## **November 19 DeSoto Trip Details**

Located two and one half hour's drive west of Ames on Hwy. 30 is the DeSoto Refuge. In mid-November it is known for large numbers of geese (Snow, Canada, Whitefronted, and sometimes a Ross'), other waterfowl, and eagles that spend the winter at the refuge. We plan to spend Saturday birding at DeSoto, seeing the Visitor's Center with it's steamboat Bertrand exhibit, and birding Lake Manawa and power plant ponds near Council Bluffs as time permits. We plan to meet at 6 AM at the Design Center parking lot and to arrive at the Visitor's Center at DeSoto Refuge at 9 AM. Plans are to return to Ames at dark. Please contact Sherry Dragula at 233-1532 or Joyce Bahrenfus at 432-3396 if you want to go on this trip. We want to know who will be attending, and who will be driving, since mid-November can bring bad travelling weather. (Also, for those of you who might want to drive out on Friday, we have information on places to stay (motels & camping). The refuge is open from 8 AM - 6 PM.)

#### **Christmas Bird Counts**

The 95th Annual National Audubon Society Christmas Bird Count will be held at over 1600 locations from mid-December to early January. You are invited to join with more than 43,000 birders in all 50 states, every Canadian province, parts of Central and South America, Bermuda and the West Indies.

You do not need experience to join in a count. Experienced leaders are placed in charge of an area and other birders will be assigned to them. Groups vary in size depending upon the area to be covered and how many wish to participate. A final tally

is scheduled at dark. Bird feeder counters are also needed on the same day as the field count.

Three Counts will be conducted in our area this year. The Ames Count will be held on Saturday, December 17. Contact David Edwards (292-3790) or Mike Meetz (382-2534) if you would like to participate. Field participants and feeder watchers (people who count the birds at their feeders on Count Day) are needed. At the end of the day we will meet at the home of David & Jeanne Edwards, 2308 State Ave. for a tally and chili supper.

The Saylorville Count will be Sunday, December 18. Contact Steve Dinsmore at 292-3152 if you want to participate. At dark the results will be tallied at Saylorville.

The Boone Count will be held on Sunday, January 1. Contact Mark Widrlechner at 233-1532 if you want to help. Feeder watchers and field participants are needed. At 5 PM the results will be tallied at the Golden Corral on S. Story St. in Boone where we will also eat supper.

The results of the Counts are published in *American Birds*. Field participants are charged a fee of \$5 to cover the costs of publishing the results- an important data base for studies of bird populations. There are no fees for feeder watchers.



## Last Chance to Order Wildlife Shrubs and Trees

Rebecca Shivvers has again agreed to make wildlife shrubs and trees available to the Big Bluestem Audubon Society. Eleven types of shrubs and trees are available. I sound we Rebecca would like to know how many of what types are desired by members. You can come to our meetings and fill out an order form or call Rebecca at 292-0691. The following trees are available: Green Ash (4-5 feet), Red Oak (3-4 feet), Red Splendor Crabapple (3-4 feet), Hackberry (3-4 feet). They cost \$5 each. The following shrubs are available: Nanking Cherry & Red Osier Dogwood (3-4 feet), Silky Dogwood and American Plum (2-3 feet), American Cranberry Bush, Serviceberry and Aromatic Sumac (18-24 Inches). The shrubs cost \$3 each. Orders will be taken through November. Some varieties will only be ordered if enough orders are placed for them. The trees and shrubs are bare root and will arrive in the spring. All proceeds will go to our Big Bluestem Chapter.
