**September Field Trips** -- Try to take advantage of at least one of these field trips this month:

Sat., Sept. 13, to Ledges State Park to see migrating warblers and hawks. Hank Zaletel and Steve Dinsmore will lead participants. Meet at 8 a.m. in the parking lot south of C.Y. Stephens at the ISU Center, Ames.

Sat., Sept. 20, a demonstration by Dr. Jim Dinsmore, ISU professor of ornithology, of mistnetting, a capture technique used in bird research. If the birds are moving, this should be a great opportunity to see warblers and other migrating songbirds up close. Meet at 7:30 a.m. in the north parking lot (by the fire engine) at Brookside Park, Ames.

Sat., Sept. 27, to Saylorville Reservoir and environs, to see pelicans, cormorants, herons, egrets, terns and gulls. Hank Zaletel and Steve Dinsmore will again lead. Meet at 8 a.m. in the parking lot south of C.Y. Stephens.

Regional Conference -- All Audubon members and interested persons are invited to this year's regional Audubon conference at Camp Sunnyside near Des Moines, Oct. 10-12. Because ours is the closest Audubon chapter, Bluestem members may be needed to help man registration desks, hand out name tags or meal tickets, or perform other such duties. Persons interested in volunteering will be able to do so at the September meeting, or may call Dave Edwards.

Wetlands is the theme of the conference, which includes field trips, numerous speakers and workshops, an address by NAS president Peter Berle and a concert Saturday night by an Iowa folksinger of PBS's "Prairie Home Companion" fame, Greg Brown.

A variety of lodging and meal plans is available. Registration fee is \$20 per person, before Oct. 1. Registration after Oct. 1 or at the door will be \$25. A daily fee of \$10 per person may be paid by individuals able to attend only one day of the conference. Contact a chapter officer for more information or for a registration form.

Leopold Centennial --Our Audubon Society is considering hosting a potluck supper for some speakers and honored guest attending the Aldo Leopold celebration here Oct. 5-9. Bluestem members will be polled at the September meeting to determine how many are interested in this idea. The tentative date and place for the meal are Tuesday, Oct. 7 at the Izaak Walton League meeting room off Stagecoach Road.

Rain Helps Trees -- An estimated 95% - 100% of the trees planted by Bluestem members along Highway 30 last spring have survived the summer, according to Hank Zaletel. Abundant, timely rain fall and careful mowing of the area by the Department of Transportation have kept nearly all of the trees alive and looking healthy, Hank reports.

Ames Lakes Meetings -- The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers met Aug. 11 with state and Ames officials to seek support for its recently completed reevaluation of a proposed dam and lake north of Ames. The Corps study indicated a smaller impoundment at the same site was the only feasible alternative now to the original Ames Lake plan. A group opposing the Ames Lake was scheduled to hold an information session Aug. 26 at Meeker Elementary School for concerned residents.

Name Omitted -- Paul Martsching's name was inadvertantly omitted from a list of newsletter contributors that was published last June to recognize these person's help. Paul submitted reports for the "Birder's Notes" feature for several issues during the year.



Aug. 21 -- Shorebirds and warblers have begun their fall migration south and are now passing through Iowa. Watch along the edges of flooded farm fields (in the mud flats left by receding water) to see shorebirds. The Colo "ponds", two miles east of Colo on the north side of old Highway 30, were visited this week by yellowlegs, Pectoral, Solitary and Least sandpipers, Semi-palmated Plovers and Killdeer, among others. In addition, pelicans and seven species of herons and egrets were seen this week on mud flats near the Highway 17 bridge at Saylorville Reservoir.

A wave of warblers passed through Brookside Park in Ames the weekend of Aug. 16 -- about 10 species were seen. Fall warblers will continue moving through the area during September and early October. Brookside is a fairly good place to see them. The migration of hawks should be underway the middle of September. You may want to tag along on the chapter's Sept. 13 field trip to see both migrating warblers and hawks.

Unusual sightings of birds over the summer included a Mountain Plover at Colo "ponds" on July 9-10, which may have been blown into Iowa by a storm. This species was reported only once before from Iowa, in the 1960's. The bird was in the company of three Golden Plovers, which although not unusual migrants, were unexpectedly early. July 19 was the earliest previous fall migration record for this species in Iowa. In addition, a Western Sandpiper was identified at the "ponds" on July 14. This species is both unusual for central Iowa and difficult to identify.
