# WHAT IS THE BIG BLUESTEM AUDUBON SOCIETY?

The Big Bluestem Audubon Society is the latest form of a group of long standing. It began as an Ames birding group many decades ago changing it name at least once. In 1983 the group applied for and received formal chapter status with the National Audubon Society. The chapter is incorporated and has the requisite formal documents and obligations. Our tie with the National Audubon Society is a mutually beneficial one. Members of the NAS in a defined area are automatically members of the local chapter. Our area extends from about Ogden to State Center and Webster City to Perry. The NAS supplies a part (\$5.50) of those members' fees. These funds are for our use in the aid of Audubon causes as defined in our documents. The current budget details are shown below. We supply a local effort in conservation causes including education, service projects, and membership recruitment. The NAS gives \$15.50 in the first year for members the chapter recruits, so it is very important that those you encourage to join use our application materials or place the chapter's designator code H57 on them.

The chapter holds monthly business meetings from September through May. Field trips are planned to meet the interests of the members and be attractive to potential members. All meetings and field trips are open to the general public, and there are no fees charged for any event.

What do we do at meetings? Each meeting typically begins with a short period of announcements and reports regarding different activities of the chapter. This is followed by a period in which members are encouraged to report interesting natural sightings and experiences; the primary focus is usually on birding. One of the experienced birders then presents a short identification lesson called "Bird of the Month." The major time is given to the scheduled apeaker or program. The program normally finishes before 9 p.m., leaving a time for socializing over refreshments before our closing time of about 9:30 p.m.

# ISU DESERT CANYONS EXPEDITION SEMINAR

During the spring semester 1990, the Environmental Studies Program at ISU will offer a seminar. "The Desert Wilderness," meeting one evening per week and featuring literature, natural and human history, wilderness legislation, and safe, low-impact hiking techniques as they pertain to the American southwest desert in general and the Escalante Canyons of Utah specifically. The seminar will culminate in a 15-day expedition. May 20 through June 3, suitable for persons in moderately good physical condition regardless of age. Dr. Tom Tanner, seminar instructor, confirms that on most of his Escalante walks he encounters no other people and little evidence of human visitation. The group will take both day hikes and overnights, at a leisurely pace. "Base camp" will feature confortable lodging and good meals in a small, isolated town nearby. The fee of \$511 includes tuition for three semester credits (\$231) and all lodging and transportation. Food and equipment costs will be held low. Call Dr. Tanner at 294-7253.
