Your letter of March 1, 1955, addressed to Dr. F. L. R. Roberts of this city, was turned over to me today, with the request that I should answer it. In connection with my work of revising the Firds of Tows, I have attempted to secure as complete a record of the spread of the Starling in Towa as is possible. During the fall I sent a similar report to N. C. Hoffman of Lakewood, Ohio. Mr. Hoffman, at one time, had requested reports of Starlings, with the view in mind, I believe, of issuing a report, but I don't think those plans materialized.

The first record of the Starling in lows was of the single specimen caught and shown to V. S. Long, at Lamoni, Decauter Co.. in December, 1922. This was recorded in the Auk (I haven't the reference at hand) and was cited by Miss Cooke in her report of the Starling.

Possible carlier records were mentioned in The Birds of Floyd County, Towa (American Midland Maturalist, Isaues of 1923-24. p. 45). by Dr. Carroll Lane Penton. In the Mypothetical List he says: "Mr. Brown and I have at various times seen birds which we felt certain of as Starlings, but secured no specimens. The most reliable of my dates are: April 25, 1914; July 24, 1914; May 3, 1915. Mr. Gabrielson considers these records as postive errors. Dr. Bailey accepted them as hypothetical, and Miss Sherman accepts them. In a letter to me she expressed the opinion that the species has been introduced into the Mississippi Valley from the east. The mentioned a record for Rockferd, Illinois, by Mr. Paul B. Mis." I am not using these records in my forth-coming list.

The first breeding record appears to be that of Prof. W. F. Kubichek at Gedar Hapids. Linn County, in the Spring of 1931. The most westerly breeding record that I know of is that of a pair seven miles south of Ogden, Boone County, June 15, 1932. The birds were seen by Walter Resene and the writer and I collected the famale. Reports of breeding have come from the following counties: Clatton, Linn, Johnson, Washington, Keekuk, and Boone, Muno. Undoubtedly the Starling is breeding in some numbers in all of the three or fout tiers of counties along the Mississippi River, and only a lack of observers has been the result of so few repoits of breeding.

The most westerly record of occurence in the state is of a flock of 8 seen at Onawa, Monona County, March 24, 1932 by W. C. Thistje. In the Iowa Bird Life, Vol. 2, 1932, p. 41, under the title of "Field Characters of the Starling", I summarized the status of this bird in Iowa at the present time as, "A locally numerous breeding bird in the eastern half (as far west as Ogden) of the state and an irregular but not uncommon winter resident." Even this statement of last fall must be modified or amplified now as the Starling was very common in several parts of the eastern half of the state the past winter.

In the same issue is an article by Chas. J. Spiker on "The Increase of the Starling in Norteast Iowa." Spiker records about thirty observations made by himself and others from March, 1929 to the Summer of 1932.

Reports of Starlings have come to me from the following Towa counties: Clayton, Fayette, Chickess, Bremer, Blackhawk, Buchanan, Delaware, Dubuque, Linn, Benton, Tama, Story, Boone, Monona, Polk, Poweshick, Towa, Johnson, Cedar, Scott, Muscatine, Washington, Lee, Van Buren, Jefferson, Keekuk, Marion, Decauter, and Union, and Jackson, Mayl, Jones, Clevion, Louisa, Maory, Ma, Meharda, Jeelas.

In answer to a questionnaire sent out recently wer the following opinions as to the staus of the Starling. Frank E. Ellis- "becoming to numerous". Maquoketa, Jackson Co. Charles J. Spiker- "scensional." New Hampton, Chickasaw Co. Geo. O Hendrickson-"rare. I saw a flock of 10-12, Nov. 28, 1931.

in Washington, County, Lowa. Have seen none at Ames." Ames, Story Co.

E. D. Nausan- "rare as yst-but nesting." Sigourney, Reokuk Co. Walter Rosene- "becoming common." Ogden, Boone Co. Oscar P. Allert- "now tolerably common." McGregor, Clayton Co.

There are Towa taken specimens in the following collections: Allert, McGregor; Coe College, Cedar Rapids (several); University of Towa, Towa City (six); State Historical Museum, Des Moines; Fullock collection, Des Moines.

In nearly all instances in lows the birds have been found about the barns, dead trees, or feeding in the fields. The reports of these birds in the town proper is very unusal, and seems, only at times of unfavorable weather. Competition for nesting areas is usally with the House sparrow or domestic pigeon. Undoubtedly some woodpeckers and bluebirds are dislodged from dead tree-tops.

I an appending a record of occurences as complete as I know of them. Of course there are many observations that go unreported as the birds are common enough new as to attract but little attention.
