200 MORE TREES PLANTED

Another 200 small trees were planted along Hwy. 30 east of Ames by Bluestem members on May 4. Mary Owings, Hank Zaletel, Cindy Hildebrand, Roger Maddux and Judy van der Linden helped plant, and a week later, because the ground was so dry, Mary Owings and Mary Cowan returned to water some of the trees.

Rather than plant in a new area, these trees were used to fill in stretches where trees planted in previous years had died. The conservation committee apologizes to anyone who may have arrived to plant in the afternoon. A mix-up in starting times occurred because of a lack of communication.



IOU MEETING REPORT

The Iowa Ornithologist's Union (IOU) held its spring meeting May 18-19 at Marshalltown Community College. Hosts were the Central Iowa Ornithologists, the Marshalltown bird club.

Participants socialized on Friday evening, then went on field trips
early Saturday morning. Late morning workshops were held on flycatcher
identification, shorebird identification and building an ornithological
library, and afternoon program topics
were identifying birds by sound and
the state breeding bird atlas project.
Carl Kurtz gave a presentation Saturday evening on his safari to Africa.

Activities on Sunday included morning field trips and a compilation at noon of the approximately 155 species seen over the weekend. The best bird spotted was a Ruddy Turnstone (see drawing at right).

BIRDER'S

Ledges State Park is one of the best places to see migrating warblers this spring. A Kentucky Warbler has been seen near the cross bridge at the bottom of the long hill down to the lower Ledges; Cerulean Warblers and Blue-gray Gnatcatchers were found near the intersection of Pease Creek and the lower Ledges road, and Yel-

low-throated Warblers, rare in this part of Iowa, are located 50 yards south of the outdoor shelter in sycamore trees behind an old ranger's shed. Near the park's main entrance, a mockingbird was seen around the ranger's residence.

Other bird sightings in the Ames area include a Connecticut Warbler on May 27 at Brookside Park, a Sharp-tailed Sparrow and Least Bittern on May 18-19 at Cooper's Marsh and a Least Bittern on May 27 at Hendrick-son's Marsh.

CONSERVATION/THE ENVIRONMENT

DRAINAGE RULES -- A hearing on proposed changes in Iowa's drainage rules will be Aug. 19 at 10 a.m. in Des Moines. Cindy, our Iowa Audubon Council lobbyist in the statehouse, is urging that the rules changes be challenged because of their potential environmental impact. The changes already have been tentatively approved and will probably go into effect unless the commissioners' minds can be changed. Letters may be sent to Robert W. Schlutz, chairman of the Water, Air and Waste Management Commission, Box 269, Columbus Junction, Iowa 52738.

PRAIRIE WORKSHOP -- A workshop on tallgrass prairie will be held Aug. 7 at Pioneer Central Division, Johnston, and is open to the public. Sponsors are the Iowa Conservation Commission, the Iowa Federated Garden Clubs and the state Department of Transportation. The all-day workshop will include talks on wildflower diversity and propagation, prairie establishment on park lands, and the question of roadside spraying. A tour of the Saylorville Visitors' Center, catered lunch and materials all are included in the \$8.50 registration fee. Preregistration forms are due Aug. 2. SAFER SUBSTITUTES

In order to decrease the amount of wastes we produce, try using some of these less harmful substitutes.

INSECT SPRAY

Blend 6 cloves crushed garlic, one mineed onion, one tablespoon pure soap in 4 liters of hot water and let sit 1-2 days. Strain before using. OR Place 1 cigarette in 1 liter of water overnight. Strain and spray.

MOSQUITO REPELLENT

Drink brewer's yeast or take in tablet form on a daily basis during the summer months (make sure you are not allergic to brewer's yeast before taking it).

GENERAL CLEANER

Mix baking soda with a small amount of water.

DRAIN OPENER

Prevent clogging by using a drain strainer.

OR Use plunger or mechanical snake. OR Pour cup borax into the drain followed by 2 cups of boiling water. OR Flush drain weekly with boiling water.
