My dear Prof. Pammel,
& am in Rec. of your esteemed favor containing
determinations, for which accept thanks.
& beg leave to say that some of the specimens
sent you are very peculiar indeed, some of these
form no spore at all but mere yellow patches
much like the Peronos. Sometimes by holding the
specimens between yourself & strong light the spores
may be seen (ie spores & conidia) Again & found great
difficulty in locating them from dried specimens

until I pack the specimens in a moist
chamber for an hour or two to soften,
otherwise the spores seemed to all break to pieces
beyond recognition. In the examination
of all the Rhiz. cur. of which 22 is one you
will I think have no trouble if you moisten
a little for about 1 hour and scrape the upper
surface of the spores, ^{do not cut out} for each you can see
it by holding between your eye & the light
if it has not been rubbed off in
transportation. I send you the Abstract of
my paper yesterday. I have told Mr. Bain, ^{that} you
have it - Pardon me for the sup. & make to you. So many
