## Va. NAACP In Drive To Get New Voters

Richmond, Va. (ANP) — State and local officials of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Virginia are in the midst of a state-wide registration drive to get all qualified Negroes in the state to register to vote on Nov. 4.

Amos C. Clark, secretary of the Franchise Committee of the Richmond Civic Council and a leader in the Virginia Civic League estimates that between 65,000 and 70,000 Negroes in Virginia have paid their poll taxes. Many of these persons, however, have never registered. A number of Negroes reached the voting age this year and can qualify to vote also.

## New Pastor Has Many Plans For Growth of Payne A.M.E.

Rev. George T. Stinson, Jr., son of the well known Rev. George T. Stinson, Sr., pastor of the St. Matthews A.M.E. Church in Shreveport, La., has been appointed the new pastor of Payne A. M. E. Church.

A graduate of Wilberforce University and the Payne Theological Seminary of Ohio, Rev. Stinson holds the Bachelor of Science and the Bachelor of Divinity degrees. He also received training at the Moody Bible Institute in Chicago and the Gary Theological Seminary at Northwestern. Rev. Stinson served as an instructor and a social worker at his home in Shreveport prior to his graduation.

A glance at his history of pastorages proves that Rev. Stinson is a determined worker and builder. He has pastored the St. Paul A.M.E. Church at London, Ohio, the Ross Chapel at Jamestown, Ohio; the Roger Chapel at Washington Court, Ohio; the Grant Memorial A.M.E. Church; and the Allen Chapel A.M.E. Church at Kalamazoo, Mich., his last appointment before coming to Waterloo. He has gained a wide reputation for the extensive repair work and building program he initiated throughout his pastorages. He left each church with a definite improvement and a guide to future progress.

Rev. Stinson's work at Allen Chapel is typical of the work done at all of his pastorages. He built a \$26,000 church, bought a \$3,000 Hammond organ, and paid for

them both in two years. He doubled the church membership and organized a youth choir of 30 voices, a young people's usher board, and a junior missionary society. A recreation program was also sponsored by the youth fellowship organized under Rev. Stinson's leadership.

Rev. Donald Folden, former Payne pastor, now pastors at Allen.

In a statement to the Post, Rev. Stinson expressed his interest in the growth and development of the youth in keeping with the moral and religious standards of the church. "Recreation supervised by Christian leaders is wholesome. We should not depend on the people of the world to provide recreation for our youth."

Rev. Stinson's wife, Ruth, is the daughter of Rev. R. C. Perry, Presiding Elder of the Mississippi Conference. She graduated from Central High at Shreveport with her husband and attended Camel College at Kalamazoo and Western Michigan.

The Stinsons have nine children: Gwendolyn, George III, Urias, Simeon, John Paul, Joseph, Sharon, and Nancy.

To the Stinsons we say: Welcome to our city.

**Governor Names October 13 Negro Achievement Day**

Dallas, Texas (ANP) — In a special official proclamation recently released to Dr. W. R. Banks and A. A. Braswell, chairman of the joint committee sponsoring arrangements throughout the state and in Dallas, Gov. Allen Shivers has officially proclaimed Monday, Oct. 13 as Negro Achievement Day at the State Fair of Texas.

The proclamation, signed by the governor, reads as follows:  
 "The directors of the annual State Fair of Texas have arranged for the Negro citizens of the State to participate in Fair activities with their attendances and exhibits. A committee of some 60 representative Negro citizens has been appointed to assist with these arrangements.

"The date of October 13 has been selected for Negro Achievement Day at the State Fair . . . In recognition of this worthy effort on the part of both the Fair directors and the Negro citizenry to arrange an outstanding program on this occasion we hereby dedicate this day as "Negro Achievement Day."

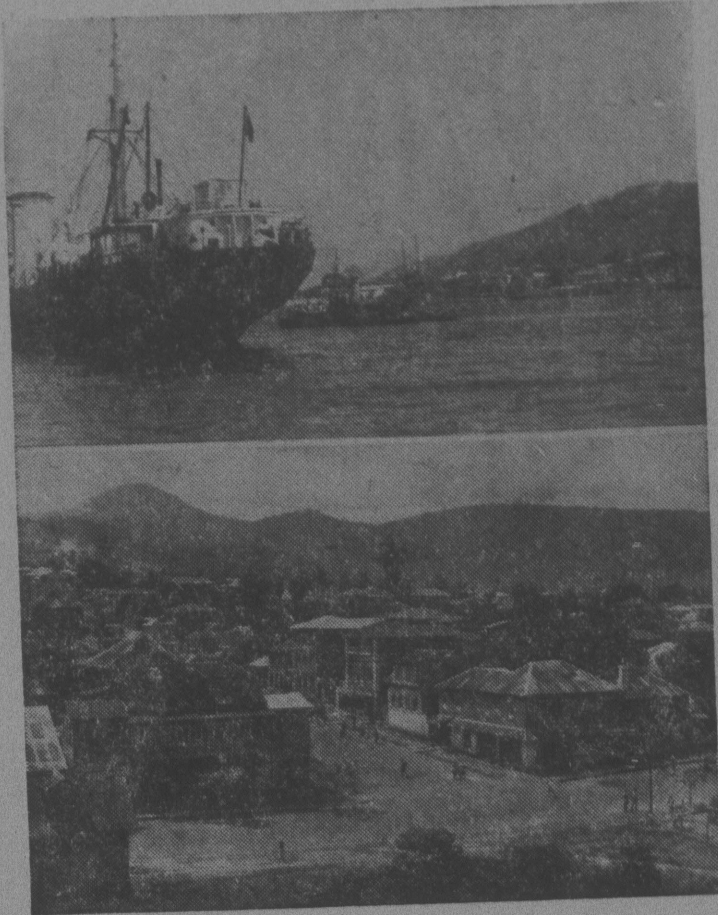

# A Great African Seaport



A city that has earned the title "Most Ancient and Loyal" is that of Freetown, Sierra Leone in Africa. The top picture displays the port facilities of this metropolis. The port, itself, is not deep enough to take the largest ocean liners, but a deep water quay now is being built.

The bottom picture illustrates Freetown's ancient architecture which makes it one of Africa's most picturesque areas. Universal tin roofs protect the home from the heavy deluges in the rainy season. Tile roofs just do not stay dry.

These roofs usually have an unusually dingy appearance because the sun flakes the paints off the roofs. Freetown has its slums, too, but generally it is considered a highly cultured center which is beginning to influence and bring progress to the interior of Sierra Leone.

## Negro Pupils Outnumber Whites In Charleston, S. C.

Charleston, S. C. (ANP)—Continuing a post war trend, Negro students in the city schools here exceeded white pupils this year, according to George C. Rogers, city school superintendent.

The number of colored pupils this year climbed to 59.9 per cent of the total enrollment. This represented a gain of 186 over last year.

For the same period, white schools in the city showed a loss of 65 pupils. Only two white schools showed gains.

Roger's report showed a total of 11,096 pupils enrolled in white and Negro schools this year. Last year the schools had an enrollment of 10,979. Current white enrollment is 4,494 as compared to the colored enrollment of 6,602.

Only one Negro school showed a decrease in enrollment. This is Avery elementary school which had an enrollment decrease from 68 to 32 pupils.

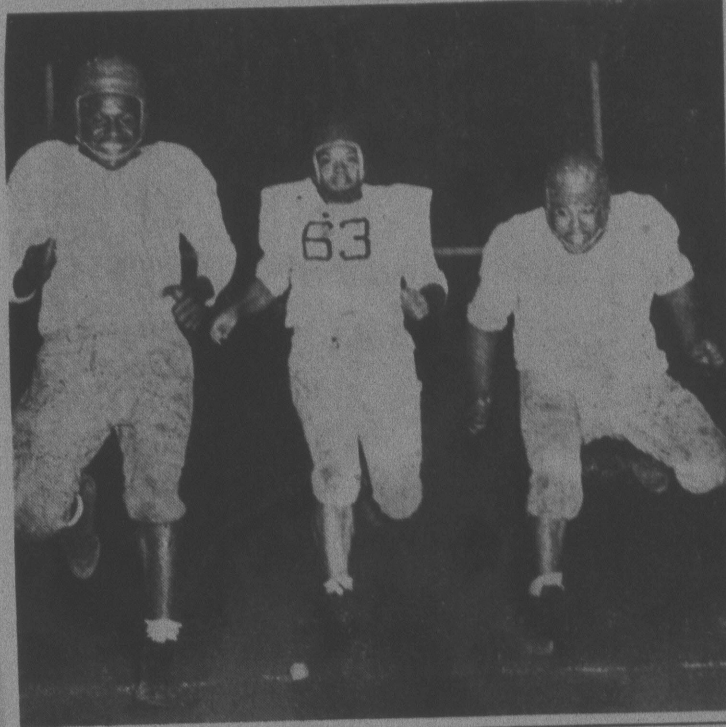

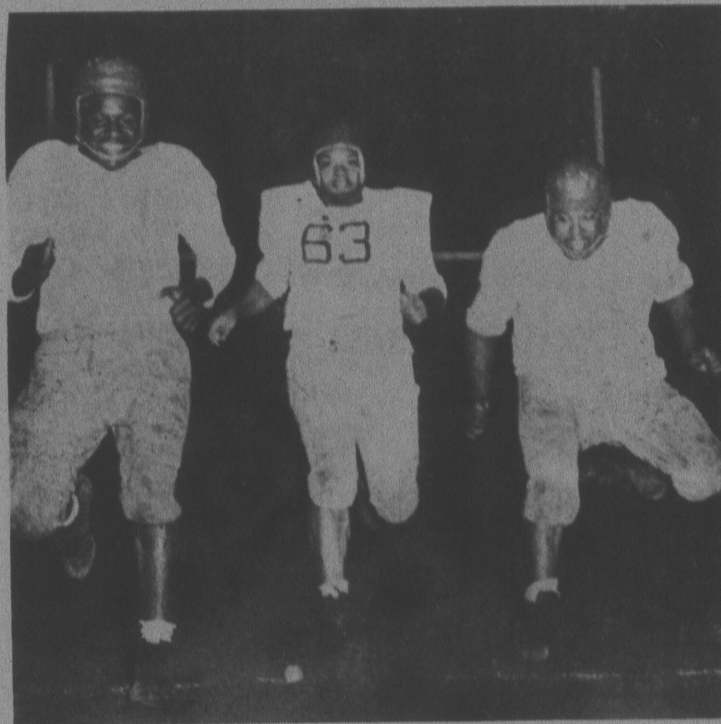

**The Fallen Gladiator**  
When a champion falls it is customary to write eulogies to his memory and to his great victories of the past. Not so many days ago, a heavyweight champion fell by the wayside, a victim of the rigors of age and the onslaught of youth.

In losing his crown, the champion, Jersey Joe Walcott, also earned his greatest victory. He gained for the first time in his career the admiration of the boxing fans as a fighting man. The thousands of fans who saw him valiantly stand up and slug with his mighty foe, Rocky Marciano, until the inevitable end came in the 13th round thrilled at his magnificent exhibition.

His display of boxing finesse and defensive artistry amazed and delighted the fans. Throughout this fight, they were thinking to themselves, "Can he last? How long can he go on at this pace?"

Unfortunately, he did not and could not last. He ran into a mighty Marciano right at the beginning of the 13th round, and it was lights out. In earlier rounds he had deftly sidestepped the blow that crushed his hopes of retaining the title.

When Rocky landed that one, age seemed to flow into Jersey's tired old body which had spent 22 years in the rings. He crumpled to the floor and lay there, evidently very happy to be through with it all.

It was a dramatic moment when the old gladiator opened the first round by dumping his young challenger to the floor with a hard right. It was even more dramatic to see the old man's body fold up and sag hopelessly into unconsciousness and probably to permanent retirement.

Some are saying Jersey Joe deserves a rematch. Maybe he deserves something even greater than a rematch, however, he deserves a rocking chair and a life of relaxation at home with his wife and six children.

From this bout, the champion has collected a cozy nest egg. Maybe he can now devote his life to the religious cause he has so long espoused.

This ringsider is one fan who never really admired Jersey Joe to any degree, but after his gallant stand against Marciano and age, Walcott deserves the admiration of all boxing rooters. He was not a great champion, but he was a proud one who refused to give up his crown until it was forced from his clutches by a bloody, bruised but powerful Rocky Marciano, aided by Father Time, the invincible conqueror.

**The New Champion**  
The name Rocky Marciano is on the lips of nearly every true boxing fan. Why shouldn't it be? He has just been crowned heavyweight champion of the world. Rocky rose from the canvas, took a brutal battering, but kept coming in for more, working to land some powerful blows and take the title.

For brute courage and strength and recuperative powers, Rocky must rank among the greats in the boxing ring.

He is the first man to become heavyweight champion with a perfect pro record, not a single defeat. He now has won 43 straight fights, 38 by knockouts. Right now he is at the pinnacle of the boxing world. He is the new champion, and actually has no logical challengers.

Who will he fight—Rex Layne, Roland LaStarza, Ezzard Charles, Clarence Henry? Or are there

some others? Maybe he will be forced to finish off Jersey Joe Walcott once more. That should not be as difficult a job the second time as it was the first.

Because Marciano is champion and probably will have some rest or will not face too much competition at the moment, he should now take stock of himself and learn a bit about boxing.

He was bruised too much for a champion in his bout with Walcott. He would have been knocked senseless by the end of the fight if Walcott had been a younger man who would not have run out of gas.

In baseball and football, when players begin to age, they substitute knowledge and alertness for the speed and sharp reflexes of their youth, and continue as great players. It has not been so in the boxing ring. Most fighters do the same thing when they are old (at least they try) that they did much better when they were young. Walcott is a rare example of an old man being better than when he was a young fighter.

Young Rocky is a likeable modest champion. He probably would be willing to learn more about not having to take too much of a beating to dish out some punishment. He cannot last as long as he should unless he does.

Maybe, habit is too much for Marciano to overcome, but Rocky at 28 does not have too many years left as top fighter in the ring even naturally, let alone if he has to take too much battering.

He fought hard to win this crown, let us hope he thinks hard to keep it.

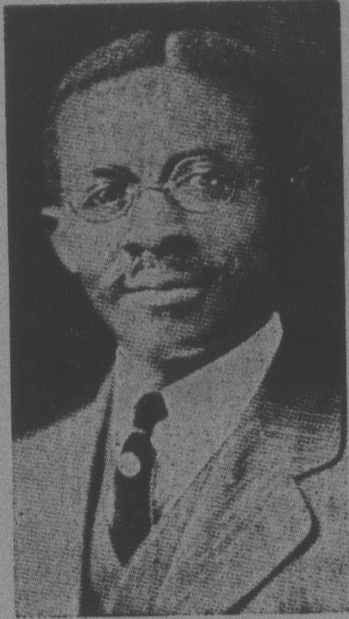
## Sermon of The Week

## Afraid to Invite Negro Ministers To Churches

Richmond, Va. (ANP) — The weakness of Christianity in the South in the face of southern race prejudice was revealed last week when this reporter found out that the average liberal white pastor below the Mason Dixon Line dares not invite a Negro minister to preach in his pulpit.

A liberal white minister last week told this reporter that he would be afraid to invite a Negro minister to preach to his congregation in Richmond because of the attitude of many of his officers and members on race relations.

Great strides have been made in recent years in race relations in the Presbyterian Church in Virginia. Union Theological seminary, white Presbyterian school, for some years has admitted Negroes as theological students.

Richmond and Norfolk had a bitter fight over the issue of segregation at their preaching missions. Richmond ministers voted to have their preaching mission next year at the Mosque without racial segregation. In Norfolk the forces of non-segregation lost, but white ministers finally voted to abandon the preaching mission until it can be held without racial segregation.

### FOLLOW ME!

Following has always been a difficult task for most men to understand, because concerning their own weaknesses they fail to apprehend.

With what they have they feel prepared to lead and not to follow; but lacking in spirit and inward grace, on the surface they appear pretty hollow.

Always, men do not want to follow Jesus. He leads in too straight a course, so that the unfaithful become weary and want to become their own boss.

This arrogance among men has obtained since the world was young, and this world is still languishing because man continues to do wrong.

Following Jesus is a daily practice quite different from everything else; it requires more in the heart than in the head, of the weak follower becomes weaker from being ill-fed.

We need men who will make their feeble wills subservient to His, despite all other propelling forces, and follow Christ, regardless of the crosses.
