### Gets Bigger Headlines Than Election; U. S. Studies Ban

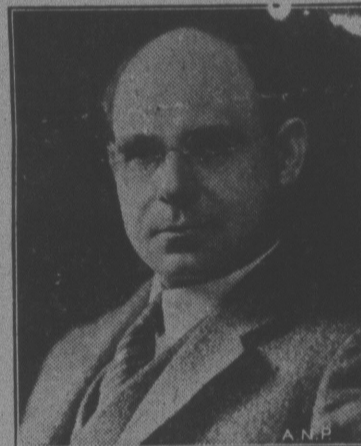
Buenos Aires, Argentina (CNS) — The latest Josephine Baker blast at the United States earned the distinction of getting bigger headlines than the election of General Dwight Eisenhower as President of the United States.

For her bitter statements, La Baker got two full columns in most newspapers. One newspaper gave her a seven column streamer on page one, with the caption: "Shattering Charge Against False Democracy." In contrast, the American elections got only a third of this space and no editorial comment.

### PORTER SLAYS WIFE THEN TAKES OWN LIFE

New York (CNS) — A 34 year old dining car porter, Vernon Polite, called police to tell them he had killed his wife, Alveta, 31. Police rushed to the scene a few minutes later, to find Mrs Polite dead on the bed and her husband dead on the floor. Notes were left to indicate that domestic troubles caused the homicide and suicide.

### OPENS MONSTER MEETING SERIES



One of the nation's leading series of forums held every year is the famed Monster Meetings of the Senate Avenue YMCA in Indianapolis. For the 41st time in the 48th year history of the series, Dr. Mordecai Johnson, president of Howard university and noted lecturer, opened the program, Sunday, Nov. 9. Leading speakers from all over the world head the weekly Monster Meetings. For the 1952-53 series, such men as Dr. Channing Tobias, Walter White and Asby Carter and others are scheduled to appear. (ANP)

La Baker's new blast came before a jammed packed Odeon Theatre where she is reported to have said: "I feel only compassion for those obliged to live on American soil because it isn't a free country."

Miss Baker was introduced by Armando Casella, head of Argentine Writers Syndicate, and spoke in English. Her translator was from President Juan Peron's Ministry of Information.

Josephine added that neither the United States nor Great Britain contributed anything to the liberation of France, where she was an underground worker. "We Free French liberated the country by ourselves," she stated.

Her lecture was such a tremendous success in this anti-United States country, that she is speaking in larger theatres for the remaining two on her itinerary.

### JUSTICE DEPARTMENT STUDYING BAN ON LA BAKER

Though in Buenos Aires, Argentina, Josephine Baker has declared that she shall count it an "honor to be barred from the United States," the Justice Department has begun to consider whether or not to admit the controversial singer to this country should she seek to return.

La Baker long ago renounced her American citizenship when she married a Frenchman. She considers France her home. As far as could be determined, she has not applied to reenter this country, though she does have a suit here against Walter Winchell, the syndicated columnist. Nevertheless, according to this spokesman, an investigation is going on concerning Miss Baker but no decision has been reached.

### An Ounce of Prevention

The old saying "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," looms up again in our community. Someone or some group is at fault and we must find out where the fault lies so that we can correct it.

It is against the law for anyone to carry a concealed weapon without a permit, and we must assume that when a person is arrested and found carrying a concealed weapon that he is guilty on the charge. This law must be enforced.

If this is true then the penalty for such an offense is not great enough to command everyone's respect and attention. New laws must be enacted and put in force.

It is a sad occasion when someone must feel and bear the brunt of an attack from a concealed weapon, when our children, who look to us for guidance, must see the results of such attacks. It is time for us to face the facts and correct such situations, that is, if we care at all what effects it will leave in their immature, impressionable minds.

We are not worthy of calling ourselves mothers and fathers unless we make ourselves heard by every official that we are against such happenings. If we have adequate laws with fair penalties, then we must see that they are enforced.

Whether we like it or not, we are a select group and the eyes of our city are on us every hour of the day. It is unfortunate that we cannot be judged individually, but as long as we are judged as a group then all must assume the responsibility of progress in our group.

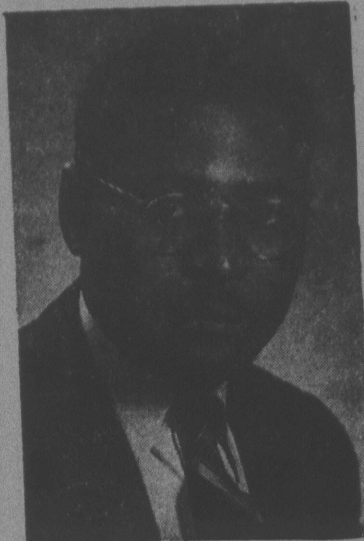

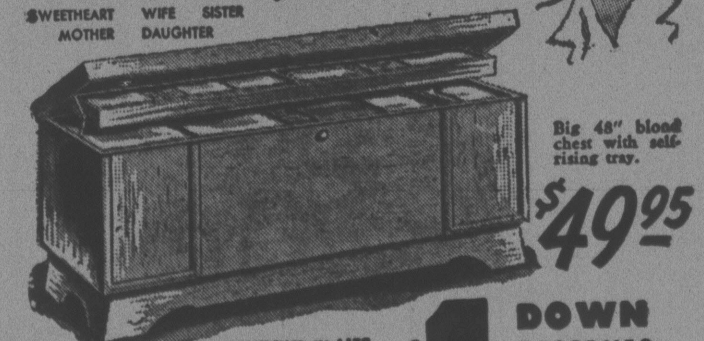

**ARCHIE MOORE TO FACE JOEY MAXIM DEC. 17 IN ST. LOUIS**

Believe it or not, Archie Moore, 36, after years of rating as the No. 1 light heavyweight challenger, will get a shot at the 175-pound title. He will face champion Joey Maxim in St. Louis, Dec. 17 in a 15-round bout.

Maxim is demanding and getting 45 percent of the gate to only 15 percent for Archie. Contracts have been signed.

Promoters will be the International Boxing Club which has been seeking to stage the bout for several weeks now.

It is said that the IBC will have to take in receipts of \$100,000 to make any money out of the fight. The record gate for a bout in St. Louis is about \$55,000.

This ringsider does not believe that bout will draw such money because neither fighter is the type that fans like to see. The money angle has been a decisive factor in Maxim and other champs dodging Moore. It is too likely that Moore will win, and the champ will lose his crown without making money.

Moore at 36 still should have enough stamina to which Maxim, a no hit champion. He will not, however, have too many active years in the ring for himself.

**CHICAGO IS NEXT STOP FOR EZZARD CHARLES EXPRESS**

The "Windy City" of Chicago will be the next stop for former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles in his "whistlestop" campaign to regain the title.

Slated as his next opponent is the ever-dangerous, but glass-jawed Robert Satterfield of Chicago.

They will meet in a 10-round bout at the Chicago Stadium. The date is Nov. 26, the night before Thanksgiving.

In his last outing, Charles who now claims to be a "tiger" in the ring (he once was a "cobra"), chopped up war horse Cesar Brion of Argentina in a 10-round bruiser in New York. The fans were for Cesar, but Ezzard won easily.

Satterfield in his last outing was kayoed in two rounds in Philadelphia by Bob Johnson. Just before that bout, he had won a 10-round decision from Johnson in Chicago.

Charles' greatest danger in meeting a man like Satterfield is that Bob might explode any moment. When the Chicagoan is good, he is great, but when he is bad, he gets conked for a knockout.

Chicago fans have about given up on Satterfield because of his inconsistency. They have seen him get up off the floor and whip a man like Lee Oma used to be, and they have seen him wilt before the barrage of a foe as he did after flooring Clarence Henry.

If he is the clouting Satterfield he can be, there are few men who can stand up under the power of his blows. Then Charles and his comeback are in great danger.

But if he is the punch-shy pretty boy, there will not be much fight in him. Then Charles probably will gain an easy kayo victory.

**BRATTON ON THE WAY TO WELTER CROWN?**

The way Johnny Bratton fought Joe Miceli the other night, it appears that he is hot after the welterweight championship now owned by Kid Galivan. Bratton did something unusual for him in his more recent days — he took all his foe had to give, then came back fighting.

This spirit was the kind displayed early in his career when he got up off the floor to stop Robert Earl and win the hearts of Chicago fans. More recently, however, he had become a spotty showoff who apparently did not do his best all the time.

Against Miceli, Johnny did not refrain from mixing with his tough opponent. His blistering attack was too much, and Miceli had to be retired from the ring.

If Johnny keeps this up he is sure to get a title bout with the winner of the Gavilan-Chuck Davey bout for the title. This ringsider believes that Johnny can take the crown too.

**MARCIANO MAY DEFEND HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE ONLY ONCE A YEAR**

The old days when a heavyweight boxing championship occurred only once a year may be returning now that Rocky Marciano is the champ. His manager, Al Weill, says his piece of physical brawn will enter the boxing ring only once a year.

In the days before Joe Louis, the champion treasured his title. Only a man who beat down all other challengers earned a right to the title shot of the year. Such great champions as Jack Dempsey and Jack Johnson rarely risked their crowns more than once in 12 months.

Louis changed that to the tune of even taking a "bum a month" during one period. Ezzard Charles followed the same pattern defending his title as often as possible.

Jersey Joe Walcott returned to the old scheme of things by keeping his crown in moth balls many more than the 90 days return bout he had promised Charles. Now Rocky who expects to be king a long time, plans to do the same. His return match with Jersey Joe may be his only defense in 1953.

It seems that Marciano can keep the money rolling in with dates as a referee and with numerous other guest appearances.

Well, this boxing fan does not like the "old days," but prefers an active champ.

**Joins Marines**

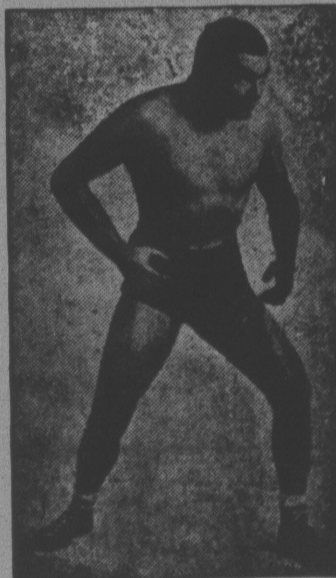

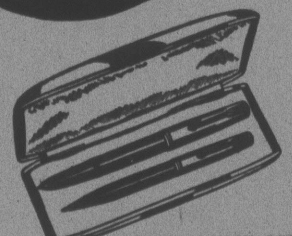

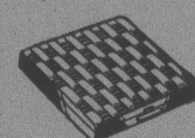

Sam walked timidly up to his boss' desk. "Boss," he said, "I came in to see if you could raise my salary."

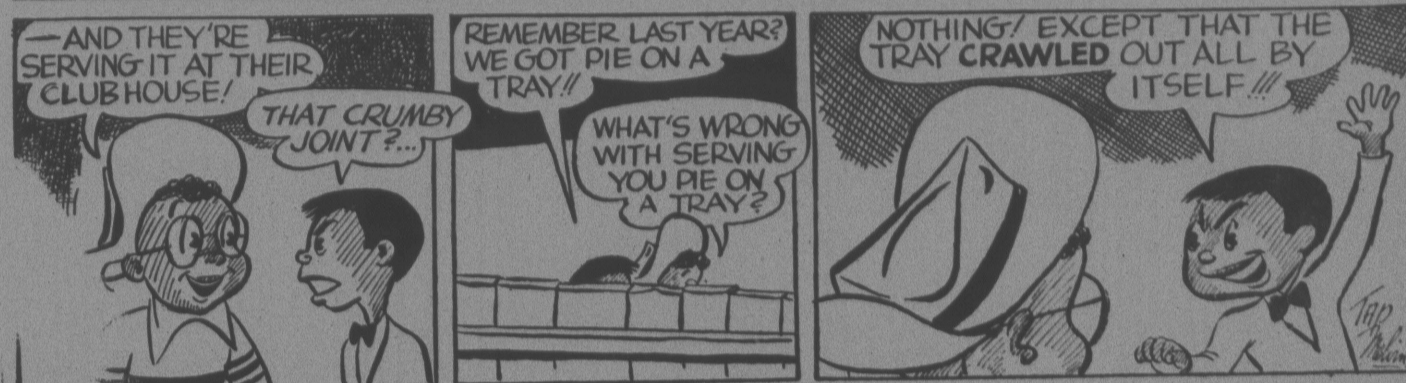
The face of the boss turned florid with anger. "Go back to work," he roared. "I've managed to raise it every payday, haven't I?"

A young doctor upon examining one of his first patients was confronted with a skin rash which he could not diagnose.

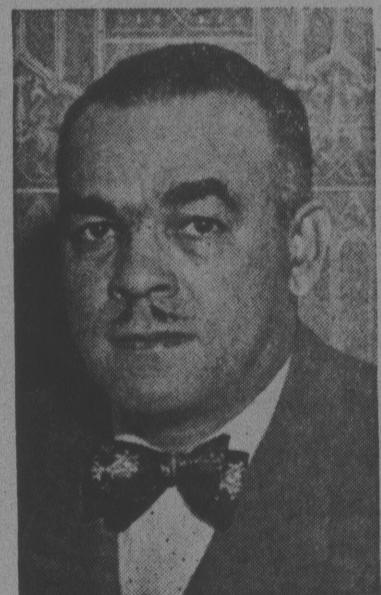
"Have you ever had a rash like this before?" questioned the doctor.

### Thousands Pay Final Tribute To Hattie McDaniel Streets In Church Vicinity Crowded By Both Races

Los Angeles (ANP)—The deep resonant voice of internationally famous screen star, Edward Arnold, saying "god-bye Hattie McDaniel;" the rich contralto tones of radio star Lillian Randolph, touchingly rendering, "I've Done My Work;" — towering orchid-adorned floral tributes, transforming the rostrum, and choir loft into a multi-colored garden of radiant blossoms, inside spacious Independent Church of God in Christ; — in this setting the "last curtain" descended on motion picture and radio star, Hattie McDaniel.

Outside all the streets converging on the corner of 18th and Paloma where the historic edifice stands, were the parked funeral cars of Angelus Funeral home, awaiting formation orders for the procession to Rosedale cemetery, thousands of spectators, who could not get inside the church already filled to its 2,000 capacity, scores of uniformed police officers and motorcycle patrolmen, first directing traffic, then cutting it off, and turning it back to detour to other streets when time came for the casket of the beloved "Beulah" to emerge.

Inside the church another squad of uniformed policemen, struggled quietly to keep the masses at the several doors from forcing their way in, some of whom, complained they had been on hand from early in the morning until that time, 1 P.M. All were anxious to pay Hattie their last respects. Lena Horne, James Cagney Brush Away Tears

Deep was the emotion that hovered over the hearts of all. Beautiful Lena Horne, who came unescorted, was observed to brush away a tear. Screen "toughie" James Cagney, masculine-like, attempted to disguise the same act-

ion by wiping his brow with a handkerchief. Noticeably affected also was handsome, light-complexioned James Crawford, Miss McDaniel's divorced first husband, who had flown in from Montana, in order to attend the funeral.

#### Messages From All Over The World

Just as during her life, fan mail had come from as far away as Switzerland, a stack of cards, letters, telegrams and cablegrams, many from city, state and national government officials, too huge to be read were acknowledged by officers of her Sigma Gamma Rho sorority, and the Rev. Clayton D. Russell, pastor, who presided over the obsequies. Thus he fulfilled a promise he had made to her during her life, that he would conduct her funeral services if she should pass first.

Jester Hairston's choir, famous as screen background music, sang "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" and "Tryin' to Make Heaven My Home," two of her favorite spirituals.

The Rev. Mansfield Collins Sr. of Neighborhood church, and who had buried Miss McDaniel's parents, delivered the funeral sermon over her.

Announcing him as "not only a great artist, but a great friend to our group," radio and screen star Louise Beavers introduced Arnold. This man who thrills millions in his radio role of "Mr. President," eloquently delivered an oration which rang with sincerity and expressiveness. Addressing the remains which lay as if asleep on a bed of flowers, in a fabulous sea-green metal casket, Arnold declared:

"We of the motion picture world are going to miss you Hattie. Always as you worked with us, you seemed to have God in your hand, offering us his goodness and kindness; now he has you in the palm of his hand, for the reward, and the rest you have so well earned. You were not only a great actress, but a great woman."

Rev. Collins told how during his several visits to her bedside at the Motion Picture Memorial Home and Hospital, in San Fernando Valley, she had remarked:

"I am walking with God. When I pass, please bury me close to the gate in Rosedale cemetery, because I have loved to live by the side of the road, where the race of men goes by."

In respect to her brother, Sam, a long time member of the Masonic lodge, uniformed Masons assisted with the proceedings, as did ushers from many other churches.

Arthur Lee Simpkins, internationally famous tenor, sang, "Oh, Dry Those Tears."

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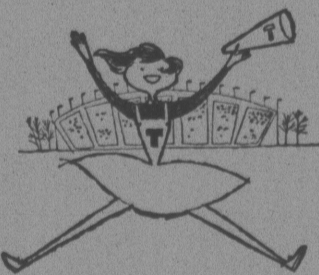
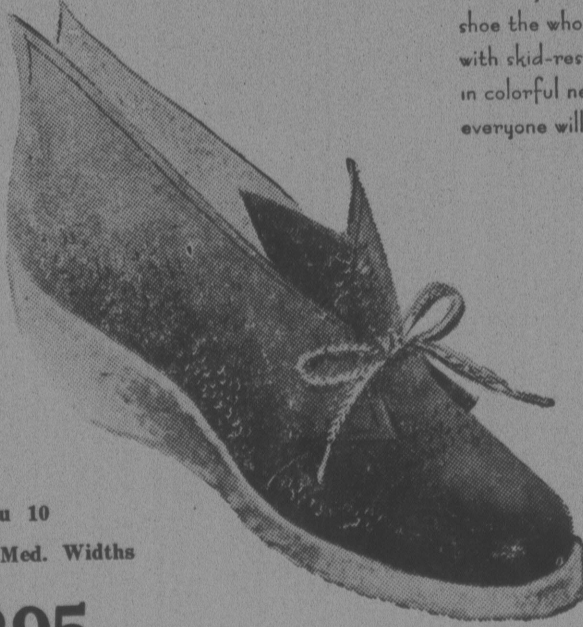
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# Tension High In Kenya; Study Begins

United Nations, N. Y. — (ANP) — Unofficially the boiling "cauldron" of African-European relations in Kenya remains the talk of UN delegates and observers. For it is a known fact that events in Kenya and the manner in which they are handled by the British are being closely watched by Africans in the UN Trust Territory of Tanganyika.

Oliver Lyttleton of the British Colonial Office left London last week by plane for Nairobi. Lyttleton was accompanied by his private secretary, A. M. Mackintosh, and H. P. Hall of the African department of the colonial office.

The latest word from African circles in Nairobi is that a provisional executive committee of the Kenya African Union has been set up to meet with British Colonial Secretary Lyttleton and discuss the African point of view.

F. W. Odede, African unofficial member of the Kenya Legislative Council and by profession a lecturer in the veterinary school of Makerere college stationed at Kabete, Kenya, has been chosen acting President of the Kenya African Union in view of the arrest and detention of Jomo Kenyatta, educator and president of the 100,000-strong Union. J. A. Z. Murambi is now acting general secretary and W. Awori, acting treasurer.

Reportedly, members of the provisional executive committee strongly assert that they did not believe that Kenyatta was guilty of any particular offense and discounted the so-called influence of Mau Mau. However, they cited a number of issues which they intended to bring to the attention of Lyttleton and Fenner Brockway of the British Labor Party.

Brockway is a member of a London group which furnished a lawyer and interpreter for a member of the Wa-Meru Tribe of UN Trust Territory of Tanganyika who spoke in Swahili before the UN Trusteeship Council this past summer on the issue of British eviction of his tribesman from land in Tanganyika.

Included among the issues to be discussed by Odede and other Kenyan Africans are:

- 1 The abolition by law of racial discrimination;
  - 2 An end to European and Indian immigration;
  - 3 Compulsory universal primary education;
  - 4 Common-roll elections for all three races, based on literacy and property qualifications;
  - 5 Election of African members to the Kenya Legislative Council;
  - 6 Parity for Africans and non-Africans on the unofficial benches in the Kenya Legislative Council.
- Ode and the provisional executive committee also demand equal pay for equal work and qualifications, an increase of 33 percent in the minimum wage and provisions of adequate housing for thousands of African workers in Nairobi and Mombasa.

On the more immediate questions they have insisted that "the terms of reference of the Royal Commission be widened to include a survey of all the land in Kenya." Also, they urge the earliest possible repeal of all "recent repressive legislation" curtailing civil liberties and requiring African editors to have licenses to publish their newspapers. Odede and his associates demand the release "or immediate trial" of all persons arrested since Oct. 20.

The creation of a "conciliation group" has been suggested. Such a group would have the task of resolving the difficult problems "facing all races." It would include representatives of the Kenya African Union, the Electors' Union, the Kenya Indian Congress, European and Indian elected members of the Kenya Legislative Council, and African unofficial members of the Legislative Council.

## ALL-AMERICAN EVANS DROPPED

Philadelphia (ANP) — A combination of an undisclosed illness and lower than usual grades combined Friday to have Bob Evans declared ineligible for the University of Pennsylvania football team.

A great tackle of all-American calibre, Evans was captain of the team. He and end Ed Bell are the first two Negroes to ever play for the Penn eleven.

Evans has been admitted to the university hospital for "a rest and complete physical checkup." Just what is causing Evans' sickness was not revealed, but it is said that Evans kept it secret.

William H. DuBarry, executive president of Penn, made this announcement:

"Upon inquiry by the university into the situation of Robert Evans' unsatisfactory scholastic record in recent weeks, it was discovered that he had not been well and had kept the information to himself because of his extreme desire to lead the football team as captain."

Evans is 21 years old and usually a good student. On the gridiron he has been a virtual 60-minute man in this day of two-platoon systems. His inspirational work has led his team to a surprisingly successful season with only one loss on its record.

## SEGREGATION DROPPING IN NATION'S CAPITAL

Washington (ANP) — A fresh survey was made in Washington's downtown restaurants and drug store lunch counters last week to determine whether the trend toward breaking down segregation is being very widespread in the various eating places.

The survey was conducted by members of the Coordinating Committee for the Enforcement of the D. C. Anti-Discrimination Laws. The group of Negro and white persons broke up into small teams of two and three and visited 24 restaurants for service. They were served without comment in 14 of the places and refused service in 10.

One conclusion drawn from these results, the committee said, is that discrimination in Washington eating places is no longer the fixed that many people assume it is. Added to the committee's findings in previous surveys, these results indicate a clear trend toward the end of any discrimination in District restaurants, the group believes.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Mary Church Terrell, noted educator, author and civic leader, the committee is seeking validation in the courts of two 19th century anti-discrimination laws. A decision in its suit, the well-known Thompson restaurant case, is expected to be handed down shortly, by the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

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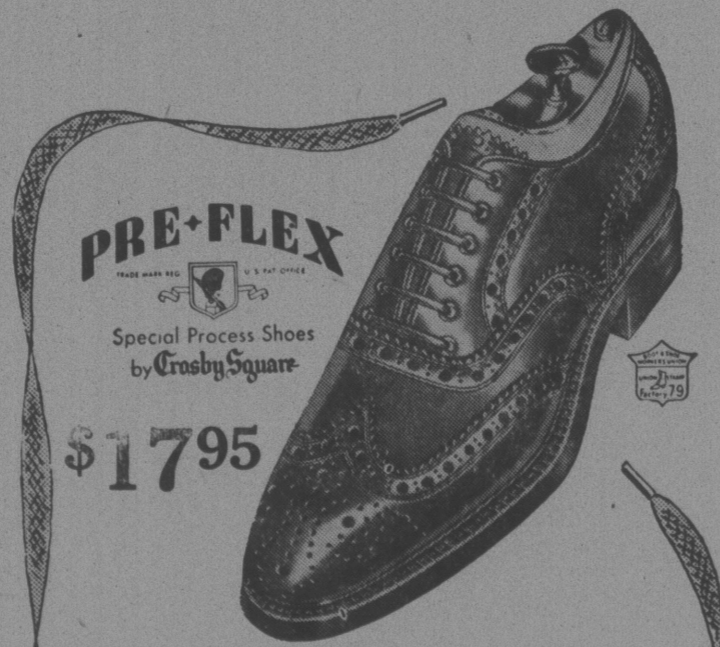

## MENU

Broiled Beef Burgers With Onion Spread  
Whipped Cheese Potatoes  
Hot Biscuits  
Harvard Beets  
Red and Green Coleslaw  
Margerine

Cinnamon Baked Apples  
Whipped Cheese Potatoes  
2 tablespoons milk  
3/4 teaspoon salt  
Dash of pepper  
Nutmeg or paprika  
6 medium sized potatoes  
1/2 cup grated cheese  
1/4 cup vitamized margerine

METHOD: Cook potatoes in boiling salted water until soft. Drain and shake over low heat until white and mealy. Mash or press through ricer. Heat margerine and milk together until margerine is melted. Mix cheese with potatoes and whip in margerine, salt and pepper. Spoon potatoes around edge of oven-proof platted. Sprinkle with nutmeg and run under broiler until potatoes are golden brown.

Arrange Broiled Beef Burgers in center of Platter. Top each burger with a half tablespoon of Onion Spread made by blending 1 teaspoon grated onion with 1/4 cup margerine. Yield: 4 servings.

Red and Green Coleslaw  
1/2 cup real mayonnaise  
2 teaspoons cider vinegar  
1 teaspoon salt  
Dash of Pepper  
Pinch of sugar  
1 teaspoon mustard with horseradish (optional)  
4 cups finely shredded cabbage  
3 to 4 radish, sliced  
1/4 green pepper, chopped

METHOD: Blend together real mayonnaise, vinegar, salt, pepper sugar, and mustard-with-horesradish. Just before serving, combine cabbage, radishes and green pepper and toss lightly with mayonnaise mixture. Yield: 4 servings.

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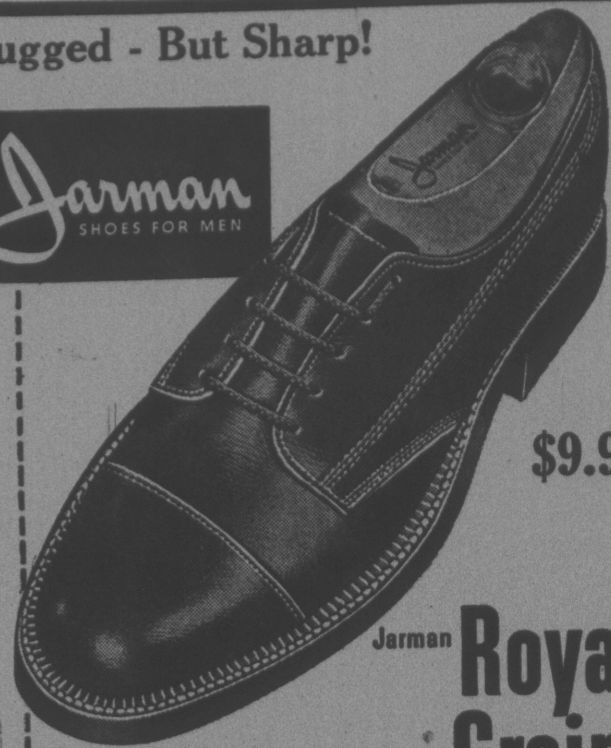
### Catherine Hardy Honored At Fort Valley
