Tim Schantz grew up in Dubuque and graduated from Simpson College in 1987 with a degree in Environmental Science and Biology. He worked for the National Audubon Society in northern Wisconsin and in the Rio Grande valley of Texas. He also worked for the National Park Service in South Dakota and the U.S. Forest Service near Yosemite. Most recently he worked as a field biologist for Point Reyes Bird Observatory in northern California. At Palomarin Field Station in Bolinas, California he worked on one of the longest ongoing migration monitoring programs, censusing birds throughout the east tropical Pacific. His interest in birds has taken him throughout North America to Mexico and Panama, to the Galapagos, Farallon, and Hawaiian islands, to Tahiti and American Samoa.

BIRDING NOTES

In central Iowa, Yellow Rails have been reported at Snake Creek near Rippey, Iowa. The elusive Black-throated Blue Warbler visited the home of Pam & Reid Allen in W. Des Moines. Yellow-rumped and Orange-crowned Warblers are coming through in good numbers. At Saylorville Reservoir, Gene & Eloise Armstrong reported seventeen American Avocets, a Piping Plover and a Ruddy Turnstone at Sandpiper Beach. Also at Sandpiper were a Red Phalarope and three Peregrine Falcons. Thousands of Franklin's Gulls and about 50 White Pelicans are also at Saylorville.

AUDUBON TV ATTACKED AGAIN

Audubon is under attack for offering a television special that portrays a controversial subject -- the grazing of private cattle on public land. The new show, "The Range Wars" about the devastation of our public lands in the West by overgrazing, has displeased the National Cattlemen's Association. Even though the show portrays the ranchers' perspective as well as that of environmentalists, the cattle lobby and the National Inholder's Association have launched an all-out campaign to try to persuade GE to drop its underwriting of Audubon television. They are seeking boycotts of GE products and deluging the company with mail.

MCFARLAND PARK FIELD TRIP REPORT

For our first field trip of 1991-1992 on September 21there were clear skies but a cold breeze from the southeast. The cold temperatures had some of the eight hardy birders talking about Christmas bird counts. We were surprised to find only 23 species of birds, and that included an LBJ [little-brown-job] and a sleeping DOMESTIC goose floating on the lake. Along the trails much of the plant life was beginning to take on some color and was showing the effects of cooler weather and the drought. Puffballs and other fungi were along the trails. Mast (acorns, hickory nuts and walnuts), kept the Fox Squirrels busy and in full view. Deer were also seen down the trail from the dam.

Highlight birds included a Sharp-shinned Hawk and an American Kestrel. Others were the usual chickadees, nuthatches, and woodpeckers. Some flocks of robins, Blue Jays, and Cedar Waxwings kept us company along the trail.

After the walk we examined the new nature and conservation education building at the park. Mike saw a flock of Eastern Bluebirds later near Dayton Road.



BROOKSIDE PARK FIELD TRIP REPORT

On September 28 a group of eleven was treated to great fall weather and 38 species of birds. Highlights included five species of woodpeckers, both kinglets, bluebirds, Green-backed and Great Blue Heron, Brown Creeper, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Nashville, Tennessee, and Yellow-rumped Warblers, White-throated Sparrows, and the Dark-eyed Junco.

IOWA AUDUBON COUNCIL

The I.A.C. met in Sioux City on September 14. Sixteen people representing seven Audubon Chapters in the state were in attendance. Cindy Hildebrand, our Legislative Coordinator, gave a report. She will testify for the Council in favor of the Waterman Creek Prairie Project on October. 3. She will also write letters on behalf of the Council on the Non-game program position that is currently frozen and on the vacant position on the Iowa Environmental Protection Commission. The Council was briefed on the LeClaire Hydropower Project which would entail heavy fish losses if built as proposed. Conservation groups locally are pushing for a full Environmental Impact Statement. The next meeting of the I.A.C. will be in Cedar Rapids on November 9th. In early December, John Borneman of the Western Regional Office of National Audubon, will visit Iowa and present workshops on strengthening Audubon Chapters. He will conduct a workshop in Des Moines for our Chapter, the Tallgrass Prairie Chapter, and the Rolling Hills Chapter. More details to follow.

THE IOWA PRAIRIE NETWORK

A new organization has formed in Iowa calling itself the Iowa Prairie Network. It is a "grassroots" organization with local groups of prairie enthusiasts. The organization actively supports the Resource Enhancement and Protection Act which provides money for local prairie projects, the Waterman Creek project in O'Brien County which is a 4000 acre prairie restoration, and the Walnut Creek National Wildlife Refuge being planned in Jasper county. Seed collection for the Refuge is a Prairie Network project. Locally the Central Iowa Prairie Network has worked on maintaining and preserving central Iowa prairies. They have also worked on the Waterman Creek project and on seed collecting for the Walnut Creek Refuge. They recently sponsored two field trips to local prairies. CONSERVATION CORNER

The nation's wetlands are currently threatened by a George Herbert Walker Bush administration proposal to "redefine" what constitutes a wetland. The Wetlands Delineation Manual is a guide to identify and determine boundaries of wetlands. It is used by agencies such as the Environmental Protection Agency, and the Corps of Engineers. The following changes are being proposed for the Wetlands Manual:

*Requiring an area to be wet or saturated for 21 days - 3 times longer than the present definition. This will make it more difficult to protect seasonal wetlands or wet areas suffering from drought.

*Changing the definitions of "growing season" to meet an agricultural, rather than biological definition. Some wetland plants can begin growing from 4-6 weeks before the agricultural growing season and thus would not qualify an area as a wetland.

*Requiring saturation "at the surface" to be a wetland. Currently if an area is wet "at or near the surface" it qualifies as a wetland because many wetland plants need saturation only in the root zone.

Letters are needed to the E.P.A. by October 15, asking that the Wetlands Delineation Manual not be changed. The changes outlined above make wetlands more likely to be developed rather than protected. If the proposed changes to the Manual are implemented, from 10 to 30 % of current wetlands would be excluded from protection under the Clean Water Act, the only federal law which regulates wetlands.
