MIGRATION 1973

This has been a rather retarded season compared to the average because of the inclement weather through much of April and early May, however, nearly everything seems to be back now. Arrivals within the past week have been scarlet tanagers, baltimore cricles, many warblers, numbers of catbirds and many shorebirds. A large flock of golden plover was seen north of Ames recently and last Sundays field trip of the Iowa Ornithologist's Union turned up willet, gainit and hudsonian godwit and dowitcher in the list of 152 species. A very rare worm-eating warbler has been reported from Brookside Park and a hooded warbler was seen in town recently. Don't miss the migrants this year for it looks like an excellent season.
