BIRD COUNTS

The 94th Annual National Audubon Society Christmas Bird Count will be held at over 1600 locations from December 17 to January 3. You are invited to join with more than 43,000 birders in counting the birds in a defined area on one chosen day. (See cover for details of counts in our area.) Counts will be conducted in all 50 states, every Canadian province, parts of Central and South America, Bermuda and the West Indies.

You do not need experience to join in a count. Experienced leaders are placed in charge of an area and other birders will be assigned to them. Groups vary in size depending upon the area to be covered and how many wish to participate. A final tally is scheduled at dark. Bird feeder counters are also needed on the same day as the field count.

The results of the Counts are published in the National Audubon Society's <u>American Birds</u>. Field participants are charged a fee of \$5 to cover the costs of publishing the results- an important data base for studies of bird populations. There are no fees for feeder watchers.

AMERICAN KESTREL "ADOPT-A-BOX" PROGRAM
