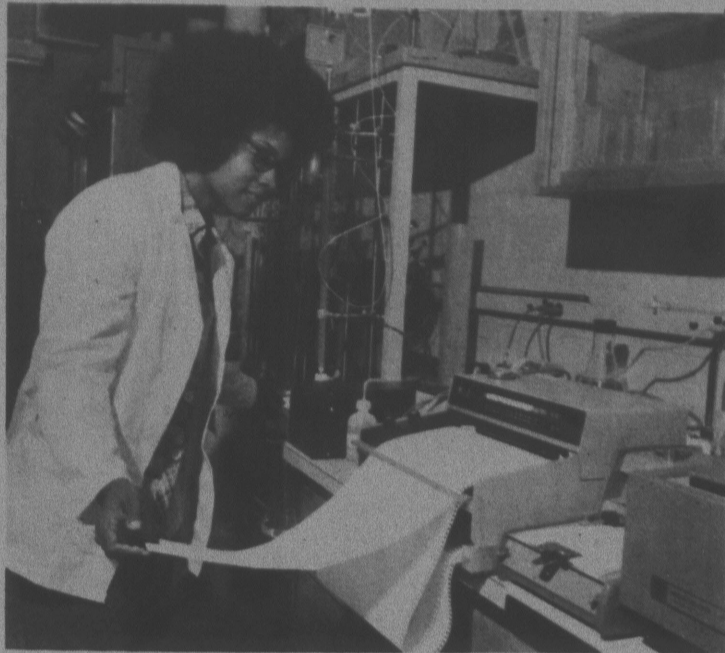
That's why the former chemistry instructor at Southern University in New Orleans, La., spent part of the summer working on elution chromatography studies at the Kodak Research Laboratories here while preparing to enter medical school at Emory University this fall.

"Everything eventually ties together," says the 25-year-old former resident of Gulfport, Miss.

Miss Caldwell plans to specialize in medical research after gaining experience in Eastman Kodak Company's organic and polymer separations laboratory. She sees her summer project as both relevant and beneficial to her career in medical research.

"I'm working to refine an analytical technique," she explained, "to make it more useful to the researchers here. Whether I use the same technique in future research is really not the point. What is important is the discipline and experience I pick up in performing my work. That I'll take with me wherever I go."

Miss Caldwell's approach to education has taken her from Xavier University in New Orleans, where she received a BS degree in chemistry, to Atlanta University, where she was awarded an MS degree in bio-chemistry in 1972. During this period she also worked in an industrial lab. Following her graduation from Atlanta, she began teaching general and organic

chemistry at Southern University and later came to Kodak for the summer as a National Urban League professor.

And what does she plan to do after medical school? "Maybe I'll

stay in research or maybe I'll go into gynecology," she said. Whatever her decision, she knows that she'll take a rich and varied background with her.

# Disastrous Legal Aid Program Approved In House

A bill, labeled by some as a disaster, has approved setting up an independent corporation to provide legal services for the poor.

The 24 amendments adopted by the House to the independent corporation bill places serious restrictions on what legal services attorneys can do.

The House, in a marathon session which ended near midnight, approved amendments barring legal services lawyers from handling suits to force hospitals and doctors to perform abortions, handle school busing or desegregation cases, or draft evasion amnesty cases.

Another set of crippling amendments, which were offered by Rep. Albert Quie, R-Minn., prohibits legal service attorneys from lobbying before a legislative or administrative body unless formally requested to do so.

Other amendments to the bill would:

- \*Prohibit attorneys getting more than 50 percent of their income from legal services activities to engage in political activities;

- \*Prohibit lawyers from taking part in partisan or non-partisan politics, including voter registration drives;

- \*Prohibit funding or allowing corporation personnel to advocate or oppose initiatives, referendums or other ballot measures;

- \*Prohibit contracts to law firms who spend more than half their time on "public interest" litigation;

- \*Eliminate back-up centers for research and technical assistance for legal services attorneys set up in law schools around the country.

Since the present legal services program, which is a part of the Office of Economic Opportunity,

Democratic liberals are hopeful that the Senate will come up with a better bill.

A similar measure was killed last year after White House objections.

Opponents of the bill, made up of Southern and conservative Democrats and Republicans, have claimed the legal services program is bad because it foments "social reform and revolutionary political activity."

A White House-committee compromise collapsed because of the division on the White House over the issue.

HEW Under Secretary Frank Carlucci, a former OEO director, and White House Counsel Leonard Garment agreed to committee changes in the bill.

OEO's former acting director Howard Phillips and William Timmons, head of congressional relations for the President, refused to accept them.

The measure will establish an independent Legal Services corporation with 11 members appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate.

Nine-member state advisory councils would be created for the \$71.5 million program in 1974.

The House measure will also force the independent corporation to pay court costs and attorney's fees when they lose and give preference to local attorneys in hiring of legal services lawyers in a community.

Rep. Augustus Hawkins, D-Calif., chairman of the House Education and Labor subcommittee, said legal services was needed for the poor to help promote "fairness, social justice and belief in the system itself."

## More Groups Charged With Job Bias

WASHINGTON -- Two more major industrial unions and trade associations have been charged by the federal government with job discrimination. Earlier last week, six corporations and unions were accused of discriminating in job hiring and promotions.

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has charged the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and the National Electrical Contractors Association in its latest crack down on violators.

IBEW, a million-member nationwide union whose workers perform electrical jobs for manufacturers, construction companies and utilities, expects to meet with EEOC officials within 60 to 90 days in an effort to conciliate the

charges.

The National Electrical Contractors Association has 6,000 affiliated construction companies nationwide. Those companies employ more than 200,000 workers.

Charges against the union and trade association are limited to discriminatory practices in 12 metropolitan areas, including New York, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Chicago, Atlanta, Dallas, Denver, Washington, Phoenix and San Francisco.

The charges stem from over a year of work by a staff of 19 lawyers and employment opportunity specialists that used computerized analysis of statistical data to put the cases of "major national significance" together.

## Effort To Save Black Colleges At Black EXPO This Year

CHICAGO -- The 1973 version of Black expohas gotten underway with a theme of "save the black colleges."

Sponsored by Operation PUSH (People United to Save Humanity), a black political and economic development organization created by Rev. Jesse Jackson in 1971 after he left the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, it continues through Sept. 23.

"(Black colleges) have begun to serve a purpose," said Jackson in defense of black schools and reinforcing their need to continue. "They were built to produce cotton pickers and they ended up producing leaders."

He was especially critical of those who say that black colleges are really not consistent with the goals of a pluralistic society.

"If you can justify Brandeis and Yeshiva as primarily for Jews, although others may attend, and Harvard and Yale as primarily for white Anglo-Saxon Protestants, although others may attend, and Holy Cross and Notre Dame as Roman Catholic, although others may attend, then you can justify Howard, Morehouse and North Carolina A. & T," he continued.

Another element of emphasis this year will be on the "civil economics movement," which Jackson often interchanges with the civil rights movement.

"From 1940 to 1965, we fought to acquire our civil rights," he said. "Now, we're fighting to implement our civil rights."

He said that most blacks find themselves in a situation like "giving a fish a chance to swim in a bowl and it doesn't have water in it. We're fighting now to get the substance in the bowl."

A number of businesses will be present at the exposition, including whites -- who have been forced to pay a fee of \$3,500 or 10 times as that amount charged a black business to set up a booth.

Earlier, a meeting with the country's largest 100 black businesses was held to discuss the economic goals of the PUSH organization.

Among the entertainers to appear in concert at the exposition will be Isaac Hayes, The Supremes, The Temptations, Nancy Wilson, Roberta Flack, Ahmal Jamal and others.

PUSH is attempting to see more black businesses created, more

## Senate Votes Big Increase In School Lunch, Breakfast Program

WASHINGTON -- The 50 percent increase in the federal aid to the lunch program voted by the Senate last week will save many schools from dropping or substantially cutting those projects.

The House has already approved a school lunch measure, but it increases federal aid to the school program by only 25 percent, while the Senate version would raise from 8 to 12 cents the federal contribution for each student participating in the school lunch program.

Needy children participating in the program would receive federal contributions of 45 cents for free lunches and those who get reduced-rate lunches will receive federal contributions of 35 cents.

It also provides for 8 cents per pupil in the school breakfast program plus an additional 15 cents for reduced-price breakfast.

"I am very gratified that the Senate has seen that this very vital program needs to receive additional money if they are going to continue with costs continuing to increase," said Senator Hubert Humphrey shortly after the vote.

"As long as they do, we need to make sure that every youngster receives a good breakfast to get him going in the day and a good and nutritious lunch."

Declaring that the school lunch program faces a crisis of "His-

toric proportions," another liberal Congressman, Joe Moakley (D-Mass.) cited the rapidly escalating cost of food, the inability of many school districts to secure bids for basic foodstuffs, had made it particularly difficult and in some cases almost impossible to operate a school lunch program in many districts this year.

In the state of Massachusetts, as an example Moakley said, the Commonwealth would have faced serious financial difficulty without compensatory increases in federal cash reimbursements for the school lunch and breakfast programs.

To offset the anticipated 25 percent increase in labor and food costs, the state estimates that charges for lunches would have to be increased by about 15 cents and for breakfasts, about 10 cents.

The Senate-approved measure would also increase from \$6,300 to \$7,200 the family income level for reduced priced meals. Children of families making less than \$4,200 can receive free meals under the program.

Since the bill exceeds the Administration's budget request by \$300 million, it appears likely that President Nixon might veto the bill as "inflationary."

## Nixon Housing Plan Defended By Lynn

WASHINGTON -- Every American who cannot afford a decent place to live will receive a government check eventually, HUD Secretary James Lynn said in defending the housing allowance proposals.

Claiming the administration is fully committed to the program which carries a yearly price tag of \$8 to \$11 billion, Lynn scoffed at reports that the President's housing proposals contained very little for the poor.

"To identify as the best approach, cash assistance is a very bold move," he declared.

"Let's at least have the benefits of our first studies (on housing allowances) before we put in the first phase," he said.

If the pilot programs, in a num-

ber of communities across the nation, are successful Lynn believes the President will give his full support to such a plan.

"The President's objective is to achieve equity for the first time among groups of people," he said.

Therefore, he believes existing housing programs have to be eliminated since they are "unfair" forcing many persons into inferior public housing, with the stigma attached to that.
