We plan to have a season ticket available next year which means that most prospects will be contacted just once. Many ideas for promotion of the series have come out of meetings with the Kiwanis Club and, with both clubs actively participating, we look forward to a highly successful season next year.

AUDUBON FIELD TRIPS

A preliminary trip was made to Red Rock Reservoir March h. Waterfowl had not yet returned and the reservoir was still ice-bound. Only a few mallard, goldeneye, and mergansers were present and one bald eagle has remained the winter. A trip is planned to Red Rock late in March or early in April to observe the waterfowl with perhaps one later in the season to observe the peak of the landbird migration. We hope that Gladys Black will be available to direct us to the better areas in the refuge. Local trips are also planned.
