Attorney Charles Ayers of Ottumwa in an address before the Fairmount Bird club, Friday night, gave a hair-raising account of a perilous ride through the mountainous parts of California to get a glimpse of the few remaining California Condors. There are probably less than 100 of these giant vultures left in this country.

His word-picture of his explorations through the Los Angeles area to view the bird life of that section was accompanied with picture slides. Miss Pearl Walker, secretary and treasurer of the Ottumwa Bird

club, handled the projector.

His story of the Burrowing Owl was especially interesting. This bird's cousin, the so-called "Prairie Dog Owl," so numerous fifty years ago on the western plains east of the Rocky mountains, is now practically extinct.

There are said to be 1200 species and sub-species. The sparrow family is found in every country except Australia.

The different species vary in color and size.

Iowa is reported to have 55 different species of which 20 are fairly common here abouts.

Some were classified as migrant as the purple finch.

Some as winter residents as the junco and tree sparrow, and some as all time residents as the cardinal and the gold finch.

Dr. Van Ohlen presented one of his students Keith Schreiner of Ollie, who gave a very interesting talk on the life history of the bob white (quail).

He spoke of his experiences as a member of the Iowa State College Extension Division group, of Iowa Life Conservation, on an 820 acre tract, located south-west of Eldon, where the observations were made.

He pointed out that the nests were difficult to find, because of the

protective instincts of the bird, and that only about 32 nests were found.

The father is the nest builder which is made on the ground, and usually contains from 12 to 14 eggs. Some nests are built with a cover, others are not.

The calls of the unmated cocks caused confusion in trying to locate nests, because of their migratory habit of moving from place to place.

Of the nest predators mentioned, the house cat is considered the greatest. Others were the Coopers, red tailed hawks, shunks, weasels, minkes and snakes. Surprisingly the fox does not prey upon nests as much as has been thought.

The young hatch in 23 days and leave the nest in an hour after

being hatched. In case of danger they scatter quickly, and because of their coloring, they are very difficult to find.

After this talk Dr. Van Ohlen showed 2 delightful films, in color, The ruby throated humming bird, and the red wing blackbird. Both ^{films} were much enjoyed by the group.

At the close of the program, Mrs. Van Ohlen served tasty refreshments at a beautifully appointed table, with a center piece of peach blossoms. The sprigs had been cut from the tree, a few weeks earlier, and forced into bloom, for the occasion.

that 25% of the value of the furs has been lost by improper handling.

This extension service is carried on by newspaper service, by talks on radios, by use of colored slides, by correspondence, by sending out bulletins published by the school, and by working through farm bureaus and Four "H" Clubs in rural areas.

After the talk Mr. Moorman showed a film, and displayed booklets and bulletins for the group's inspection.

The film, "Water Birds," showing herons, flamingos, egrets, wild ducks and Canada geese, was much enjoyed.

Several interesting facts were noted. The flamingos so

common in Florida; are native of India, and the Canada geese prove to be the most watchful ^{parents} of any of the water birds. The young of the wild geese and ducks are surprisingly adept at moving about in search of their own food, and they have the ability to swim very soon after being hatched.

It was also noted, that the flight of the large birds seemed very graceful in comparison to their seeming awkwardness in other respects. Refreshments of cake and coffee were served at a table lovely with spring flowers, at the close of the meeting. Mrs. Dack
