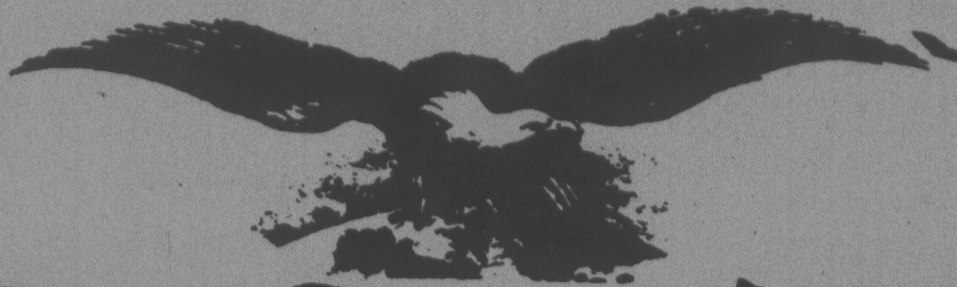

Library's phone book collection grows

A collection of U.S. and foreign telephone books in the information department of the Waterloo Public Library, East Building, has reached a total of 731 and is still growing, according to Michael Phipps, library director.

When complete the collection will have directories for all cities in this country with population of 25,000 or over, plus directories for all Iowa communities and some of the major cities of the world.

"FOR YEARS the library has kept a number of current

directories on hand to supply individuals and businesses with address, phone numbers and yellow page information," Phipps said.

"But calls for such information have increased to the point where it is necessary to have many more books to fill the demand.

"In our extremely cramped quarters it took a lot of juggling to clear 150 feet of shelving for the additional directories," Phipps said.

Some of the 700 directories available are Paducah, Ky., Oahu, Hawaii; Juneau, Alaska; Berlin, Germany; Mon-

tréal, Canada, and Paris, France.

South African black veterans recognized

PORT ELIZABETH, South Africa (AP) — Black South African war veterans have been recognized officially as war veterans — 30 years after World War II — and are now eligible for an additional allowance to their pensions, a South African Legion spokesman announced.

An official of the Bantu (African) Affairs Commissioner's office says that African war veterans are now entitled to amounts varying from \$57 to \$74 a month as well as the old age pension of \$30.75 bimonthly.

Africans served with white South African forces in both world wars but did not carry arms.

Manpower board approves programs

The Black Hawk County Manpower Planning and Programming Board Wednesday afternoon approved general programs for next year.

Those programs will be similar to those of this year and will include vocational education, youth work experience, adult work and training experience, public service employment and general support of services.

The board will meet Friday afternoon to finalize its programs and allocate its \$565,000 to each.

Deadline for submitting next year's budget was Monday, but the Black Hawk County group received an extension until next week.

VOCATIONAL education programs will include individual referrals to programs, a heating and air conditioning class and Adult Basic Education-GED-remedial education unit which could be used by those enrolled in the program either during or before training.

David Mazur, director of Black Hawk County Manpower programs, said other areas will include the youth experience program (Neighborhood Youth Corps this year); the adult work and training experience (on-the-job-training and Operation Mainstream); and Public Service Employment (placement of enrollees in publicly supported offices).

The general support of services part of the program will include counseling, transportation and day care, Mazur said.

IN OTHER ACTION, the board approved allocating \$156,000 to summer youth jobs.

The funds, Mazur said, will come from both this year's and next year's budgets.

The \$156,000 will provide up to 200 jobs for young people this summer and will be administered by NYC personnel.

The 200 slots are an increase of 40 to 60 positions for young people this summer than originally planned.

THE MANPOWER board was approached by Waterloo Community School officials to consider supporting the summer Governor's Youth Opportunity Program (GYOP), but took no action on the request.

Dr. Steve Holbrook, acting director of the division of research, evaluation and development for the school district, requested support of \$47,000 for 160 job slots for young people this summer.

HE SAID the request was necessary because funding from the state legislature for the program is not expected to be as high this year as in the past.

GYOP supports jobs for young people 14 and 15 years old during the school year. For the last several years, funding has been available for jobs during the summer months as well.

"The state Office of Planning and Programming has suggested that future money be used for in-school programs only because of a reduction in the amount appropriated in the last two years," he said.

Postmaster asks for applicants for jobs

Postmaster M. E. Anderson announced today, applications for examination for the position of Mail Handler in the Post Office at Waterloo will be accepted beginning April 28, 1975. No applications will be accepted after the closing time and date of May 9, 1975 at 5 p.m.

No experience is required. All applicants will be required to take a written test. Scores are rated on a scale of 100 and a score of 70 or better is needed to pass. Successful applicants will be placed on a register of eligibles according to score, and from which future Mail Handler vacancies will be filled. A strength and stamina test is required before an eligible can be employed. Persons with certain physical conditions will not be permitted to take the strength and stamina test.

Mail Handler duties include loading and unloading bulk mail and performing other duties incidental to the movement and processing of mail.

Applicants must be 18 years or older; or 16 years old and be a high school graduate. In general, there is no maximum age limit.

Starting wages are \$4.51 per hour with increases to \$5.70 per hour. Interested applicants

can apply at the Passport Window in the Main Post Office at Waterloo.

Applicants will be notified of Time, Date, and Place of the examination.

County Board will not approve special deputies

Appointment of special deputies by Sheriff Wendell Christensen will no longer require approval by the Black Hawk County Board of Supervisors. The decision stems from a 1972 attorney general's opinion which states that a sheriff need not obtain supervisor's approval to appoint special deputies, nor is a sheriff requested

nor is a sheriff required to even disclose names of those appointed.

The supervisors agreed Monday that they did not want the responsibility of approving special deputies if the board indeed has no real authority to either accept or reject names submitted.

Supervisor Chairperson Lynn Cutler was authorized by the board to send a letter to Sheriff Christensen requesting that the appointment of special deputies be made a strictly departmental matter.

About 250 special deputies have been appointed within the county this year. Each is entitled to

a badge and a concealed weapons permit.

Christensen says that a special deputy has no more police power than the average citizen.

In other action, the board agreed to ask the Iowa Northland Regional Council of Governments (INRCOG) to supply a comprehensive county ambulance study. The board said the county could not act on a request to donate \$2,000 toward the \$21,000 cost of an ambulance for the Hudson Fire Department until the study is completed. This procedure is in compliance with Iowa code, according to Robert Braun, board attorney.

The supervisors also approved an agreement with the State Library Commission to implement a county-wide library service. \$5,000 in state funds will be provided, with matching funds from the county. The program will allow a library card issued by one library to be used in other libraries throughout the county.

Threshold seeking director

Operation Threshold of Black Hawk and Buchanan counties is seeking a new director who is expected to begin work at the beginning of its fiscal year, June 1.

The agency now has an acting director, Mrs. Lynda Kincaid who will stay in the position until that time.

Threshold began its search for a director after the board fired former director Fred Reeves for alleged insubordination, failure to follow federal guidelines and mismanagement of Threshold money.

APPLICATIONS for the position, according to board chairman Edith Hollingsworth, may be submitted at the agency office, 604 Mulberry St.

Applicants for the position should be familiar with federal Community Services Administration (CSA)—formerly OEO—guidelines and be able to work well with low income people.

There are no educational requirements for the job, but administrative experience is necessary.

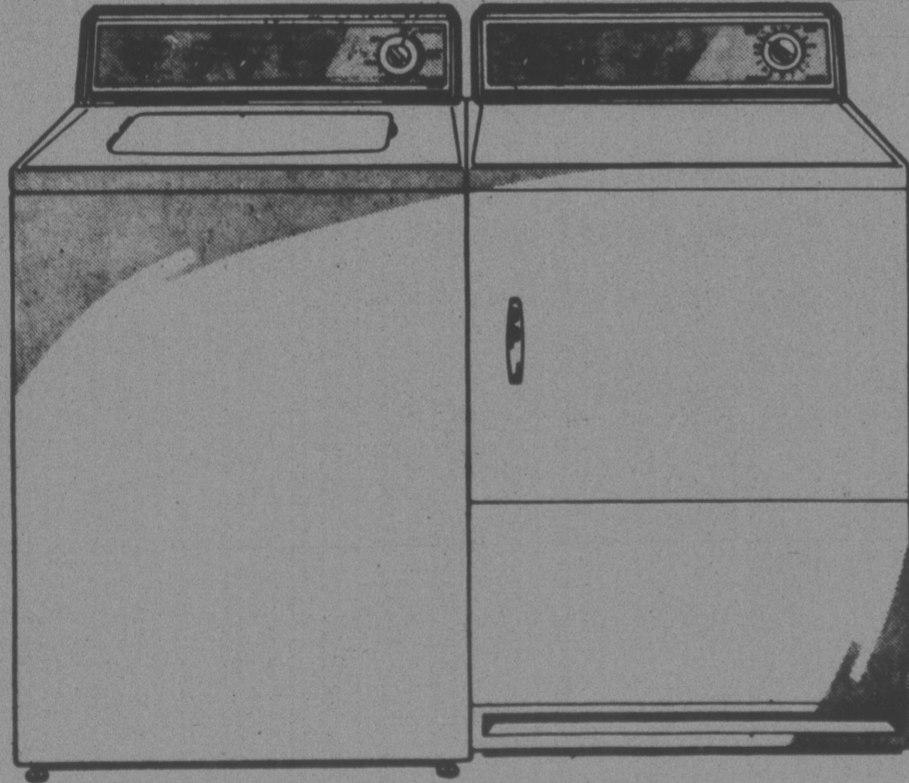

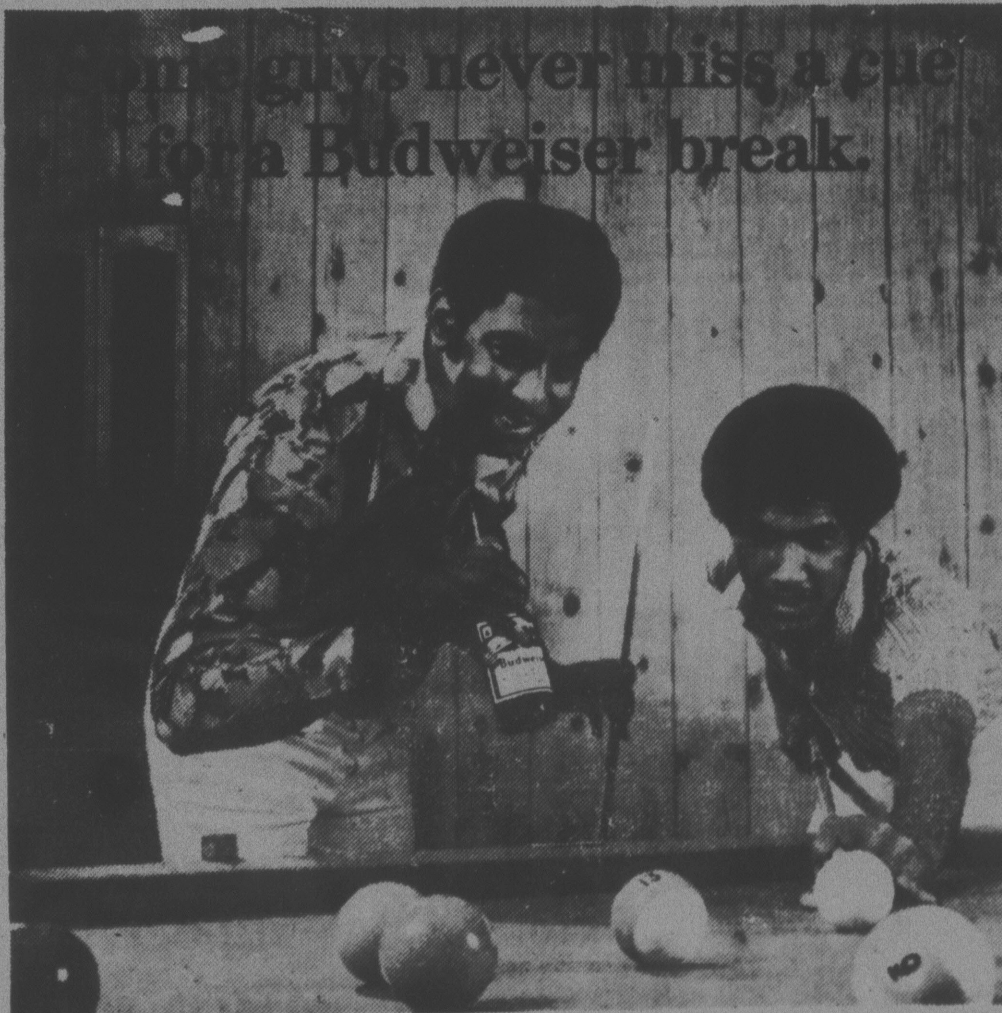

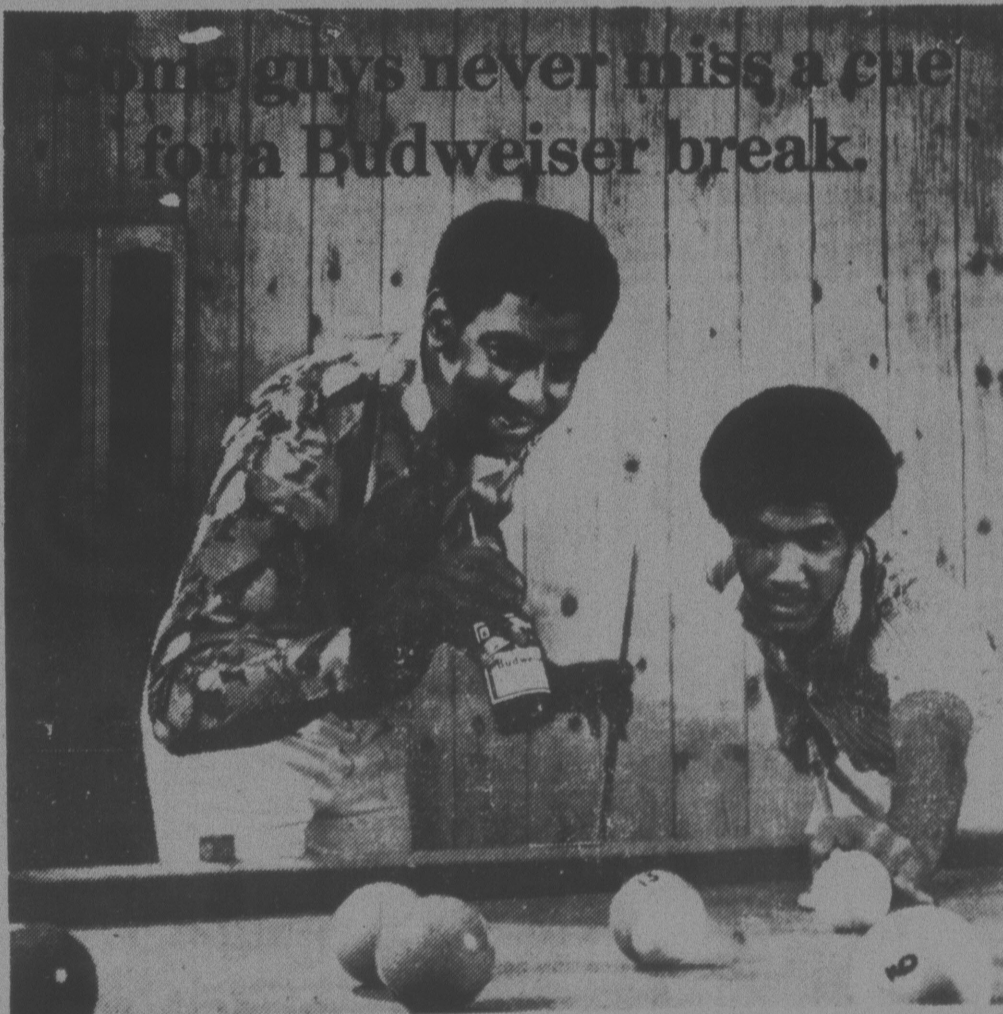

Rep. Jordan Gets Award

Representative Barbara C. Jordan, Democrat of Texas, was awarded the "Ladies Home Journal Magazine Woman of the Year in Politics" at a ceremony shown on television Saturday evening. She was among the eight who received recognition at the ceremony. Mrs. Lyndon Johnson was unable to be present.

Representative Jordan was born in Houston, Texas, October 21, 1936. She was graduated from Phyllis Wheatly High School, received her B.A. degree cum laude from Texas Southern University in 1956 and her LL.B. from Boston Law School in 1959. In 1959 she was admitted to the Massachusetts and Texas bars and later served as assistant to the County Judge, in Harris County, Texas.

In 1966 she was elected to the Texas Senate and in 1972 the U.S. House of Representatives. She was re-elected in 1974.

Representative Jordan is a member of Good Hope Baptist Church, NAACP, Houston, Texas and American Bar Association, National Trial Lawyers Association and Delta Sigma Theta Sorority.

A member of the House Judiciary Committee, she served during the Watergate investigation and the confirmation of Vice President Rockefeller.

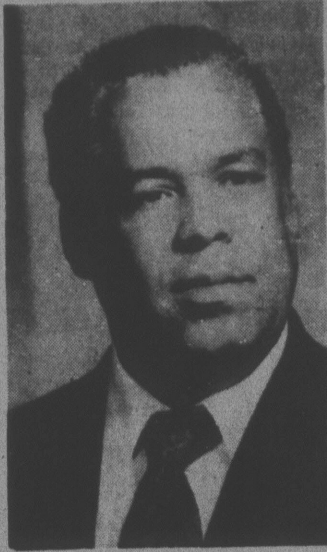

Dr. Organ is a frequent contributor to state and national medical journals and has presented numerous papers, exhibits and lectures at national and international medical meetings. He was a participant in the AMA-White House Conference on Drug Abuse in 1972.

He served four years as president of the board of the Omaha Urban League, and has been chairman of Omaha Urban Housing Foundation, co-chairman of United Negro College Fund in Omaha and was chairman of the United Negro College Fund Advisory Board in 1973. He was elected to the board of trustees of Xavier University in 1972 and was chairman in 1974.

Two Black Included In North Viet Nam Tour

Four American teachers, two of them black, have just concluded a 10-day visit to North Vietnam arranged by the American Friends Service Committee. The tour, part of continued efforts by the Quaker organization for reconciliation with the Vietnamese people, included schools and other educational facilities.

One of the blacks, J. Marshall Rogers Jr., a high school instructor from Durham, N.C., was named U.S. National Teacher of the Year in 1972. He teaches social science and human relations at a Durham high school. He visited the Ministries of Education in addition to teachers and schools in 1973 in Egypt, Lebanon, Israel, Greece and Cyprus, and gave many lectures upon his return to the United States.

Sara Boyd, the other black, lives in Stanford, Calif. She is a public school counselor at Palo Alto. Also, she is active in relation to other schools and counseling services in the San Francisco Bay area and has worked on civil rights and other educational and public issues.

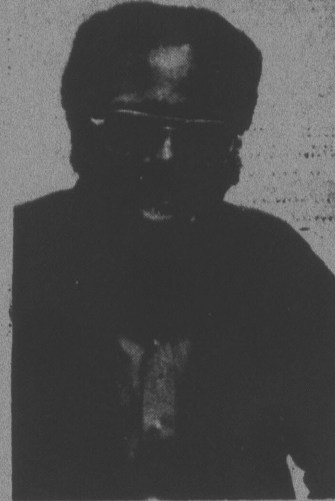
Other AFSC efforts in North Vietnam include shipment of \$50,000 worth of critically needed copybooks for school children. Future projects will provide a variety of supplies for a Hanoi high school near Kham Thien Street, an area that was carpet bombed by B-52's in 1972, and will set up machinery shops for handicapped people of the Kham Thien Street community who were injured in the bombings.

AFSC Executive Secretary Louis Schneider, who visited North Vietnam last summer, stated: "Visits to schools and with school children and teachers can provide opportunity to demonstrate

personal friendship and concern for reconciliation between the Vietnamese and American people.
