Cn Wednesday evening of Nov. 5, Ames Audubon will sponsor the first National Audubon Wildlife Film program ever shown in Ames. These are produced by the National Audubon Society and are now in their 27th successful season. Over 1500 such programs will be shown in about 250 No. American cities, large and small, this season. Included are 8 Iowa com-Without question they are, as a group, the very highest quality programs on wildlife, wilderness, and conservation available anywhere today. Mr. Durden has had a distinguished career in nature photography. A native Californian with a B.S. degree in Biology, he has contributed footage to Walt Disney and "Lassie" TV productions. He has produced 2 accumentaries, "Deserted Island" and "Sky Skipper", which have been on nationwide TV. He crrently also produces educational nature films. In addition, Kent Durden has lectured throughout So. California with 2 of his productions, "Eagle Sense" and "Deserted Island".

The program will last about 90 minutes or more, depending on audience participation in a question-and-answer session at the close. The actual running time of the films is about 70 min., in 2 reels, They are in full color with a sound, track of natural sounds and amusical back-

ground. Mr. Durden will narrate the program in person.

Proceeds go to support local conservation programs of the Ames Audubon Society and the I.S.V. Botany Club, which will share any net receipts, We are cautiously optimistic about a good turnout, so we advise that you come early for better seats. The program starts at 8 p.m. and the doors will open at 7 p.m. We are confident about the sound system. A major problem is with parking, as meters around the Union are only for 1 hour. The Union ramp is available, however, with easy access to the Union, mates are 15¢ for the first hour and 10¢ per additional hr. Free parking is available at the foot of the hill east of the Union, if you don't mind a little walk. Please try to attend and bring your friends. NOTES ON RECENT EVENTS

Cur major events in October were the 2 programs featuring the 3-M films, "Three Young Americans: In Search of Survival", relating to to-day's environmental problems. An estimated 300-350 persons attended on Cotober 6 and close to 400 on October 8. We had some sound trouble the first night which detracted from the program, but the second night was excellent in all respects. The response of the audience was very gratifying. It was generally agreed that the second night was by far one of our best programs to date, along with Dr. Landers' machel Carson Lecture last year. We certainly wish to express our sincere thanks to Dr. Adela Elwell, Gerald Robinson, and Jim Rod of Ames Audubon for their active participation. Also, we want to thank Dr. Landers and Prof. Trauger of the I.S.U. Ecology Group for serving so ably as moderators. Their group co-sponsored the programs with Ames Audubon.

Dr. Milton Weller, world famous wildlife scientist (and Ames Audubon member) recently departed for Antartica where he will do some work with penguins. We understand he will return to Ames about Dec. 1 after a stop in Hawaii. Last year Dr. Weller travelled to Alaska and the area of the North Sea.

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When our club is able to do so, financially, we may wish to consider expanding our contacts with other recognized and reputable conservation organizations. Two of those that might be considered are the following: The Iowa Ornithologists Union, a non-profit corporation, devoted to encourage the study of, interest in and protection of birds in the state. Membership includes a subscription to their fine publication, "Iowa Bird Life." Also, The National Parks Association, a non-profit corporation devoted to defending and enlarging our parks system. A publication is included with membership.

Ames Election Notes

On Tuesday, November 4, local citizens will vote in the municipal elections. Many of the candidates for office have stressed conservation and related problems in their statements. This certainly reflects a growing awareness of the environmental needs in Ames and elsewhere in the country. We sincerely believe Ames Audubon has made a major contribution during the past 18 months in helping to alert local people- both young and old- to the need for protecting wildlife and our parks, conserving our natural resources, and improving our natural environment, in general.

This year marks the retirement from the Park Commission of Mr. Lloyd Kurtz after 18 years of distinguished and dedicated service. Mr. Kurtz was recognized last spring by Ames Audubon in being selected for our first annual "Conservationist of the Year" award. Ames will sorely miss Mr. Kurtz' active role in park development.

Mr. George Clark III is the only announced candidate for the vacating position on the Park Commission. His recent statement in the Ames Tribune certainly merits repeating here. In part, it is as follows:

"The citizens of Ames can be justly proud of the accomplishments of our present Park Commission. The park system of the city of Ames is decond car to none. As a member of this commission I would therefore propose to continue its current plans and activities with the same goal of providing an ever-increasing acreage of park facilities... Situated at the confluence of 2 beatiful streams Ames enjoys a natural location for the improvement and expansion of public park facilities. I would therefore propose to do all within my power to insure that these flood plains and contiguous wooded areas are preserved for recreation and enjoyment... Foresight and planning at all levels of government, coupled with the cooperation of all citizens, are necessary in this regard."

This very fine statement certainly speaks for itself.
We believe Ames is very fortunate to have a man of Mr. Clark's ability and sentiments ready to step into Lloyd Kurtz' big shoes. The future looks bright for the Ames park system. We of Ames Audubon pledge our cooperation in these efforts in any way we can. We believe our Nature Trail project in Brookside Park is a step in this direction.
