

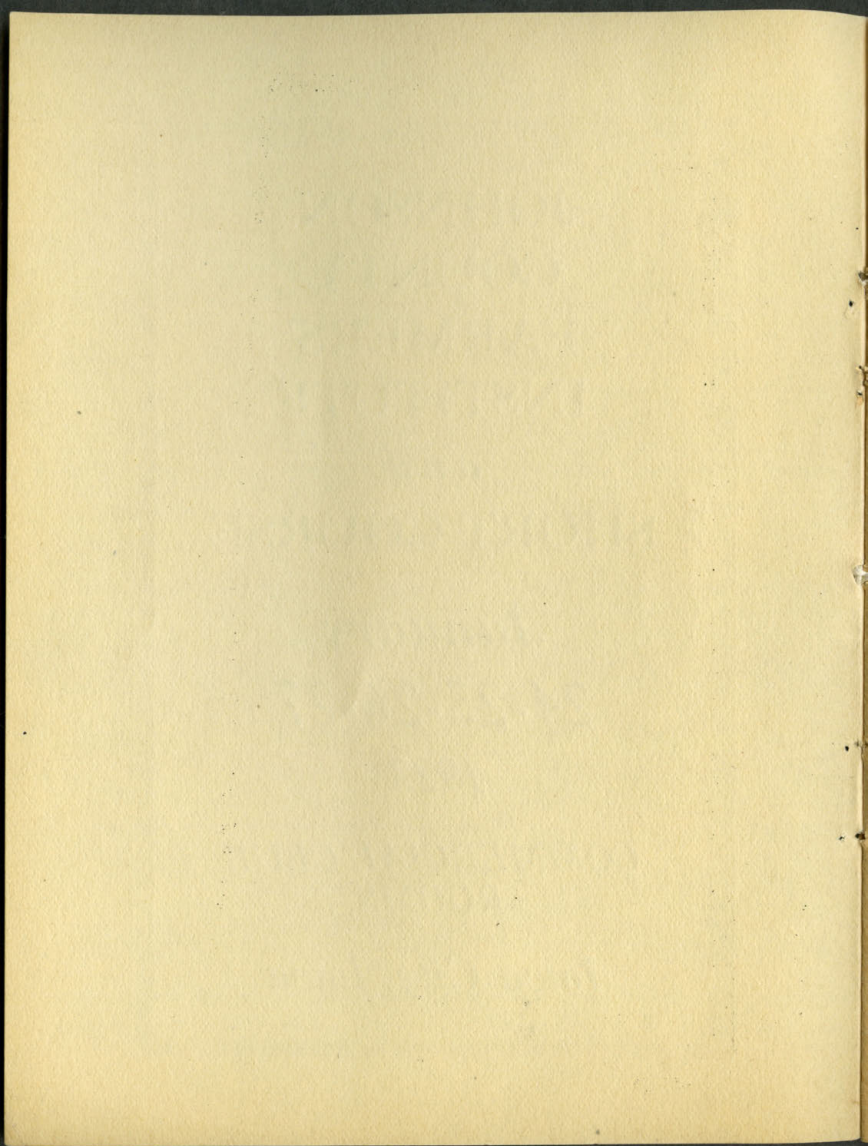

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### FOREWORD

In the regular order of events and achievements there are many things that contribute to the general success. Nothing is done without an effort—things don't just happen!

In the advancement of Agriculture it has been found that the problems grow more complex with each succeeding generation. Boys and girls of the farm are being attracted to the city. This cityward movement has changed the ratio between farm and city population until to-day America has more city dwellers than farm people. Along with this problem has been the problem of soil fertility. There has been a tendency to sell the fertility from the farm and not to replace it. The solution of both of the above problems have resolved themselves into the problem of more profits for the farmer.

The farmer of to-day is interested in two main problems. The first is to get a larger percentage of the ultimate proceeds for which his products sell. The attempt to accomplish this is by a better, cheaper, and more efficient system of marketing.

The second main problem is to produce, not more but more efficiently. In his efforts to accomplish this latter achievement he is confronted with the problem of better breeding in plant and animal life and more economical uses of the products that he must consume.

The Johnson County Farmers' Institute and Short Course is one of the things in the regular order of events that is contributing to the solution of these two main problems. It is an effort.

While the results of better breeding and more economical uses of products that are consumed are being



rewarded in the show room, the problems of marketing and the general methods that should be followed to secure the best results are being discussed in the forum.

It is with the above thoughts in mind that the Program Committee presents to you this booklet and urges you to help make greater achievements possible by showing your good products, constructive thoughts and good will at this 1923 session.

### NARRATIVE

For the nineteenth time in as many years the Johnson County Farmers' Institute and Short Course will open its doors for entries on Wednesday, January 24th, 1923, at 9 o'clock a. m.

From a small beginning almost a generation ago through years of prosperity and years of adversity this organization has endeavored to keep before the people of this county a high standard of improvement.

While perhaps the quality of the exhibits this year may not excel in quality those of a year ago to a great extent, yet, if the products of to-day could be measured in quality with those exhibited during the early days of this organization the contrast would be quite marked. It would show a steady forward march.

This friendly competition that is made possible by this organization has spurred on the exponents of better quality products. In this striving to outdo our neighbors we have kept before us the need of constant endeavor for better products on the farm.

During the recent period of war prices many of us were content with producing any quality; as the margin of profit seemed large. Today, since the wave of

high prices has receded and we are temporarily in the trough and not on the crest of the wave, it behooves us to produce articles from the farm and home that have a lower cost of production.

In striving for more efficient production we have only ourselves and the usual hazards to overcome. In more efficient marketing we have a greater battle. The old motto, "God Helps Those Who Help Themselves" is nowhere more true than with us who seek to improve the products from the fields, garden and household.

The Premium List this year contains over \$1,000.00 (One Thousand Dollars) in premiums. New Departments have been added and entries are opened to every resident of Johnson County.

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### JUDGING PROGRAM

Judging will start promptly at nine o'clock Thursday morning. Don Fish will handle the corn exhibits and Mr. M. A. Houser will judge the small grain. Mr. Brunner will judge the dairy exhibits, apples and honey.

In the Women's Department, Miss Alma Heiner will make the awards.

In the clothing Department, Miss Alma Heiner; and Miss Knowles in the Food Products.



**PROGRAM****Wednesday, January 24th**

The Institute will open Wednesday morning at 9 a. m., January 24th. All entries must be made on this day and before noon if possible. There is no entry fee, but every one exhibiting must become a member of the Association. The membership fee is One Dollar (\$1.00).

In the Women's Department there likewise is no entry fee, but one member of the family must be a member of the Association.

The afternoon program will start at 1:30. There will be music and readings. These will be followed at 2 p. m. by a lecture on "Child Welfare," by Dr. Amy Daniels of the State University of Iowa. Every mother will want to hear this lecture.

**Thursday, January 25th—Women's Day**

The doors will be open at 9 a. m. and a picture show will start at 10:30 a. m. The pictures will be humorous, educational and entertaining. At 1:30 p. m. there will be a program of entertainment and then a lecture by Miss Knowles of the Extension Department at Ames at 2 o'clock.

At 3 o'clock there will be a lecture on Dairy Products by Mr. Brunner of the Dairy Department at the Iowa State College.

**Friday, January 26th—Economic Day**

At ten o'clock Friday morning there will be a picture show on some subject appropriate to the occasion.

At eleven o'clock will be held the regular annual election of officers of the Johnson County Institute and Short Course Association.

At 1:30, following a program of music, there will be a lecture by Attorney Mitchell of Des Moines on "Rural Credits." Mr. Mitchell is attorney for the Iowa Farm Credit Corporation and the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation, and is well qualified to handle this subject.

At 7:30 Friday evening there will be a very good preliminary program to the lecture by Hon. E. T. Meredith of Des Moines. Mr. Meredith has agreed to speak on the Institute program this year and every one interested in better agriculture should hear the former Secretary of Agriculture discuss some of the problems that are awaiting a solution.

#### **Saturday, January 27th—Children's Day**

The Saturday morning session will be turned over to the sale of the first prize products. During the noon hour there will be several reels of comic pictures for the rural people who care to bring their lunch.

At 1:30, following opening musical program, the Grand Old Man (Hon. Frank I. Mann of Illinois), famed as an agriculturist, is to address the final session. If you have ever heard Mr. Mann you will want to hear him again, and if you haven't heard him you will have a double treat. He is a real student of soils and knows how to tell about what he has learned.

## DEPARTMENT

### Junior Department

In this Institute and Short Course special attractions are added to make it well worth while for the boys and girls to exhibit. Special attention is to be given to this department. Every boy and girl that attends will be given a badge to show their teacher that they attended the Institute and it is hoped that every teacher in the County will recommend their students to be present on Wednesday. Get your Boys and Girls to make entries at the Institute. We must realize that they soon will be stepping forward to fill the gap in the rank that we leave. Help them prepare for the coming fight.

A Junior is defined as one under eighteen years of age who has not won a first or second premium in any Professional class. Winnings that may have been made in previous Junior Classes do not bar from again showing in the Junior Class.

The same judges will officiate in this class as in the Professional and Amateur Classes.

### Amateur Department

Anyone may compete in the Amateur Class who has not previously won a first or second premium in the Amateur or Professional Class.

### Professional Class

The Professional Class is open to all who care to make entry.

There are no entry fees for entering exhibits, but each exhibitor, except in the Junior Department, must become a member of the Association.

**RULES FOR FARM PRODUCTS DEPARTMENT**

- 1 This exhibit is open to all residents of Johnson County, except as otherwise specifically stated.
- 2 No entry fees are to be charged but every exhibitor except in the Junior Department will be required to pay a one dollar membership in the association.
- 3 Entries must be made and the exhibits in the hands of the superintendent on Wednesday, January 18, by 4 p. m.
- 4 All entries in the professional and amateur divisions must have been raised by the exhibitor during 1921.
- 5 All entries in the Junior Division must have been selected by the exhibitor without any assistance whatsoever from the crop raised during 1922 on the farm or in the garden belonging to the family.
- 6 No person can make more than one entry in any class, but may enter in as many classes as are open to him. Not more than one person from a family can make an entry in any class with the exception of the Junior Department, where as many entrants will be permitted as are otherwise eligible.
- 7 All entries must remain in place until noon of the last day, Saturday, January 27, after which they may be removed. Failure to comply with this rule will cancel all premiums won by the exhibitors.
- 8 The winners of any sweepstakes prize forfeits the right to the first premium in a class in which he won, except in the Junior Department.
- 9 Division II is open to Amateurs and Juniors. An Amateur is defined as one who has never won a premium on corn above third place at any corn



show where there were more than two entries in the class concerned. Previous Junior winnings accepted.

- 10 Division III is open only to Juniors. A Junior is defined as one under eighteen years of age who is not already a professional. Winnings in the Junior Department of previous years not to act as a bar in this division.
- 11 Amateurs may compete in the professional division and Juniors may compete in both Amateur and Professional Divisions.
- 12 Corn Exhibit Samples will be limited to 1, 10, 30, 60 ears.
- 13 Clipped oats will be barred.
- 14 Winners of Premiums must prevent vouchers and claim premiums before the 1st of March, or the right to claim will be considered as waived.
- 15 All entries remain the property of the exhibitor except the Grand Champion and Sweepstakes in corn and first premium winners in all divisions. These exhibits will be sold at auction Saturday, January 27th, at 9 a. m. The proceeds of the sale to go to the Association. The ribbons belong to the Exhibitor.
- 16 In order that the Association might be able to clean up the rooms and turn them back to the Commercial Club for other uses that evening all entries must be taken charge of and removed by the owner not later than 5 p. m. on Saturday, January 27th, or they will be considered as donated to the Association and be disposed of as it may see fit.
- 17 The President, Secretary, and Superintendent shall

have final work in deciding any dispute that may arise.

- 18 Every effort will be made to take proper care of the exhibits, but the Association will not be responsible should loss or injury occur.

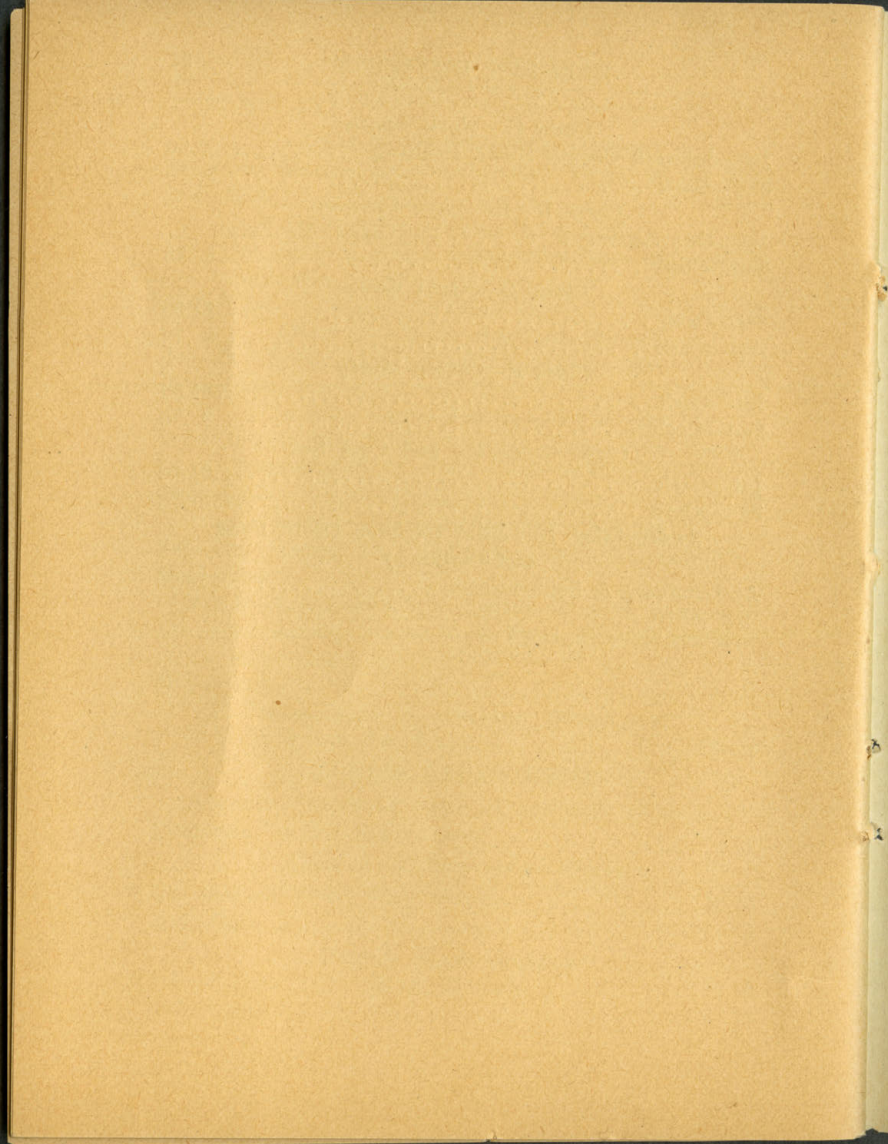

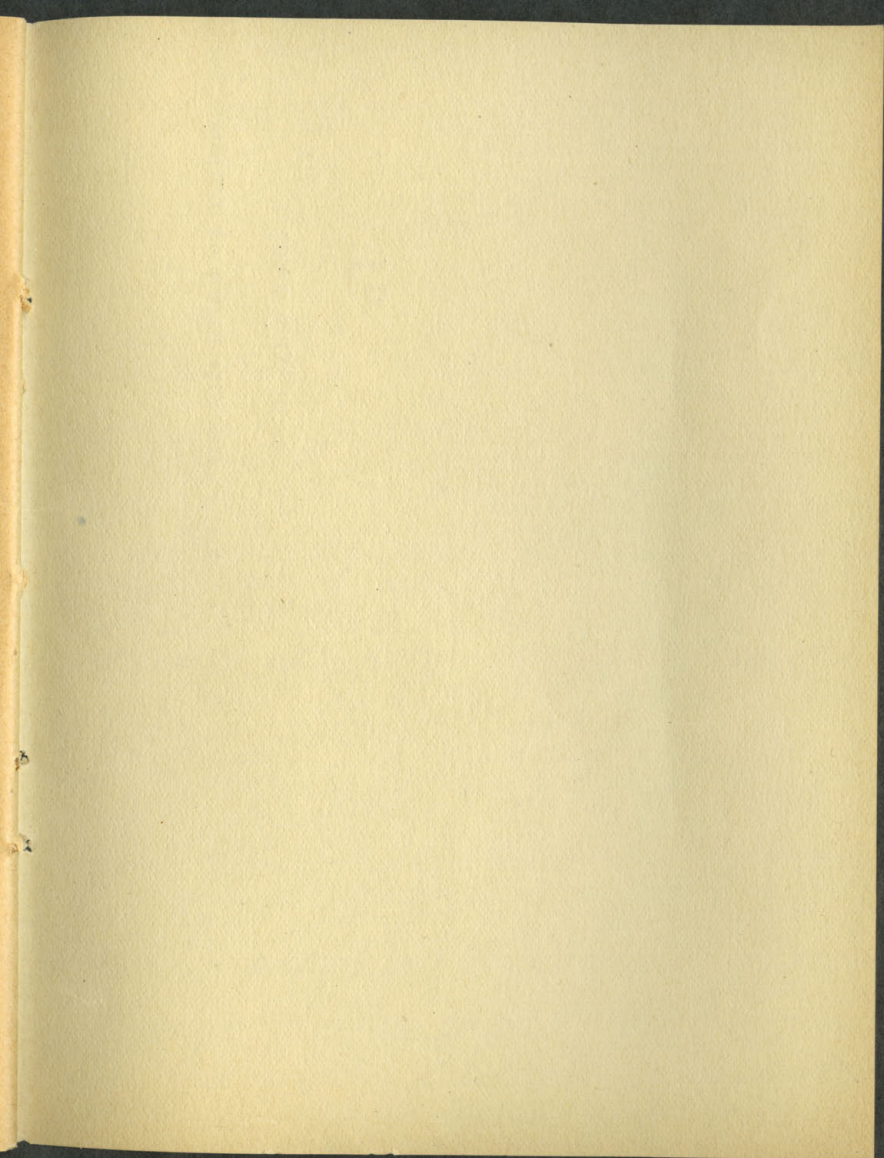
