The best bird of the Ames count this year was Barney Cook's Gyrfalcon, a new sighting for the records. Overall, the totals were pretty good, somewhat above the average of between 47 and 48. That total of 51 was on somewhat shaky ground, given that 13 names on the list had just one sighting. It could easily have been a disaster.

The crow population is getting larger though the starlings were fewer than in some past counts. Among the birds-not-seen-but-should-have-been were the robin and turkey.

We thank the 35 participants who took to the fields and roads and also the 8 feeder watchers. Three of those single bird counts were at feeders.

BOONE

Bird numbers were down for this year's Boone County Christmas Bird Count, possibly due to habitat destruction cause by floods. Most of the Des Moines River floodplain was covered with icebergs and mud, and little else. You could walk 45 minutes without encountering a chickadee. Thus the 25 counters saw only 40 species of birds, our lowest count ever.

But the day had highlights: Ring-billed Gulls, House Finches, and a Common Redpoll visited our count circle for the first time ever. Also of interest were Canada Geese, a Short-eared Owl, two Sawwhet Owls, Red-headed Woodpeckers, and a shrike.

Counters coped with the low levels of bird activity in some interesting ways. For example, Barney Cook said he was day-dreaming about Snowy Owls as he walked his 12 miles. The Bahrenfus group decided to hold a concurrent Christmas Mammal Count, and you would too if you were seeing White-tailed Jack Rabbits and Red Foxes. Even worse, the Edwardses and Mark Dobbe lost their discipline and counted trees in the afternoon.

I promise that next year more birds will be around, unless it floods again. And regardless of the conditions, each year we can depend on some high-quality scenery in the Des Moines River valley. Join us on January 2, 1993, a Saturday.

SUPPORT IOWA'S NONGAME WILDLIFE GIVE GENEROUSLY


TO THE CHICKADEE CHECKOFF

It's tax time again, and time to show your support for Iowa's nongame wildlife which represents more than 80 % of the species in the state. This year marks the 10th anniversary of the Nongame Program.

Since 1982, when the Chickadee Checkoff first appeared on Iowa's state income tax form, the program has done research, management and education on a vast variety of wildlife. Types of efforts undertaken include: barn owl, river otter and peregrine falcon re- introductions, research on breeding birds & winter bird surveys, also on butterflies, bats and frogs. Land acquistion is also part of the Nongame Program and educational programs and publications have given Iowan's many opportunities to learn about our diverse wildlife resources.

However, Iowa's Nongame Program is grossly underfunded. It receives no general revenue or other money from the state. The program is funded solely from the checkoff. Iowa has the lowest nongame budget of six midwestern states. Over 90% of the people in Iowa enjoy non-game type recreation, yet only 2% of the people contribute to the checkoff. Clearly we must work for a better funding mechanism for our wildlife resources. We must also keep our current Nongame Program going strong.

Look for the "Chickadee Checkoff" on your state income tax form and give generously.


