Beginning Birding Course

A beginning birding class will start on February 8th at 7 PM, at the Story Coun ty Conservation Center at McFarland Park. Topics to be covered include: basic identification tips, optical equipment, bird lists, guides, publications and winter feeding tips. second class will be held February 22 at 7 PM at the Conservation Center. Topics for this session include: birding by habitat, basic shorebird identification, common woodland species, Audubon and other organizations and BBAS field trips. The third and final class, March 8, will deal with: bird vocalizations, grassland species, waterfowl basics, raptors and the Nongame program. All sessions will end at 9 PM. It's Chickadee Checkoff Time

Want to invest in Iowa's future? Then contribute to the Chickadee Checkoff (Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund) on your state income tax form. Your donation will be used to help 80 percent of the state's wildlife ranging from frogs and turtles to bats, river otters, bald eagles and songbirds. Your money will also be used to directly educate over 25,000 Iowans about our natural resources and help expose thousands more to topics like bird feeding, landscaping for wildlife and the life history of various animals.

The checkoff funds the Nongame Program which last year conducted surveys on frogs and toads, birds at feeders, wintering bald eagles, migrating shorebirds, heron rookeries, bat houses and bluebird houses. All in all, the program was involved in more than 40 projects, helping over 250 of Iowa's 400+nongame species. The Chickadee Checkoff is the only source of funding for this program. REAP Update

Iowa's Resource Enhancement And Protection (REAP) program is a leader in natural resources funding throughout the country. Unfortunately, funding for REAP has never reached its intended amount of \$30 million per year. Last year, some \$8.5 million was allocated for REAP in Iowa. Despite setbacks in funding levels, REAP projects have been successful and well received. For example, in Story County REAP funds have been used for Moore Park in Ames, for the Heart of Iowa Trail, to repair the Hickory Grove Lake spillway, to help construct the Conservation Center at McFarland Park and to purchase the Hickory Grove Schoolhouse.

To encourage public input into the REAP program, a regional assembly will be held on Saturday, February 5, at 1 PM at the Izaak Walton League Clubhouse, 4343 Valley Dr. (off Fleur Dr.) in Des Moines. For carpool information contact the Story Co. Conservation Board at 232-2516. If you can't be at this assembly, then consider writing a note of support for the REAP program to your state legislator.
