UPDATE ON Resource Enhancement and Protection Program (REAP)

The Iowa House has passed a budget bill for FY 1992 which gave REAP \$20 million. THAT AMOUNT IS LIKELY TO BE LOWERED IN THE SENATE. It is very important to contact senators ASAP, even senators who support REAP. The address is: State Capitol, Des Moines 50319. Senate Phone: 515-281-3371. Suggestions from one supportive Senator: 1) Thank senators for supporting REAP unless they are new this year, 2) Ask for their support for the \$20 million for REAP in House File 479, 3) Discuss how REAP money is being used to benefit natural resources and the public in senator's own districts, 4) Thank them again.

CONGRESS THREATENS WETLANDS NATIONWIDE

Well organized attempts to seriously weaken existing federal wetlands protection are underway. The national Clean Water Act and Section 404 in particular are up for reauthorization this year. A series of hearings recently held in Washington D.C. produced a litany of complaints against wetlands protection legislation. The Hayes bill, HR 1330, has been introduced and it would: 1) redefine wetlands to eliminate seasonal, ephemeral and isolated wetlands not inundated for at least 21 consecutive days during the growing season and 2) designate the Corps of Engineers as the sole regulatory authority and eliminate EPA's ability to veto Corps permits to alter wetlands. (The Two Forks Dam was recently stopped due to this veto process.)

Letters or phone calls to members of the U.S. House & Senate are needed to counter attempts to weaken wetlands protection laws. The message is: Please do not cosponsor or vote for the Hayes bill, HR 1330, which would eliminate and reduce protection for millions of acres of wetlands.

We are presently losing wetlands at a rate of 300,000-400,000 acres a year with our current system.

STATE LANDS PROTECTION BILL

The Iowa House has passed a bill to allow the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to restrict the establishment of new large livestock confinement facilities and certain commercial facilities within one mile of state-managed public use areas, including parks. One reason for this bill was the large hog confinement facility proposed for an area next to Ledges State Park a few years ago.

THIS BILL FACES AN UPHILL BATTLE IN THE IOWA SENATE. If you want to help, contact your senator and encourage support for HF 616. Three points you might make; 1) Some counties may not want zoning, but state-managed lands within those counties should still be protected because they belong to all Iowans, 2)Iowa ranks 48th in the amount of public land per person, so our public lands need protection, 3) The bill would only allow the DNR to restrict new facilities of certain specific types, so the bill does NOT take the buffer zone land out of production as some have stated.

WATERFOWL FIELD TRIP REPORT

For once it was a great day to be out birding on a Saturday in March. The sun was strong enough to see colors at a distance and the wind was nearly absent. Eight BBAS members travelled from Ames and joined two more at Bay's Branch, about 3 miles northeast of Panora in Guthrie County. (A gremlin in the last newsletter had it in Greene County). Later we travelled a few miles due north to the Lakin Slough wildlife area. On the way back we went on backroads to the north, making it into Greene County and Grand Junction. The variety of wildfowl was good though the numbers were not spectacular. On the water there were Great Blue Heron, Snow and Canada Geese, American Coot, Ring-billed Gulls, and fourteen kinds of duck (Woody, Green-winged and Blue-winged Teal, Mallard, Northern Pintail and Shoveler, Gadwall, American Wigeon, Ring-neck, Lesser Scaup, Common Goldeneye, Bufflehead, Common Merganser, and Ruddy). Other sightings were the usual except one pair of Shrike that didn't stay in range long enough to scope the species, and some Brewer's Blackbirds that did. All told, we saw 46 species.
