

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SHORE BIRD FIELD TRIP REPORT

Fourteen people sighted fifty two species on the April 28 trip to eastern Story County. Most of the time was spent at Hendrickson's Marsh, and then quick stops were made at the dry Colo ponds, Larson's Marsh, and Kettlesen's Marsh. Among the more interesting birds seen were Pied-billed Grebe, Cormorant, Snow Goose, ten species of ducks, Song, Swamp, and Chipping Sparrows, Phoebe, Snipe, Woodcock, and Tree Swallow. But no shore birds.

EAST MARSHALL COUNTY FIELD TRIP REPORT

Eight people departed from Ames and met three people from Marshall County at the Grammer Grove Woods County Park about one mile south of Liscomb. The weather was not inviting with cold, 40 to 50 degree and strong and gusty winds. Among the more interesting birds of the forty-one sighted were Turkey, Great-blue Heron, Rufous-sided Towhee, Eastern Kingbird, and Orange-crowned, Nashville, and Yellow-rumped warblers.

ACID RAIN REPORT

Mike Meetz reports pH readings of 5.75 and 5.5 from a total of 2 inches of rain. A pH of 5.6 is considered normal.

Audubon To Come To Silver Screen

The National Audubon Society has announced that its first feature film, *The Ivory Hunters*, will be released some time in mid-1990. *The Ivory Hunters* is a benchmark in Audubon's continuing effort to touch millions of people with its environmental message.

The Ivory Hunters is an action film with a strong, fact-based environmental theme—the fate of the endangered African elephant. Executive Producer Christopher N. Palmer says the film, co-produced by Turner Network Television (TNT) and Harlech Television, is expected to cost about \$6 million and to feature a major motion picture star.

The Ivory Hunters will premiere on TNT and will be released in theaters abroad. A companion children's book, a major trade book, and other spin-offs from the film are planned.

Last summer members of BBAS and people enjoyed several canoe trips on nearby Iowa rivers. Though opportunities were limited by water flow, the canoeists enjoyed good times and some exceptionally good birding and nature appreciation along the Des Moines River and the Raccoon River. We have high hopes for better water flow this year. Most trips take a weekend day, floating about 12 miles with a stop for bag lunch along the way. Numbers of canoe have varied from two to nine. Rental canoes are available locally for about \$7 per person. No whitewater, no dunking, and no partying. MORTENSEN PRAIRIE BURN

On April 22, EARTH DAY, 1990, sixteen "prairie dogs" converged on the corner of Mortensen Road and Ashmore Lane. With pruners, axes, chain saws and litter bags (found on site), they braved the "harsh elements" (75 degrees with gusty winds) in order to reclaim a small part of Iowa's past.

Within an hour the weedy berm was cropped and ready for treatment, involving the latest in pyro techniques (a safety match). Gale-force winds sent flames so high that they attracted a passerby from Peoria, Illinois who had to stop and photograph the event. One of the prairie dogs really got her money's worth out of the experience when she discovered a flaming dollar bill. "I always knew this place still had some value in it," she exclaimed.

A big thanks goes to head prairie dog Tom Rosburg for supervising the burn and to Story County Conservation Officer Carol Williams for providing additional equipment. Before and after photos of the burn will be displayed at the May meeting. Drive by and watch the changes taking place, or better yet, get involved with this project.
