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<u>Conservation Committee Discusses Issues</u> -- The Bluestem society's Conservation Committee met Sept. 25 to discuss local and state conservation issues. Cindy Hildebrand submitted a list of some 12 bills that may be considered at the state level in the Iowa legislature this session. Committee members decided to recommend the following four items as priority issues to the Iowa Audubon Council at its meeting Oct. 27.

- Drainage district exemption bill -- could lead to uncontrolled channelization of streams in Iowa. (A legislative committee meeting on this bill will be Oct. 9 at 9 a.m. in room 22 of the state capitol building. Call Cindy if you need a ride.)
- Steel shot bill -- the statewide rule mandating steel shot in 1985 could be weakened by a bill.
- Park user fee bill -- would require a \$10 annual or \$2 daily permit per vehicle visiting a state park. Money would be used to improve state parks.
- Leaking underground storage tanks bill -- would require monitoring wells to be placed near new underground petroleum storage tanks.

If anyone would like further information on these bills or the complete list of probable Iowa environmental bills, contact Sherry Dragula.

Also discussed at the conservation committee meeting was the proposed Ames Reservoir. Committee members agreed to write for a copy of Rep. Neal Smith's recently-passed appropriation bill and specifics of the study that the appropriation will fund. Any Ames residents active in opposing the reservoir in the early 1970's will be invited to attend and speak up at the next conservation committee meeting.

<u>Name Change Vote</u> -- Bluestem members will be asked at the October 9 meeting to formally approve amending legal documents filed with the Secretary of State to reflect our name change from Ames Audubon Society to Big Bluestem Audubon Society. The change must be approved in this way to satisfy IRS requirements before the chapter can be considered for taxexempt status.
