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

WHAT IS THE BIG BLUESTEM AUDUBON SOCIETY?

The Big Bluestem Audubon Society is the latest form of a group of long standing. It began as an Ames birding group many decades ago changing its name at least once. In 1983 the group applied for and received formal chapter status with the National Audubon Society. The chapter is incorporated and has the requisite formal documents and obligations. One tie with the national group is a mutually beneficial one. Members of the N.A.S. in a defined area are automatically members of the local chapter. The N.A.S. returns a part (\$5.50) of those members fees. These funds are for our use in the aid of Audubon causes as defined in our documents. We supply a local effort in conservation causes including education, service projects. membership recruitment. The N.A.S. gives \$15.50 in the first year for new members the chapter recruits, so it is very important that those you encourage to join use our application materials or place the chapter's designator code H57 on them.

The chapter holds monthly meetings from September through May. Field trips are planned to meet the interests of the members and to be attractive to potential members. All meetings and field trips are open to the public, and there are no fees charged for any event.

What do we do at meetings? Each meeting typically begins with a short period of announcements and reports regarding different activities of the chapter. This is followed by a period in which members are encouraged to report interesting natural sightings and experiences -- the primary focus is usually on birding. One of the experienced members sometimes presents a short identification lesson called "Bird of the Month." The major time is given to the scheduled speaker or program. That presentation usually finishes before 9 p.m., leaving a time for socializing over refreshments before our closing time of about 9:30 p.m.


BIRDING NOTES

Migration is underway for warblers, vireos, and may others. Maridel Jackson reported seeing twenty-one species of warblers from one position at the Ledges State Park on Labor day. No significant waterfowl groups have appeared yet on the big waters except the White Pelicans on Saylorville reservoir and some Canada Geese at Hickory Grove Park. Night Hawks have been grouping, and of course the grackle and blackbird hordes have been wheeling over the farm landscapes. By now the crows will have given up their solitary ways to congregate each night on campus to the 'delight' of passersby. No hawks to speak of have been seen moving through as yet. Drought will make for difficult shorebird sighting this year.

WILDFLOWER WATCH

Here are some wildflowers to watch for in September and October. In shady woodland areas are White Snakeroot and Woodland Sunflowers. Also on the underside of Solomon's Seal are large, heavy, navy-blue berries, and at the tips of False Solomon Seal fronds are smaller, bright-red berries. In sunny, prairie areas are goldenrods, sunflowers, Little White Asters, Purple New England Asters, and Evening Primroses.

More wildflower information will appear in the April and May newsletters.



WATERMAN CREEK PRAIRIE DEDICATION

Letters are needed to support the proposed Waterman Creek Prairie project. The Iowa Natural Resources Commission will decide whether to approve the project on October 3rd. The project would involve about 4,700 acres in northwest Iowa, bought from willing sellers over fifteen to twenty years. Both prairies and savannas, including some endangered and threatened species, would be protected and restored. The project would be large enough to give the prairies badly-needed buffer zones and connecting corridors.

Some Iowans who would like to stop or severely reduce the Waterman Creek project have hired one of Governor Branstad's former top aides to help them. This project is becoming a test case for some Iowans who would like to see an end to ALL further public land acquisition in Iowa. What happens to the Waterman Creek proposal could affect other land acquisition projects for years to come. CONSERVATION CORNER ARMCHAIR ACTIVISM

Our Chapter would like to be part of a new Audubon program based on two simple but effective methods of citizen action-letters and phone calls to government officials. The Armchair Activist program began in a Chicago area Chapter and has spread to Chapters nationwide. At least 5 Chapters in Iowa are starting up the program this fall. The program has two components: The Letter of the Month Club & the Telephone Rapid Response Team.

The Letter of the Month Club requires about one hour per month. The only expense is for postage and stationery. The participants write one letter per month to elected officials on a state, local or federal issue. A summary of the topic is sent to volunteers, along with an explanation of current legislation and a sample letter.

The Telephone Rapid Response Team requires only an occasional phone call. As a member of the team, you stand ready to call government officials on short notice. Calls maybe be local, to Des Moines or to Washington D.C. Participants also agree to call up to two other Audubon volunteers to solicit their involvement.
