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In the new A.O.U. Check-List, 4th Edition, the records of several rare or accidental species, formerly reported or recently found to occur in Iowa, are omitted in the delineation of ranges for these species.

During the year 1932, while securing information for a Revised Birds of Iowa, practically all of the collections containing Iowa birds were examined. The following rare or accidental specimens were found to be definite Iowa records. Some of these were recognized in the Check-List, but it seems advisable to publish the entire findings. While this may not be a complete summation of all such specimens a detailed record will be contained in the forthcoming Iowa list. ~~All excepting the Pacific Loon were examined by the writer.~~
