The California Desert- A Natural History of some lesser known areas by Wolfgang Oesterreich Thursday, March 16, 7:30 PM, Room 2532, Veterinary Medicine Building, Iowa State University

Wolfgang Oesterreich will share with us some of the scenes, wildflowers, reptiles and other elements of the natural history of the lesser known areas of California's Desert. Wolf explored the desert over a couple of years as a Biological Technician for the Bureau of Land Management and did a study of the desert tortoise. He lived in California for 15 years and graduated from Humboldt State University. Currently, Wolf works as a Biological Science Technician for USDA-ARS at the National Soil Tilth Lab in Ames. An active member of the Big Bluestem Audubon Society, Wolf is an avid birder and regular field trip participant and leader.

Field Trips

Saturday, March 18, 7:30 AM - Trip to view waterfowl

Meet at the Design Center Parking lot, I.S.U. We will either go to Little Wall Lake north of Ames or Bays Branch near Panora in Guthrie Co.

> Saturday, April 1- Trip to Ringgold Co. to view & photograph Prairie Chickens. We will stay overnight Friday, March 31 in a motel near the site and leave early (4:30 AM) Saturday morning to set up for viewing and/or photographing Prairie Chickens on their lek in southern Iowa. Roger Hill will be our guide. There is only room for a limited number of photographers in the blinds that will be set up. People in the blinds need to stay in them until about 9 AM so as not to disturb the booming birds. There is also an opportunity to view the Chickens from a further distance if you don't want to take pictures. After viewing the Prairie Chickens we will do some birding in the vicinity. February Field Trip Report

The eight Big Bluestem Audubon Society members that participated in our field trip on Saturday, February 18, enjoyed an unseasonably pleasant morning exploring the Des Moines River valley. Across the river from Camp Hantesa, the brush was thick and the weed seeds still in good enough supply for large numbers of cardinals and other seed eaters. Interesting finds included Harris's and White-throated Sparrows and a Rufous-sided Towhee (the western, spotted race). A possible Pileated Woodpecker was observed briefly as well. Downriver, on the east side of the river south of the E 57 bridge, Wolf Oesterreich led us to a large seep with open water, where snipe and a thrasher were located on the Boone County Bird Count. These birds could not be found, but we did see good numbers of Red-headed Woodpeckers, Bald Eagles, and a few Red-tailed and Rough-legged Hawks.

Natural Areas of Ames

At our February 16 meeting, Bill Norris of the I.S.U. Botany Department presented a very informative program on a survey of natural areas in Ames and the surrounding two mile area. He told us about a ranking system he developed to differentiate higher quality areas from lesser quality areas. His findings are to be used by the City of Ames as it writes its new Land Use Policy Plan. One high quality area identified is the wooded area west of the YMCA property. It will take diligence by Ames citizens to make sure that these natural areas are protected.

International Migratory Bird Day, May 13

International Migratory Bird Day (IMBD) is the hallmark event for Partners in Flight, the international coalition of organizations, agencies, academia and industry whose mission is to maintain populations of migratory birds. The theme for IMBD, 1995 is "Sharing a Passion for Birds".

Sharing your excitement for birds and birding is important to successful conservation of birds. Many species of neotropical migratory birds are at risk. Habitat loss has had the greatest impact on declines of these species.

Sixty five million Americans enjoy bird watching and bird feeding. Birders are a fast growing and potentially powerful constituency in the U.S. We outnumber golfers by more than two to one. We spent over \$18.1 billion on memberships, optics and photography equipment, birding trips and trip related costs in 1991 alone in the U.S.

Partners in Flight encourages you to communicate your passion for birds to national, state, and local decision makers by letting them know of the need for adequate funding for wildlife. And, also, to communicate your passion to friends, family, neighbors and colleagues and let them know that there are 65 million people who enjoy bird watching, bird feeding and who care about bird conservation.
