DON ROSS JR.

In Iowa there are several excellent basketball players, but there is only one rated good enough to be named a member of the pre-season High School All-America squad— East Waterloo's Don Ross Jr.

Don, who is playing his third year of varsity basketball at East, is the leading scorer for the state tournament-bound Trojans with a consistent 30 point plus average. Frequently being in the spotlight has not spoiled Don. In fact, the All-American center says, "My biggest thrill was being named All State."

The lanky senior has a strong basketball background contributing partially to his success. Even though he didn't really become interested in basketball until he was in ninth grade, his family has always had avid basketball buffs as Don, Sr. played a forward position with the Harlem Globetrotters between 1942 and 1943. His interest may also have been sparked by rapid growth. The 6'8" hard-courter grew three inches between eighth and ninth grades in one of his spurts.

Don enjoys playing all aspects of basketball. However, he does mention that shooting and rebounding are his specific favorites. In his role as top scorer, he has led what experts consider an extremely well-rounded ball club. "We got this far by working so I think we have deserved it," comments Don on the Trojans rating as top team in the state. He is looking forward to competition in the tournament to justify the rating even more.

Basketball, however, is not Don's sole interest. Active in students affairs, he is a member of Student Council, a Choir, Male Chorus and Boys' Quartet. In his church, he is active in Young people's Choir and Youth Fellowship. During the summer Don holds a job and works on sharpening his basketball skill.

Over 50 U.S. college athletic departments are interested in Don. Among the schools which have written him, Don, though keeping an open mind, is interested especially in New Mexico and Kansas. He has not ruled out possible junior college experience before playing at a university. Wherever he chooses to go, however, Don will have been one of the most sought-after preps in the class of '65 of American high school basketballers.

William Parker, 19, Accused of Murder

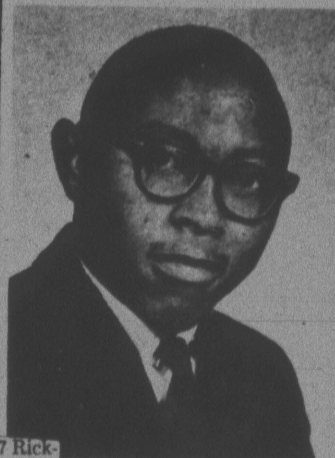

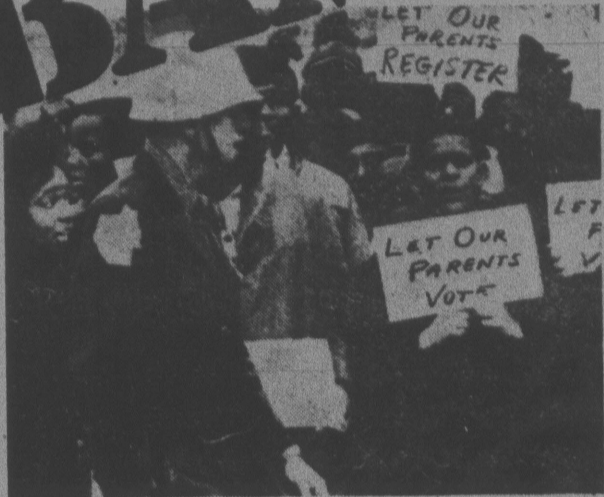

MY VIEW

What Is
 The Solution?

Many cities in the nation are faced with the problem of white people moving to the suburbs and leaving the central city to Negroes. A good bit of this rush to the suburbs is due to the desire of white citizens to get away from Negroes.

This problem is disturbing Atlanta at the present time. William Hartsfield, Mayor emeritus of Atlanta, talking to a group of realtors in Atlanta, recently, urged

Atlanta to annex surrounding unincorporated areas. The reason for this was to maintain what Mr. Hartsfield calls a racial balance. He stated that racial imbalance would stymie the city's growth and turn the central city into decay. Mr. Hartsfield pointed out that Atlanta, today, is 41 per cent Negro. It is estimated that in five or six years Negroes will be a majority in central Atlanta. The white people are moving constantly outside of the city limits of Atlanta and the Negro population in the city is increasing. The Mayor pointed out that he was not race baiting and certainly he was not preaching racial hatred. Knowing Mayor Hartsfield as I do, I know he is not race baiting and he certainly would not preach racial hatred.

But I do raise the question as to whether what the former Mayor proposes is the solution to the problem. One solution to the problem is for white people to stop running. Mr. Hartsfield's solution is a temporary one. In time, Negroes will invade suburbia and the white people will run some more and if they keep on running and they keep on incorporating outlying areas, the city will be spread out to undue proportion. Eventually, many of these white people who move out from the center of business will be returning to the central city.

One of the places where the racial problem is a long way from a solution is in housing. And the North is just about as bad as the South when it comes to housing. I have said jokingly, but with an element of truth, that the only place I know where one Negro can chase 1,000 white persons and two can put 10,000 to flight is in housing. As long as this is true, there will be a problem in central Atlanta and all other cities in the U.S. where people are spreading out.

Now that segregation has been abolished by the Supreme Court and Congress, it may be only a matter of time when it will not matter who lives next door to whom.

At this point, the churches could do a great deal. Almost invariably, when Negroes move into a community in large numbers, the white churches in that neighborhood, instead of becoming interracial, move. This poses quite a task for the minister, for few of them are able to resist the pressure of the members as they get the jitters and want to take their church to another area.

Whatever the solution may be, one fact is clear: incorporating the surrounding areas is not the whole solution.

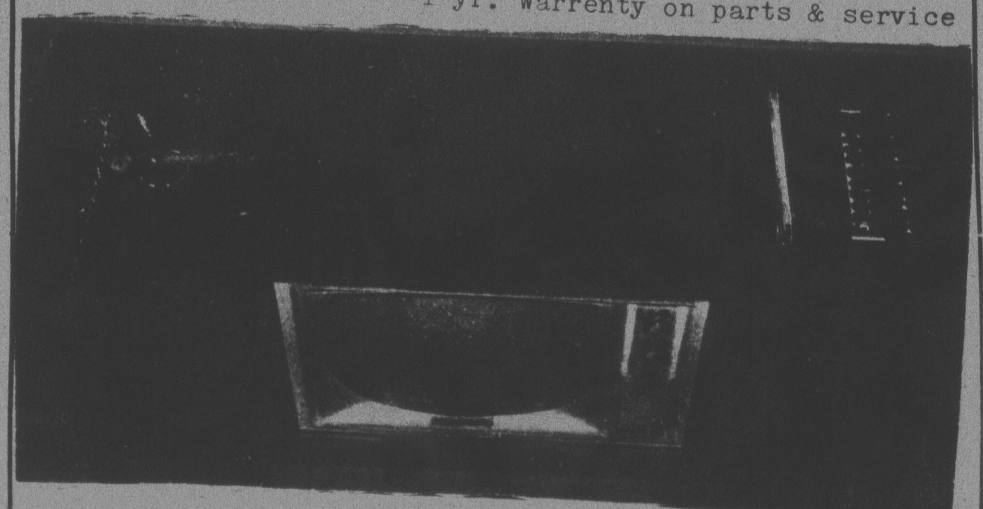

Sausage Baked Apples

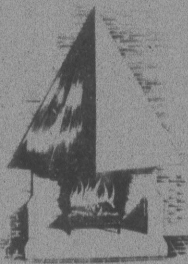

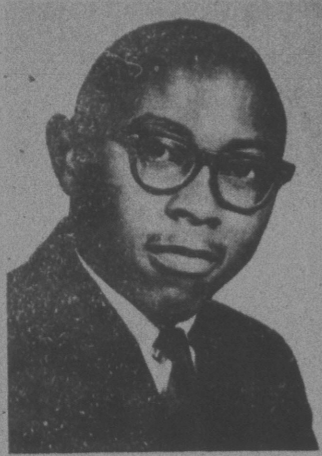

Swing Choir's songs include: "Everythings Coming up Roses," "Then I'll Be Happy," and "Back in Your Own Backyard." Bob Tate will sing a solo entitled "People."

Eventhough Eastonians are deeply involved in extra-curricular activities, primary emphasis is given to academic area. Competition is now beginning to decide East's representatives in the National Council of Teachers of English competition, a battery of tests and writing samples. The NCTE recognizes outstanding English students each year, and winners and runners-up in the competition receive scholarship recommendations. NCTE candidates must be juniors as do students in another testing program just completed at East—the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test. Juniors completed this test battery on Tuesday. Those with sufficiently high scores will take other tests next year and will have an opportunity to compete for the Merit scholarships as semi-finalists and finalists. A winner of the scholarship may win from \$100 to \$1500 depending on financial needs.

Several juniors and seniors are also completing applications to take the American College Test in April. These tests are used by colleges for placement and determination of scholarship awards.

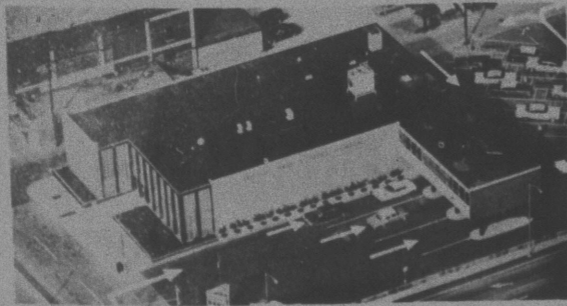
