SHORE BIRD FIELD TRIP REPORT

This was not a good year for seeing shore birds in the usual spots of central Iowa. There was essentially no standing water. The eleven field trip participants covered the waters of Big Creek State Park first, starting at the north end and moving south. Later, most went on to Hendrickson's Marsh, though the wind was rather strong by that time. It was a good day for variety. Though there were few shore birds, we sighted 55 species. Many different ducks and such were at Big Creek including Canada Goose, Blue-winged and Green-winged Teal, Mallard, Wood Duck, Lesser Scaup, Red-breasted Merganser, Ruddy Duck, Bufflehead, Ring-necked Duck, Northern Shoveler, Redhead, White Pelican, Cormorant, Coot, Pie-billed Grebe, White-winged Scoter, Common Loon, and Ring-billed, Hering, and Bonaparte's Gulls. Among shore birds were Pectoral and Baird's Sandpipers, Common Snipe, Kildeer, and Woodcock. Among the rest, an early Orange-crowned Warbler was interesting.

SECOND ANNUAL BIRDER'S BREAKFAST

Join us for a couple of hours of birding along the Ledges State Park canyon road and then a breakfast in the stone shelter in the lower park. Birding will begin at the lower stone shelter at 7 a.m. and proceed up the canyon road and back. A bring-your own breakfast will begin at about 9 a.m. Cooking materials will be provided and there will be some goodies to share. Call Andy Fix (296-7554) with questions. Remember to have your State Park vehicle sticker; they can be purchased at Drugtown, K-Mart, and the like, or during normal office hours at the park.

FIRST ANNUAL BBAS CANDE TRIP

A leisurely canoeing venture is planned for Sunday, June 11, to poke about the many areas of Big Wall Lake located about an hour north of Ames on highway 69. Big Wall Lake is really misnamed; its more of a marsh with sections of open water, if there continues to be adequate rain. Alternate possibilities include sections of the Des Moines river, again assuming reasonable water levels. The Des Moines river from Boone's Water Works Park to the Ledges is a very pleasant 4 hour trip with many birds and other interesting features. On a recent trip by five BBAS members an Osprey was seen catching and showing off a large fish, a pair of Great-horned Owls were roosting in a riverside tree, a Red-tailed Hawk nest was in production, and Spotted Sandpipers and Kingfisher were evenly spaced every few hundred yards along the 12 miles.

Mike Meetz and Dave Edwards will be in charge of planning and logistics. Contact either for more information. Canoes will be rented as needed; charges are expected to be about \$12 per canoe. Novices are encouraged; little more is required than the common sense all Audubon people have.

BIRD ATLAS PROJECT

A sampling of sections of Iowa are being intensively examined for evidence of nesting bird species. The Iowa DNR and the Iowa Ornithological Union are the principle participants, but they can use volunteer help. The Big Bluestem society will cover one designated block on Saturday, June 24. Mike Meetz will organize the event, beginning at the May membership meeting.
