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1988-1989 CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

AMES, December 17, 1988 Compiler - Steve Dinsmore

Ten feeder watchers and 36 field observers helped to register 51 species, the second highest count recorded for Ames. The most unusual sightings were the five new species to the Ames count: American Black Duck, Northern Pintail, Gadwall, American Wigeon, and Wild Turkey. Other unusual birds seen were a Carolina Wren and five Easter bluebirds.

SAYLORVILLE, December 18, 1988 Compiler - Steve Dinsmore

The Saylorvill count was new this year and co-sponsored by members of the Des Moines Audubon Society. An amazing 82 species were tallied, one of the highest counts ever for Iowa, aided by good participation and weather. Some of the more unusual sightings included the Great Blue Heron, Greater Scaup, Red-shouldered Hawk, Merlin, Sandhill Crane, Carolina Wren, 26 Eastern Bluebirds, Rufous-sided Towhee, and 45 Snow Buntings.

BOONE, January 2, 1989, Compiler - Mark Widrlechner

Among the good sightings on the Boone count were the 154 Wild Turkey, Winter Wren, Caroline Wren (did the same bird make each count?), Rufous-sided Towhee, and Evening Grosbeak. The species count was 53.

NATURE BOOK OF THE MONTH

The complete birder: A guide to better birding, by Jack Connor and published in 1988 by Houghton Mifflin (\$18.95), has a rather impressive title for a slim book, but the content is among the most practical and useful of guides I have seen. The mission of the book is to guide, not intimidate, and the author assumes that the best birding skills will be acquired slowly, building upon good foundations. The chapters are divided into good advice on equipment, descriptions of migrations, winter and summer birding, and five excellent chapters identifying the families giving the most trouble: warblers, hawks, shorebirds, terns, and gulls. Its not easy to briefly describe the quality of his advice but in one respect he goes one step further that Peterson's famous system of key marks by placing groups of birds in patterns of similarities. In the warbler section he urges that just a few key warblers be learned extremely well before using those to branch into the others. Several good tables and charts illustrate the system. An added bonus is Connor's wit. His description of watching warblers, for example, is "Hey!. What? Uh...Damn!." And on buying scopes: "If you enjoy poking sleeping dogs with sharp sticks, ask the zoom owner to show you something in his scope that you can't see in the fixedfocus."
