Dear Dr. Stephens:

Since I have not received word from you in answer to the inquiry I made concerning Youngworth, I am writing you again.

I asked Dr. Drake about the possibilities of hiring a man on fellowship basis for routine stomach examination work and the like. He seemed to agree that such a man would be very useful.

Not knowing anything of Youngworth, however, he suggested that I request you to send him a transcript of Youngworth's grades at Morningside and also your personal opinion concerning his qualifications, both as a student and for the sort of work we would have him do. Assuming that you think Youngworth would be interested in a proposition, would you mind sending this information to Dr. Carl J. Drake of the Iowa State College, Zoology Department?

I don't know yet when I shall be in Sioux City again; possibly toward the middle of the month, if negotiations progress favorably with and concerning Youngworth. In case things work out all right here, I suppose that I had better drop in on Youngworth personally and perhaps take him to Ames for interview with Dr. Drake and others.

Of course you understand that my correspondence with you is not intended to commit me one way or the other relative to Youngworth's possible appointment.
