Memo for Noble Clark:

Mr. Longnecker recommends (1) Rosa sitegera (prairie rose), (2) Rosa rubiginosa (sweetbriar).

I happened to meet a man from the White Elm Nurseries in his office who quoted 25 plants of each of these varieties, total 50 plants at 30¢ each, total \$15. In order to save time, and with Mr. Longnecker's advice, I placed the order with the understanding that the nurseries will await receipt of the requisition before billing, but will ship immediately. I guaranteed the bill in the event of any hitch. The stock is to be consigned to the College of Agriculture, % Mr. Longnecker, who will store it subject to call by Errington.

Mr. Longnecker estimates one day instead of two for putting them in, and offers one of his trained men to do the job on his own time. Accordingly all that Errington will have to do is show him over the ground and give general directions.

I hope I have not exceeded your authorization in concluding this matter.
