Dear Elton:

I have now had the opportunity to read carefully the last two issues of the Journal and also the progress report of December 15.

It is putting the matter very conservative when I express the opinion that the last two issues of the Journal contain more meat than any similar volume of periodical literature (or books for that matter) which I have so far read. I was particularly impressed by the probable future value of Nicholson's mathematics and Jackson's methods for getting the density of Tsetse flies. I also heartily welcome your policy of getting contributions from Russia. I do not think we will ever unravel the cycle until a large volume of information is forthcoming from Russia and Asia.

Some of Nicholson's trends of thought on predation are strikingly parallel with those of Errington who has a paper in press which he will doubtless send you. Errington can hardly afford to get along without the Journal and I am sending him a copy of this letter to suggest that if his institution does not take it, that he try and arrange a subscription.

I recently had the pleasure of spending an evening with Bob Greene. He has made some interesting modifications in his size-up of Tularemia which will doubtless appear in his paper at the Game Conference.
