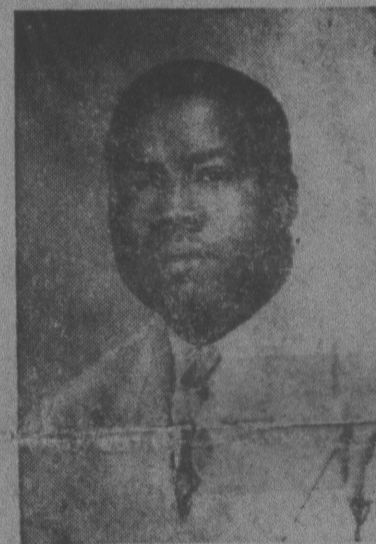

Union Leader Asks for 'Equal Rights' Week

General Ike Not Right Yet, Says Current

The question of where General Dwight D. Eisenhower stands on the Civil Rights issue seems to have been somewhat clarified Wednesday night when Gloster B. Current of New York, N. Y., declared that the General has not favored non-segregation in the armed forces in Europe except above the platoon level.

Current addressed members of the Des Moines branch of the Na-

tional Association for the Advancement of Colored People of the Crocker branch, Y.M.C.A. Gloster is Director of Branches of the N.A.A.C.P. and seems much younger than his age which is 38.

President Truman, Current said, "recently is keeping quiet" on the racial issues and has not been doing much "pushing". Thus far, however, Truman has not announced his candidacy.

Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee is "definitely not a proponent of civil rights, but is an opportunist," stated Current. "He is popularizing the word 'coon' for something else." (Reference to Kefauver's hat).

Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, Current said, might as well be one of the southern governors from the stand he has taken on the state's rights in the matter of segregation and the elimination of segregation in schools.

The one man who seems to have done "every thing which a governor should have done" is Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois. His action was commended in the Cicero and Cairo incidents.

Sees Improvements

He also cited five examples of anti-colored voting by Iowa Senators and some Representatives, but primarily, Current declared, "opinions are changing in America."

He cited numerous cases, even in the south, where segregation in schools is being eliminated without unfavorable "incidents."

In one case, he said, psychiatrists testified that segregation of colored children was "warping their minds and doing permanent damage, which accounts for their difficulties when they later are thrown into mixed societies."

Housing Situation

Current said he "rejoices" at im-

provements in housing for colored people, but he warned:

"We can't yet trust racial questions to a secret ballot. Too many Americans are not willing to extend civil rights unless they know they must stand up and be counted."

Current paid tribute to early N.A.A.C.P. leaders who now are "getting up in years."

"They fought a good fight in days when it required great sacrifices. Many of them did a lot of work at their own expense and they got nothing out of the N.A.A.C.P.," Current said.

"Job Not Yet Done"

He criticized younger members of the N.A.A.C.P. for not making some of the same sacrifices, although they are benefiting from earlier work.

"Our job is not done," Current declared. "We still are suffering at the hands of Jim Crow, and everytime we become complacent, old man Jim Crow raises his head."

Current complimented the Des Moines branch on its activities, and expressed confidence that its quota of 1,000 will be met in a membership drive to start in May.

Red Cross Sends 100 to Aid South

Washington, D.C. — American Red Cross headquarters Sunday announced 100 doctors, nurses and staff personnel from all parts of the country have been rounded up for emergency relief duty in the tornado area of the south.

The Red Cross put the death toll at 233, and said 1,100 others were injured in Arkansas, Tennessee, Missouri, Mississippi, Alabama and Kentucky. At least 1,007 homes were destroyed and 1,318 damaged.

Cooler weather in the area Sunday ended the threat of new tornadoes, but floods were feared because of the downpours which accompanied the week-end storms.

End Credit Curb On Home Repairs

Last Monday the government dropped from its credit regulations any down payment requirements for home repairs and modernization work.

Up to this date a 10 per cent down payment has been required by the federal reserve board's "Regulation W" on credit.

However, the new board order continues a provision that such projects must be paid for within thirty six months.

Man Charged With Carrying Gun

James Thomas, 206 Oneida Street, was free on \$1,000 bond, Monday, March 31st, after having been charged with carrying a concealed weapon. Thomas was arrested Saturday night, March 29th, after a call had been sent in that a man had shot a revolver in a crowded business place on Oneida Street.

City To Pave Mobile And Cottage Streets

Tuesday, March 25th, the City Council of the City of Waterloo, approved a resolution, calling for the paving of Mobile Street, from the north line of Independence Street, to the south line of the present paving on Sumner Street. It was also deemed necessary and advisable to pave Cottage Street, from the west line of Mobile Street, to the east gutter line of the existing pavement on East Fourth Street, Ash Street, from Douglas to Albany street, was al-

These streets will be of six inch thick reinforced concrete pavement, twenty one to twenty five feet wide with integral roll-type curbs.

Several petitions had been received by the city council, requesting such improvements, and the council after studying the situation, deemed that such improvements were necessary and advisable.

This resolution will be considered by the city council for passage at a meeting to be held on the 22nd day of April, 1952, at 8 o'clock p.m., in the council chambers, at the City Hall, at which time, the owners of property subject to assessment for the proposed improvements may appear and make objection to the cost of the improvements, to the amount proposed to be assessed against any lot, and to the passage of said resolution. And at which time, resolution may be amended, passed as amended, or as proposed.

True Friends Singers At Union Baptist

The Union Baptist Church is expecting a capacity crowd on Sunday, April 6th, when the mid-west singing sensations, the TRUE FRIENDS SINGERS from Des Moines are presented in a concert of spiritual and gospel songs.

Organized 22 years ago in Memphis, they group was made up of four members. A few years ago, the group became established in the north and western parts of Iowa.

After becoming so very popular, three new voices were added, bringing the number to seven soul stirring voices. However, the group retains the name quartet, consisting of Robert Dixon, Al William, Victor Coleman, Lester Jurnigan, Alfred Bruce, Wendell Chapman and J. L. Parker. Since their arrival in Iowa in 1944, the group has been under the supervision of Deacon Cannon.

Russell Lasley Seeks Action By Stevenson of Illinois

Chicago (ANP) — Russell R. Lasley, vice president of the United Packinghouse Workers of America, CIO, and also head of the union's anti-discrimination department, last week called on Governor Adlai Stevenson to proclaim an "Equal Rights Week" for Illinois.

Purpose of the week is to combat race discrimination and to emphasize the democratic aspirations.

"So that the race riots of Cicero and the bombings in Cairo do not become more symbolic of Illinois than the traditions of Abraham Lincoln and Gov. John Peter Altgeld, we strongly urge that you proclaim an 'Equal Rights Week' for this state, during which time the majority of its citizens and religious, civic, labor and industrial organizations may join in observances and practices to strengthen those democratic aspirations which today are the only sure way to freedom and peace."

The union also asked the governor to start a scientific survey of the actual conditions, nature and causes of racial discrimination in Illinois.

The UPWA now is nearing completion of a nation-wide survey conducted by Fisk University, Nashville, Tenn., of racial practices within its own organization.

"Look Rape" Trial Postponed; Court House Burns

Yanceyville, N. C. (ANP) — The second trial of Mack Ingram, Negro tenant farmer accused of assaulting a white girl last summer in a "look rape" case, although he never came within 75 feet of her, was postponed last week because a fire destroyed the courthouse here.

Ingram, 42, and the father of nine children, is free on \$1,500 bond. He first was sentenced last summer to two years by a Recorder's court. He appealed this sentence and a Superior Court trial last November ended in a mistrial.

The case was listed among the 10 top news stories in North Carolina during 1951.

Pearl Bailey Quits "Shuffle Along"

New York (ANP) — Pearl Bailey, the musical comedy songstress, has left the cast of "Shuffle Along" which has been struggling to get ready for a Broadway opening, March 24th.

It is reported that Miss Bailey did not like the part assigned to her. There are plenty of people eager to take her place, according to reports.

Thelma Carpenter, another top bracket performer is said to be available. There have been so few opportunities to get on Broadway that despite its frail financial backing the producers of the revival have been able to pick and choose from many performers seeking tryouts for various roles.

Dolores Martin who took the job Miss Bailey surrendered in "Arms and the Girl" is also being considered.

Shoots At Friend Over \$4 Loan

Detroit (ANP) — John Lewis may have been a friend in the time of need when he loaned Thomas Andrews \$4, but Lewis used the wrong method in an attempt to collect his money.

Lewis, 22, last week was brought before Recorder's Judge John J. Maher on the charge of careless use of firearms.

Police said Lewis went to the home of Andrews, 32, and fired several shots into the wall of the bedroom when Andrews refused to pay him. Lewis said that he was only trying to scare his money out of Andrews.

Judge Maher placed Lewis on six months probation.

Atlantic City Preacher Accused of Rape

Atlantic City, N. J. (ANP) — Junius Manuel Mickey, 57, was arrested in Harrisburg, Pa., by special agents of the FBI where officers said he was living under the name of E. Manuel.

S. K. McKee, special agent in charge of the FBI, for New Jersey, announced the arrest of Mickey on a charge of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for rape.

Mickey was indicted by the Atlantic County Grand Jury on Dec. 5, 1951, on charges of carnal abuse of a 13-year-old girl of Atlantic City.

The family of the 13-year-old girl resided in an apartment owned by Mickey.

At the time of his arrest, police reported Mickey said he had been a travelling evangelist for more than 20 years. He claims to be a minister of the Pentecostal Holiness Church in Atlantic City.

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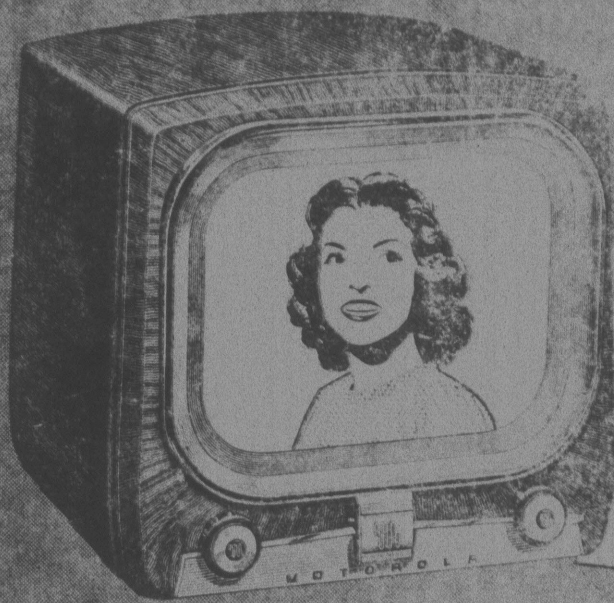
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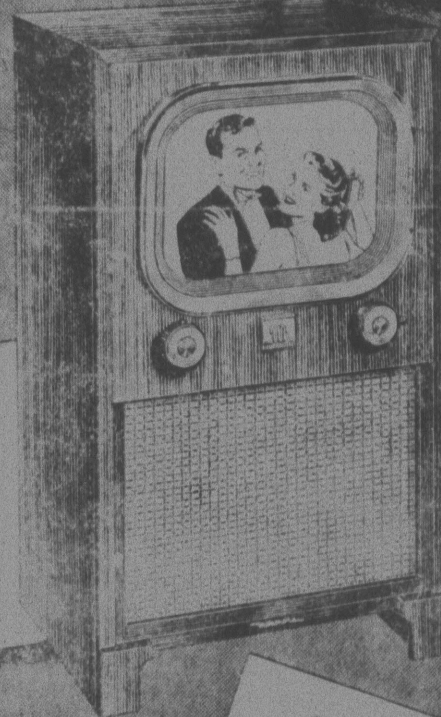
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Lorraine Baker Crowned Miss Bashir Temple
